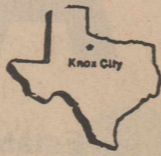

Two Who Gave Up Christmas

While most residents of the Big Country area will remember Christmas of 1987 for the winter storm that hit on Christmas eve, two Knox City men will have no trouble remembering that they gave up Christmas with their families because of the same storm. When the storm arrived, it brought a power outage that required local WTU employees Bud Reynolds and Dennis Stegemoeller to work twenty-eight hours with only forty-five minutes rest during the period.

When power lines all across the Big Country started coming down because of the weight of accumulated ice, a wide area suffered a major power outage. Under normal conditions a power outage in one area can be overcome by the rerouting of power from another area or direction, but the severity and wide coverage area of the Christmas storm knocked down major lines in all directions from Knox City. WTU work crews were called out all over the Big Country area and Knox City was certainly no exception. With local WTU Manager Dick Evatt out of town, the workload fell on the shoulders of the two remaining workers, Bud and Dennis.

After the initial call for service, both men worked non-stop for 24 hours before attempting to return home. Their brief period of rest lasted only 45 minutes before they were called out for another four hours of work. While most in the area were home inside their

houses trying to keep warm, Bud and Dennis were constantly out in the weather-also trying to keep warm while they worked.

A major problem faced by the pair was the number of power lines that were down in the area. Each line had to be repaired prior to power being restored in Knox City. At best, it was a cold and miserable 28 hours for the two men.

Another hard worker during the storm was Sequoyah Reynolds, the wife of WTU worker Bud Reynolds. Whenever the local office of West Texas Utilities is closed, it is Sequoyah and Bud's telephone number that is listed for calls concerning problems with power. While Bud worked trying to fix power lines, Sequoyah stayed at home answering over 100 phone calls in a five or six hour period from local residents asking questions about the loss of power. Sequoyah reported that throughout the period, only one caller wasn't very nice. Most who called were understanding and listened intently to her explanations of why the outage occurred and what steps were being taken to get the power turned back on.

Many in Knox City and the surrounding area became very innovative in their efforts to stay warm and do other things like fixing Christmas dinner without electricity. From conversations heard this week, it seems that camping type cookstoves and gas heaters were in great demand! While

many seem to congratulate themselves on their varied and different ways to keep warm inside their houses, we should all take just a minute to also thank the many men and women who worked extra hard during a very uncomfortable time. Bud, Dennis and Sequoyah were among many who worked throughout the cold period and power outage. Police officers and volunteer firemen were also kept busy with calls from concerned residents.

Christmas spirit comes in many different ways and even ol' Santa Claus himself is seen differently through the eyes of everyone who views him. When recalling the winter of '87 and the winter storm of Christmas '87, we would all remember the amount of Christmas Spirit that was reflected in the efforts of our local WTU employees. As for Santa Claus, we're sure that for many who were shivering in their homes, the arrival of a snow covered pair from West Texas Utilities named Bud Reynolds and Dennis Stegemoeller must have seemed like the arrival of ol' Saint Nick himself.

CRP Meeting Set January 28 At Local PMC

The Board of Directors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District has announced that a meeting to provide information on the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) has been set for 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, January 28, at the USDA's Plant Materials Center at Knox City. "This meeting is being held to provide information to individuals interested in participating in the CRP Program in Knox County," states District Conservationist Jerry Pearce. "We hope that this meeting will provide some good, useful information to landowners who are considering or who have already committed to participating in the program. The meeting will also be a few days prior to the February 1-19 sign-up and will allow landowners some time to make decisions prior to signing up."

Included in the meeting agenda will be the following topics: Eligibility; Bid Procedures; Cover Establishment; and Cover Maintenance. Main speakers at the meeting will be Jerry Pearce, District Conservationist; John Rector, County Executive Director; and Greg Huber, Range Conservationist. There will also be several vegetative contractors on hand to discuss custom work available. The Plant Materials Center is located 2 1/2 miles Northwest of Knox City on FM 1292. Deposits End 1987 Over \$20 Million

The Citizens State Bank reported year-end deposits totaling \$20,645,246.22. This marks the first time in the bank's history that year-end deposits exceeded \$20 million.

According to bank president Greg Clonts, the growth in deposits was primarily attributable to the large cotton crop.

"This area was fortunate last year in that both cotton yields and cotton

prices were at their highest levels in almost 10 years. This should provide some stimulation for the local economy.

"This area, and Knox City in particular, continues to enjoy a sound, diversified economy with the oil industry providing steady employment along with the federal and local governments. Hopefully, the recovery of cotton prices means that government

programs are working, at least for the time being, and that wheat and other small grain prices will soon follow cotton in an upward direction.

"If we can get a stabilization in the price of oil, I'm convinced we will see an increase in drilling locally, which should further enhance that sector of the economy and provide employment."

We have a great community here, and even though we have fewer businesses, perhaps those remaining will be stronger businesses.

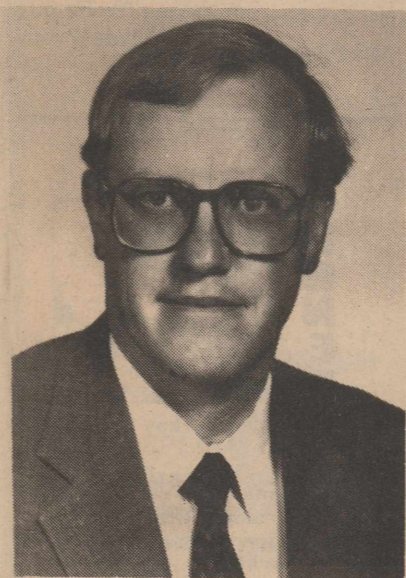
We have had a much better than

Tom Schrandt Files

Tom Schrandt, District Attorney for the 50th Judicial District filed for reelection last week on the Democratic ticket. Mr. Schrandt was appointed to the position of District Attorney in July, 1986 and voters of Baylor, Knox, King and Cottle counties elected him in November of 1986.

