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Mailings Revert To Former System

About a month ago, we advised our mail subscribers that our local postmaster had completely changed up our mailing system in a move that he felt would speed up the delivery of our papers. The change was drastic and caused a lot of extra work for us as we worked toward a system that we had never heard of before. In trying to work with Jimmie Wilhelm, our local postmaster, we completely changed a system that had been working fairly well for thirteen years. But, as he stated to us: our system was wrong and not up to the latest regulations of the U.S. Postal Service.

While working with this change, we asked our out-of-town subscribers to let us know how they were receiving their papers, if the new system was indeed making the delivery faster. In a short time we had a number of letters, phone calls, and personal visits to the office, and all except one were very critical of our new system because the delivery of their papers had been slowed considerably. One example of the new 'faster' system was that residents of Munday, 12 miles to the east of Knox City, who were now receiving their papers on Saturday instead of their normal delivery on Thursday, the day after we mailed them. It was understood with Jimmie that the responses from our subscribers would be printed in the paper, regardless of whether they praised or condemned the new way of delivering the papers. We would, tell it like it was with no punches pulled.

In the spirit of telling it like it is, let me now continue with the story: In the three weeks under Jimmie's new system, I had the occasion to talk with several other newspaper publishers and editors. Strange, but not one had heard of any new system or had a different way of mailing imposed on them. Then, last week I had the oppor-

tunity to read about a talk given by U.S. Postal Authorities to the last convention of the Texas Press Association. In the story were direct contradictions to what our local postmaster had been telling us and a phone number was listed in case there were any questions. By this time I had quite a few questions to ask so I called the number and talked with a postal expert on second class newspaper mailings. After describing the system we had previously worked under and then the new system that Jimmie had changed us to, I was informed that our old system seemed in regulations that indicated anything to the contrary. This official expressed his concern and assured me that he would help to work out the problem.

Later on the same afternoon, I received a call from Andy Goad, the postal authority in charge of second class mailings for this area of Texas. Once again, I explained everything to him and once again, I was advised that our old system seemed to be correct and that there were no new rules that would cover any of the changes that had been made. Andy asked me to send him a computer list of the old way we had mailed out and a copy of the new way that Jimmie had changed us to. I did so the same afternoon.

In the following days, Andy and I had several phone conversations and everyone indicated that we had been right in our mailing all along. He advised that he would check on the problem and send me a list that he would work up from the computer worksheets that I had mailed him. This list would indicate where each of our papers, bundles and mail bags would go for fast, proper distribution. That list arrived in the mail last Friday morning and after a brief review, I discovered that it was almost identical to our old way of mailing. Andy called back late Friday afternoon to see if I had received the list and also to ex-

plain that it was nearly the same as our old way of mailing, with just a few changes that he felt would make some papers go a little faster.

So, with the help of Andy Goad in Waco, your future editions of *The Knox County News*, as well as last week's, will be mailed almost identically to the way they were prior to the 'new' change. We are now back to the 'old' system and we hope that your papers will be arriving faster than they have in the past month. Even though we were being forced to operate under the wrong instructions, we offer our apologies to those who had their paper service affected during this very trying time.

In a column that I wrote three weeks ago, I defended the actions of our local postmaster because I felt that as the postmaster, he knew what he was talking about when he made the changes. Since then, I have spent many hours working the computer console to make our mailing list conform to his instructions. The sad part to this story is that I have had to change it all back once again. When I told Jimmie that I would print the responses from our readers, I advised him that this would be fair and we would print the good with the bad, and he agreed. We want to work with our post office in every way possible and we feel that a good working relationship will benefit not only our subscribers and this newspaper, but the Postal Department as well. My special thanks to those in the Waco office who have worked so hard to correct this problem and make our mailing list work for us.

Joint Election Set

The City of Knox City, the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District, and the Knox County Hospital District will hold their respective elections together, and the joint election has been set for this year on Saturday, May 7. In previous years, the joint election was held the first Saturday in April but was moved back a month this year. Polls will be open at the Knox City Aging Center from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

In the city election, the terms of council members Frankie Baker, Jonathan Godsey, and Larry Staggs will expire. Holdover council members are Mayor Derrell Marion, Barbara Barnard, and Marq Brockett. According to Dick Wilcox, city ad-

ministrator, no one has filed. Deadline for filing is March 23, and forms may be picked up at City Hall.

School board members whose terms expire this year are Butch Stephens and Donnie Roberts. Holdover members include Larry Deering, Jimmy Tankersley, Terry Carter, J.M. Emerson, and David Albus. Forms for filing may be picked up at the school superintendent's office. According to word from school secretary Joyce Risinger, no one had filed as of Tuesday morning. Deadline is March 23.

