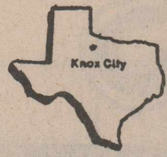

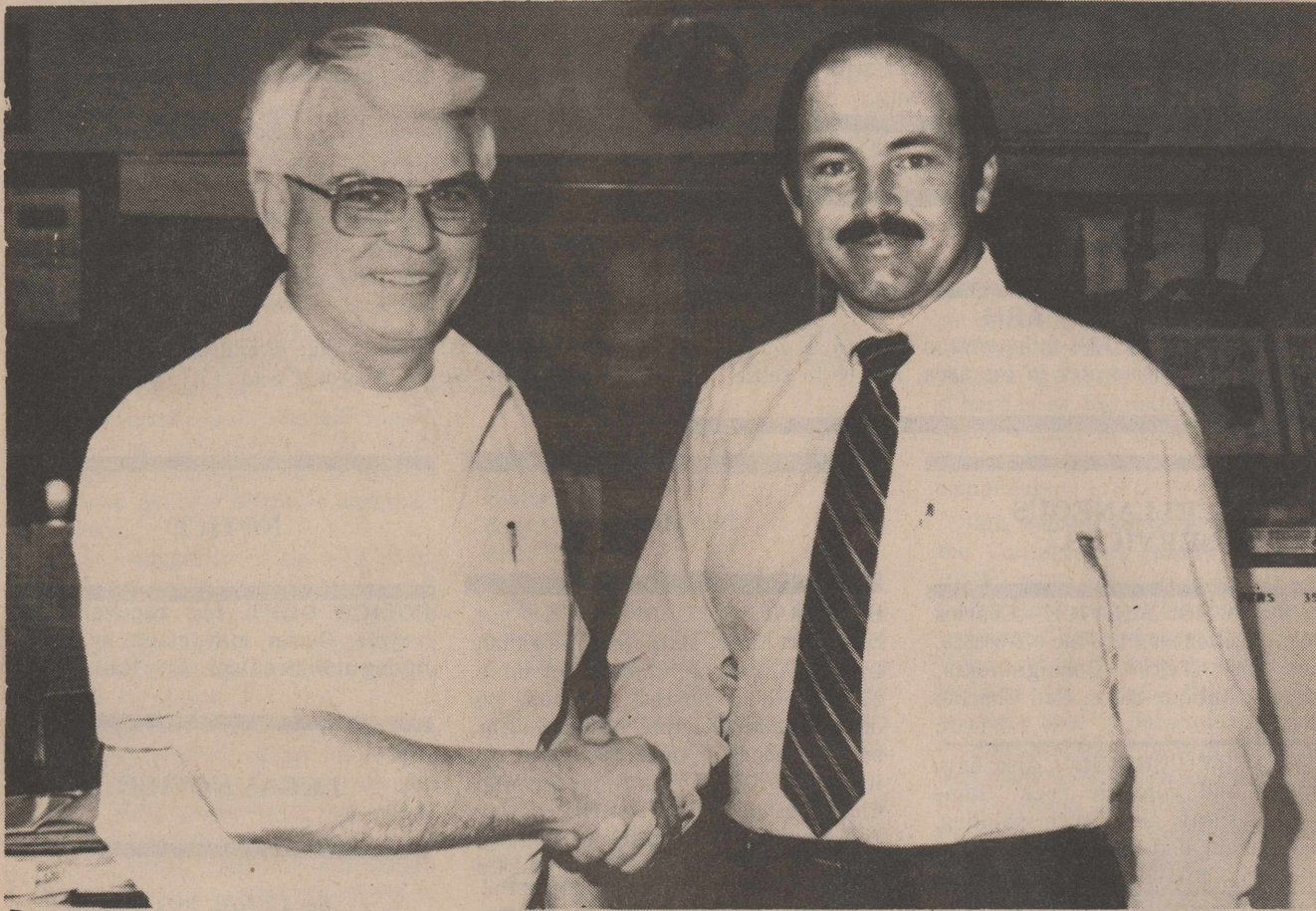

Counts Certified

As Democratic Nominee

David Counts, in action taken Friday in Austin by the Secretary of State, was certified to be on the General Election ballot as the Democratic nominee for State Representative, 78th District.

Counts will replace Steve Carriker, D-Roby, who was recently elected to the Texas Senate in a special election to fill the seat vacated by Ray Farabee.

