Times and laws have changed, but it's a shame those responsible for making this family suffer more can't be treated to some old fashioned Texas necktie justice.



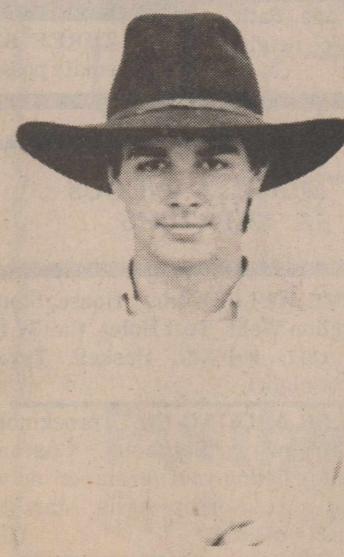

Bob Burkham To Receive Lone Star Farmer Degree

Five thousand Texas FFA members and guests are expected to attend the 60th Annual Convention of the Texas Association of Future Farmers of America, July 13-15, 1988, at the San Antonio Convention Center, San Antonio, Texas, including local members Justin Emerson and Bob Burkham, along with Chapter Advisor Leon Burkham and Mrs. Burkham.

The FFA is composed of students who are studying Agricultural Sciences in the public school in preparation for a variety of careers in Agriculture and Agribusiness. Agricultural Sciences is well known for providing learning experiences to students through the FFA with the theme this year "FFA - Agriculture's New Spirit." The ultimate objective is to produce future leaders for American agriculture with its vital role of producing food and fiber. Texas now has more than 900 FFA chapters with over 53,000 active members and more than 500,000 former members.

Bob will be receiving the Lone Star Farmer Degree during the convention. Over 2,000 award winners will be recognized with more than 1,500 members receiving the Lone Star Farmer

In addition, Kelli Evans, National President, Lincoln, Nebraska, will address the convention on Thursday night during the Stars Over Texas Award Program. Toby Miller, State President from Whitharral FFA Chapter, Whitharral, Texas, will preside at the general sessions. These sessions will include the election of the 1988-89 state president from the state officer candidates nominated by the 10 area associations. From ten area nominees, voting delegates will also select the state FFA sweetheart to represent the state association during 1988-89. Those in attendance will hear and recognize the Outstanding Public Speaker who will represent Texas at the National FFA Convention in Kansas City, Missouri.

Shawnee Russell, Knox City High School student, attended the 1988 session of the American Legion Boys State at the University of Texas at Austin, June 4 through 10. Boys State is a governmental simulation program sponsored by the American Legion.

Purpose of the program is to teach the youth of Texas constructive attitudes and understanding of the American form of government. Each high school in Texas is invited to send one junior to participate in the program. These participants are divided into cities, counties, and districts, to make up a mythical 51st State of the Union, "Boys State".

Commissioners Appoint Dancer

As a result of action taken by the Knox County Commissioners Court late Monday afternoon, Sheriff Elect Henry Dancer will be on the job as Sheriff of Knox County a little sooner than he expected. Dancer was selected by the commissioners to fulfill the unexpired term of Sheriff Gene Nix, who had previously submitted a resignation that is effective July 25.

After newspaper articles solicited applicants for the opening, the court received two applications and both persons were interviewed by the court prior to the selection of Henry Dancer. After defeating Nix in the last election, Dancer was originally scheduled to take office January 1, 1989. With his early appointment, Dancer will be formally sworn into office on July 25 in a ceremony at the Knox County Courthouse.

Sheriff Nix has accepted employment with the Baylor University Police Force in Waco and plans to attend college while working there. He will be moving within the next two weeks and will be taking some of his accumulated vacation time prior to July 25.

Working out of the back room at Andy's Hair Station on North Central in Knox City, Chester Wallace is a gentleman who is attempting to revive an art that hasn't been seen in Knox City in many years, the art of a professional shoe shine man. Working magic with his fingers, polish, cloth and brushes, Chester is a man who takes great pleasure in helping customers to look their best.

