## Dairy Queen franchise holder in bankruptcy

The future of Clarendon's Dairy Queen is unclear but the restaurant was still open as the Enterprise went to press Tuesday afternoon.

The uncertainty comes from the bankruptcy filing of the local DQ franchise owner, Vasari LLC, and the closure of 22 Dairy Queens, including those in Claude, Wellington, and Shamrock.

Social media and local talk

erupted last week after area news outlets reported that the Clarendon location was on the company's list to be shuttered, but a spokesperson told the ENTERPRISE last Thursday the store's closure was not definite.

"Please note that the list of stores 'potentially' closing that some media have run with was sourced from one of the public filings that included a list of stores the claims

agent may visit," public relations account manager Whitney Albert said. "It is not a definitive list of closures, and while some locations on the list have already closed, others are not closing."

Albert was referring to a published list of 29 Texas, New Mexico, and Oklahoma DQ restaurants that were facing possible liquidation.

"After filing for Chapter 11

bankruptcy protection on Monday, October 30, Vasari LLC, a Dairy Queen franchisee based in Texas, has announced the closure of 22 underperforming restaurants in Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico," Albert said. "Contrary to some earlier reports, no decision has been made on remaining locations, although some may close within the next 90 days. Ultimately, Vasari will restruct-

ture to create a smaller but financially stronger company."

Local employees said last week they had been given no information about the possible closure of the DQ.

Vasari closed five Dairy Queens – including the ones in Shamrock, Perryton, and Dumas – prior to its bankruptcy filing. Among the additional 17 locations that closed last week were Wellington and Claude.

## CJCAT recognizes Seliger for outstanding service

State Sen. Kel Seliger was honored on Tuesday, November 7, by the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas (CJCAT) for his outstanding service during the 85th Session of the Texas Legislature.

CJCAT Immediate Past President Woodrow W. "Woody" Gossom Jr., Wichita County Judge, presented Seliger with the 2017 Legislative Award at a special ceremony in the Commissioners Courtroom at the Potter County Courthouse.

## Breast cancer screening offered for uninsured women

Uninsured women age 40 and above will have the opportunity to receive a mammogram at no cost thanks to a new collaborative effort.

The effort is the work of the Panhandle Breast Health's WISE Woman program, Breast Center of Excellence (Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center), and Lowe's Family Center of Clarendon, which are sponsoring an Information Screening Event in the at Lowe's next Wednesday, November 15, from 2 to 4 p.m.

Pap test are also available to those meeting current guidelines. Women with insurance, but in need of an annual screening, will be scheduled for appointments as well.

Women may be scheduled for screening appointments with mobile units that will be in the parking lot of Lowe's on Monday, November 27, starting at 8:30 a.m.

Women may opt for screenings with the mobile units or with a participating provider of their choice.

Many women are unable to access medical and preventive care because they do not have insurance. The screening's mammograms are paid for by a state grant made to TTUHSC.

Given that at least 66 percent of the female population in our area is not compliant with current screening guidelines and given that early detection of breast cancer is the key to less intensive treatment and better assurance of survival, annual screenings are most impor-

tant for Panhandle women to know about and to obtain.

Pre-paid services for uninsured persons are not always available. Many regions have no such services at all. Please encourage women to come to Lowe's for these important services

# Shouting down free speech

Is the First Amendment truly in danger? It can certainly seem like it when every week some new and alarming event happens that makes people wonder if our freedom to express ourselves is slipping away.

But is that just a feeling that we get from being plugged into the 24-hour news cycle, or from listening to pundits argue with each other on cable television?

Here at the First Amendment Center, we launched a report card series this year in the hopes of gauging true threats to the First Amendment. Each quarter, 15 experts from across the political spectrum award grades to the five freedoms guaranteed by the First Amendment. They base their evaluations on events that have occurred in the previous three months.

The latest report card shows that over the course of this year, our panelists have grown steadily more pessimistic about freedom of speech. Its grade point average has dropped from a C+ to a C; and while at the beginning of this year the majority of panelists awarded it Bs and Cs, it recently has been earning Ds and Fs.

Why the gloomy outlook on free speech? Our panelists pointed to two major factors: controversies involving free speech on college campuses, and controversies involving free speech and Donald Trump. In the past few months there have been several incidents where college students have disrupted events featuring controversial campus speakers. Furthermore, survey results from the Brookings Institute, The Economist, and the Cato Institute indicate that a majority of college students think that hate speech should be censored and that students should be able to shut down an event they don't like by loudly and repeatedly shouting down the speaker.