Counts, fifty-one year old Knox City businessman, was selected unanimously by the Democratic

chairmen of the 78th District to replace Carriker on the ballot for the November 8 General Election.

"I can think of no other greater honor than public service. To represent the people with whom I have lived, worked, and gone to church would be a tremendous responsibility, but one I would welcome," said Counts.

Counts also expressed his appreciation to the Democratic county chairmen of the 78th District for the confidence they placed in him to be the

Democratic nominee.

"November 8 is not far off, and I am going to continue to visit each county of this district as I have been doing to let people know me and for me to hear from them, because that is what a state representative should do," stated Counts.

The 78th District is comprised of Cottle, Fisher, Garza, Jones, Kent, King, Knox, Lynn, Nolan, Scurry, Stonewall, and rural Taylor counties.

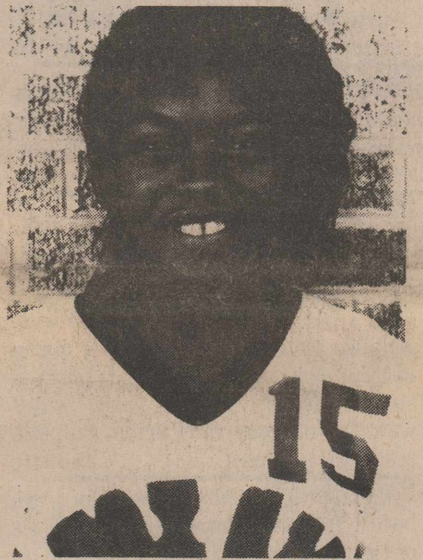

KC-O'Brien Enrollment Totals 470

Enrollment for Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District is "down slightly" from the 484 total at the beginning of the 1987-88 school year.

Four hundred and seventy students have enrolled in classes for the first week of the current school year.

Elementary reported a total of 173 with pre-kindergarten 36, kindergarten 36, first grade 36, second grade, 32, and third grade 33.

Mid school enrollment also was reported as 173, with fourth grade 37, fifth grade 30, sixth grade 32, seventh grade 34, and eighth grade 40.

High school enrolled 124 students. Freshmen totaled 27, sophomores 21, juniors 42, and seniors 34.

Greyhounds Roll On

Sting The Hornets, 23-0

Under the direction of head coach Pat Risinger, the Knox City Greyhound football team has a perfect season record after dominating and defeating the visiting Aspermont Hornets last Friday night by a score of 23 to 0 at Greyhound Stadium. With this victory following on the heels of last week's big win over Seymour and a near flawless pre-season scrimmage record, the Greyhounds are looking forward with cautious optimism to hosting Albany in Knox City this Friday night.

In the contest against Aspermont, Knox City started out by receiving the opening kickoff and immediately establishing a running offense during the first drive, picking up a first down on the second play after runs by both Alex Ledesma and Roy Roberson. A missed connection on the next first down play between quarterback Billy Large and Alex Ledesma resulted in a fumble that was recovered by the Aspermont Hornets on the Hound 45 yard line.

Starting earlier than expected, the Greyhound defense came on strong

with stops by Jim Ford, Alex Flores, Fred Ledesma, and a quarterback sack by Bubba Manuel. Forced to punt on fourth down, Seymour managed to kick the ball to the Knox City 20 yard line and down it there.

With 8:36 left in the first quarter, Knox City again took offensive control of the game with quarterback Billy Large at the helm. A first down handoff from Large to Alex Ledesma picked up 7 yards on the first play of

After a scoreless first half, the Greyhounds got our offense untracked and posted a 23-0 win over the Aspermont Hornets to run our record to 2-0. Halftime adjustment in our blocking schemes proved effective against the stunting Aspermont defense. Aspermont did pretty well, what we expected defensively, but breakdowns in execution prevented us from capitalizing on good field position the