Open since June, Chester's homemade shine stand is something that you have to actually experience to fully understand. 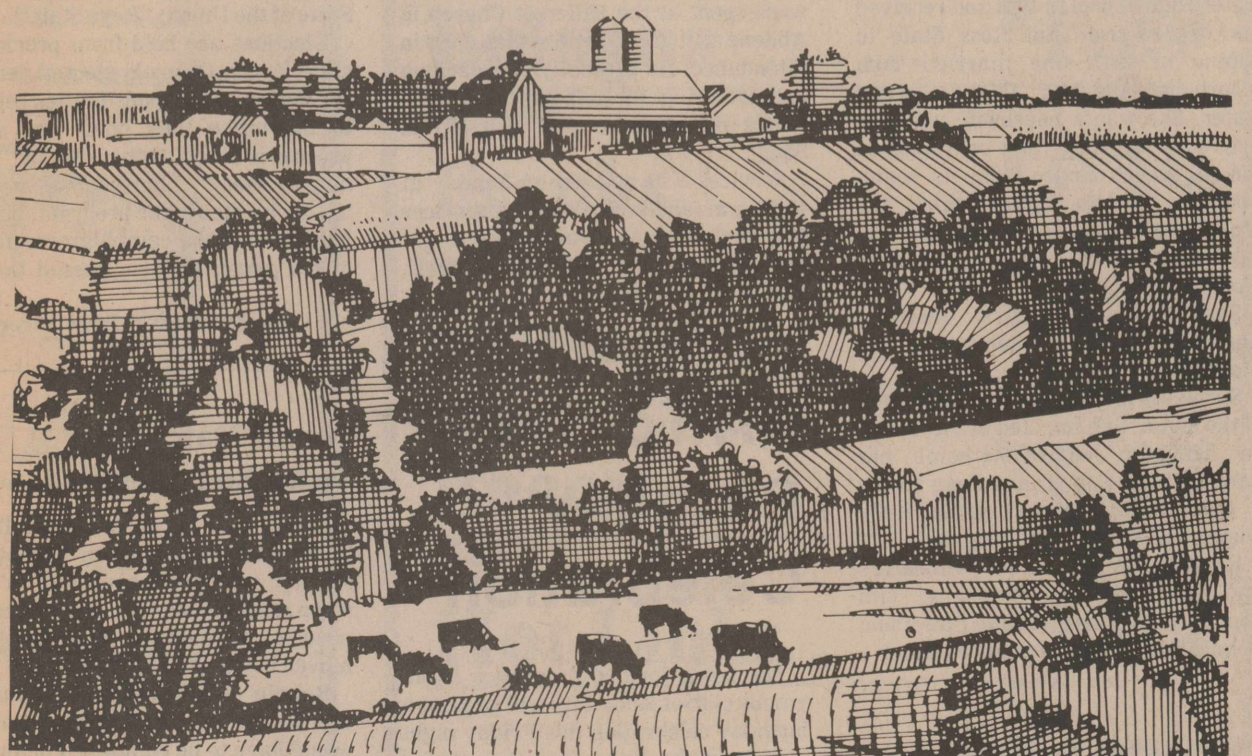

Care Home News

One of the articles in the Brazos Valley Care monthly newsletter is "A Time In The Life", which features one of the residents.

This month, Hazel Clark, a resident of the Care Home since 1978, is featured.

On December 7, 1901, in Yukon, Oklahoma, G.W. America Kruse and Hazel Jammia Kruse became the proud parents of Hazel Kruse. Hazel was the first born of her family. She later had three other sisters.

Later in Gilliland, Texas, Hazel met a young man by the name of Henry Wallace Clark. On November 20, 1916, they became husband and wife. In 1946, they moved to O'Brien. They had six children, three boys, Wayne, Lewis and Shadie and three girls, Nina Lee, Ramona and Waynell.

Hazel mentioned one of the most memorable times in their life occurred on Friday, March 13, 1953. Hazel's husband was a janitor at the O'Brien School and she was a housewife. Henry and Hazel were married 56 years.

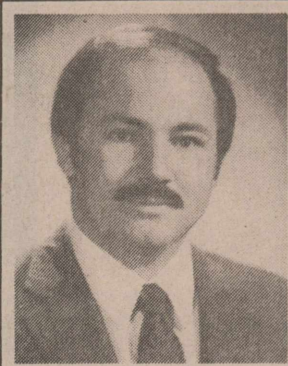

Brazos Electric and TU To Settle Comanche Litigation

WACO -- Brazos Electric Power Cooperative has announced an agreement with TU Electric intended to settle litigation related to the Comanche Peak nuclear plant.

Under the agreement, TU Electric will purchase Brazos Electric Power's 3.8 percent interest in the Comanche Peak plant and related nuclear fuel and transmission facilities. TU Electric will make Brazos Electric Power's loan payments on the project.

"We are very pleased with this agreement which we value at approximately \$229 million in today's dollars," said Richard E. McCaskill, executive vice president and general manager of Brazos Electric Power. "Its long-term effect on our rates and power supply structure should benefit our consumers," he said.

