## **ELEVEN PROJECTS** BEING WORKED IN **COUNTY ON RELIEF**

Cities of Rule, Rochester And Weinert Have Part In CWA Projects

### AFTER MORE PROJECTS

bers of Board Now In Austin For Approval

Haskell county has eleven proects approved by the Austin office calling for 238 men to work daily. Only three projects, working 47 men daily were approved prior to last week. Mr. P. M. Robertson, chairman of Board of Welfare and Employment of Haskell county was in Austin last week and through his efforts the other eight projects were approved. These projects now employ one hundred and ninetyone men daily.

The town of Rule has the following projects approved: Changing water line (working twenty men daily). Graveling streets (working 25 men daily; and improving school grounds, (working 20 men daily,) in Rule.

Rochester has projects approved Jud (working 64 men daily), draining streets and alleys (working 20 The judging team from the local men daily), and building privy for school is practicing daily, with school (working 12 men daily), Robert Barnett, Louis Hamilton, making 96 men as the number

Weinert's projects call for work on lateral road between Weinert and Pleasant View, which is a school bus line (working 20 men daily) and building privies for residents of Weinert (working 12 men daily.) These projects are allowing 32 men to work in Weinert.

In the city of Haskell they are changing a water line (working 15 men daily), improving South Ward school grounds (working 10 men daily) and working 20 men daily on improving lateral roads in Precinct Four, making a total of 45 men working out of Haskell.

Haskell is fortunate in having as many as 238 men to work but the Administrator and members of the Board are far from satisfied. Mr. T. L. Donohoo, County Adminis-(Continued On Page Eight)

#### Scotch Macaroons

Two and one half cups rolled oats: one half cup brown sugar; one half cup granulated sugar; one tablespoon shortening; two eggs; one teaspoon vanilla; two teaspoons baking powder.

Cream the shortening with the sugar, add the vanilla and the beaton yolks, then the oats and baking powder. Add the stiffly beaten egg whites last. Drop by spoonfuls on pans rubbed with shortening. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for twenty minutes.

#### All Contaigous Diseases Should Be Well-Treated

teresting and profitable meeting.

AUSTIN, DEC. 11 .- "It is a great mistake to treat even light cases of measles, chickenpox, mumps, scarlet fever, or any other of the communicable diseases of childhood as though they did not amount to much," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. "Treatment of that sort makes it possible for these diseases to spread and cause serious outbreaks among children whose impaired resistance makes them easy victims to any form of infection.

"Some of the most serious outbreaks we have had of scarlet fever, as well as of other diseases in different parts of the State, have been traced to mild cases—that is, to cases too light for the doctor to be called. In some instances the children have continued to go to school and to associate and play with other children. In others after they have been kept at home for a few days suffering from what was believed to be just an ordinary cold, they have returned to school and have scattered these germs around among their schoolmates Evidently a group of cases-sometimes very serious ones-have developed from the carelessly-handled mild case. The result was another epidemic that could have been prevented.

"There are several things worth remembering in connection with childrens' diseases. Nearly all of these diseases begin with a diges-tive upset or with symptoms closely resembling those of the common cold. Accordingly it is a wise thing for mothers to regard every diges-tive upset and every common cold with suspicion until you are sure it is not the beginning of some thing more serious".

Your doctor is the best judge of the seriousness of such symptoms and you will save suffering and an-xiety if you put the child to bed, send for your doctor and follow his



#### CHRISTMAS

Throughout the Christian world Christmas is celebrated in commemoration of the birth of Jesus Christ, although the day or even the year of that event is not definitely known. Observance of Christmas was first officially set for December 25 by Pope Julius, in the fourth century, probably because certain pagan festivals were held at that time of the year.

Even to this day many of the customs which surround the Christmas season may be traced to pagan origin. This may be accounted for by the fact that early missionaries did not disturb the harmless native customs of their converts to Christianity, but gradually merged them with Christian observances. Thus the giving of gifts, the decorations of holly and mistletoe, the feasting and other features of Christmas celebration are of very ancient origin.