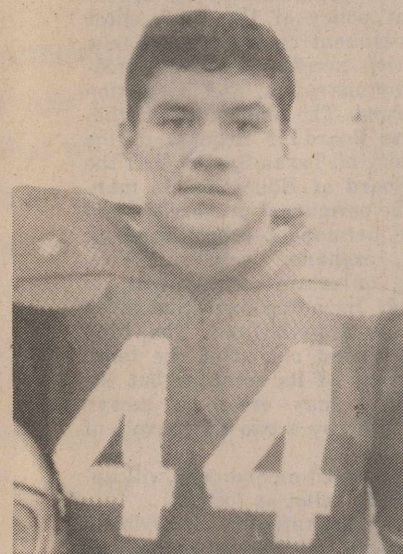
first half. Coach Underwood's blocking adjustments simplified assignments for our linemen and we were able to put the ball in the end zone in the second half. Defensively, we played very well. who came in as quarterback under difficult conditions in the first half and did a fine job running the ball club. Also, Chad Carter's pass interception and ensuing 30 yard touchdown run highlighted the defensive effort by all the Hounds.

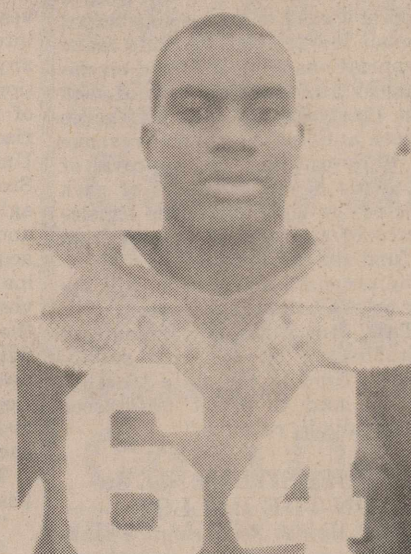
Friday night we host Albany. They have a very good football team and

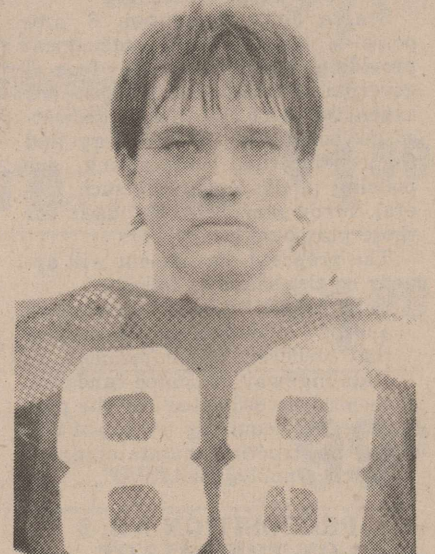
Players of the Week

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS
OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. The Texas

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

the series. Second down saw another running play with Roberson being stopped on the line of scrimmage. Facing a 3rd down and 2 yards to go, Alex Ledesma picked up another 1st down and 5 yards with a quick run up the left side. Large then took the ball on a keeper play and picked up 9 yards with a run through several attempted tackles. Roberson picked up the 3rd Greyhound 1st down on the next play with a run to near mid field. Ledesma carried next, but was stopped at the line of scrimmage with no gain. Large picked up another 1st down and 14 yards on the next running play before being brought down from behind by the Hornet defense. Roy Roberson picked up another first down on the next play with 4:42 left on the scoreboard clock in the first quarter of play. Alex Ledesma, Roy Roberson and Billy Large were all stopped on three successive runs as the Hornets tightened up their defense and forced a 4th and 15 situation for the Greyhounds. Starting up their defense and forced a 4th and 15 situation for the Greyhounds. Starting from the Aspermont 32 yard line, Large attempted to pass before being sacked and thrown for a loss back to the 46 yard line.

Regaining control of the ball, Aspermont faced a strong Greyhound rush that caused an incomplete pass on the 1st down. A second down tackle by Fred Ledesma stopped the Hornets with only a 1 yard gain. Aspermont soon faced a 4th and long yardage situation when Fred Ledesma sacked their quarterback on a 3rd down pass play. On 4th, the Hornets punted to Billy Large who caught the ball on the 30 and brought it back past midfield into Aspermont territory with a 21 yard runback.

The next Greyhound drive began with quarterback Billy Large's picking up 15 yards and another 1st down on a quarterback keeper play up the middle. An ignited Hound offense then went into an I formation for first time in the evening. A handoff to Roberson

picked up 1 yard, followed by a fake pass and pitch back to Roberson who picked up enough yardage for another Greyhound 1st down as the clock ran out of time in the 1st quarter of play.

