Carriker Nominated

State Representative Steve Carriker of Roby was picked as the Democratic choice to succeed Ray Farabee in the State Senate, picking up 18 of 30 votes in a meeting Saturday of the District 30 Democratic Committee held in Seymour.

State Rep. Charles Finnell of Holliday received 11 votes and Helen Farabee of Wichita Falls received only one from her home county chairman.

After the roll call, the chairmen selected Carriker by acclamation.

"I will attempt to do my very best to carry out the trust you have placed in me," Carriker told the group. "I also want to thank my two very strong contenders who are fine Democrats." Finnell and Mrs. Farabee then joined Carriker in a show of unity. Both congratulated Carriker and pledged to work toward unifying the party.

State Democratic Chairman Bob Slagle said, "We had three excellent people under consideration and any of them would have made a great senator."

Before the vote, there was one last attempt to get the chairmen to postpone choosing a nominee. Cooke County Democratic Chairman Bill Sullivant argued for the delay, but after an explanation as to why the nomination should proceed by Knox County Democratic Chairman David Counts, the proposal was defeated 25 to 5.

In the roll-call vote, Carriker was supported by the chairmen of Clay, Cooke, Cottle, Denton, Dickens, Fisher, Floyd, Grayson, Haskell, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Mitchell, Scurry, Stonewall, Throckmorton, and Young counties—every chairman in his

House district.

Finnell had the support of the chairmen from Archer, Baylor, Callahan, Childress, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Motley, Shackelford, and Wilbarger counties—all but two of his House district's chairmen. Carriker and Mrs. Farabee got a vote each from chairmen in Finnell's district.

The Senate vacancy was created when Farabee resigned to take a position as vice chancellor for the University of Texas System.

Following the meeting Saturday in the yard of Baylor County Democratic Chairman Calvin Gambill, speculation

turned toward who would be Carriker's successor, and Knox County's David Counts was the man most often mentioned as the possible House nominee who could step in when Carriker formally accepts the Senate nomination.

Counts told the group in Seymour that he hadn't decided if he'll run.

When the News contacted Counts Monday morning, he said that he had had his total attention focused on getting Steve elected as the nominee, and that he would now turn his attention as to whether or not he would seek Carriker's House seat. He said that if enough support is indicated, he will definitely be interested.

Silver Haired Election Scheduled For May 24

Election day for the second Texas Silver Haired Legislature is Tuesday, May 24. Individuals may vote in their Senior Citizens Centers throughout the area. Voting is open to all persons who are 60 years or older, a registered voter, and who reside in the district in which they are voting. Contact your local Senior Citizen Center for the specific times when voting will be conducted.

Delegates to the Silver Haired Legislature will be elected through the 28 Area Agencies on Aging in Texas. The West Central Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging covers a nineteen county region. This region will be sending four delegates to the Silver Haired Legislature when it

convenes in September. There will be one legislator from each of three regions and one candidate elected "at-large."

The Silver Haired Legislature was authorized by the 69th Texas Legislature. The Silver Haired Legislature is an elected, nonpartisan body of citizens 60 years of age or older elected by people 60 years of age or older.

