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



Following the kickoff and the return of ball control to the Hounds, two short runs and an incomplete pass play forced the home team to punt back to a strong Panther defense.

Seymour tried to show off its aerial attack in the next offensive series, but a sturdy and tough Hound defense stopped the drive cold and returned ball control to Knox City with 1:23 left in the half. One running play by Large was stopped after a six yard pickup just before another Greyhound timeout was called. 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
