Fire Razes Benjamin Business

For the second time in their grocery business career, Dub and Jo Cartwright have suffered a devastating loss. What has been the only grocery store in Benjamin for several years—since the closing of McCanlies grocery—was destroyed Sunday morning by fire. The call came in to the fire hall a little after 4 a.m. and with the Benjamin and Knox City Fire Dept. working feverishly, they were unable to save the structure or any contents, because by the time it was reported and they got there the smoke was too great for entrance.

The fire apparently started in the attic, probably by an electrical short but a positive cause will not be available until after the State fire inspector makes his investigation.

So what has been a place to buy your weeks groceries or just a loaf of bread or bag of ice as a convenience to you. And what has served as an "office" for the local men to gather at, drink their morning coffee and plan their days activities—where the school kids came for their lunch, where lots of passers through stopped for a soft drink and a snack—what was the local bus stop—and what was so handy to call and say "Jo, will you please put some coffee and eggs in a bag and send to someone's house who have had a personal tragedy (and she always did it)". Those things are no more. It all lies in smolders of what was Dub's Grocery. We will all miss it but have to face the fact that our small town is at this time without a grocery store.

Jo Etta told me she had been in the grocery business since she was 17

years old and when I asked them if they planned to rebuild and restock they said "no—twice in a lifetime is enough." The first time they "burned out" was March, 1959. And recovery from that fire took nearly 15 years.

Fire Dept. Stays Busy, Need Your Help, Support

Knox City Volunteer Fire Department members have stayed extremely busy during the past week as nine calls have been answered as of Monday. According to Fire Chief Roland Marion, eight of these calls have been grass fires with the additional call being that of assistance to the Benjamin Fire Department Sunday morning when Dub's Grocery burned.

Chief Marion stressed to Knox City and area residents to do no burning of any kind, including that of leaves or yards, until some rain relief is seen.

Marion also noted that he had been in contact with the state fire marshal's office and that any burning outside of the city limits must be done in the daylight hours of 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and that the person doing the burning is responsible. There is to be no burning of any kind unless the wind is above six miles per hour or below 23 miles per hour.

Chief Marion also advised the News office that the local fire department is in need of funds drastically. In order for the firemen to attend the federally funded schools, the department is in need of 25 pair of bunker pants at \$100.00 per pair, to meet the federal guidelines: Two radios at \$850.00 for the pair need to be replaced by the department. Another need by the fire department is that of two new tires for one of the vehicles. The new budget for the department does not begin until April 1 and no bunker pants for the volunteer firemen have been allotted for.

Anyone who would like to make a donation to the fire department or for those who would like to make a memorial for a loved one may do so by contacting Fire Chief Roland Marion, Assistant Chief Ronnie Oliver or any fire department member. They desperately need your help and support.

Former Resident Dies In One-Car Accident

Funeral services for former Knox City resident Andrea M. (Andy) Hudson Norrid of Amarillo were held Tuesday afternoon, February 23, at two o'clock in the First Baptist Church in Knox City. Officiating was the Rev. Ronnie Travis, church pastor. Burial was in the Johnson Memorial Cemetery in Munday with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Norrid, 42, died Friday morning, February 19, from injuries sustained in a one-car accident, which also critically injured her husband, Gail, and younger son, Noah, west of Albuquerque, New Mexico. The couple's older son, Joshua, was not traveling with the family.

Services were held in Amarillo Monday afternoon, February 22, for Andy at Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Home.

Born March 1, 1945, in Orange, Texas, she was the daughter of Mrs. Iola Hudson of Knox City and the late W.B. Hudson. Andy moved back to Knox City with her family in 1946. She was a 1963 graduate of Knox City High School. She attended West Texas State University in Canyon and was a graduate of a beauty college in Amarillo. She married Henry Gail Norrid, January 30, 1966, in Austin. Mrs. Norrid was a member of the Christian Church in Amarillo and was a hairstylist at The Cutting Edge in

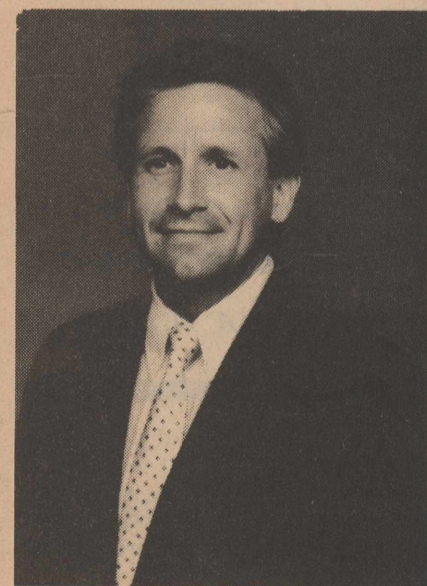
O'Brien Revival Begins Sunday

community to attend the revival services. The nursery will be open.

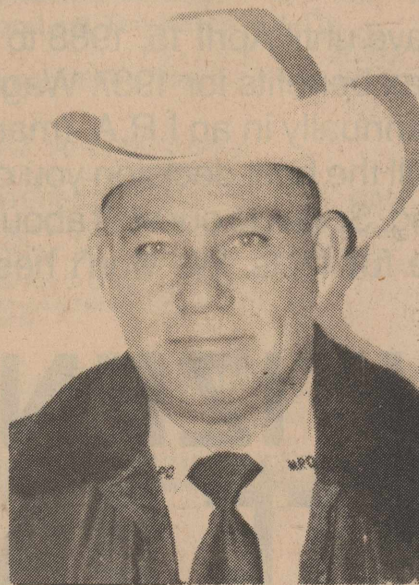
Sheriff Candidate Issues Statement

Girl Scouts Conduct Challenger Campaign

Dick Scobee, Michael Smith, Gregory Jarvis, Ronald McNair, Ellison Onizuka, Judy Resnik...Do you recognize these names? Girl Scout Troop 107 of Knox City wanted to find out just how much the people of our town know about the tragic morning of January 28, 1986. The hopeless shock of the Challenger Space Shuttle is something we all will remember forever. The girls thought it would be interesting to see if people could say where they were, what caused it and who the astronauts were. To give us insight toward answering these, we developed a small questionnaire, asking friends and relatives, we were not surprised to find out that almost 98% knew exactly where they were; be it school, work, or even in the field. About 80% remembered the famous O ring as being the major cause of the explosion. Christa McAuliffe, the school teacher that won the chance to adventure into outer space, will not be forgotten by at least 70% of the questioned public.

Sad but true, a very large percentage of our town has no idea as to the name of just one astronaut let alone the six.

We need to commit these names to memory...Scobee, Smith, Jarvis, McNair, Onizuka, Resnik, and McAuliffe. They are all American heroes.

The family and friends of the Challenger crew have established a place to teach our children the important role space will play in their lives.

They hope to remind us that "all that can be imagined can be achieved." The Challenger Center, a non-profit organization, has been founded in the memory of that fatal blast-off. The national headquarters in Washington D.C. provides residence facilities for learners from all over the world, enabling them to experience science through simulated mission projects. This is also a primary learning center for teachers who can take space education back to the classroom.

In every time zone across the country, regional mission centers will supply educational experiences like those of the flagship facility. These will include Lunar Base, to Mars Base, to Jupiter Station to Earth Resources Station. All of these will be linked to the Washington, D.C., station by satellite network.
