## Hounds Win Opener

### Defeat Seymour, 14-7

After a day of clouds and brief rain showers, the skies above Knox City cleared to their familiar Texas blue shortly before the scheduled 8:00 p.m. kickoff to officially open the 1988 Greyhound Varsity football season. Hosting the Seymour Panthers in their first regular season game, the Hounds opened to a full stadium and all the excitement normally associated with the season's first home game.

With temperatures in the 70s and the Greyhound band providing festive background music, the Greyhounds started the action following the coin toss by electing to defend the north goal and kick off to Seymour.

Seymour opened play after being stopped on their own 26 following the kickoff. The Panther first drive saw one first down gained and a total yardage of 26 before being stopped cold by a tough Greyhound defense.

After a first penalty for holding and facing a first and 20 situation, Hound quarterback Billy Wayne Large broke a run around the right side for 10 yards, then just two plays later Jim Ford gained another 10 for a Knox City first down. The next play gained another first down after a pass play from Large to Chad Carter. Two plays later, Seymour picked up their first penalty on a holding call after a short run by Large. With Knox City picking up another first down, they immediately followed with a penalty for delay of game. Seymour was penalized on the next play for clipping, moving the ball down to the Panther 25 yard line. After two short runs with little gain, Knox City called their first time out to discuss strategy with head coach Pat Risinger on the sidelines. Two plays later, the Hounds picked up another first down on the Panther 20 yard line. With a pass from Large to Ford picking up 13 yards, the Hounds moved within a few yards of the Panther goal line. On the next play, Alex Ledesma scored the first Greyhound touchdown of the season with a short run right up the middle. Following the TD, Fred Ledesma booted in the extra point with a solid kick through the uprights.

Trailing 7 to 0, Seymour started their second drive after running the kickoff from Ledesma back to the 33 yard line. After a run attempt and two foiled pass attempts, the Panthers punted back to a tough Greyhound defense that allowed no gain during the drive.

Knox City's second possession started off with a quarterback keeper by Large on the Hound 44. Following a second run by Large, another holding penalty was called against our own red and blue. Facing a second and seventeen, Large again ran to the left side, picking up four yards. The first quarter of play ended with the next incomplete pass play from Large to Ray Flye.

Starting the second quarter of play

with a punt to Seymour by Alex Flores, the Hound defense settled in for a tough stand against the Panthers on the Seymour nine yard line. Even with good tackles by Robbie Whitford, Fred Ledesma, Chad Carter, Mike Manuel, Augie Rodriguez, and Alex Flores, Seymour managed to pick up four first downs with a combination of runs and short yardage pass plays. Knox City was called for a face mask penalty

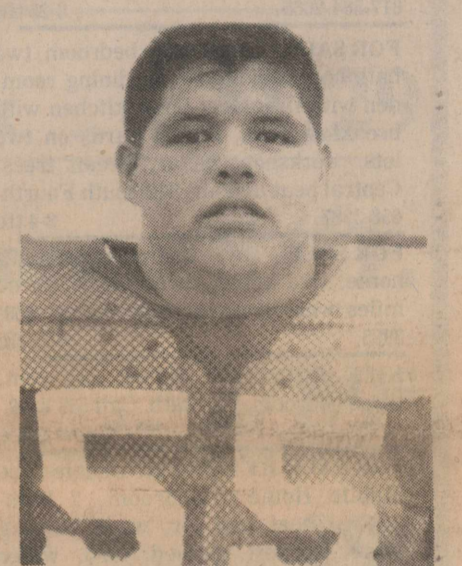
before Seymour completed several pass plays that moved them to the Knox City nine yard line prior to being stopped by a holding call and penalty. Seymour crossed the goal line three plays later, only to have the play called back by an offside penalty. Jim Ford stopped the next run attempt, forcing

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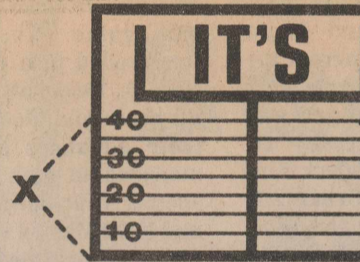

