Grant pays for new patrol vehicle for sheriff's office

The county retired a patrol truck as trade-in for the new vehicle, which the judge says is better suited Deputy Miranda Betts says new 2017 Chevrolet Tahoe that to the job of the highway safety

officer. "This is a highway pursuit vehicle," Howard said. "It is more stable and more capable and fits in better with us complementing DPS efforts on the highway."

The judge said the county will be applying for continuing grant funds for the next four years to help cover a portion of Betts' salary. Those funds, if approved, would decline over time – 80 percent next year then 60, 40, and 20 percent.

The Tahoe will have about a three- to four-year service life with the county before it needs to be traded off while it still retains a good value, Howard and Blackburn both said. At which time the county

CC offers honors program

High school students taking dual credit classes from Clarendon College will have new opportunities for success through a new Honors College program starting this fall. Honors College students wou

ılc receive priority advising and get specialized transfer advising fro both Texas Tech University and W d West Texas A&M University and have opportunities to attend transfer days at both universities

"We're very excited ab opportunity to meet with these students and help them be successful," said CC President Robert Riza. "This gives them an opportunity to leave home, adjust to college life, get their core classes completed or finish an associate's degree, and then transfer to a university."

The program, approved by the Board of Regents last month, will waive tuition and fees for college hours equal to the number of dual credit hours completed for CC students from outside of Donley County. Those students would be required to live in student housing on the Clarendon campus and could not combine their waiver with other CC institutional scholarships.

Donley County resident high school students are also eligible for the Honors College without being required to live on campus, but their

'Welcoming the stranger'

On Feb. 8, a group of Latino men were leaving an vernight hypothermia shelter at Rising Hope Mission Church in Alexandria, Va., when they were surrounded by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

by U.S. immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE officers, arrested and taken away in vans. The church's pastor, Kerry Kincannon, worries that ICE is now targeting churches, abandoning longstanding ICE guidelines that treat houses of worship, hospitals and schools as "sensitive areas" to be avoided when rounding up people for deportation.

"They are making people fearful of coming to church," Kincannon told a local TV station. "They ar making people fearful of coming in, to get out of the cold, to get help in a shelter, and we are not going to stand for it, we are absolutely not going to stand for

Kincannon is not alone. Religious leaders across the country are increasingly concerned about new immigration policies that have "taken the shackles off" ICE agents, in the words of White House Press Secretary Sean Spicer.

Of course, large numbers of undocumented immigrants were deported under the Obama administration. But Obama-era guidelines focused ICE on serious criminals and gang members; this directive appears to be vanishing under President Donald Trump. According to news reports from several states people with no criminal history or with misdemeanor convictions are now being swept up in ICE raids.

Houses of worship are pushing back by declaring themselves "sanctuary churches" – an ac of conscience that many sanctuary activists believe is rooted in biblical admonitions to "welcome the " At various times in American histo churches have given sanctuary to the vulnerable most famously harboring fugitive slaves as part of the Underground Railroad in the 19th century. In the Underground Railroad in the 19th century. In the 1980s, many churches gave sanctuary to Centra American refugees fleeing civil conflict. According to USA Today, there are now more ry to Central

than 800 sanctuary houses of worship in 45 states, a number that spiked dramatically after the presidential election

Earlier this month, to cite just one example, the Earlier this month, to cite just one example, First Unitarian Society of Denver gave sanctuary to Jeanette Vizguerra, a mother of four described by Denver Mayor Michael Hancock as "an active legal status through the proper channels." To be clear, religious and civic leaders like Kincannon and Hancock are not arguing that the

government turn a blind eye to the presence of more than 11 million undocumented people in the U.S. Nor do they oppose ICE taking action against people who have committed serious crimes and endanger the iity

But sanctuary leaders are standing up for ocumented people who they believe have be betrayed by a government that has long refused to fix the problem, and big business that has long profited from the labor of undocumented migrants. Instead of taking responsibility for creating and sustaining a broken immigration system, many Americans now demand mass deportation and unworkable walls. For the sanctuary movement, this is a classic case of blaming the victim

Marining the victim. Against this backdrop of dysfunction, hundreds of religious individuals and communities involved in the sanctuary movement see their actions as acts of religious conscience protected by the First Amendment. For many Christians, protecting the vulnerable is more than social justice; it is a comma of the Gospel

Thus far however the religious freedom defer not prevailed in the courts. Under current law, ICE may enter places of worship to arrest undocumented people. And religious leaders themselves risk being charged with harboring people not authorized to be in the U.S.