With 1st and 10 inside the Aspermont 24 yard line, Large opted for a quarterback keeper and picked up 3 yards to the Hornet 21 yard line. A 2nd down run by Large around the right side picked up nothing but bad news as Large was hit hard at the line of scrimmage. Shaken up on the play, Billy Wayne was taken out of the game and replaced by backup quarterback Boyce Tankersley after a Greyhound time out. Roberson picked up 2 yards on the next play before being stopped by a host of Aspermont defenders. The first Greyhound pass play of the game came next as Tankersley threw long to Willie Rodriguez with the ball passing through his hands as he was unable to hold on to the ball while under a strong pass defense. Aspermont then took over possession on downs at its own 19 yard line.

A 1st down fumble was recovered by Aspermont, with 2nd down bringing a completed pass that was called back by a penalty against the Hornets. With 2nd and 16, Aspermont opted for a quarterback run that was stopped with a hard tackle by Jim Ford. A 3rd down pass attempt was broken up when defender Fred Ledesma sacked the Hornet quarterback deep in his own territory. Following a punt and return by Ledesma to the Aspermont 28 yard line, Knox City set up the next offensive drive with excellent field position.

With Tankersley still in at quarterback, Roberson took the 1st down handoff down to the 19 yard line. On 2nd and 9, Tankersley passed to and overthrew receiver Jim Ford. With 7:16 left in the first half, Tankersley went back to pass under a strong rush by Aspermont and managed to get the ball off to Roy Roberson who was dropped for a loss on the play. With 4th and 16, Knox City opted for a fourth down run by Alex Flores to just inside the Aspermont 16 yard line. Aspermont then took possession on downs.

A 1st down fumble by Aspermont was recovered by Knox City on the Aspermont 14 yard line. Following a time out for a side line conference with the coaching staff, the Greyhounds once again took possession with 6:12 left in the second quarter. Tankersley picked up 4 yards on a keeper run around the right side before being stopped on the Hornet 10 yard line. Roberson was thrown for a loss of 3 yards on the next play with Tankersley being sacked on 3rd down. Facing a 4th and 12, Tankersley's attempted pass was incomplete, and Aspermont took over once again on downs.

With the 1st running play stopped for a loss, Knox City received an offside penalty on 2nd down, allowing the Hornets to replay the second down. Fred Ledesma's rush of the quarterback and Jim Ford's tackle of the running back allowed only a 2 yard gain on the replayed 2nd down and Aspermont received a penalty for delay of game on third down. With a 3rd and 10 from their own 15 yard line, Aspermont ran to the 20 yard line before being stopped by Chad Carter, Bubba Manuel, and Monte Owen. With the Hornets punting again on 4th down, Alex Ledesma received the 45 yard punt and ran back 6 yards before being brought down with just :55 seconds left in the half.

Tankersley handed off to Alex Ledesma for a 1st down run and 5 yard gain. Ledesma again ran on 2nd down

and picked up another 4 yards before the Hounds took another time out with :13 seconds left on the clock and still no score in the game. A return to play saw Tankersley attempt to pass before being sacked as the first half ended.

Following halftime performance by the Greyhound band, Twirlers, and Drill Team, Knox City opened the second half with Fred Ledesma's kicking off to Aspermont. Alex Fores made a strong open field tackle on the Hornet runback, knocking the ball carrier out of bounds on the Aspermont 17 yard line. Knox City defenders Monte Owen, Bubba Manuel, and Robbie Whitford combined their talents for tackles and a quarterback sack that shut down the Hornet offense and forced a 4th and 16 for Aspermont. A high snap from center to the punter and a strong rush by the Hound defense caused a broken play on the punt with the punter being forced to hand the ball off on an attempted run that failed.

With Knox City taking over possession on the Aspermont 24 yard line, quarterback Boyce Tankersley kept the ball and ran to the 14 yard line before being brought down. His efforts resulted in a first down for the Greyhounds from the 14. Billy Large came back in as quarterback on the next play and ran around the right side to cross the goal line for the first touchdown of the evening. Fred Ledesma kicked the extra point to put Knox City ahead 7 to 0.