Christmas, therefore, may be said to have a double significance-one religious, and the other social-the latter perpetuating the customs of many peoples. It is the world's most widely observed holiday, and its social observance is by no means confined to adherents of Christianity.

#### **GETTING RESULTS**

It only takes a little thought to see that the number of dollars of gold in the country can be increased to any desired extent by reducing the gold content without adding to the gold stock."



GROVETON.-Land terraced 20 vears ago with the help of the feed kept available to insure to ounty agent yielded more than onehalf bale of cotton per acre this year on the farm of D. W. Benton, Trinity county farmer. Unterraced farms in the community averaged about one-third bale to the acre, he says. When he started terracing, Mr. Benton says his land was gulhed and washed and not as good as several other farms in the neighborhood. This year he planted peas on the destroyed cotton land and has cut 1200 bales for his work stock and has some to turn under

DAINGERFIELD. - An average of 600 pounds of lint cotton per acre from two and one-half acres of upland was made this year in a demonstration conducted by L. B. Jenkins, Morris county farmer. The 10-year county average yield is 117 pounds per acre. The increase, according to W. G. Ralph, county agent, was due to the practice of turning under winter cover crops and the use of barnyard manure which made the liberal application of commercial fertilizer go farther.

RISING STAR.—An outstanding white leghorn pullet selected from the demonstration flock of Mrs. Evetett Harris, Eastland county, laid 310 eggs from October 17, 1932, to the same date last fall, and continued to lay until she reached the 327-egg mark at moulting time. From March 22 to June 1, the pul-

In the old country and in our pioneer times, too, days, sometimes weeks, previous to Christmas, were spent in preparations for the holiday itself,-days of cooking and baking, days of much vigorous beating with large spoons in bowls, much thought and joyous planning being indulged in, with all sorts of agreeable condiments to make the festive Christmas goodies.

Since really more than half the fun lies in getting ready for Christof the year-some suggestions are given here, in many of which the children may share the work and fun of producing them.

Children can make a number of hristmas candies with a little supervision. Dates stuffed with nuts. or fondant, are delicious and easy I've tried real hard to be a good and I have been a good little girl, to make. Stoning the dates and rolling them in sugar, daughter can manage, while mother prepares the fondant,-the simpliest kind being powdered sugar stirred into white of egg or cream. And son can crack and pick out walnut meats,-Tho he may have to be watched a bit, -they mustn't "evaporate" too rapidly, you know. Nut meats tempt us all to nibble just a little.

Old-fashioned Candy

While mother is mixing fondant, perhaps she will make a larger amount, part of which will go into a fruit candy. Take a few dates and run them through the meat grinder. These should be worked into the fondant and rolled into a loaf about an inch and a half in diameter. This little loaf can be sliced with a wet knife and the slices allowed to stand over night. For some families it is the special Christmas candy .- not made at any other time of the year.

A gift box to send away to someone who will otherwise miss the home made goodies offers splendid opportunities for one to think up new combinations to surprise this loved one. A spice cake recipe will make about three small round cakes one of which will be ample for a centerpiece for the box we are to send. White frosting with a pretty design of red candies with fresh holly leaves pressed flat into the surface will be a welcome sight to the far away one.

Spice Drops for Decorations

Around the centerpiece which is in a sturdy tin box, compartments of cardboard can be arranged, each to hold a different candy. Besides the stuffed dates, there should be nuts and figs, and more stuffed candies made of prunes and dried apricots. Spice drops scattered about among the larger fruits will add to the gay appearance.

If one is skilled at Candy-making. now is the time to hunt up recipes for those old favorites, fudge, panoche and divinity. A variation of fudge can be produced by adding shredded cocoanut or walnut meats, or chopped marshmellows, Panoche, the brown sugar fudge, will be