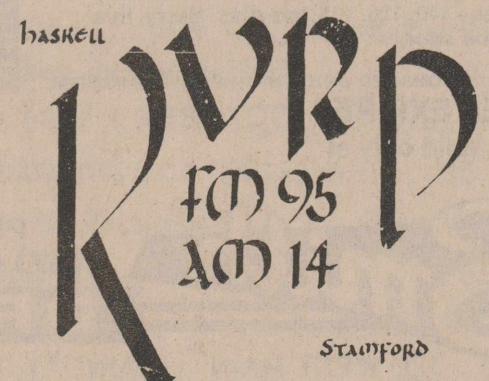

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# Hounds Win Opener

The Panthers into a fourth and goal from the four yard line before a time out was called by Knox City. The next running play by Seymour and the following extra point kick tied the ball game at 7-7 with 4:22 left in the first half.

Following the kickoff and the return of ball control to the Hounds, two short runs and an incomplete pass play forced the home team to punt back to a strong Panther defense.

Seymour tried to show off its aerial attack in the next offensive series, but a sturdy and tough Hound defense stopped the drive cold and returned ball control to Knox City with 1:23 left in the half. One running play by Large was stopped after a six yard pickup just before another Greyhound timeout was called. Following the timeout, a couple of pass plays brought the Hounds another first down on the Seymour 40 yard line with 40 seconds showing on the clock. Following another timeout, Quarterback Large opted for a short pass play to Alex Ledesma for short yardage before another Greyhound timeout was called. Action resumed with a delay of game penalty against the Hounds and a long pass play from Large to Brent Willis. As Willis missed the ball and crossed the sideline he was hit by a Panther, causing a dead ball foul call against Seymour and a 15 yard penalty. Knox City resumed play on the 35 and 20 seconds showing on the first half clock. Large picked up a first down on a right end run then threw an interception and returned ball control to the Panthers with eight seconds left on the clock. Following a return to play whistle, Seymour called a time out with one second left in the first half. A short yardage run up the middle closed out the first half with the score remaining tied at 7-7.

The Knox City Drill Team consisting of Captain Marci Berryman, Ymelda Gonzales, Amber Mahan, Diane Casillas, Becky Wilson and Karla McKinney gave one of the best performances seen by Greyhound fans in several years as they entertained the home crowd to a fast, lively tape recorded tune. It was evident by the crowd response that the Drill Team performance was well received and appreciated by both Greyhound and Panther fans. Next on the entertainment listing was a solid and obviously well rehearsed performance by both the Greyhound Band under the direction of Drum Major Beth Underwood and Knox City Twirlers, Kelli Whitten, Head; Kristen perdue and Angie Staggs. A current favorite across the nation, La Bamba was performed next by the Greyhound Band and again was well received by the home crowd.

With Knox City Cheerleaders Kim Bateman, head; Jennifer Grindstaff, Mitzi Marion, Ivy Maurer and Leah Rauch leading the home crowd in cheers of support, Billy Large opened the second half with a kickoff return run to the Greyhound 43 yard line. After two no yardage runs, the Hounds were hit with an illegal procedure penalty and the down rerun to a second and 15. Another penalty for delay of game was called next on the Hounds, forcing a second and 20 play. On the third down, Large rolled out on a pass play to Alex Flores with the pass short and incomplete. The Hounds punted and Seymour took over for their first drive of the second half from their own 35 yard line. Defenders Bob Burkham,

Willie Rodriguez, Fred Ledesma, Boyce Tankersley, and Billy Large all made strong tackles to end the next Panther offensive drive, forcing Seymour to turn the ball over on the Hound 47 yard line.

Knox City picked up another first down in just three plays with short yardage runs. On the second play after first down, Billy Large ran out a quarterback keeper for a 36 yard touchdown run through the left side of the Panther line. The extra point kick was good, and Knox City once again took the lead by 14-7 with 3:20 left in the third quarter.

Seymour tried to form a wall to run the ball back on the kickoff, but Kevin Hoekendorf broke through and stopped the ball carrier for short yardage. Fred Ledesma and Alex Flores demonstrated their strength on the next few tackles as they held Seymour to nine yards in three plays. With fourth and one, the Panthers punted the ball into the Greyhound end zone, allowing Knox City to resume the offense on their own 20 yard line. Two short runs up the middle failed to gain any yards for Knox City and with third and 10 to go, the third period buzzer sounded. Prior to beginning the fourth quarter, Knox City called a time out for another sideline conference with the coaching staff.