Hospital administrator Dick Stout advised the *News* office Tuesday morning that the terms of Jerry Williams and Vernal Zeissel will be expiring

this year. Williams was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Maurene Reeder. Greg Clonts is the holdover elective member. Appointed members include Bernard Brown, Ray Lynn Hardin, Benny Grill, and Bill Baker. Anyone wishing to file for the hospital board must be eighteen years of age or older, be a qualified voter of the district, own land subject to taxation by the district, and submit a petition to the secretary of the board containing the names of not less than 25 qualified voters residing within the boundaries of the hospital district. Petition forms may be picked up at the Knox County Hospital's business office. No one had filed as of Tuesday morning, Stout said. Deadline is March 23.

Youth Basketball Tourney Next Week

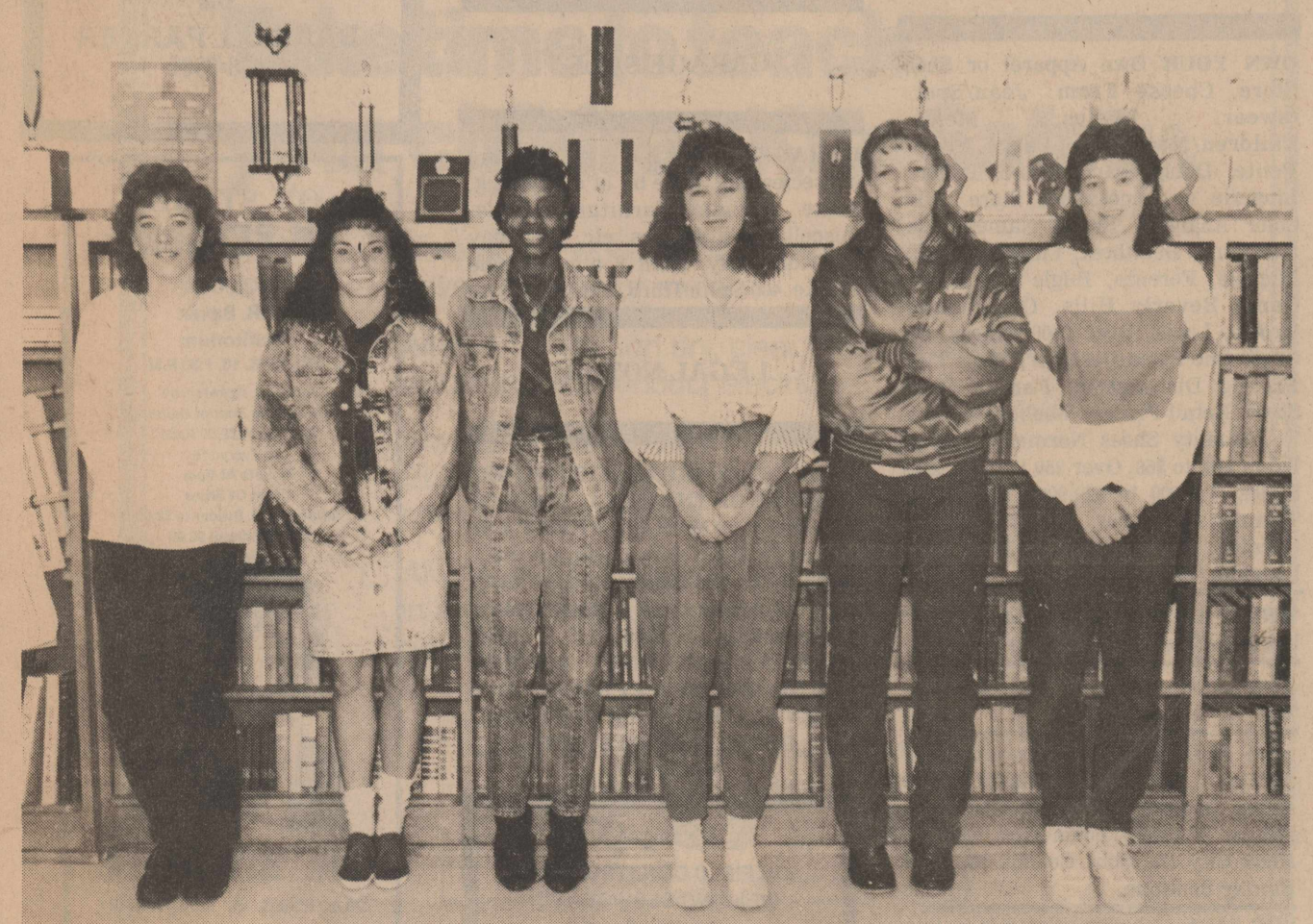