After receiving the Greyhound kickoff, the Hornets again took possession with 9:42 left in the 3rd quarter. Bob Burkham made a good, one man open field tackle to stop the runback after the kickoff. Bob Burkham, Monte Owen and Bubba Manuel made the next stop, followed by an incomplete pass from Aspermont quarterback and a penalty for illegal procedure against the Hornets. Another pass play was broken up as Rodriguez and Ford sacked the quarterback for a loss of downs and forced 4th down punt attempt that was blocked by Augie Rodriguez. The Greyhounds took over on the Aspermont 24 yard line.

Ledesma took the 1st down handoff for a pickup of 5 yards, then 2nd down saw Roberson picking up 2 more yards on a tough run against several Hornet defenders. Going from the 17 yard line, the Greyhound 3rd down moved the ball down to the 7 yard line with another 1st down picked up on a run by Billy Large. Alex Ledesma was met at the line of scrimmage on a 1st down run with no yardage picked up. Large then moved the ball to the 5 yard line with a quarterback run before calling a Greyhound time out for another sideline conference. Facing a 3rd and goal from the Hornet 4 yard line, Billy Large ran the ball in for a touchdown but the points were called back after a holding penalty against the Hounds. After being moved back to the 14 following the 10 yard penalty, Large

completed a picture perfect pass to Willie Rodriguez for the second Greyhound touchdown of the game. With Chad Carter once again holding for the extra point kick by Ledesma, the ball sailed straight through the uprights to place Knox City ahead 14 to 0 with 4:46 left in the 3rd quarter.

Tackles by Jim Ford and Bob Burkham slowed the next Aspermont drive, but the Hornets managed to pick up their first 1st down of the game. Jim Ford, Bubba Manuel teamed up to stop the next running play on 1st down and the Greyhounds recovered an Aspermont fumble on the next play to turn the ball back over to the Hound offense.

The 1st down for Knox City brought a 5 yard penalty with Ledesma running for no gain on the replayed 1st down. With 1:25 left in the 3rd quarter, Aspermont drew an offside penalty as Roberson carried the ball for a short yardage gain. Large then ran with the ball and was stopped at the line of scrimmage just as the scoreboard clock showed the end of the 3rd quarter.

The fourth quarter started with a time out, then Large reopened play with an incomplete pass to Chad Carter. Fourth down and 14 brought another pass from Large to Jim Ford, but Aspermont regained possession on downs after Large threw the ball past Ford who was on the 6 yard line.

Desperately needing to establish an offense, Aspermont tried to run on 1st down but lost 2 yards after a crunching tackle by Willie Rodriguez. The next play was a pass attempt that was almost intercepted by Boyce Tankersley. A holding penalty against Aspermont followed, but the call was refused by the Greyhounds. Facing a 3rd and 12 from their own 19, the Hornets completed a pass at the 35 yard line for another 1st down. A new quarterback came in for the Hornets and his first pass play was completed before the receiver was tackled by Jim Ford and Chad Carter. Carter also broke up the next pass attempt, followed by a tackle on the next running play by Jim Ford. With 9:28 left in the game, Aspermont punted off to Knox City on 4th down.

With the Greyhounds taking over on their own 40 following the 29 yard punt by Aspermont, Alex Ledesma took the first running play and moved the ball all the way down to the Hornet 15 yard line for a big Greyhound 1st down.

Large then took the ball on a short yardage run to pick up 4 yards. Second down saw Large losing a couple of yards after being sacked in the backfield. Large again took the ball on a run to the inside and moved down to the 7 yard line before being stopped. Fred Ledesma then kicked in a field goal to put the Greyhounds ahead 17 to 0.

Aspermont opened up the next series with an incomplete pass on 1st down and completed pass for a pickup of 13 yards on the play. With another 1st down, an overthrown pass play was well defended by Monte Owen, Chad Carter, and Boyce Tankersley. Second down brought a pass that was intercepted by Boyce Tankersley on the Knox City 30 yard line.

Billy Large kept the ball for a 12 yard run and added yardage was gained when a personal foul penalty was called against the Hornets. With the ball marked on the Aspermont 43 yard line and another 1st down, Tankersley came in as quarterback to try a run around the right side. With an Aspermont tackle behind the line of scrimmage, the play lost 4 yards. Roberson then ran the next play and his run was accompanied by a lot of yellow flags as Knox City was called for a holding penalty. With 4:22 left in the game and Large back in as quarterback, a pass intended for Jim Ford was almost picked off by an Aspermont defender. Large did complete a pass to Jim Ford on the next play, but the pass was still short of the yardage needed for a 1st down. Alex Flores then made the first punt of the game for the Knox City Greyhounds. Prior to the punt, a 5 yard penalty for delay of game was called against Knox City.

