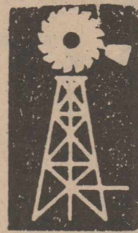

INVESTIGATE BEFORE BUYING TIMESHARE

A resort area for use a specific week every year can be a good vacation option for some families, says Bonnie L. Piernot, a consumer economics specialist. "No matter how attractive the deal, however, consumers should carefully investigate before buying a vacation timeshare," cautions the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service home economist. She says it's most important to know what kind you're buying. An ownership or "interval" time share, gives you a simple interest in the property, providing title, deed and title insurance. You can sell your share of the property, will it or give it away. "Right-to-use" timeshare offers no equity in the property. You're given the right to use a specific unit for a certain period of time, after which possession reverts to the developer. This type of timeshare may also be called a vacation license, lease or club membership, she explains. "Contests and gifts have been used to induce people to visit a site where unscrupulous sellers then apply heavy pressure," the specialist says. "Texas laws protect consumers by allowing a 3-day cooling off period, during which you can back out of a contract and get a refund," notes Piernot. Before signing a timeshare contract, the consumer specialist suggest you figure your total costs, including interest to be paid for financing and annual maintenance fees.

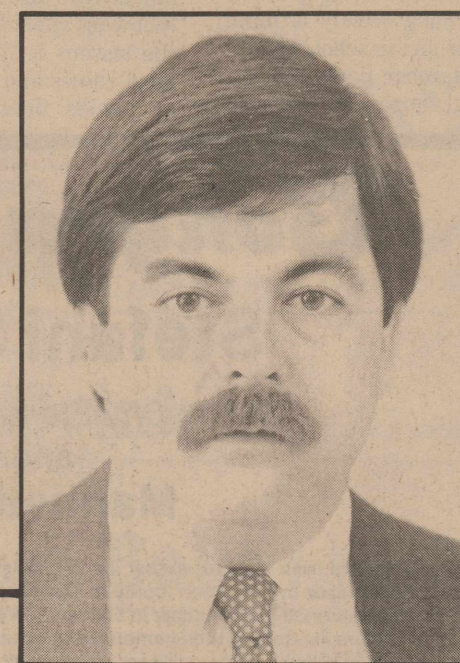

READ LABELS FOR TROPICAL OILS

If you think you're avoiding saturated fat by buying food products that are advertised as "made with 100% vegetable shortening," think again. The term "vegetable shortening" on food labels also includes the highly saturated tropical oils, such as palm oil, palm kernel oil and coconut oil, according to Marilyn Haggard, a nutritionist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service. "Of the fatty acids in coconut oil, 92% are saturated, 86% of those in palm kernel oil are saturated, and 51% of those in palm oil," Haggard remarks. "By contrast, 41% of the fatty acids in lard are saturated, and only 9% of those in safflower oil."

SMALL MEALS NO ADVANTAGE

Contrary to the common advice, eating several small meals each day may not help burn up more calories than eating the same amount of food in only one or two large meals. A study at the Western Human Nutrition Research Center in San Francisco, showed that the rate at which the body uses calories in foods during digestion was essentially the same, whether volunteers ate two large meals or ate the same amount of food at several smaller meals. The smaller meals may have some physiological and psychological benefits for dieters, and may be a necessity for people with diabetes or other disorders. But splitting the day's intake into smaller meals may not, by itself, boost the rate at which the body uses up calories.

MEDICAL BENEFITS FOR THE UNINSURED

According to a federal law which took effect Jan. 1, 1987, if you become unemployed or divorced or separated from a spouse with medical insurance benefits, you may be able to continue your coverage. If you become unemployed, you can continue to pay your share of medical insurance premiums (usually at a low group rate) and maintain your insurance coverage for up to 18 months. If you become divorced or separated and had relied on your spouse's medical benefits, you can continue to pay your share of the premiums and maintain your coverage for up to 3 years. This also includes coverage for any dependents. But it's critical that you make insurance premium payments on time, since coverage is contingent upon being "paid up".
