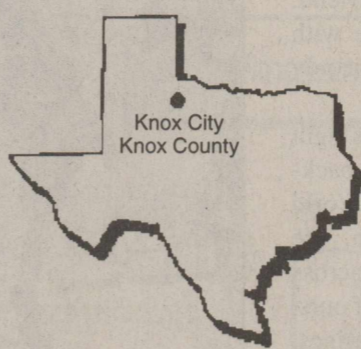

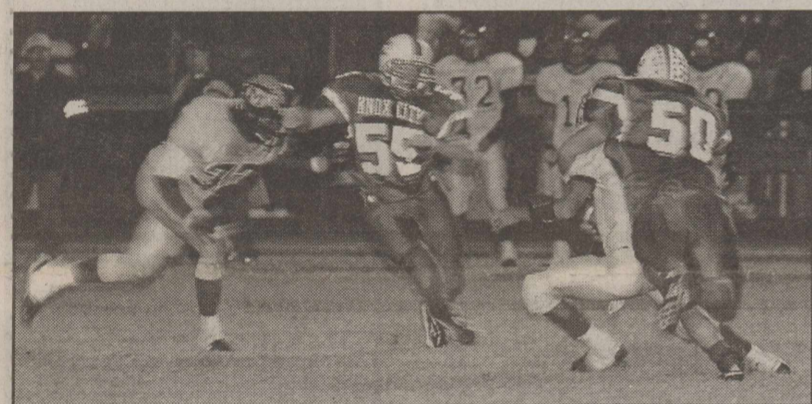

Greyhounds shut out Munday 12-0, to claim district runner up title and a trip to the playoffs

Greyhound Stadium in Knox City was the scene of jubilant celebration last Friday night after our KCHS Greyhounds defeated the Munday Moguls and claimed not only the District 9A Runner-Up title, but a trip to the post season playoffs as well.

Shutting the Moguls down and keeping them off the scoreboard, the Greyhound defense executed their game plan perfectly as they contained the open field running style of Mogul brothers Dustin and Jerome Flye. In contrast, Munday's defense failed to stop another pair of brothers, Riley and Quentin Spells of Knox City, as each scored a touchdown run to put the Greyhounds on top, 12-0 over Munday. Junior Riley Spells was the first to put points on the scoreboard when he broke several tackles and moved the ball 39 yards into the end zone with 6:19 left in the first half of play. The game remained 6-0 until Quentin Spells made a spectacular 75 yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter with 8 minutes left in the game. With the extra point kicks after both touchdowns failing to make it through the uprights, the score remained 12-0 until the end of the game.

With the temperature sitting right at 39 degrees for the start of the game, the action on the field was anything but cold. Munday started the game with a short kick to Knox City's Cameron Hutchinson, who fell on the ball at the 49 yard line to give the 'Hounds excellent field position to begin their first offensive drive.

Munday and Knox City ground up both the field and the clock as they hammered each other on both offense and defense during the game. Knox City players recognized by their coaches for big hits were Rickey Gonzales, C.J. Bruce, Derreck Magana, Carlos Ruiz, Riley Spells, Eric Lewis, and Cameron Hutchinson. The big play of the game award went to brothers Quentin and Riley Spells for their touchdown runs. Key blocks opening up holes for the runners were made by Rickey Gonzales, Riley Spells, Drew Barnard, and Brandon Espinosa.

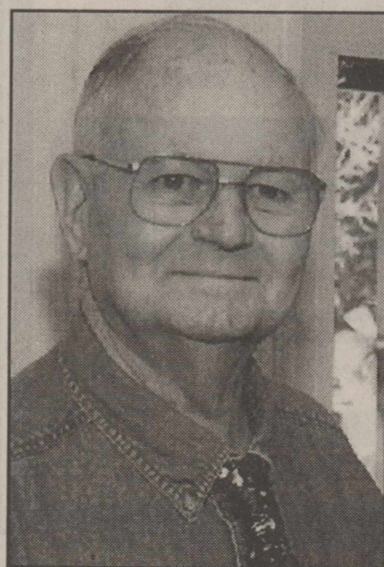

Knox City lost a friend to all and a local merchant this past weekend when Tom Paul 'Jack' Stubbs passed away in the Munday Nursing Center after a long battle with prostate cancer.

