The race sponsored by the Clarendon Lions Club in conjunction with National Child Abuse Awareness Month, drew 127 registrations and had 107 actual runners and walkers the day of the event as well as dozens of spectators, supporters, and workers.



City moving ahead with project after **Town Hall**

Clarendon Aldermen are set to move forward this week with a \$3.9 million project to improve the city's water distribution system following a recent Town Hall meeting.

"I think it was a positive response," City Administrator David Dockery said of the Town Hall. "We'll have something dealing with this project on every agenda for the foreseeable future."

The City Council will consider two items on its agenda this Thursday that will set the project in motion, the administrator said. The first is a "notice to proceed," and the second will be action to engage bond counsel.

Dockery says he expects the city will complete surveying and design work within six months, project bidding will be done in seven or eight months, and construction will begin within a year. Once construction begins, the project will take 18 months to three years to complete.

The main focus of the project will be to address discolored water found in some parts of town that is caused by miles of cast iron distribution pipes and poor flow through the system. The city is also out of compliance with state regulations for elevated storage due to problems with the standpipe (or water tower) on the east side of town. Clarendon could face state fines in the near future if those issues are not addressed.

The city additionally will replace all water meters with auto read meters. City officials say the aging meters currently in use are inaccurate by as much as 20 percent, and automated meters would significantly reduce the man-hours needed each month to read more than 700 meters.

Through the USDA Rural Development Program, Clarendon for th e project of \$1.387 million and a loan in the amount of \$2.522 million. The loan will take 40 years to pay off at 2.5 percent interest and with an annual payment of about \$100,500. The loan payment would require additional revenue for the city equal to \$10 per month per water connection. Dockery says the rate increase is about nine months in the future at this point. More than 50 people attended the Town Hall meeting on the night of March 29 at the Bairfield Activity Center, where Dockery, along with Mayor Larry Hicks and city engineer Clayton Scales, fielded questions from the public following an explanatory overview of the project. A sample of the questions and answers follows. Question: Why can't the east standpipe be raised to create more elevated storage? Have we asked for a variance from the state? Answer: The engineers aren't sure the foundation or the base shell of the standpipe could handle the weight of additional capacity. And we can't get a variance.

Big things happening in Clarendon

If you didn't get out of the house last weekend, you missed a terrific time in Clarendon.

Kimberly Britten and Jordan Green breathed new life into an old landmark and launched their Whistle-Stop Trade Days on Friday. Approximately 100 vendors and literally countless customers and on-lookers crowded the former Chamberlain Motor Company property during the course of three days.

Also on Sunday, a great new family activity was formally opened at Lake Greenbelt. The Greenbelt Disc Golf Club held a ribbon cutting and hosted the first tournament on its newly finished 18-hole course at Kincaid Park.

The committee behind the development of the disc golf course is already working on an even bigger tournament that will be held June 4 and 5 (which will also coincide with the 11th annual Trash To Treasures Garage Sale event and comes one week before the third monthly trade days).

Speaking of things going on, THE CLARENDON ENTERPRISE is proud to welcome its fellow newspapers to our city as the Panhandle Press Association holds its 106th annual convention here this week.

It's been ten years since a gathering of newspaper men and women was held in Clarendon. The West Texas Press Association held its convention here in 2006; but while the two associations share some territory, the PPA is largely comprised of a different group of folks.

The WTPA is the largest regional press group in Texas with members from Perryton to the Davis Mountains. By contrast, the Panhandle Press is bound a little bit closer to home with its members mostly coming from the Texas Panhandle and South Plains and a few friendly neighbors from New Mexico and Oklahoma.

for most of its history, the Panhandle Press typi cally held its annual conventions in Amarillo, but six years ago the PPA returned to its birthplace in Canadian and began alternating holding its meetings in Amarillo on odd numbered years and in an area community on even years. Clarendon and this newspaper has had a long history with the PPA, including having five local journalists serve as president of the association - Sam Braswell, J.C. Estlack, George Wayne Estlack, your humble editor, and now your humble editor's better half We are also proud to have four former Clarendon newspaper men and women as members of the PPA Hall of Fame, and on Friday we'll add another name to that list. The late Edward E. Carhart, the man who brought the first printing press to the Panhandle will have his name added to the roll that already includes J.C. Estlack, George Wayne Estlack, L.H. Carhart, and Ruby Dell Estlack. My late uncle, George Wayne, encouraged me years ago to get involved with the state and regional press associations. He said that no one could really understand this business except those who are in it and that I could learn a lot just by being around fellow newspapermen. He was right. But what he didn't tell me was how close the relationships are that develop within these associations.

