




Names of R. C. Lowe, Hollis Atkeison, Ed F. Fouts, **Roy Sanders Filed**

The time for filing for a position on the ballot will expire tonight and unless other names are filed this afternoon the ballot will appear with only four names from which



On the same day that the American Federation of Labor - usually deeply pessimistic - announced that "under the ruffled surface of the business stream, currents of revival are steadily gaining strength," the United States Chamber of Comemrce noted that a rise in production figures which began in December has continued steadily into March.

While the federation saw small promise of jobs for the jobless in the immediate future, the Chamber estimated that 700,000 should have been re-employed by March 31 over the beginning of the year.

Certainly the conjunction of these two reports would seem to indicate pretty definitely that a real upward trend is at last in progress.







Without discussing the merits of the Child Labor proposal but only referring to the process involved there ought to be a time limit on State action.

### LET'S LOOK AHEAD

The progressive town will consider the needs of its children. The progressive village will take care of this situation before it grows, and acquqire sufficient land for park and playground purposes.

Haskell is not as big as it will be. Its needs along this line are not as great as they will be. Land will never be cheaper. The time to buy is at hand.

We hope our responsible officials will carry this thought in their minds. Let's make Haskell an ideal city in the future by undertaking its broad development along the right ideas. Acquire park sites and playgrounds now even if we have to postpone their development until some future period.