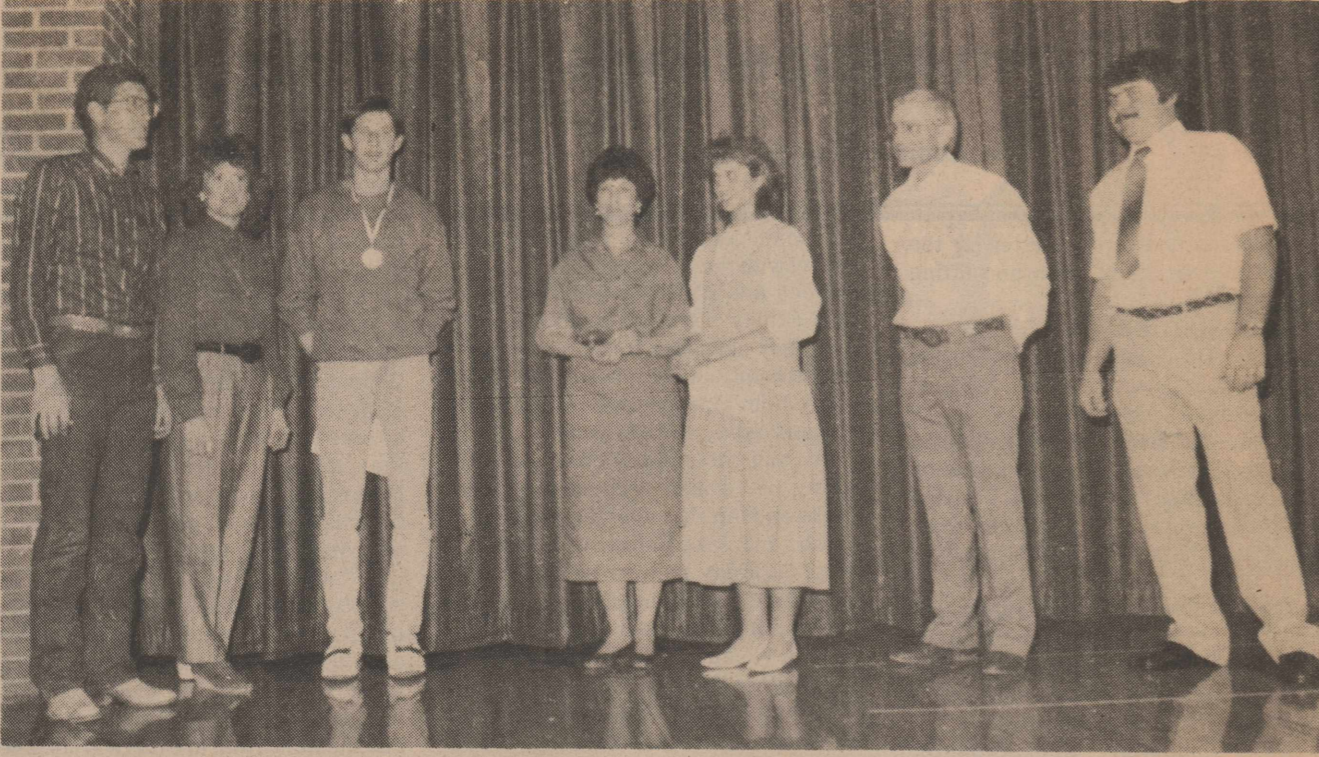

Houndettes Win First Meet In Track With 153 Points

The Knox City Houndettes, just two weeks out of basketball, won their first track meet of the 1988 season.

The Houndettes scored 153 points to win first, Anson had 136 points to take second place. Spur had 92, Jim Ned 67, Stamford 60, Roby 14, Abilene Christian High School 12 and Highland 2.

Winning first place medals for the Houndettes were Leah Rauch, long jump 15'8 1/4", 100 yard hurdles 18.42; Ymelda Gonzales 2 mile run 14:07, 880 yard run 2:50; and Angie Logsdon discus 97'1". The two relays were made up of Leah Rauch, Kim Bateman, Marci Berryman and Stacy Cheek. The 880 yard relay and the mile relay each also won first place with times of 1:59 and 4:39, respectively.

Second place medals were won by Stacy Cheek discus 96'4"; Leslie Tears 880 yard run 2:53; Roxie McCrary 100 yard dash 13.45 and 220 yard dash 29:31; Kim Ainsworth one mile run 6:38.