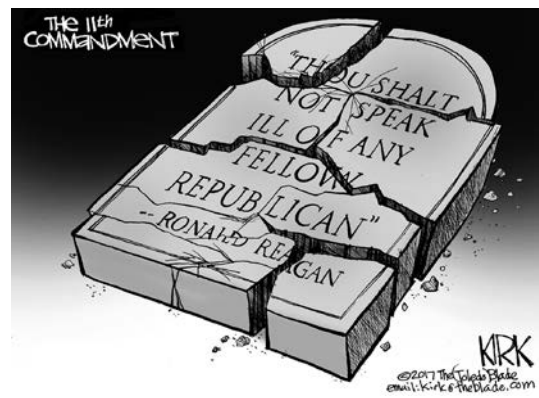
As for President Trump, his latest attacks on freedom of speech have revolved around his open criticism of football player Colin Kaepernick for kneeling during the national anthem; he urged the NFL to fire Kaepernick for exercising his First Amendment right to engage in silent protest. (He also continues to take cheap shots at the free press, but let's take it one freedom at a time.)

How much do things like this matter in the long run? For all the news that they've generated, President Trump and (most) American college students haven't actually violated the First Amendment. The First Amendment protects our speech from government censorship and government punishment. For all of his rampant tweeting, Trump has not sought a law making it illegal to kneel during the national anthem, nor has he personally taken any action against Kaepernick. He has advocated for the NFL to fire Kaepernick, but that's a suggestion, not a mandate. As his press team has pointed out, the president has First Amendment rights as well.

It also sometimes feels like a bizarre form of theater. Tweeting about disrespect for the national anthem allows Trump to play to his fan base while avoiding a real conversation about police brutality. Shouting down a speaker like Richard Spencer makes students feel like they've defeated a neo-Nazi — but it's uncertain what kind of impact this has on the white supremacist movement as a whole.

Sometimes we forget that freedom of speech doesn't just refer to the right to talk; it also encompasses the right to hear others speak. The rising antagonism toward speech we disagree with doesn't necessarily violate the First Amendment, but this attitude can be corrosive to its spirit. Because when speech becomes less about the communication of ideas and more about posturing and showing off your hatred for your enemies, fewer and fewer people will hear it.

# The way we were way back when

At a time not so long ago--when smiling was a frequent response to something said or done--we were more relaxed, feeling that much was right with the world. Sadly, smiles have pretty much abandoned faces around our shrinking world.

Today, if Abbott and Costello somehow reappeared on earth with their best verbal exchanges about "who's on first," there'd be quick searches for strait jackets instead of readings on laugh meters.

Most comments from "quotable" people, whether in the world of politics, business, sports or entertainment, are sharp-edged. Gentle souls seeking restorative humor from yesteryear are in short supply....

A single quote, forwarded via email by a friend from college days, affected me warmly. He's long been known for his quick wit, as well as occasional acerbic tendencies. In the autumn of his life, he's digging through historic files of humorous quotes that once caused the world to rock with laughter.

The one he sent is timely, since Americans whose interest in baseball shot upward in all time zones due to the intensity and excitement provided by the 2017 World Series.

A part of me is hesitant to share my friend's "find", since there's clearly an envy factor to admit. Not only is he extremely sharp, he resides in swanky digs across the pond, unless he's sailing the high seas. Whichever, his "location du jour" is such that he thumbs through files in utmost comfort. A drumroll, please, for this denizen of a high-end

world, whose favorite sports quote was a sterling response from a baseball umpire about a century ago. It is credited to one Bill Klem, who worked a record 18 World Series....

He was behind the plate when a rookie pitcher complained about a pitch he thought to be a strike. Klem thought otherwise.

The batter was one Rogers Hornsby, thought by many baseball experts to be the best hitter of all time.

The "judge and jury" calling balls and strikes responded in classic fashion--his few words carefully chosen and rolling off his tongue into a vault of classic quotes worthy of "smile consideration" in 2017. He countered, "Son, when you throw a strike, Mr. Hornsby will let you know." (Hornsby was a native of Winters, TX.)...

My friend's collection also includes current quotes.

An example is a response to recent allegations that NBA basketball king LeBron James is cheap.

My buddy agrees, figuring James would climb over a gate to save the hinges. Never mind he's paid 32 million in US dollars annually, not counting millions more for endorsements. Still,

he chooses a phone app with advertisements to save money....

