About a month mail subscribent ago. we advised our master had completely changed up our mailing system in a move that he fel
would speed up the delivery of ou papers. The change was drastic and worked toward a system that we had never heard of before. In trying to work with Jimmie Wilheim, our loca

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making
meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of meter tampering a third degree ferony. A Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed $\$ 5,000$.
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than $\$ 200$. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a
reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee, authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