The Greyhounds opened the fourth quarter with a 10 yard run and a first down followed by a short two yard run and a penalty for illegal procedure. Third and seven brought a six yard run by Roy Roberson, just short of a first down. Knox City then punted back to Seymour with the runback stopped by Boyce Tankersley, Richard Davenport, Bob Burkham and Kevin Hoekendorf.

A clipping penalty against the Panthers on their second play of the next drive set them back to their own 20 yard line. An incomplete pass attempt on the third down forced Seymour to punt back to Knox City, with the Panthers downing the ball on the Hound 39 yard line.

Knox City's offense stalled against a tough Seymour defense on the next drive with no yards gained in the first three plays and a clipping penalty against the Greyhounds that was refused by Seymour, forcing Knox City to punt the ball off in a fourth and 10 situation. A clipping penalty against Seymour on the runback forced them back to the 25 yard marker to open up an offensive drive with 6:44 left in the ball game. The Panthers then steamrolled to a first down on their own 40. Devastating tackles by Bob Burkham and Monte Owen slowed up their advance, but Seymour still managed to gain enough yards for another first down. Augie Rodriguez and Mike Manuel stopped the next two plays before Seymour picked up another first down on the third down. Harvey Rocha stopped the next two plays with Ledesma, Large, and Manuel stopping the third down with 1:09 left in the game. A fourth down run by the Panthers netted them a first down before the runner was stopped by Monte Owen. A personal foul against Seymour then moved the ball back to the 23 yard line and a pass on the next play provided a lot of excitement for Seymour fans, but the Panther receiver could not hold on to the ball in the midst of a lot of red Knox City jerseys. Following a several minute con-

fusion delay by the officials with :30 seconds left on the clock, Seymour again had the ball with a second and 20 and attempted a pass play that was broken up by Knox City. Third and 20 with :23 seconds on the clock brought another attempted Seymour pass, but a strong rush on the quarterback caused a fumble that was recovered by a fast thinking and even faster moving Chad Carter on the Greyhound 43 yard line. With :20 seconds on the clock and leading the game by seven points, Knox City elected to run the ball and eat up time before Seymour called a time out with :16 seconds left in the game. After resuming play and another short run by Knox City, Seymour called another time out with :03 seconds on the clock. Billy Large ended the game by dropping on the ball and retaining possession as the final three seconds ran out.

With the final score 14 to 7 in favor of the Greyhounds, there were a lot of happy faces visible as the Knox City fans left the bleachers. A lot of favorable comments were heard as those present discussed the performance of so many who have worked hard to make the evening a success. The coaches, the football players, band members, cheerleaders, drill team, and twirlers have every right to be proud of this victory, they all earned it!

An article of interest in the *Wichita Falls Times/Record News* last week reports that former Knox City resident Boyd Kelly of Wichita Falls, along with Richard W. Chapin of Lincoln, Nebr., has purchased KSYZ-FM in Nebraska, pending approval of the Federal Communications Commission. Lyle Manchik, president of Manchik Broadcasting Inc. said the FCC should approve the sale in late October. The station began operating in November 1982.

Chapin and Kelly, the officers, directors, and stockholders of Mid Nebraska Broadcasting Inc., are well-known in the radio broadcasting field, Manchik said.

Chapin said he and Kelly have been friends for 35 years, and they decided to invest together. They chose KSYZ because "it is the best Class C FM facility in mid-Nebraska, in my estimation," Chapin said. Kelly is president of Stuart Broadcasting, which once owned KRGI AM-FM in Grand Island, as well as KFOR and KFOX in Lincoln.

Kelly owns the top-rated FM station in Dallas, KKDA, Chapin said.

Kelly also was a co-owner of KDWT in Stamford in the early 80s with Bob Pritchard before Pritchard bought him out.