Exactly which actions by religious leaders o violate the law is murky, given that lower courts differ on whether "harboring" means concealment or simple sheltering. But we do know that religious clergy and laypeople were arrested and convicted for their work

in the sanctuary movement in the 1980s. Since the law may not protect them, churches and other places of worship must rely on public opinion and moral suasion to keep ICE agents from entering their sanctuaries. The ICE "sensitive areas" guidelines are an acknowledgment that the optics of raiding churches would be morally repugnant – and a public relations nightmare

But if houses of worship become fair game for ICE under Trump – which is precisely what Pastor Kincannon fears – the only recourse for many people of faith is civil disobedience through nonviolen

Civil disobedience is not, of course, one of the five freedoms guaranteed by the First Amendment. But a sixth freedom – the act of following the dictates of conscience in pursuit of justice – has been at the heart of social justice movements throughout

American history. From the Underground Railroad to the women's suffrage movement, from the civil rights movement to ACT UP, courageous Americans have defied what they believed were unjust government laws and policies and willingly accepted the consequences, including physical assault, arrest and incarceration.

"Welcoming the stranger" in the current climate requires courage and carries risk. But in the face of injustice, the voice of conscience cannot be denied.



The event, Give & Take: Consumers, Contributions, and Charity, will bring together regulators, researchers charity watchdogs, donor advocates and members of the nonprofit sector. In the tips when asked to give: Donate to charities you know and trust and that have a proven track record. Be alert for charities that seem to have sprung up overnight in connection with current events. Check out the charity with the Better Business Bureau's (BBB) Wise Giving Alliance, Charity Navigator, Charity Watch, or GuideStar. Don't assume that charity messages posted on social media are legitimate. Research the organization urself. When texting to donate. onfirm the number with the source efore you donate. The charge wil show up on your mobile phone bill, but donations are not immediate. It

can take as long as 90 days for the charity to receive the funds. Find out if the charity or fundraiser must be registered in your state by contacting the National Association of State the National Ass Charity Officials.

"Prize Scams: Don't Pay to Play" by Ari Lazarus, FTC You get a phone call from an

excited caller saying you've won a trip, a car, or a lot of money. Next, they ask you to send money before you get the prize. That is a sure sign of a scam. Recently, we've heard about a spike in prize scam calls. Although there are some legitimate contests, remember: there are a lot of scams. Here are a few ways to spot a prize scam: Scammers ask you to pay before you can claim your prize

you pay a fee or buy something to enter or improve your chances winn ning. Scammers might and official and say it's for ight try to for "taxes," "shipping and handling charges," or "processing fees." Don't pay to claim a prize, and never give your checking or credit card number for a sweepstakes promotion.

Scammers ask you to wire money to "insure" delivery of your prize. Don't do it. Legitimate sweepstakes don't ask you to wire money. Once you wire money, you can't get it back. The same goes for sending a check or money order by overnight delivery or putting money on a prepaid debit card.

Scammers send you a check and ask you to send some of the ack. But the check is fake money b and you're responsible for repaying the bank. Scammers use the names of well-known companies for prize ns. Con artists often pretend to from well-known companies to call fro make themselves appear legitimate and gain your trust. If you don't remember entering, you probably didn't. If you think it may be legit, use a search engine to find the company's real phone number. Call to confirm that you entered a contest before responding to any claims that you won. If you're suspicious of a prize offer, report it to us Stay safe out there!

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
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Regional Quarter Finals Champs

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