The Hornets took over on their own 18 yard following the 36 yard punt by Flores and no runback attempt. Aspermont lost 5 yards on the next run as two Hornets collided with each other in the backfield. The very next pass play was well short of its intended receiver as the quarterback was under strong pressure from Knox City. The very next pass play was intercepted as Chad Carter stepped in front of the intended receiver and ran the ball back

30 yards to the goal line for another Greyhound touchdown. With the score 23 to 0, Ledesma again kicked the ball attempt with 1:53 left in the ball game.

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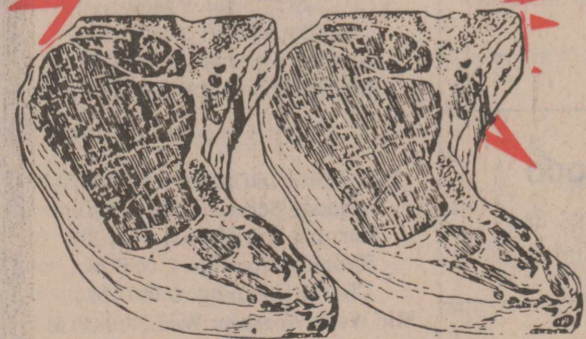
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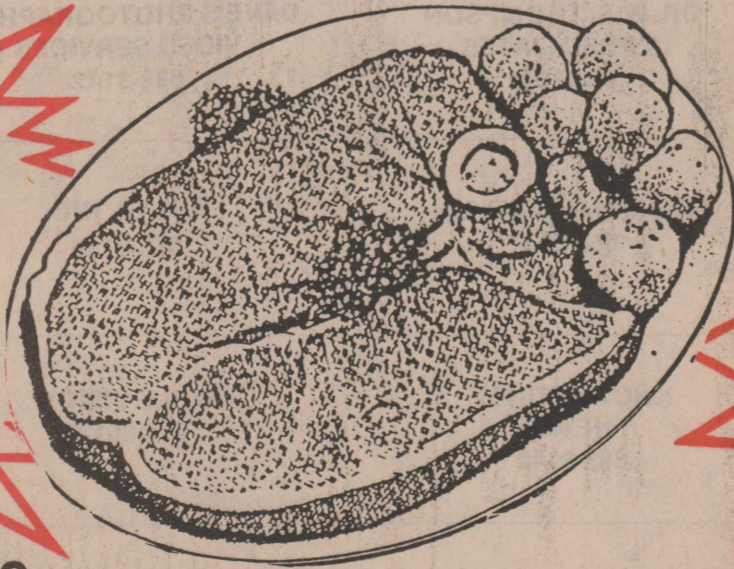

Letters To The Editor

Dear Editor:
Recently I joined several Democratic leaders for an afternoon of skeet shooting with John Dukakis, son of our Democratic Presidential candidate. The purpose of the outing was to provide each of us an opportunity to get away from the hustle and bustle of Austin and especially to allow John a break from the rigors of the Presidential campaign.

John dubbed the afternoon as a practice session for the opening of quail season in Texas. He impressed us all with how quickly he adapted to the environment and went on to conclude with a not-too-shabby performance on the target range.

While we discussed everything from the weather to John's hopeful entrance into fatherhood in January, our conversation revolved around the recent presidential debate regarding gun control.

Over the past several weeks, news reports regarding the Presidential candidates' positions have attempted to paint Republican George Bush as the pro-gun candidate and Democrat Michael Dukakis as the opposite. This conclusion is drawn based on Dukakis' past support of efforts aimed at limiting the availability of plastic handguns and Saturday Night Specials. Those actions, combined with a comment he made regarding his hopes to reduce the availability of these weapons from undesirable individuals, are being interpreted by Bush surrogates as support for an uncompensated national weapons forfeiture program.

Such a suggestion is not only an insult to the public's intelligence, but it also deals a serious blow to Americans' ability to responsibly discuss the merits of their right to protect themselves.

