Tornado Hits Feed Lot

A tornado hit the Brazos Valley Feeders northwest of Rule Thursday afternoon between 4:30 and 5:00 p.m.

Moving in from the northwest, the storm unroofed three sheds where approximately 800 head of cattle were sheltered.

Workers had reported about thirty minutes earlier that they had seen a funnel cloud to the west.

Three head of cattle died as a result of the storm. One was killed instantly, and two others had to be destroyed, according to Charles Durham, who is general manager for Brazos Valley

Feeders of Rule as well as Cactus Farms and Spike Box ranch, both of Benjamin.

One tree was split into and a large 2x4 was driven into the ground by the storm. Fortunately the office buildings and storage tanks were spared.

Mass Casualty Drill Is Held Sunday

The Knox City Police Department, Volunteer Fire Department and Emergency Medical Service participated in a Mass Casualty Drill on Sunday, June 5. The drill was not announced until the time of its occurrence to evaluate the response and performance by the fire department and EMS personnel.

A simulated two vehicle accident was set up at North Second and Avenue B with one vehicle on fire and seven casualties reported. Volunteer victims were made up to simulate various degrees of traumatic injuries to allow for patient assessment by fire department and EMS personnel. Patient extrication was performed by the fire department and EMS using the Jaws

Carriker's Replacement Due To Be Named Tuesday

KC Man Being Considered

The twelve county chairmen from state Rep. Steve Carriker's 78th District were to meet Tuesday night at Hickman's Restaurant in Aspermont to choose someone to replace Carriker on the November ballot.

Officials say the decision by the 12 county chairmen will be unofficial, a "gentlemen's agreement."

According to a story in the Tuesday Abilene Reporter-News by staff writer Richard Horn, this could set the stage for a fight with the State Republican Party, and possibly a court battle later

in the summer.

Carriker, who won renomination to his House seat in March, has been chosen as the nominee for the District 30 state Senate seat vacated by Ray Farabee. When he becomes the State nominee, Carriker must give up his 78th District House nomination.

Knox City businessman David Counts, the Democratic chairman for Knox County, is one of two candidates who are vying to replace Carriker. The other candidate is Greg Wortham, a Sweetwater native, member of Carriker's House staff, and a law student in Austin.

Republican Secretary of State Jack Rains, has said that if Carriker runs for Senate, he can't be replaced as a House candidate.

If the issue should go to court and Rains' view prevails, it would mean the Republican nominee, Rod Waller of Snyder, would win by default.

A.L. "Dusty" Rhodes, Taylor County Democratic chairman, said, "We're going to have to have a state court action to determine the availability of the seat, and we feel good about our position."

Both Counts and Wortham were to be given the opportunity to speak to the chairmen Tuesday night.

Counts, who is in the Knox City real estate and insurance business, was campaign coordinator for Rhodes' bid for the U.S. House seat won by Charles Stenholm in 1978. He's been Knox County Democratic chairman for about eight years.