Student Pre-Registration Is Friday

She was to represent District 2 again

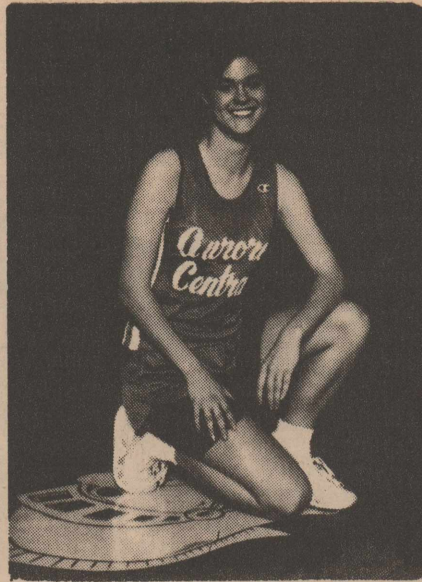

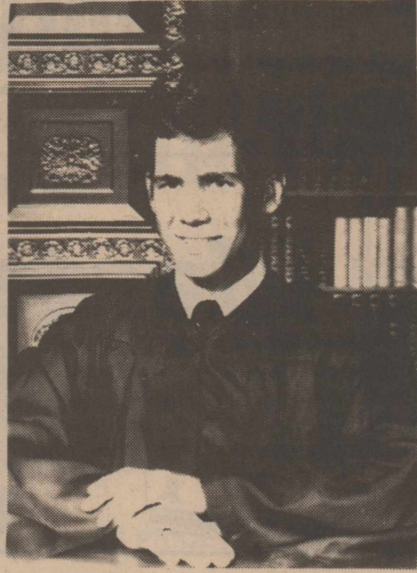
FHA NEWS

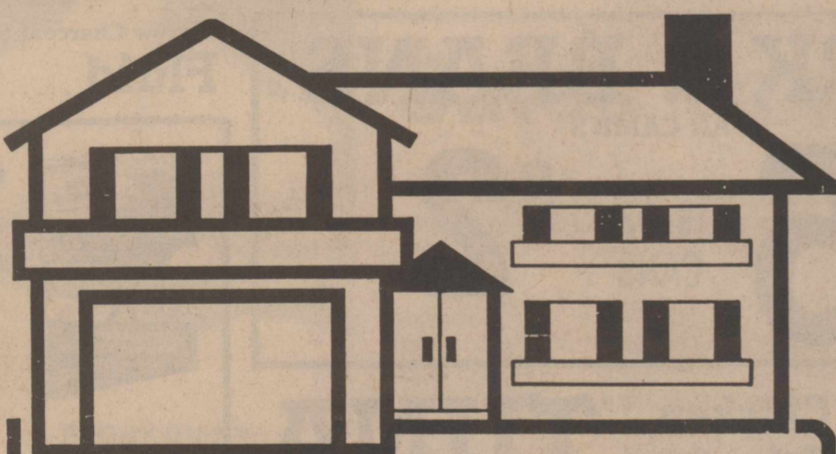

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METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

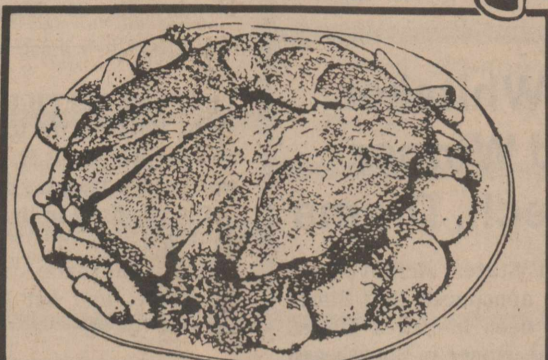

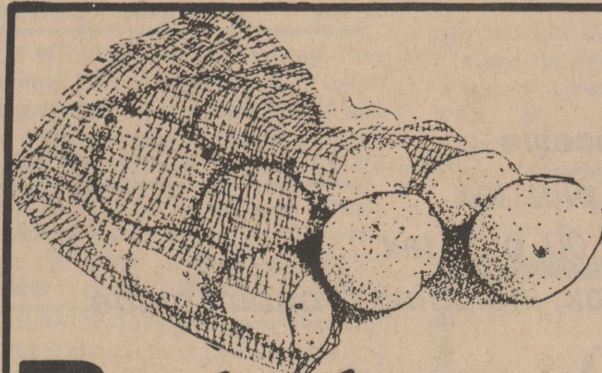

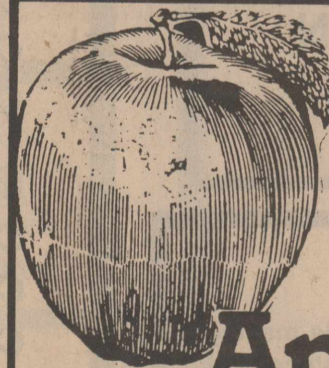