Bronze medal winners consisted of Jenny Grindstaff 100 yard hurdles 19:66; Stacy Cheek shot put 33'1 1/2".

Contributing fourth place points were Lisa Polk in the 100 yard dash and Angie Logsdon in the shot put. Fifth place finisher was Kris Tiffin in the shot put. Lisa Polk added a sixth place finish in the 220 yard dash.

The 440 yard relay was disqualified for running out of the exchange zone.

Leah Rauch was high point Houndette with 30 points.

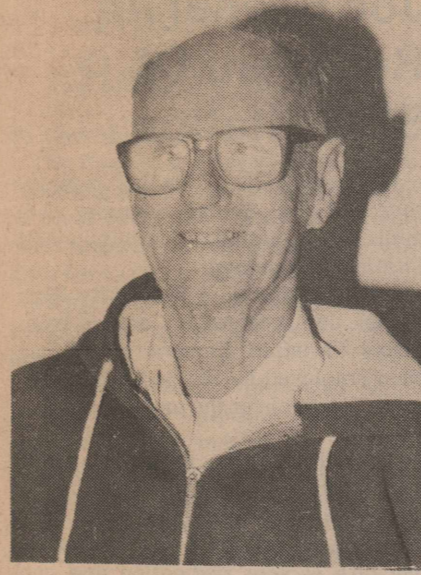
The Houndettes will take next weekend off for Spring Break. They will run March 19 at Jayton.

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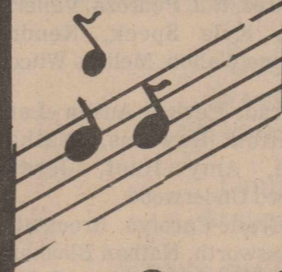

Baker Researches First One Hundred Years

(Editor's Note: The following was presented to Supt. Clead Cheek by former Supt. W.R. Baker who had researched the local school's first 100 years.)

"Knox City-O'Brien C.I.S.D.
The First One Hundred Years

In 1887, the Commissioners Court of Knox County created the second school district in the county and the first south of the Brazos River. The Reeder School, built in 1888 was the first built in this part of the county. It was a small frame building located near where the Knox City Cemetery now is. Miss Ora Gray taught a six month school. This building was used until Knox City was located and a new three room building was constructed on the present campus in 1905.

The 1987-88 Knox City boys Basketball season came to a close last Tuesday night as the Hounds fell to Aspermont in the area round of competition. The loss was a great disappointment as the Hounds had defeated the Hornets earlier in the year at the Hornet tournament. Knox City did lead by one point with eighteen seconds to go in the game. However, it seemed a victory was to evade the Hounds throughout the game as the Hounds were called for 21 fouls while the opponents were called for 13. This resulted in the Hounds cashing in 7 of 10 times at the line while the Hornets enjoyed a free walk to the line 32 times, cashing in on 19. It is very difficult to win a closely matched contest with these type of statistics.

Nevertheless, the Hounds are to be congratulated for a fine overall season. The season began with Anthony Oudems, the team's leading scorer on crutches. The personnel was shuffled to cover for Oudems. With some young men playing out of their normal position and against stiff competition the Hounds lost 6 of their first 9 games. It might be noted that after the first games the Hounds put together an 18-4 record. It is always a milestone when a basketball team wins over 20 games in a season. Many of these young men have been a part of three straight seasons of this type: 1985-86: 24-7; 1986-87: 26-8; 1987-88: 21-10. It is also an accomplishment to tie for the District Championship, splitting regular season games with Mun-

day. The Hounds earlier placed third in the Albany tournament and won the Aspermont tourney.

Several of the team members have already received post-season honors. Seniors Anthony Oudems and Richie Saxton were elected to first team All-District, while their classmate Anthony McCrary was elected second team All-District. Senior Rance Marion was also voted Honorable Mention All-District.

Underclassmen who will return next year, were also honored. Junior Pat Wupperman was selected first team All-District, while Sophomore Billy Large was selected second team. Receiving Honorable Mention recognition was Junior Jim Ford.

Coach Underwood would like to thank the administrative personnel for their cooperation, Coach Chappel for his loyal support and tireless effort and coaches Pat Risinger and Joel Haragan for their scouting efforts. Also to Mrs. Fritsche who through the years has been so faithful and efficient in keeping the books a heartfelt thanks. A thanks is also in line for those who kept the clock and all those who kept stats this year. Those who officiated the J.V., Freshmen and Junior High games are also appreciated. Also a heartfelt thanks to the players themselves and their parents who have understood the long hours of preparation necessary to be successful team.