I have long believed that the more eccentric people are, the more likely they are to be quotable. Near the top of the list of eccentric coaches was the late Rick Majerus, best known when he coached the Utah Utes to the 1996 NCAA tournament's "final four" for a losing effort against powerful Indiana University coached by the fiery Bobby Knight.

Portly, bald and a hotel resident throughout his adult life, the bachelor's wit was keen, sharp and usually self-effacing. When he had open-heart surgery, it required seven bypasses. He claimed "one for each food group." He thought maybe his burial should be at the finish line of Churchill Downs, so he could be "run over one more time." Pointing out that Indiana had four McDonald's All-Americans, Majerus said four of his players were from towns so small, they didn't even have a McDonald's.

Majerus managed to keep life in perspective. Sadly, he died too soon at age 64, and left no clones. Too bad he and Klem (no relation to Red Skelton's Klem Kadiddlehopper) left no clones--at least none that I know of. I'll ask my friend; he'll enlighten me after dressing me down for suggesting he ever has acerbic tendencies....

# Fisherman becomes newspaperman

Fishing is what he does best. Some people around Sulphur Springs told me I needed to interview Chuck Roy who lives in the nearby community of Yantis. They told me he had just started a newspaper. I thought to myself that doesn't sound all that interesting, but I value suggestions and set up a meeting with him. I quickly learned why people told me to visit with him. He is a man of many talents.

Chuck enrolled in LSU to study journalism and fell in love with a philosophy major so he changed his major to philosophy. Apparently the romance ended and/or he didn't really like studying; whatever the reason, he came home. His father, a contractor, put Chuck to work roofing houses.

"I'm allergic to heights and hard work," he says, "so I went back to college and earned a degree in Electrical Engineering."

He was with a firm headquartered in Tokyo for more than 25 years and worked his way up to vice president. He cast his shadow on all continents except Antarctica. Once he was in Saudi Arabia and was diverted to Norway.

"I went from 122 degrees in the morning to minus 32 in the afternoon. I didn't have any warm clothes with me, so I put on all my clothes and tried to put on my suitcase."

He worked on several precision instruments, including the Mars rover. He lived in Dallas for 25 years and when it was time to retire he chose a place close to Lake Fork, a favorite family vacation spot. Chuck's grandparents taught him to cook and he followed that up with cooking courses all over the world. He graduated from the Culinary Institute of America. His daughter didn't have a passion for cooling, so when she went to college Chuck wrote some recipes and gave them to her. He included some family stories. Chuck's wife sent the manuscript to a publisher who said it was the most unique format he had ever seen and offered to publish it. Chuck

said fine. "That resulted in a relationship with Pelican Press in New Orleans and I spent 15 years doing 11 books. Just recipes and family stories."

Not content with just a couple of careers, Chuck became a licensed fishing guide. "Fishing is what I do best," he says. He gave a couple of demonstrations to Bass Pro Shop and that led to a Saturday morning television show.

He went to Washington, DC, to advise some folks on mine technology and ended up going into partnership with them. He stayed in DC seven years and then sold his part of the business.

Now he's really retired. But restless. He looked around for something to do and remembered his early journalism studies in college. He bought a local newspaper. The Community Chronicle is published monthly and has 48 pages. It's now in eleven states, even though he's had the publication only a year. "It doubles in income and influence every month," says Chuck. "I spent a lot of time doing what I thought I should do and spent time doing what I wanted to do. This is what I was intended to do. I'm having more fun than ever."

## San Antonio-area shooter was denied license to carry

The shooter who killed 26 people at a church outside of San Antonio on Sunday tried to get a license to carry a gun in Texas but was denied by the state, Texas Gov. Greg Abbott told CNN's Chris Cuomo this morning.

"So how was it that he was able to get a gun? By all the facts that we seem to know, he was not supposed to have access to a gun," Abbott said, citing the Texas Department of Public Safety. "So how did this happen?"

Abbott added that the shooter was "deranged."

At a press conference on Sunday, law enforcement officials said it was too early to speculate on a motive for the killings. However, Freeman Martin, the DPS regional director for San Antonio, said Monday that the shooting may have been the result of a "domestic dispute."

According to Martin, the shooter — who DPS confirmed in a tweet Monday morning was 26-year-old Devin Kelley of Comal County — had a mother-in-law who attended First Baptist Church. Freeman said the mother-in-law had received threatening texts from Kelley and DPS was investigating the situation.

