Early primary voting to begin on Tuesday

Early voting begins next Tuesday, February 16, as Texas Democrats and Republicans ponder their choices of presidential candidates.

Primary voters will be able to case their early ballots through February 27.

In Donley County, officials are running opposed this year. Those include Sheriff Butch Blackburn, County Attorney Landon Lambert, Tax Assessor/ Collector Linda Crump, Pct. 1 Commissioner Mark White, Pct. 3 Commissioner Andy Wheatly, and Pct. 3&4 Contstable Doug Wright.

All of the above are running as Republicans.

Also running unopposed for re-election in the GOP primary are Clarendon's own US Rep. Mac Thornberry, State Rep. Ken King of Canadian, District Judge Stuart Messer, and District Attor-

ney Luke Inman. The General Election will be held Tuesday, November 1.

The Texas Department of State Health Services will hold an Immunization Clinic in Clarendon on February 18 at the Burton Memorial Library. The clinic will be open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and clinic times are subject to change or cancellation.

Rules apply to signs along state roads

State transportation officials this week are reminding citizens and candidates of the laws regulating their placement on state highway right of way.

Under Texas law, it is a class C misdemeanor to place any sign on state highway right of way. It is legal to place a campaign sign on private property adjacent to state highways with the landowner's permission. Size restrictions apply, and signs must be removed within 10 days after an election.

TxDOT's regulatory authority allows the immediate removal of a sign placed on state highway right of way without prior notice. Signs posing potential safety hazards will be removed as soon as possible.

"The object is to help others," Monroe said. "It's great that so many people help. I like it, and I've met so many great people doing this that I probably wouldn't have met otherwise."

When Monroe and her husband started helping with the food pantry, they were buying food themselves at a discount store to try to help. But they soon affiliated the ministry with the High Plains Food Bank to provide the most food for the most people.

"We can get food boxes for the Methodist church, it is a com- about 16 cents per pound through Braddock, Lynn Calvert, and Lisa the church at 806-874-3667.

For a time, the ministry reboxed the food so that each family received about 25 pounds of food, but the labor was too intensive. Now each 35-pound box goes straight to a family in need.

The schedule varies some, but the family boxes and surplus food are distributed on one Monday each month, and then a second distribution of surplus-only occurs another Monday.

Working with the High Plains Food Bank also helped the ministry with its structure by providing guidelines that recipients must meet United Methodist Church, PO Box in order to qualify for assistance.

Watson serve as coordinators for the ministry, and they are assisted by a team of about 30 volunteers who help unload the food truck and prepare for each distribution.

With the number of recipients more than doubling since 2014, the Bread of Life is in need of both volunteers and financial support. Thanks to the High Plains Food Bank, a little bit goes a long way.

"Twenty-five dollars will pay for about four boxes," Monroe said.



These really are our best candidates?

Many primary voters will find themselves in a pickle when they start voting next week.

Texas finds itself in the unusual position of actually mattering in a primary contest for the first time in several election cycles. But the choice of candidates is, well, pathetic at best.

I first interviewed Doug Smith and recorded his playing piano when he was fourteen. It was at his parents' home in Kermit. It has been amazing to watch his career blossom. He has played piano concerts in some of the major cities in America. He composed music for photographer Wyman Meinzer's video titled WEST TEXAS

Doug is 52 now and living in Lubbock. "My music is very dynamic for piano music," he says. "It's loud and rambunctious, not your soothing type of piano. Some of my songs are soulful, though." Doug has played piano since he was two. His first concert was at age six. "I played for the whole elementary school there in Kermit and I knew right then what I was going to do the rest of my life."

PBS did a documentary of Doug and it played on television stations across the country. "I went from playing 20 dates a year to playing 80 to 90 dates a year. All of a sudden I was playing in St Louis, Chicago, Los Angeles and New York. I'd walk out on stage wearing a cowboy hat looking like a hayseed and play concert piano. I never have a playlist; just play what I think the audience wants to hear. It's all my original music. Yamaha picked up sponsorship

and made sure I had a piano wherever I went."

In 2007, during his 25th year as a concert pianist, Doug was getting ready to perform on the **Austin City** Limits televi-

sion program when he had a wreck in his pickup, resulting in a spinal cord injury. "When it happened I couldn't move from the neck down. Therapy has brought me to where I am today. That's a long way. Nobody ever thought I'd be up in a wheelchair playing piano and recording music again and doing what I do. It's just been a God-given determination not to stay in bed. I can't use the fingers on my left hand so I use the old karate chop method and I'll play with the side of my

hand." Doug is confined to his wheel chair and has to have help to get up and get around. He was in bed two years before he could get in a wheel chair. His wife left him a few years after he was injured. But his spirit is as bright and healthy as

ever. He plays every day and has made one album since the accident. That brings his total albums to 14. "My daddy used to fuss at me for making so many albums, but I'm glad I did when I could because I make my living with them now." He has composed 200 songs not yet released. Occasionally he makes a motivational speech.

He had his therapy at Craig Hospital in Denver. "That's where Superman went for his therapy," says Doug. "I figured if it was good enough for Superman it was good enough for me." When hospital personnel learned about Doug's speaking, they invited him to come up there and make a speech. "After I spoke I wheeled up to the grand piano and played Amazing Grace. When I finished, the two thousand people who were there stood straight up and it was the most fulfilling ovation that I've ever had in my life."

I heard a recent recording of Doug playing Amazing Grace. There are significant pauses between musical phrases but the recording is dramatic and makes the listener feel and understand what it took to play that song.

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

Aspirin May Lower Prostate Cancer Risk

Aspirin works by blocking several different chemical processes in the body that cause pain, inflammation, and

Prostate cancer develops when certain cells in the prostate become abnormal. These abnormal cells often continue living, while the normal cells die. According to a recent study, daily aspirin use in men with prostate cancer may be associated with a slower rate of disease progression and a reduced risk of dying from the condition. The results came from a large study in which data was collected from over three thousand men with prostate cancer who were evaluated over a twenty-seven year period. Men who took aspirin everyday had twenty-four percent lower chances of developing severe prostate cancer. Thirty-nine percent had lower risk of dying from prostate cancer. More research is needed to determine the additional benefits of the daily use of aspirin as well as

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