Military graveside rites were held at 2:00 p.m., Tuesday, November 11, 2003, at the Knox City Cemetery. Following the graveside rites, "A Celebration of Jack's Life" was held at the First Baptist Church in Knox City. Visitation was held in the First Baptist Church Fellowship Hall following the celebration.

Jack was born February 19, 1925, in Knox City to the late George F. and Minnie Mae McKee Stubbs. He graduated from Knox City Schools.

He served in the United States Marines in the South Pacific at Peleliu, Palau Islands, Okinawa, and Ryukyu Islands.

He married Romain Day in Knox City on December 18, 1952. Jack worked for Skelly and retired with Texaco as a lease operator. He was also a farmer and business owner. Jack and his wife Romain owned and operated the Art Stall & Frame Shop in downtown Knox City.

Knox County Hospital employees receive certification for teaching classes

Instructors to begin Heartsaver First Aid classes immediately

Knox County Hospital District employees have become certified Heartsaver First Aid instructors for the American Heart Association and will begin holding classes for the general public immediately.

The course is designed to teach rescuers the knowledge and skills they need to recognize emergencies and give first aid. Some individuals are required to take this course as a part of their employer's effort to comply with OSHA regu-

lations. For others, whose work may involve interaction with the public, such as law enforcement and lifeguards, taking this course may be a requirement of their job description.

Heartsaver First Aid includes training in assessments and interventions that can be applied by a trained lay rescuers that have been shown to make a difference. It includes training in general principles, medical emergencies, and injury emergencies. The instruc-

tors are also certified to teach CPR to lay rescuers and healthcare providers.

The course is video-based and includes peer and mannequin practice and case discussions and is approximately four hours in length. Individuals, businesses and organizations are encouraged to register for a class to become a certified first aid provider.

There's another Marine guarding the gates of Heaven

At 10:00 o'clock last Saturday night, Heaven gained another United States Marine while many of us here in Knoxville City lost a good friend. When Jack Stubbs passed from this world after a long battle with prostate cancer, he left a void in his family and community that can only be filled with fond memories.

I first met Jack over twenty years ago, and we became friends right away because there was a common shared experience in our backgrounds. Jack had served with the United States Marine Corps in World War II and I had served with the United States Army in Vietnam. We both knew first hand what it was like to be young and far away across the Pacific Ocean as we engaged the enemies of this great land of ours.

During World War II, Jack was a tank mechanic in the Marines. Every time he talked about his tanks, a look of pride would glaze over his eyes, as Jack was so very proud of what he accomplished while he and fellow Marines hopped from one island in the Pacific to another. It was tough keeping the tanks running in the brutal terrain of those Pacific islands, but Jack and his fellow tank mechanics always got the job done.

We never talked much about the harsh living conditions, we never needed to. Both of us remembered in our own way what kind of living hell we had to endure in wars that were 24 years apart in time, yet so similar in experiences.

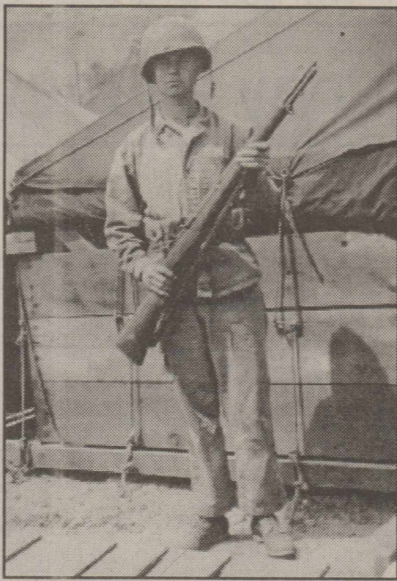
As everyone who knew Jack is aware of, he loved guns. All kind of guns; pistols, rifles, and military weapons. Jack had an extensive collection, including weapons that I was all too familiar with from the Vietnam era. Jack also loved to travel the area to gun shows. I went with Jack several times and those trips provided an opportunity to talk without the normal day to day interruptions of our businesses. Jack's first love was his family, followed by the U.S. Marine Corps. When talking about his family, the pride in each of his children was obvious, and his grandkids were a joy to him. When talking about the Marine Corps, Jack often had tears in his eyes as he related experiences and remembered those he served with who did not make it back to their loved ones. First and foremost, Jack always considered himself to be a very lucky man to have survived all his experiences during World War II.