Martin confirmed that Kelley didn't own a license to carry but had a private security license.

Fred Milanowski, a special agent with the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, confirmed that three firearms were

recovered — including two handguns. "All three firearms were purchased by the deceased suspect," Milanowski said.

As far as the agency knows, there's nothing that precluded Kelley from purchasing a gun, he said.

In a separate interview Monday on ABC's Good Morning America with George Stephanopoulos, Abbott said he does not believe the deadly church shooting was a "random act of violence."

In a press briefing Monday morning, a DPS official said the agency had retrieved video footage from inside First Baptist Church and that all bodies had been removed.

On Sunday, Kelley entered First Baptist Church of Sutherland Springs and opened fire. The victims range from 18 months to 77 years old and included the pastor's 14-year-old daughter. DPS said it would provide more updates on the shooting throughout the day.

Officials say when the shooter was confronted by a local resident with a gun, he fled the scene. He was later found dead in his car; the cause of death has not been publicly released. The Associated Press reported Sunday that Kelley served in the Air Force but received a bad conduct discharge after he was court-martialed in 2012 for assaulting his spouse and child.

Milanowski said his agency — along with the FBI and DPS — is also investigating Kelley's military record and doesn't have all the documents yet related to Kelley's dis-

charge.

According to Martin, 23 people were killed inside the church, two were killed outside and another died in transport to a local hospital. Authorities said about 20 others were taken to hospitals with injuries ranging from minor to "very severe." Martin said four shooting victims are in serious condition and another 10 are in critical condition.

"We're not sure if that number will rise or not," Abbott said Sunday night at a news conference. "This will be a long, suffering mourning for those in pain. These people were innocently gunned down."

"Our church was ... a very close family, now most of our church family is gone," Sherri Pomeroy, the wife of First Baptist Church's pastor, Frank Pomeroy, said Monday.

Vice President Mike Pence announced Monday afternoon he will visit Sutherland Springs on Wednesday. In a tweet, Pence said he and Second Lady Karen Pence will make the trip to "meet w/families of the fallen, injured & law enforcement."

President Donald Trump said Kelley had "a lot of problems over a long period of time."

"We have a lot of mental health problems in our country — as do other countries — but this isn't a guns situation," Trump said while speaking at an event in Japan. "I mean, we could go into it but it's a little bit soon to go into it. But, fortunately somebody else had a gun that was shooting in the opposite direction."

Hi, gang! Just a heads up. I received a call from Tom asking me to check out a possible scam on the web. It was Instant Checkmate, Inc. I found that there are a lot of places on the web that could check into yours, or anyone's you would like to check, criminal records or a background check, for a bit of cash of course. The top 10 listed run from \$9.95 to \$39.95 per month. They are legal and most BBB certified. Just beware that you could open a real can of worms.

"Call from 877-382-4357? Hang up." by Andrew Johnson, FTC

Scammers are using fake caller ID information to trick you into thinking they're someone who can be trusted. The practice is called caller ID spoofing, and scammers can fake anyone's phone number. Today, we got reports that scammers are spoofing the FTC's Consumer Response Center's phone number (877-382-4357). But don't let that stop you from reporting scammers it's still safe to call the Consumer Response Center, and it's also safe to report scammers online.

If you've submitted a report or request to the FTC's Consumer Response Center, the FTC might call you for additional information. But we won't call you from 877-382-4357. And the FTC will never ask for money or for sensitive information such as your Social Security number, date of birth, or bank account information. Scammers are constantly picking new phone numbers to spoof.

Here are a few tips for staying ahead of scammers and their unexpected calls: If you get a strange call from a government phone number, hang up. If you want to check it out, visit the official (.gov) website for contact information.

Don't give out or confirm your personal or financial information to someone who calls. Don't wire money or send money using a reloadable card. In fact, never pay someone who calls out of the blue, even if the name or number on the caller ID looks legit. Feeling pressured to act immediately? Hang up. That's a sure sign of a scam.

If you've gotten a call from a scammer, with or without fake caller

ID information, report it to the FTC.

public Wi-Fi, available at places like airports and coffee shops, are convenient, but can be risky. How It Works: Scammers monitor commonly used Wi-Fi network names, and set up their own "evil twin" access points in hopes your computer or device will automatically connect to it without your consent. Or they launch a "man in the middle" attack, by hacking in between you and your Wi-Fi connection. Their goal? To grab your emails, credit card numbers, and passwords.