Perhaps this Republican strategy is based on the lack of an immediate record of the Vice President on gun issues. However, one need only look to the March 10, 1969 Congressional Record when (then) Congressman Bush called for increasing efforts to limit handguns. The statement was as follows:

"...Inasmuch as it may serve to prevent undesirable people from ob-

taining weapons with which to commit crimes, the so-called gun-control law must be deemed proper, despite the widespread inconvenience and embarrassment it has caused law-abiding citizens.

"(But) much more must be done at the state and local levels to curb illicit purchases of firearms, particularly if upward of half these weapons are obtained through theft and pawnshops."

While George Bush's remarks of 1969 are certainly no reason to accuse him of endorsing any national weapon forfeiture effort, neither are Mike Dukakis' actions to limit the purchase of cheap handguns by undesirable individuals.

Given the right granted through our U.S. Constitution for every law-abiding American "to keep and bear Arms," the issue of gun control is indeed a serious issue that deserves serious debate.

Governor Dukakis has stated his position, and I am hopeful Vice-President Bush will rise above the political rhetoric we have heard so far and positively contribute to the national debate of this very important issue.

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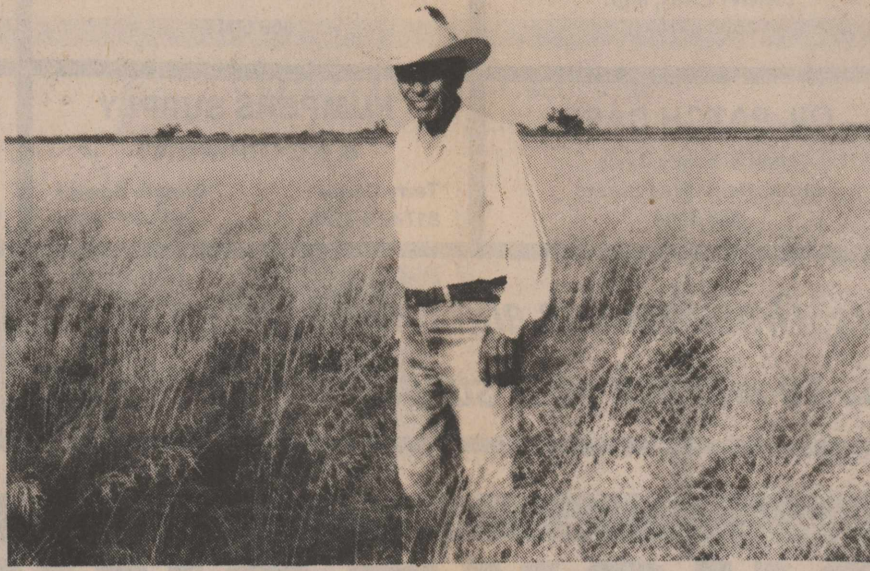

CRP Program Successful

W.R. Belcher of Knox City had no way of knowing that he would be farming grass instead of cotton when he moved to Knox County in 1974. Belcher and his wife, Minnie, left Gaines County and purchased their original 160 acres located north of Knox City with the hope of raising some of the best cotton crops in the area. Despite years of hard work, the reality of a "few bad years" made it appear as though Belcher would have to give up farming completely.

"Mr. Belcher knew very little about the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) when he submitted his bid," states Jerry Pearce, District Conservationist. "You might say that I was a 'beginner' at farming grass," added Belcher with a smile. "Nevertheless, we were able to determine that Mr. Belcher needed to plant a cover that was quick to establish and would perform well on his sandy soils. That's why we decided to go with a pure stand of Ermelo Weeping lovegrass."

"At first, I thought I had done the wrong thing in signing up," recalls Belcher. "Now I wish the program had come along sooner." W.R. is very proud of the success he has had in establishing lovegrass on the 170 acres he used to farm in cotton and grain. In the second growing season since planting, the lovegrass has formed a dense stand which is waist-high. The sandy fields that once were wind-blown and yielded sparse crops are now protected by a permanent cover of grass that may be used for grazing at the end of the ten year contract.

W.R. Belcher has not only protected his land against erosion, but he has

also discovered a way to eliminate some of the pressure that has come with being "a little on in years" as the 84 year old puts it. When asked what he thinks of CRP program, Belcher responds by gazing at the waving sea of lovegrass and, smiling, replies, "It's the best thing that's happened for me in a long, long time."