The Hounds lose Anthony Oudems,

Anthony McCrary, Richie Saxton, Rance Marion and Raul Baiza to graduation. These young men did a good job of pulling a great season from much adversity throughout the year.

Returning on the Varsity are Pat Wupperman, Jim Ford, Alex Flores, Rob Whitford, Mike Manuel and Billy Large. Also promising great things for the coming season is the fact that the J.V. and Freshmen teams were highly successful. The J.V. team lost only three games to teams that were of a very high level of competition—Seymour, Paducah (a one point loss in the finals of the Knox City Tournament) and Wylie. The freshmen lost to the Archer City J.V.'s and Paducah J.V.'s. The J.V.-Freshmen combined team also won the Seymour Tournament which was filled with AA schools. The J.V. team won 15 and lost 3 for the season. The Freshmen team won 5 and lost 2. This gave the underclassmen a 20-5 record.

With an early effort to set goals for next year and a continuing effort in preparing to reach them next season, the community can look for another good season for the Hounds in 1988-89.

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

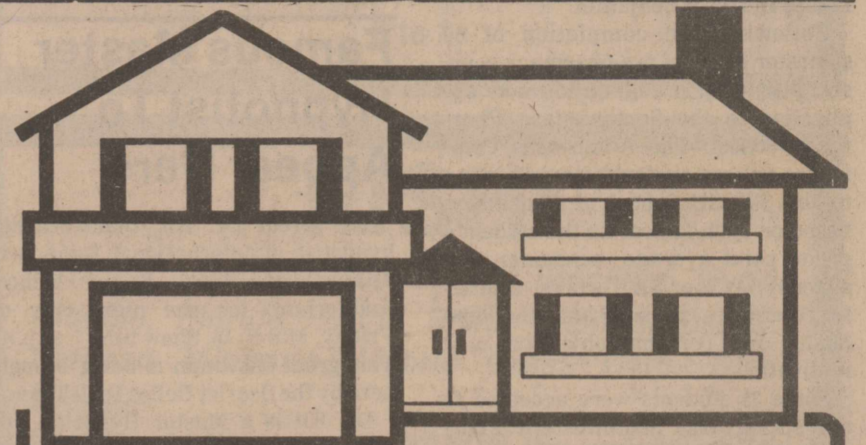

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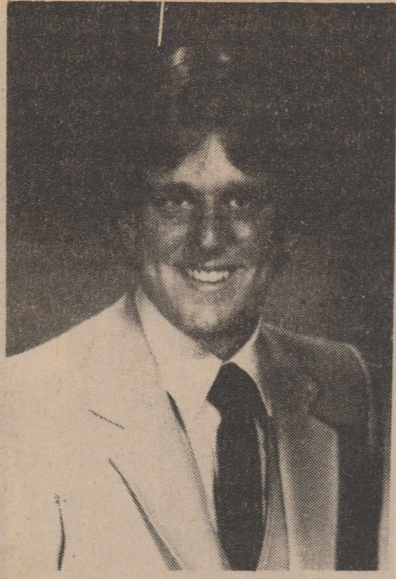

FRESHMAN CLASS NEWS

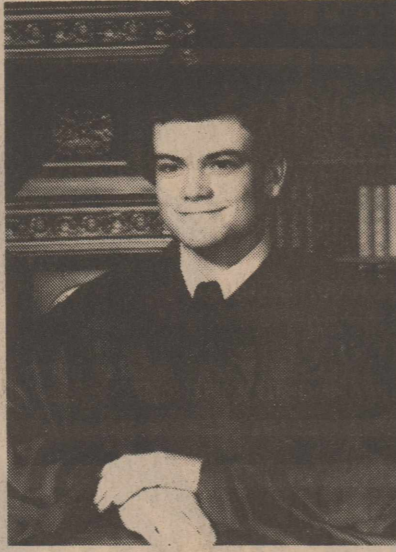

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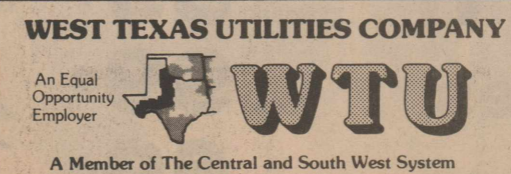

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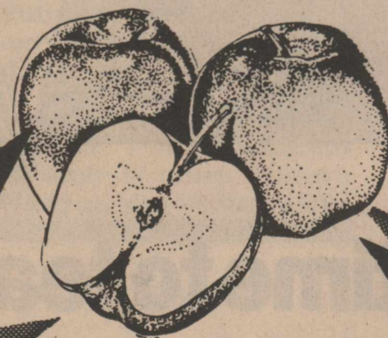