What You Should Know: Any data you send over free public Wi-Fi is vulnerable, so be thoughtful about how you use it. What You Should Do: Ask an employee at the location offering free public Wi-Fi for the name of the network. Don't just assume that "free airport Wi-Fi" is a legitimate wireless network; it could have been set up by a hacker to trick you into connecting.

Stick to browsing the web, checking news, weather, or traffic when on public Wi-Fi.

Avoid online banking, checking emails, making credit card purchases or even posting on social media on public Wi-Fi. Check your device's settings to make sure it doesn't automatically connect to any free public Wi-Fi that you're in range of.

If you find you use public Wi-Fi regularly, play it safe and sign up for a Virtual Private Network (VPN) that keeps your data secure. Some are free, while others charge a subscription.

When it comes to fraud, vigilance is our number one weapon. You have the power to protect yourself and your loved ones from scams. Please share this alert with friends and family.

Researchers find bug in Wi-Fi network encryption by Phoebe Rouge Technologist, Office of Technology Research and Investigation If you have a smartphone, laptop, or IoT device connected to a Wi-Fi network, the information you send

over that network could be at risk. Researchers recently found a bug that lets attackers break the encryption that protects most wireless networks – leaving data you send exposed.

The bad news is that this is not a problem with a specific device, or even manufacturer – it's a problem with the WPA2 encryption standard nearly all Wi-Fi devices on the market today use to scramble communications, preventing eavesdropping and tampering. Basically, if you use a device to connect to a wireless network at home, work, or elsewhere, this bug means you cannot rely on that connection being secure.

The good news is that the bug can be fixed with a security update or patch. Device manufacturers and software companies are aware of the bug and updates for affected devices should be rolling out in the near future, if they haven't already. In the meantime, connections other than Wi-Fi (like your smartphone's 4G/3G carrier connection, or a connection with an Ethernet cable) are not affected. So, consider using them instead of Wi-Fi until the updates are available.

Even so, this bug is a reminder that there's no single solution to secure your data, and all of the other tips for protecting your sensitive information and security online are more important than ever, including: Keep up with the latest updates for your software and devices, including updates for your smartphone, computer, and any IoT devices around your home. Avoid sending sensitive information over public Wi-Fi, whether or not it's encrypted.

When you do send sensitive information to a website, make sure the address starts with "HTTPS" – this will at least ensure the data you send to that one website is encrypted. A VPN (Virtual Private Network) app or service can give you another layer of protection for your personal data. VPNs encrypt traffic between your computer and the internet – even on unsecured networks. You can get a personal VPN account from a VPN service provider. If you decide to use one, be aware some VPNs are more secure and easier to use than others, so shop around. Read reviews from several sources, including impartial experts.

Stay safe out there.

**WESLEY ADAMSON & LEO LLOYD LANE**

During the night of Oct. 8, 1918, Leo Lloyd Lane of Hedley led an Army reconnaissance party inside "no-man's land" on a battlefield near Compiegne, France. The men were under heavy barrage and machine gun sniping. As they moved out on a deserted field, the party was attacked by gunfire.

Lane was buried by the battlefield with his fallen comrades. Wesley Adamson of Hedley was sent with National Guard units to the Western Front in France for combat and was also killed in battle on October 8 at St. Etienne, France.

The captain of Adamson's unit wrote, "He was one of the first to go 'over the top.' He went forward like the brave man he was, until shrapnel burst near him, and he was wounded. But he did not stop. He fought furiously on, like a man who seemed willing to give his life. He finally ran into the fire from a machine gun and was killed instantly."

Adamson's parents later received the Croix de Guerre and the Silver Star in recognition of their son's bravery. His remains were buried in Rowe Cemetery

To commemorate these sacrifices, the Adamson-Lane Post of the American Legion was chartered in Hedley on March 4, 1921.

The Whistle-Stop and the community salute the heroism of Lloyd Lane and Wesley Adamson through their sacrifices in defense of America. Thank you, gentlemen!

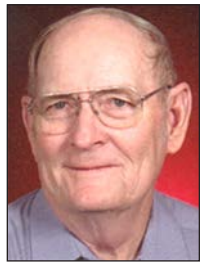

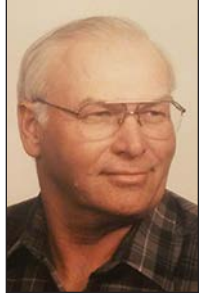
