We ale

Calls by month have been as follows: September, 2,513; Octo-ber, 2,514; November, 3,453; December, 2,008; January, 4,142; February, 4,137; and March, 4,-145. There is no indication yet as to size of the April call.

Local board quotas for the March call will not be made up until the latter part of January or the early part of February, the state Selective Service director said. Quotas and calls section of state headquarters must figure local board quotas, giving credit for enlistment from each area.

The men called up for the March quota will be furnished for the Army, as well as those for January and February. All those called up in 1950 were furnished for the Army. So far only the Army has requested manpower under the Selective Service Act.

Calls are made by the Secretary of Defense on the director of Selective Service in Washington, who allots quotas to the states on the basis of federal draft law regulations, giving credits for enlistments of men from the states.


The state draft directors under these same regulations assign quotas to their respective local boards.