TU Electric will pay the cooperative \$19 million for nuclear fuel, \$15.3 million for litigation costs, \$2.5 million for the transmission facilities, and \$322,000 for other expenses as part of

the \$229 million settlement.

Brazos Electric Power received about \$22 million upon signing the agreement. At a closing anticipated for March 1989, the cooperative expects to receive another \$15 to \$16 million. TU Electric will then begin making the cooperative's loan payments on the project to the Federal Financing Bank (FFB).

The agreement will require the approval of the Rural Electrification Administration, which guarantees Brazos Electric Power's FFB debt, the National Rural Utilities Cooperative Finance Corporation, the Texas Public Utility Commission, and the Nuclear Regulatory Commission.

Brazos Electric Power is based in Waco. It provided wholesale electric power to 20 member cooperatives, seven municipal electric systems and Texas A&M University. These systems serve 233,000 consumers in a 66-county area of central and north Texas.

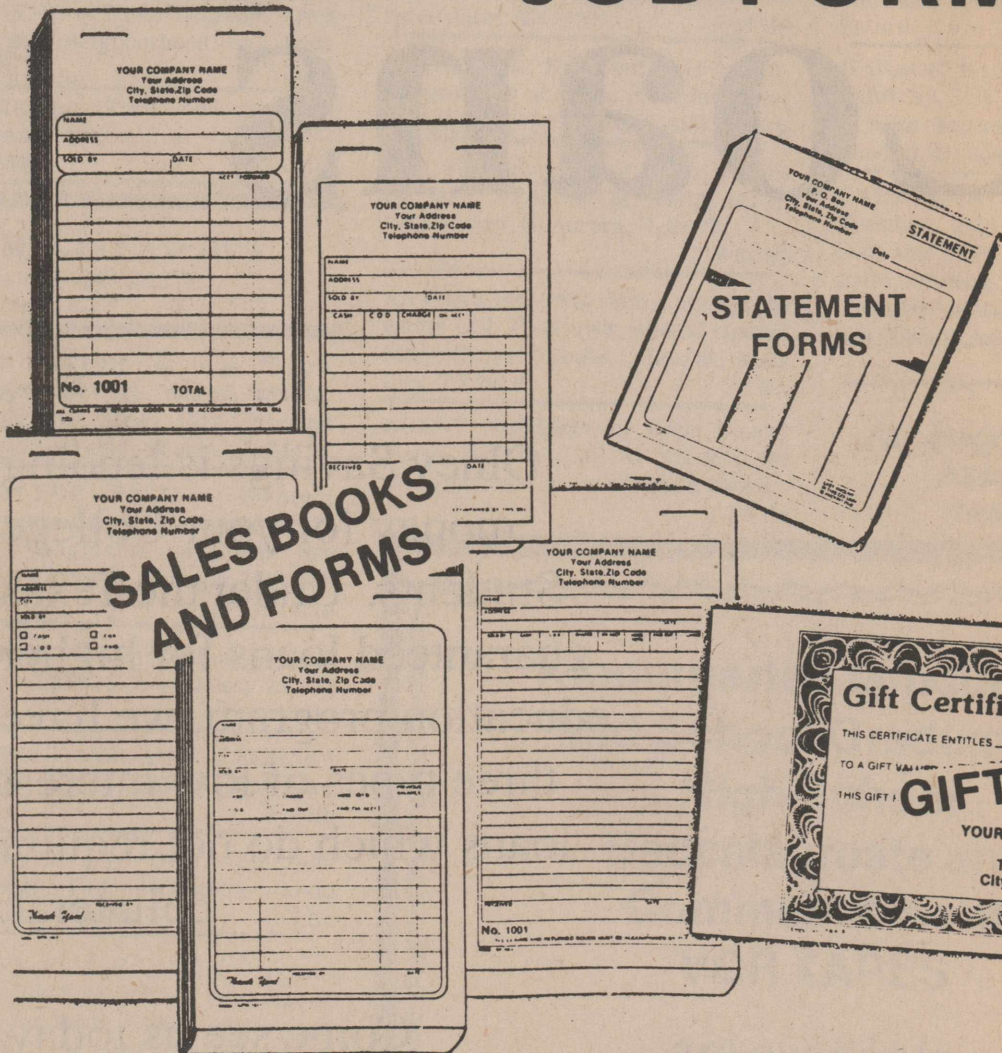