Mr. Schrandt moved to Seymour in January of 1981 and lives there with his wife Michele and 2 1/2 year old child, Michael. The Schrandts are expecting a second child at the end of February, 1988.

Schrandt is a 1976 graduate of Baylor Law School and went to Wichita Falls to serve at Sheppard Air Force Base

and later as Assistant District Attorney and Wichita County Attorney before moving to Seymour. Since he has lived in Seymour, he has been the Baylor County Attorney, the acting Knox County Attorney, Judge of the 50th District, and is now the District Attorney of the 50th District. Schrandt has more than eight years' experience as a prosecutor for the State of Texas. He is a graduate of the Career Prosecutors Course accredited by the National College of District Attorneys and attends various professional

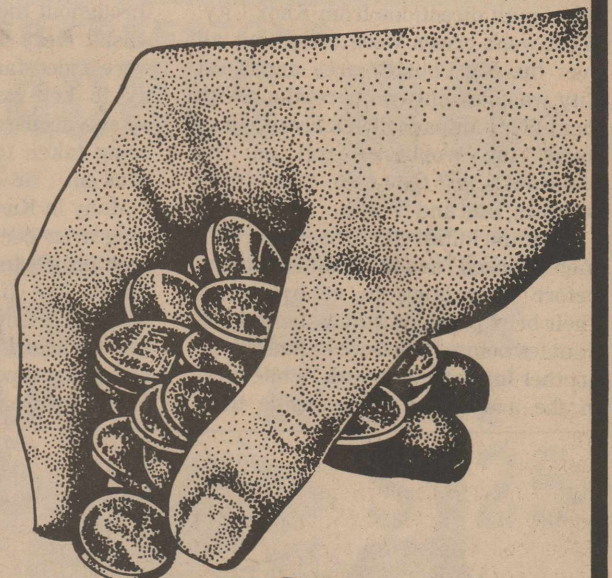

PORK ROAST BURGUNDY

4 pound pork loin roast* ¼ cup burgundy wine
½ cup Kikkoman Soy Sauce ¼ teaspoon dried rosemary, crumbled
½ cup apricot preserves

Pierce meaty sides of roast with fork; place in large plastic bag. Combine soy sauce, preserves, wine and rosemary; pour over roast. Press air out of bag; tie top securely. Refrigerate 8 hours or overnight, turning bag over occasionally. Reserving marinade, remove roast and place, fat side up, in shallow pan. Insert meat thermometer into center of roast, but not touching bone. Roast at 325°F. about 2-1/2 hours, or until thermometer reaches 165°F; brush roast with reserved marinade every 30 minutes. Remove roast and let stand 15 minutes before carving. Makes 6 servings.

Medicare Rates To Increase In 1988

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount Medicare patients are responsible for when they first receive hospital insurance services in a benefit period, will increase to \$540 in 1988, Frances Braden, Social Security representative in Vernon, said recently. The 1987 deductible is \$520.

Also scheduled to increase are the per-day amounts patients are responsible for after specific length of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, Braden said.

After 60 days of inpatient care in a benefit period in 1988, Medicare will pay for all covered services except \$135 a day. The 1987 figure is \$130.

For each reserve day, Medicare will pay for all covered services except \$270 a day. The 1987 figure is \$260.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered service except \$67.50 a day. The 1987 figure is \$65.

The basic monthly premium for Medicare medical insurance will be \$24.80. The 1987 basic premium is \$17.90. Some people pay more than this rate because there were periods of time they could have had this protection but did not.

The monthly premium for hospital insurance for those people not otherwise eligible for this protection will be \$234 in 1988. The 1987 premium is \$226.

The medical insurance annual deductible will remain \$75, unchanged from 1987.

TAX CHANGES FOR 1987

Whenever you start preparing your income taxes this year, it won't be a moment too soon. With changes in the tax laws brought on by the Tax Reform Act of 1986, it may take extra time to figure out the forms and how much owed or will have returned.

Here is a list of deductions you can no longer claim:

- * 60% deduction for capital gains
 - * dividend exclusion
 - * deduction for state and local sales taxes
 - * deductions for qualified adoption expenses
 - * deduction for a married couple when both work
 - * credit for political contributions
- Extra exemptions for age and blindness are no longer allowed, but they have been replaced by the additional standard deduction. Also, income averaging is no longer an option.

But many deductions and credits are still available. You are allowed deductions for real estate taxes and personal property taxes along with credits for child and dependent care and care for the elderly or the permanently and totally disabled. Check IRS publications for other deductions that may apply to you.

Although deductions for state and local income taxes are also allowed, Texas has no state or local income taxes. However, if you lived in another state for part of 1987, you may have paid state or local income taxes there which can be deducted.

With all the changes, filling out tax forms this year may seem more complicated. But help is available. The tax

booklet sent to your home will include a form you can fill out to order information pamphlets and phone numbers you can call for help.

MEDICATION ADS CAN MISLEAD

When the advertisement says "our brand is the one hospitals use most," consumers may think that's a sign of quality. But since hospitals buy their

drugs through competitive bidding, it's more likely a sign that this company sold their product as cheaply as possible to get the bid. In the drug store, you may pay a premium price for that brand. One brand of aspirin or acetaminophen is as good as another and you can save money by buying the least expensive brand.