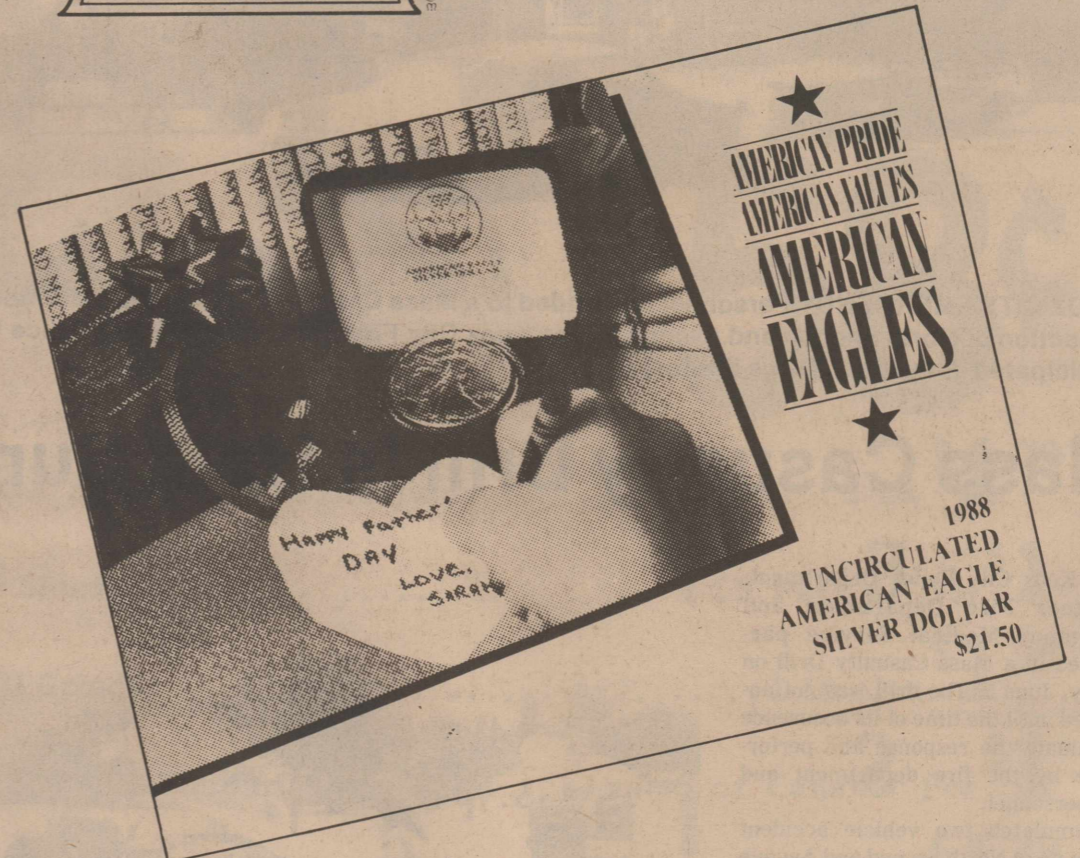

Building terraces helps control erosion, but how well terraces do their job protecting cultivated land depends on how they are farmed and maintained. Terraces can be built parallel or non parallel, but parallel terraces are easier to farm and maintain.

In farming terraces, you can use either a one-way or two-way plow. A one-way plow used for several years eventually creates "steps" from terrace to terrace. Because the soil removed between terraces cannot be replaced, the profile between terraces becomes hollowed out and terraces become benched.

If a two-way plow is used the dead furrow or hollowed-out portion is in the terrace channel where it can be

smoothed out. When using two-way plow on parallel terraces plow the front slope of each terrace towards the ridge. Plow uphill the remaining area from the channel to the ridge of the next terrace. Plowing uphill tends to keep up with the downslope movement of the soil. On deep soils plowing can be done downslope to decrease the slope between terraces. Plowing downslope tends to bench the area between terraces and requires periodic raising of terrace ridges.

When using a one-way plow, plow so that dead furrows, or hollowed-out spots, do not follow in the same place too often. Either raise the terrace ridge by back furrowing or deepen the channel by dead furrowing.

When working terraced land for either row crops or drilled crops, operate all cutting tools such as disks, using the terraces as guidelines.

When row crops are planted in terraced fields it is often to the farmers advantage to sow small grain, grass, or other high residue crops on the terrace. This serves two purposes; (1) to keep the terrace from blowing and, (2) to have a field that is strip cropped and contour farmed to keep from plowing down terraces.

The main objective to terrace maintenance is to keep the base width and original height of the terrace as it was when the terrace was built. With contour farming and maintenance with a one-way plow or two-way plow this objective can be achieved.

DON'T RUN AIR CONDITIONER BLOWER FAN CONSTANTLY

How you run your air conditioning blower fan may be costing you more in utility bills, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service housing specialist Dr. Susan Quiring. Many people set the fan selector on manual rather than automatic. This leaves the blower fan running constantly and makes them feel more comfortable. "From an energy standpoint, it's much better to set the blower fan on automatic because you get better moisture control," the specialist maintains. Part of the air conditioner's job is to remove moisture, she explains. When the blower fan is left on constantly, it re-evaporates water collected on the condenser coils and puts it back into the air. This means the air conditioner has to work harder to remove that recirculating moisture. "Using box fans, circulating fans or ceiling fans to move the air, will achieve the same effect as constantly running the blower fan, and at less cost," says Quiring.