After returning from the war, Jack worked for both Skelly and Texaco and farmed land here in Knoxville County.

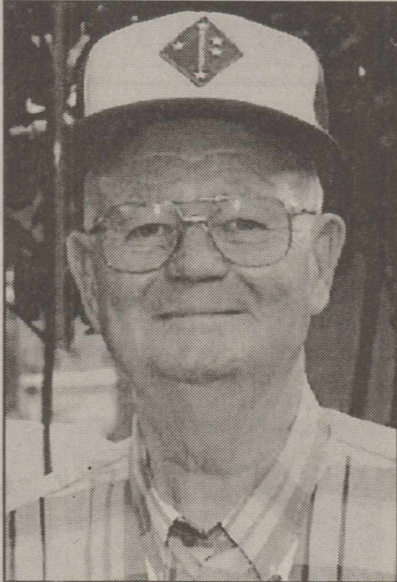
When he and his wife Romain opened up the Art Stall and Frame Shop in downtown Knoxville City, Jack was usually the one to greet customers with his always pleasant smile. After we became friends and learned of each other's wartime experiences, Jack was always finding something that had to do with Vietnam, then making it a gift to me. When I visited the Vietnam Memorial in Washington many years ago, I took a photo of the U.S. Marine Corps statue of the Marine flag raising on Iwo Jima, had it enlarged and gave it to Jack. All this was done out of mutual respect and understanding, often without words having to be spoken, one old soldier to another.

They say that it's Saint Peter who will meet you at the gates of heaven.

This past Saturday night, I'll bet Saint Peter willingly stepped aside to make room for the U.S. Marine Corps Color Guard who were all at the gates of Heaven waiting to welcome their brother home. As I write this on Monday, it is also the 228th Anniversary of the United States Marine Corps. Knowing Jack, I'll bet he's enjoying the birthday party with so many of his fellow Marines. Jack's body will be laid to rest on Tuesday, which is also Veteran's Day. What a fitting tribute for a man who was so proud of his service to his country. As the Taps sound, we'll be honoring you Jack.

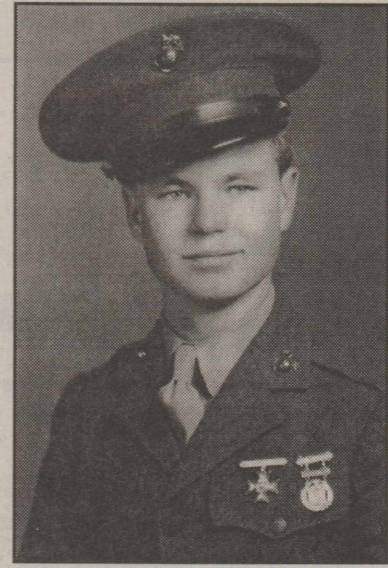

Jack's greatest pride and joy was placed in his grandkids. He loved his country that he proudly served.

He was preceded in death by his parents, sisters Hazel Wilson, Georgia Armstrong and Mozell Kennedy.

Vernon College surgical program is now accredited

Vernon College Surgical Technology program has been awarded a three year accreditation from the Commission on Accreditation of Allied Health Education Programs (CAAHEP). Vernon College is the 21st accredited program in Texas.

Jeff Feix, Surgical Technology instructor, applied for accreditation in June 2002 and submitted a self-study of the program in February 2003. An on-site visit was conducted in June 2003 by the Accreditation Review Committee for Surgical Technology, consisting of Betty Roberts from Virginia and Joe Long from Michigan.

