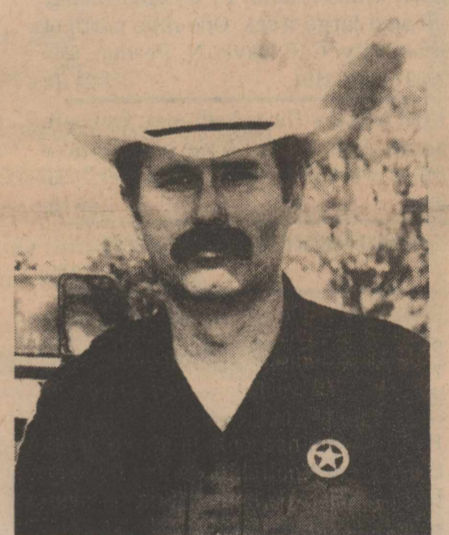
Sheriff To Resign

Gene Nix has advised *The Knox County News* that he will be resigning from his office of Knox County Sheriff this week with the resignation effective July 25.

Sheriff Nix has accepted a position on the police department at Baylor University in Waco and will be moving there with his wife Joyce, who is currently the editor of the *Munday Courier* in Munday, and his son, Tyler.

While working for the Baylor University police force, Nix will have the opportunity to take college classes, and he plans on working towards his bachelor's degree in Criminal Justice.

Having worked as a constable in Goree, a police officer in Munday, and for the Knox County Sheriff's Department, Nix has worked several positions to serve the citizens of Knox County. He was defeated in the last election when Munday Chief of Police Henry Dancer totaled the highest number of votes for the office of Knox County Sheriff. Slated to take office in January, Dancer will probably be the logical choice to be appointed to the position being vacated by Sheriff Nix. Knox County Judge David N. Perdue advised the *News* that while no Commissioners Court meeting has been held since learning of the resignation of Sheriff Nix, he had talked unofficially with at least two of the county

commissioners and they indicated that appointing Henry Dancer to the office of sheriff would be the likely course of action taken by the court to fill the unexpired term of Sheriff Nix.

No word has been released on any other immediate personnel changes in the Sheriff's Department although Sheriff Nix stated that one current employee was currently going through job interviews elsewhere.

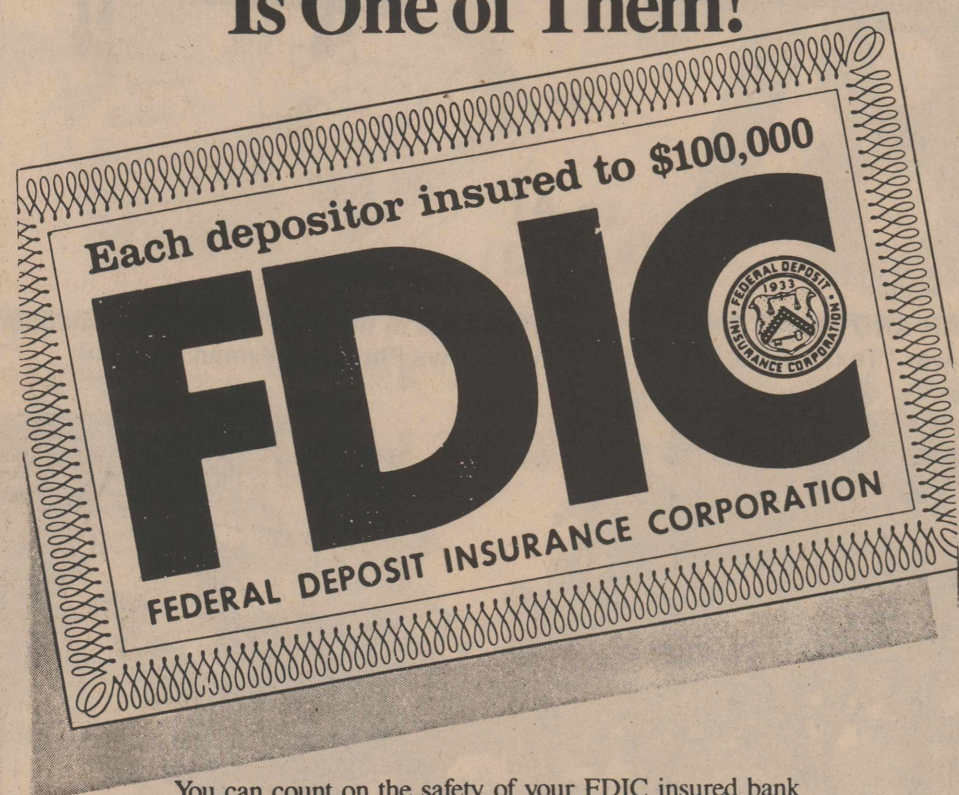

Funeral services for Brownie L. Lowrey were held Friday afternoon, June 17, at three o'clock in the First United Methodist Church with the Rev. Byron Putnam, church pastor, and the Rev. James Patterson officiating. Burial was in the Knox City Cemetery with Smith Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Lowrey, 89, died Thursday, June 16, at 1:45 a.m. in the Knox County Hospital after a brief illness.