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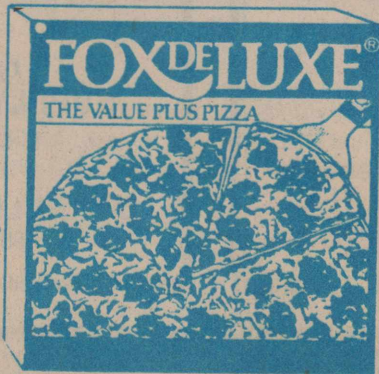

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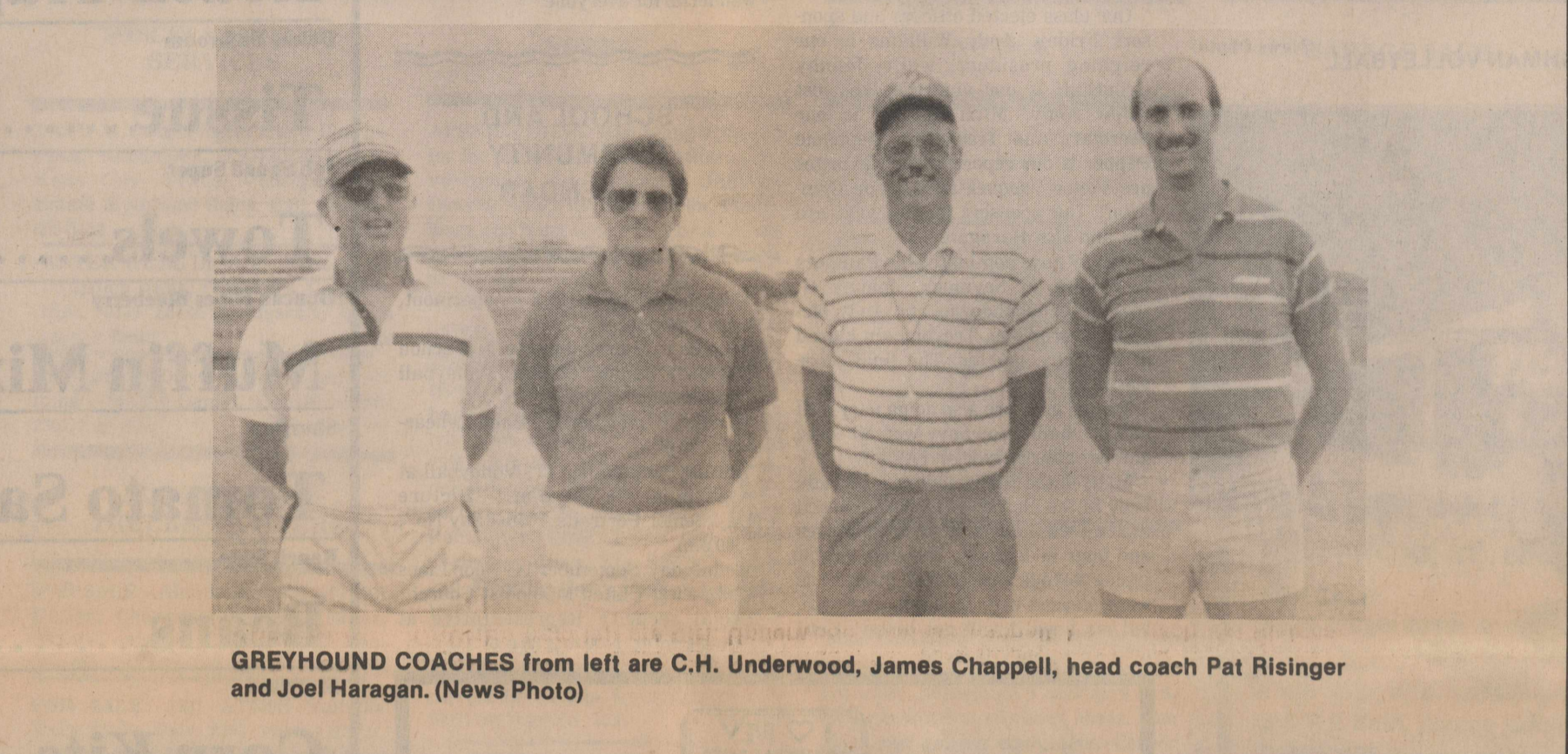