Surgical Technologists perform a vital role in the operating room for the surgical patient. Their role as a member of the surgical team includes establishing and maintaining the sterile field for the surgical procedure, assisting with draping the patient, passing instruments and supplies to the surgeon, and assisting the Registered Nurse with patient positioning and transfer after the procedure.

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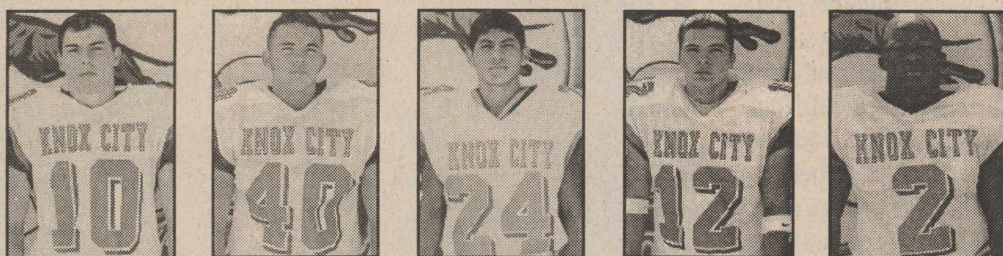

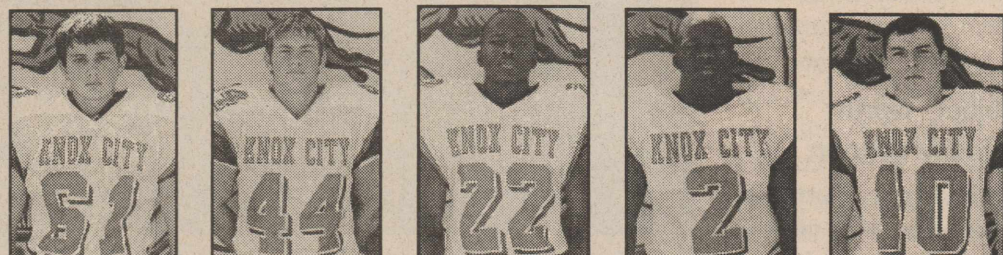

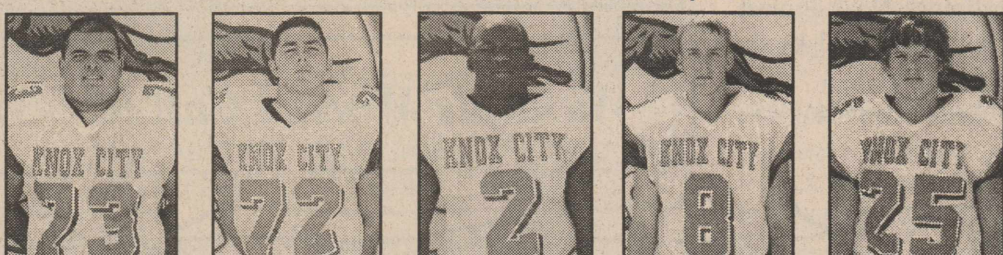

He was with the 101st airborne division. His rank was 502nd infantry Sergeant E-5.

He was stationed in many places... Like Vietnam, Guan, Japan, and served 3 years in Vietnam.

He earned many metals while serving his country. Some of them you can view today. The metals that are shown are some he earned while serving his country in the military. Top left: Screaming Eagle, Purple Heart, CIB, Silver Wreath Combat. Bottom left: 101 st ABN Division, Infantry Insignia, Parachute Wings, CIB-Combat Infantry Badge.

The day my Uncle got hit he knew that something was not right. He knew the enemy was waiting. The firing was all around. He fired back. He got knocked down. He felt something was wrong. He got hit in the right thigh. He was taken to the Hospital. This happened in 1966.

I brought a flag today with me to give in honor of those who have given their lives in any war anywhere in our country. May God bless all who have served. Thank you for keeping this land safe for me and my family.