Peace beyond all understanding

Only God could create a character like the late Hal Rowe. During his 72-year earthly pilgrimage, his specialty was constantly helping others, always making them smile.

Consider his bungled marriage proposal to Joyce. She accepted – IF he'd place the ring on her OTHER hand. He blamed inexperience, asking, "Do you want to marry a 210-pound football player or a 130-pound poet?" The two would share life's "thick and thin" journey for a half-century. Much of Hal's life elicited smiles,

when of Hars the encred sinies, even at age 68, when he donated a kidney to an acquaintance with critical need. "They won't accept blood from persons on Alzheimer's medication, but kidneys are OK," he laughed. *****

Hal battled Alzheimer's for seven years, but "remembered" to insist on Blue Bell ice cream cup giveaways as folks exited his funeral. Alzheimer's was one of Hal's many

battles. Consider his struggle in 1986 when 20-year-old son Greg was killed in a collision with a drunken driver. Kevin, the Rowe's other son, also

was deeply grieved. Yet, he, too, forged on, finishing Lubbock Monterey High School a few days after Greg's funeral. The loss of his dad a quarter-century later was even greater; Hal was Kevin's best friend.....

Between the two losses, Kevin opted for a four-year stint in the Navy, serving in the Persian Gulf War. He lost several buddies along the way.

Back home after discharge, he clung to his dad, mom and sister Melissa.

He then earned a degree at Howard Payne University, where I was president at the time. I well remember this student who said little, but blessed others with

his thoughtful manner and ready smile....

He valued family above all else.

Upon **american** Hal's death in 2012, Kevin took over man-

agement of the family 'srental properties.

Renters compared him to his caring father. Hal, for many years a deacon and Sunday school teacher, radiated an everpresent spirit for others. Kevin, however, may have felt he didn't measure up. Or maybe life's "gut punches" became too many. Diagnosed with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder, he took his life on March 3. He was 47....

"The Lord prepares us for what lies ahead," Joyce said. "I hadn't heard from Kevin for two days, and was distressed to discover no activity on his credit card and phone," she said.

Attempts to nap were futile as she anticipated a visit by Dr. and Mrs. Larry Jones. Linda is her favorite cousin, and she hadn't seen them for almost a year. (They live some 300 miles from Lubbock.)

They insisted on taking her to dinner; she "had no appetite."...

On the way home, a neighbor called to tell her a policeman was at her house. "I knew Kevin was gone, and told him before he told me," she said, recognizing the officer, the son-in-law of her hairdresser.

Had she gone to Kevin's apartment at the time Larry and Linda reached Lubbock, her visit would have coincided with arrival of the medical examiner. She also was spared seeing an unkempt apartment. Joyce later noticed, however, that his garage workshop was immaculate – just like his dad's.

"I was comforted by two treasured relatives, and within two hours, all ministers from my church – as well as dozens of members and the entire staff where I work – were at my side," Joyce recalls...

As was the case at Greg's and Hal's memorial services, several hundred gathered for Kevin's. Larry preached; Melissa's from-the-heart eulogy touched all.

Within a week, Joyce – once named "national teacher of the year" during her 24-year Lubbock Monterey High School career – was back at the Bacon Heights Baptist Church keyboard. Except for two moves from Lubbock totaling 15 months, she has served in that role for 49 years.


She has photographs, memories of her husband and two sons and the evergrowing love of a daughter, to keep her going....

She's better equipped now to comfort others on life's jagged edges. So is Melissa, who also works at Lake Ridge Funeral Home.