POWDERED DRINK MIX POSES SALMONELLA DANGER

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has warned consumers that Nutrien and Vitalite powdered drink mixes produced by Sunrider International of Torrance, Calif., should not be consumed because of evidence that some of the products tested are contaminated with Salmonella bacteria. Both are nutritional supplements marketed as powdered drink mixes. Sunrider distributes its products nationally through independent distributors—usually people who market the products for the firm, often door-to-door or among friends. Salmonella bacteria can cause nausea, fever, headache, diarrhea and vomiting in normal healthy adults.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by freeze March 28 through April 3, 1987 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Knox City, FmHA County Supervisor Bobby G. Cude said today.

Knox County is one of forty in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the adverse weather conditions.

Cude said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the PIK of

Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted through December 29, 1988 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly overflow into the new farming season.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is

authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. 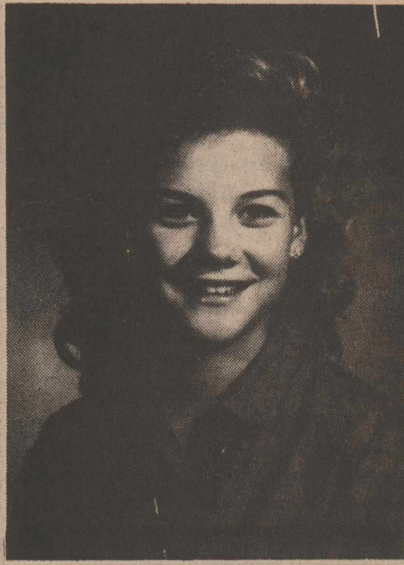

The judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. Entries will be on display until 4:00 p.m. at which time exhibitors may claim them. There will be three divisions which can be entered. These include Junior Division-19 years and younger, Senior Division-20 years and over and a commercial division.

Best overall Home Gardener awards will be presented in Junior and Senior divisions. Grand and Reserve Champion entries will be selected in each of the three divisions.

Rules for this year's vegetable show may be picked up at Farm & Garden Supply in Knox City, Munday Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture, the Vegetable Research Station and Osbornes in Munday and the County Extension Office in Benjamin.

I would encourage participants to closely follow guidelines as to the amount of vegetables needed to be considered as a proper entry.

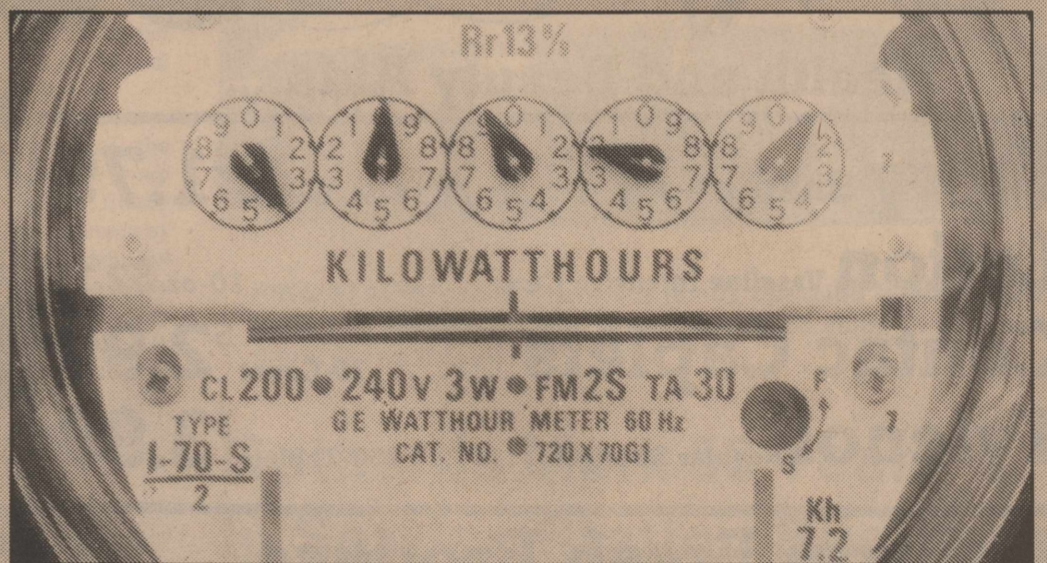

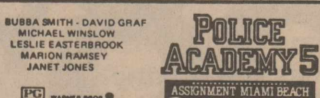