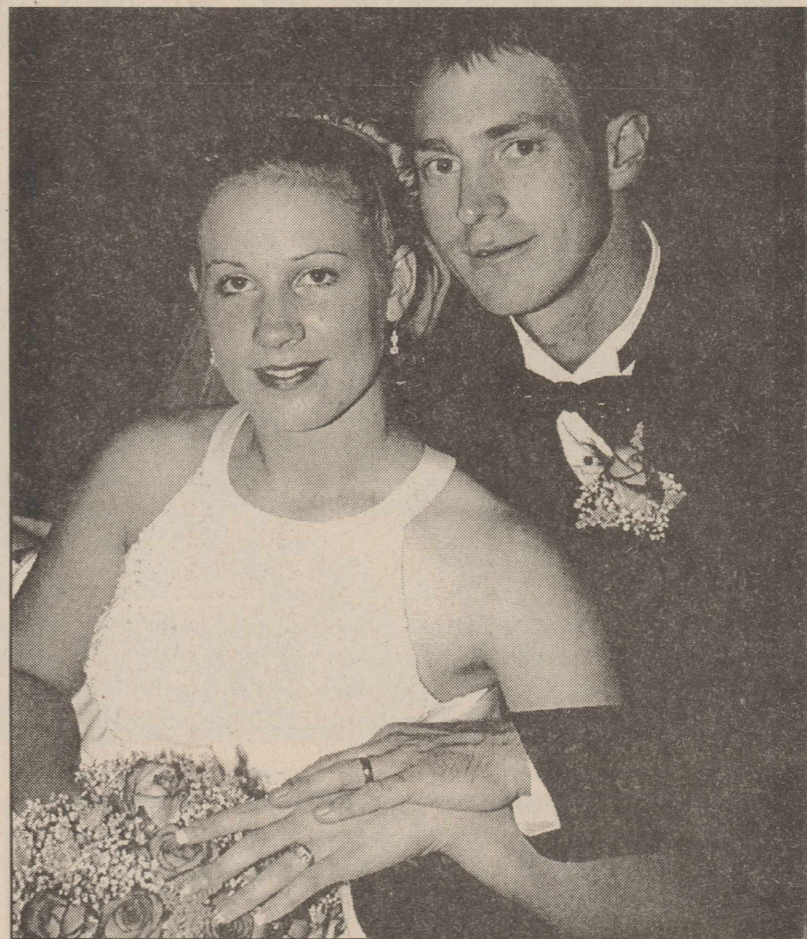

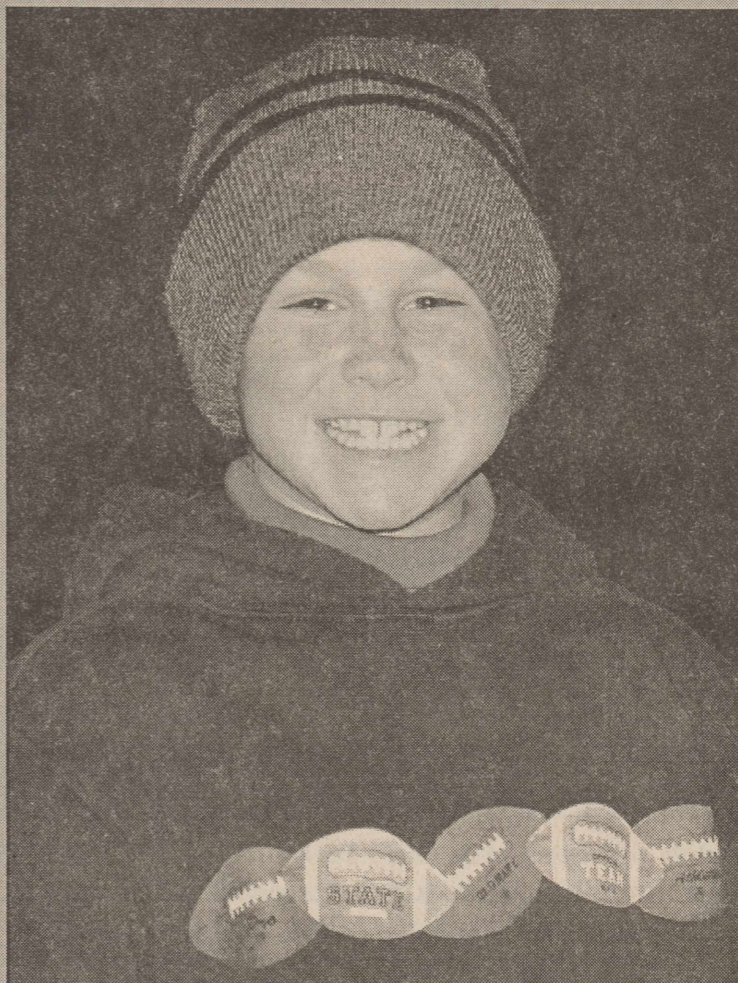

The American Cancer Society is sending a message this year with a poster stating "It's Never Too Late to Quit," proclaiming that quitting smoking significantly reduces your risk of cancer, not only of the lung, but also mouth, nasal cavities, pharynx, larynx, esophagus, stomach, pancreas, and other organs. Smokers who are ready to kick the habit can find help through the American Cancer Society's Quitline by calling toll-free, 1-877-YES-QUIT. The Quitline, funded by the Texas Department of Health using Tobacco Settlement funds, offers free telephone counseling services, advice and cessation materials to smokers, age 13 and older. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's "Cigarette Smoking Among Adults - United States, 2001" report shows a slow but continued decline in adult smoking rates from 25 percent in 1993 to 22.8 percent in 2001. Current or former smokers may enroll in a National Lung Screening Trial (NLST), a cancer screening trial funded by the National Cancer Institute that will take place at 30 study sites throughout the United States, including The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston. The trial, slated to last eight years, will examine the risks and benefits of spiral CT scans compared to chest X-rays. NLST will enroll 50,000 participants nationwide.

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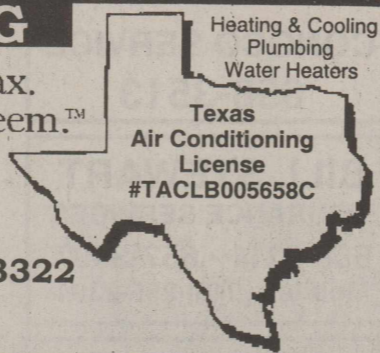

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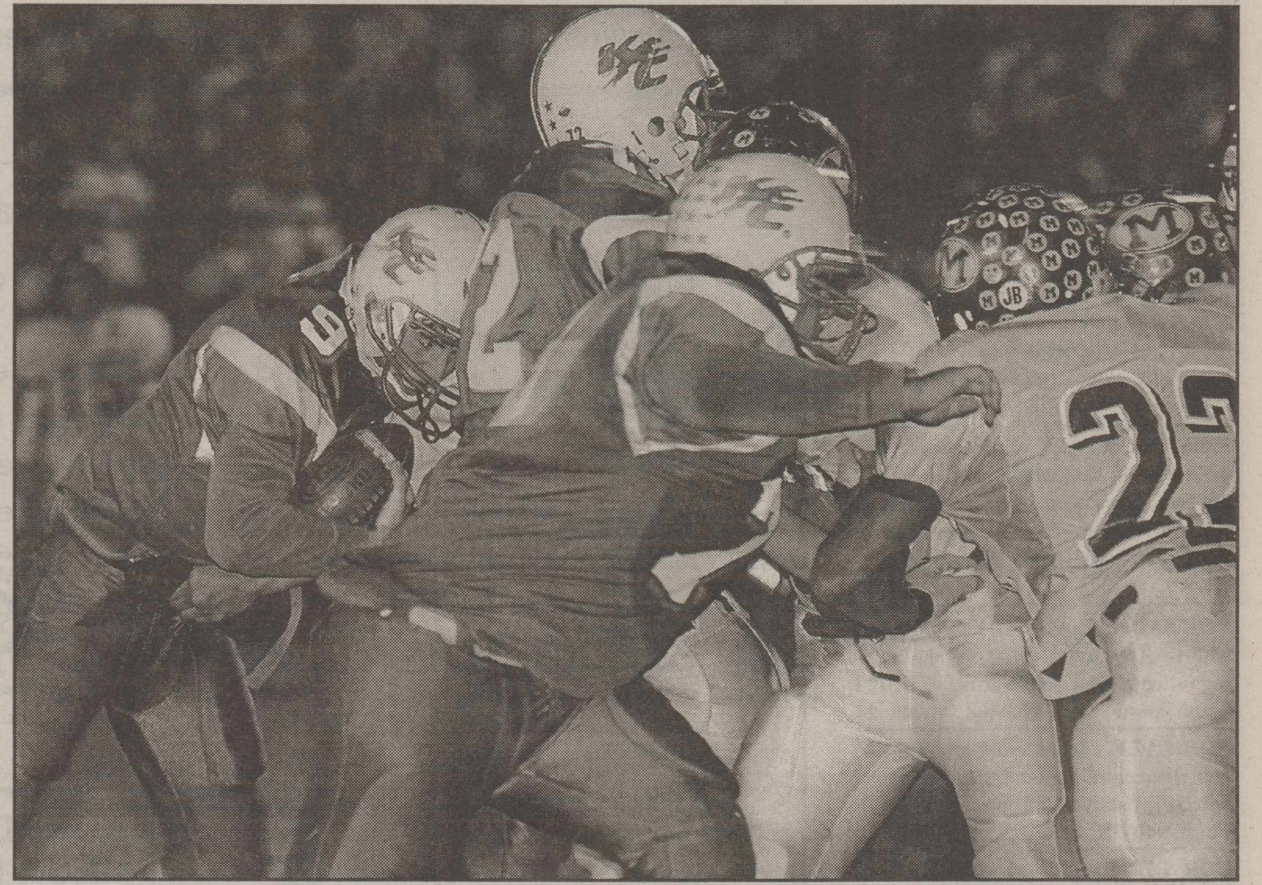