It is our honor and privilege to host the PPA convention. We hope that each visitor this week takes home with them fond memories of our community, and we sincerely thank them for their friendship. Every time we leave the country we are advised to watch for pickpockets in areas where there are large crowds. Travel books and brochures tell travelers not to carry any loose cash, wallets or passports in front pants pockets or in purses without secure locks. A friend of mine has had his pocket picked two different times. Once was on a bus in Budapest during the winter when he was wearing an overcoat. He was lucky. All the perpetrator got was a notebook that had a list of expenses. Another time he was in Rome and had put about

30 dollars' worth of Italian currency in his pocket for some walking around cash he had planned to use for lunch and incidentals. Someone came up to him and asked if he needed help finding his way around town. Suddenly my friend noticed he was minus his walking around cash.

Pickpockets are well trained and start learning their trade at an early age. Small children suddenly appear out of nowhere and stand by your side without you noticing them.

My wife took our five-year-old grandson on a train trip from Dallas to Texarkana. While she was buying the tickets at Union Station in Dallas, she put her wallet on the shelf by the ticket office. She was distracted by her grandson who needed a drink of water. When She turned

Over the years I have bought some money belts and pouches that hang around the neck underneath a shirt. On my most recent trip out of the country I noticed several men in airports and in cities wearing the pouches on the outside their shirts. That made it convenient to use, but a skilled criminal could cut the cord without the owner being aware of what was happening. I keep mine out of sight. It has pockets for passports, credit cards and cash, things you want to keep and use only for yourself.

I have some travel vests that I use when I leave the country. They have large inside pockets with zippers and I feel secure putting valuables in them. I don't ever take the vest off and leave it on the back of a chair while I have a meal.

Losing cash, passports and wallets are real downers and could ruin a trip. You don't want to walk around full of fear about losing your valuables. Put them in a safe place and enjoy your travels.

(It's a real thing: it's an organization that helps governments work together on crossborder privacy cooperation.)

Here are few things to remember if you get any kind of tech-support call, no matter who they say they are:

Don't give control of your computer to anyone who calls you offering to "fix" your computer. Never give out or confirm your financial or sensitive information to anyone who contacts you. Getting pressure to act immediately? That's a sure sign of a scam. Hang up. If you have concerns, contact your security software company directly. Use contact information you know is right, not what the caller gives you. If you spot a scam, tell the FTC.



Thornberry to host service academy forum

AMARILLO - Staff from the office of US Congressman Mac Thornberry (R-Clarendon) will host the annual 13th District's Service Academy Forum on Saturday, April 16. for high school students interested in pursuing an education at a United States Service Academy.

The free, informational event will take place at the Texas Air and Space Museum in the Rick Husband Amarillo International Airport from 9:30 until 11:30 a.m. This forum is designed for potential nominees in school. However, all local students are invited to attend No RSVP is required.

To be eligible to attend an academy, students must be at least 17 years old, but not have passed the 23rd birthday by the entry date; must be a United States citizen; unmarried; and, have no legal obligation

to support children or other dependents

"Nominating students to a service academy is one of the highest privileges I have in Congress," said Thornberry, who serves as the chairman of the House Armed Services Committee "We owe the deepest gratitude to the brave men and women who serve to protect our freedoms, and I applaud each and every student for their desire to answer this worthy calling."

At the event, representatives their junior or senior year of high from the US Air Force Academy, the US Military Academy (West of any age, parents, and counselors Point), and the US Naval Academy will provide details on appointment procedures, daily life at the academies, and post-graduate military commitments, as well as answer any specific questions from the audience. Information about the US Merchant Marine Academy will also be provided.

Each applicant must receive a nomination from a member of Congress in order to be considered. As a member of Congress, Rep. Thornberry is allowed to nominate a limited number of students for each service academy per year.

Applications for nominations must be submitted to the Congressman's Amarillo office by December 1 of a student's senior year. After reviewing the congressional nominations and student applications, the service academies will make final selections and offers of appointment in the spring. Accepted nominees will receive a free education, including tuition and room and board. in return for an agreement to serve as an officer in the military for a minimum of five years after graduation. 