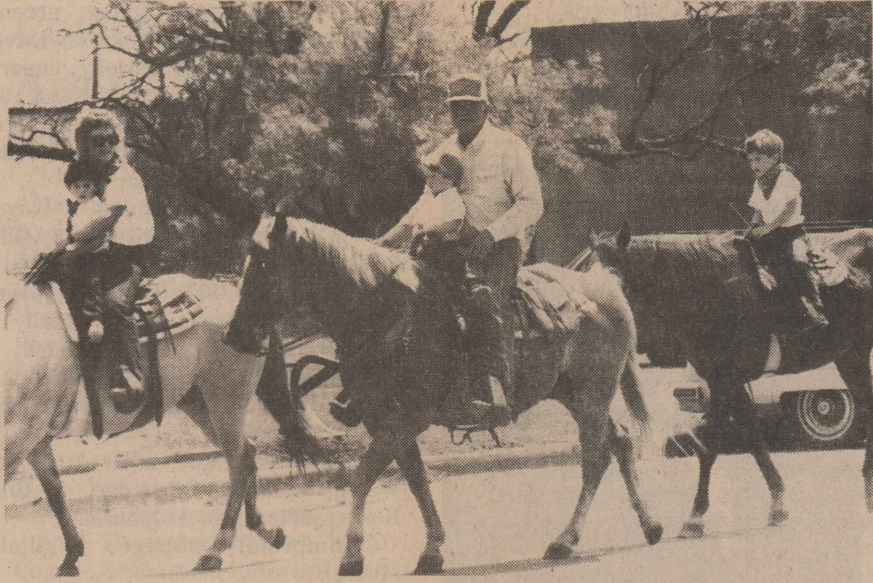

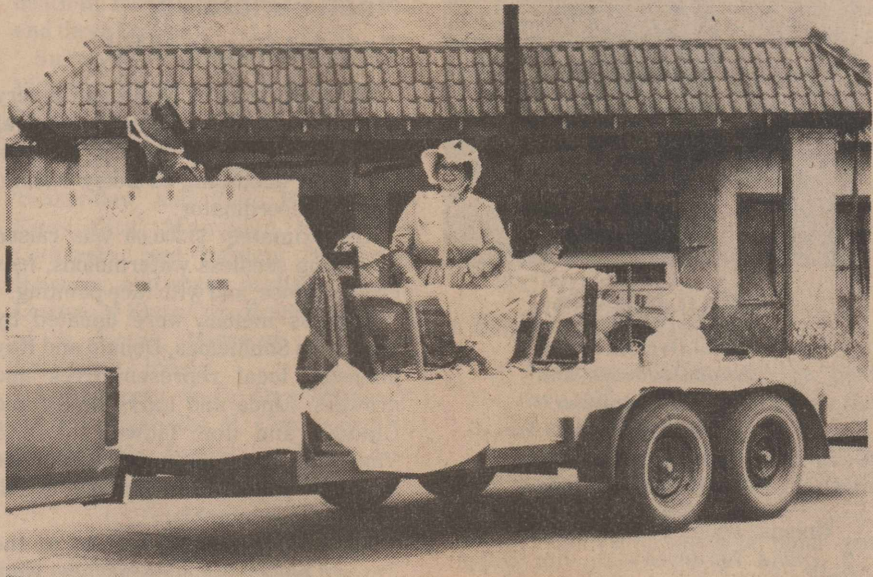

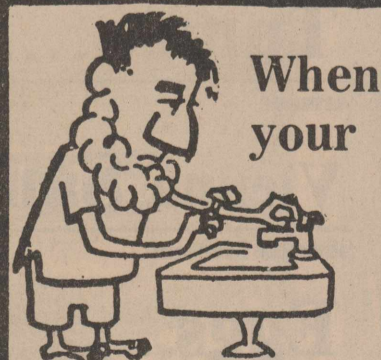

Be careful when you turn water on and off at outside faucets, especially if there is vegetation around the faucet which might hide a snake. An eight inch rattler hiding in the grass could hurt just as much as a big one that might be easier to see.

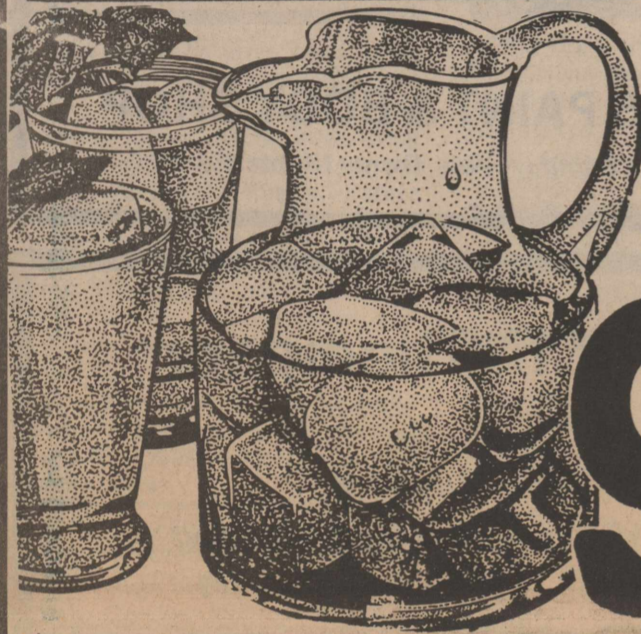