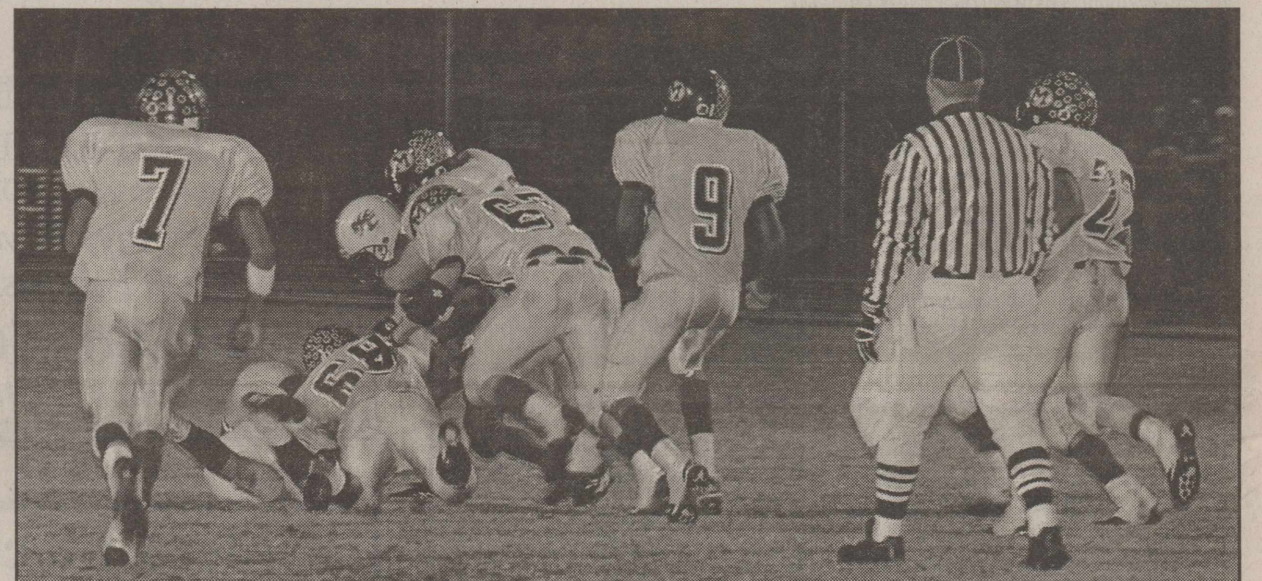
