Counts Named To Replace Carriker

ASPERMONT, TEXAS -- Knox City businessman David Counts was chosen Tuesday night by Democratic chairs of the 78th District to replace state Rep. Steve Carriker as nominee for the district's House seat.

Taylor County Democratic Chairman A.L. "Dusty" Rhodes of Abilene conducted the "unofficial" meeting, which was described by district leaders as "gentlemen's agreement."

Rhodes gave the district chairmen the opportunity to select someone else to conduct the meeting, but they all voted unanimously to have him continue with the unusual meeting.

Of the 12 Democratic chairmen, ten votes were cast. Counts, Knox County Democratic chairman for the past eight years, chose not to vote, passing instead, and Lynn County Democratic chairman Tommy Lawson was not present. Of the ten votes cast, Counts

received six while Carriker aide Greg Wortham of Sweetwater had four. Those counties supporting Counts included Jones, Kent, King, Scurry, Stonewall, and the 14 rural precincts of Taylor County. Wortham had the backing of Cottle, Fisher, Garza, and Nolan counties.

Wortham, 27, was first to speak to the group who had gathered in the dining room of Hickman's Cafe and Motel, citing his legislative experience, and the need for strong representation from rural counties.

Counts, 51, introduced his family who was present, including his wife, Mary, his mother, Alma Counts of Rule, and his daughter and her husband, Patti and John Barnett of Lubbock. He said he had always been taught to work and, as a child, worked along side both his mother and father, the late Walter Counts. He mentioned

both civic and business accomplishments during his years in Knox City and said he would make only two promises during his campaign-first, to always listen, and second, to work as hard as he knew how to for the good of Texas and "especially for the good of the 78th District.'

Following the voting, Wortham congratulated Counts and said he would support the chairmen's decision.

After the roll call vote, the chairmen unanimously selected Counts as the nominee.

Counts will be formally placed on the ballot once Carriker becomes nominee for the 30th Senatorial District seat. Republicans may claim that Carriker cannot legally be replaced as the

AUSTIN, TEX.--State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that Texas cities can expect handsome revenue increases from their local sales taxes as the Texas economic recovery continues to pick up steam.

This month's city allocation checks showed a 23.5 percent increase over June 1007, a growth rate too high to attribute to the broadened sales tax base.

'Local governments will continue to see a healthy increase in revenues from their sales taxes as the state's economy mends and consumer confidence grows," Bullock said.

Texas' economic outlook will continue to improve, barring a national recession or a collapse in oil prices, according to Bullock.

Checks totaling \$65.1 million were sent to 878 cities that collect local option sales taxes at either one or none and one-half percent.

Since January, the state has sent \$465.9 million in local taxes to cities across the state, an increase of 10.3 percent over last year's allocations during the same period.

'This increase is too great to be attributed to the Legislature's broadening of the sales tax base, which was estimated to bring in an extra 3.5 percent in local revenues." Bullock said.

Bullock projected that local sales tax revenues statewide will continue to increase at an average rate of more than eight percent a year through 1991.

COTTON INSECT SCOUTING PROGRAM TO BE HELD

With much of the cotton in Knox County being planted and making a good stand, producers will now be watching for early cotton pests.

There will be two different cotton scouting sessions held on Tuesday, June 21. The first session will be held at the Rhineland Co-Op Gin beginning at 8:00 a.m.

The other program will be held at the Community Center in Knox City beginning at 10:00 a.m. Emory Boring, District 3 Rolling Plains entomologist, will be presenting information on early cotton pests.

Participants will also be able to get to scout early planted fields for insect damage

Fruit tree owners should soon begin to get their sprayers ready as mid-June will be the time to begin spraying for the peachtree borer.

Take my advice and don't wait until your trees get infested before treating. Preventive measures are the best way to control this awesome pest.

Control measures that should be followed to avoid infestation of peachtree bores in peach, plum and apricot trees include:

-removal of any damaged, diseased or dead wood from tree

-maintain good health of the tree by watering tree regularly and fertilizing with a balanced fertilizer at a rate of 1 pound per inch diameter. The fertilizer should be applied around the drip line.

-spray trees in mid-June, mid-July and mid-August. The trees should be sprayed from the scaffold limbs to 3 ft. from the base of the tree. Chemical control measures that are recommended are Dusban, Lorsban, Thiodan or Lindane.

Tree owners should be warned to avoid spraying foliage and fruit.

By following these tips you should continue to have quality fruit for years to come.

CARE FOR ROSES Roses are very pretty when well kept and free of insects.

Philip Homer of Munday and Randy Hibdon of Benjamin both have raised very nice roses with exception of damage by thrips. Thrip damage takes place while the rose is in the bud form. As the bud swells the outside of the petals are black or darker than the rest of the petal.

The thrip itself is very small, yellow in color and cigar shaped. It will be found just inside the outer covering of the rose.

Both Homer and Hibdon had many thrips on each new rose bud. There are many control measures for killing thrips which include Orthene, Malathion, Diazinon, Sevin, Dimethoate and Meta-Systox-R at 7-10 day intervals.

However, I like a product called Orthonex. This is a combination of Orthene and Funginex. This product will take care of nearly every problem that should infect your rose bushes.

Funginex is a fungicide which controls two other problems of roses. These are black spot and powdery mildew.

Black spot has a black spot usually in the middle of the leaf. Black spot can cause death to the

rose bush if severly affected. Powdery mildew makes the leaves

The control measures for these two diseases include Benomyl, Maneb, Zineb, Folpet, Acti-dome PM, Karathane or Wettable Sulphur.

The fungicides may be mixed with insecticides and sprayed simultaneously.

One other tip that I might add is to prune spent flowers above the second five-leaflet leaf. This will make new growth and longer flower production.
