Young bicycle riders from throughout the Knox City area are readying their two wheeled machines as they prepare for a Bike-A-Thon that is scheduled for this Saturday morning at 9:30 a.m. Taking place at Greyhound Football Stadium, the event is being held as a fundraiser for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital.

Youngsters of all ages are invited and encouraged to ride in the event. All that is needed is a bicycle and a little work ahead of time to collect pledges per mile that are actually ridden.

Local coordinator for the event is Sharon Newton. In a conversation last week, she stressed the need for as many young boys and girls as possible to plan on participating in the event. "The life-saving study of childhood cancer at St. Jude has become critical to children all over the world." Sharon said. "Every mile our bikers go earns money bringing us closer to a cure for

This event is unique as it features children helping other children who are less fortunate than themselves. It is a great opportunity for local children of all ages to learn and experience what it's like to help others. The concept is simple. Each child who

wishes to ride just needs to contact as many sponsors as possible who are willing to donate any amount of money for each mile ridden by that particular rider. At the completion of the event, the miles will be totaled and funds collected. There are added benefits for the riders as each biker who riases at least \$25.00 will receive a T-Shirt and those who collect at least \$75.00 will be awarded a bike-a-thon duffle bag. A special prize of a bicycle will be awarded to the young person who collects the most money.

# Greyhounds Rebound

# Hold Spur Scoreless 21-0 In District Opener

With the offense led by Roy Dale Roberson and the defense rallying around the efforts of Billy Wayne Large, the Knox City Greyhounds rebounded from last week's loss to Albany and dominated action over the Spur Bulldogs 21-0 in their District opener last Friday night in Spur.

Starting with a 64 yard touchdown run by Roy Roberson on their second offensive play of the game, the Greyhounds exploded to accumulte a total of 348 yards against 252 for the Bulldogs.

With Spur's taking over on offense after the touchdown by Roberson and the point after kick by Alex Ledesma, their first series with the ball ended with a punt back to Knox City after both running and passing plays plus a penalty call failed against a strong Greyhound defense.

Quarterback Billy Wayne Large immediately gained a first down on his first carry of the next series. With runs by Large, Roberson, and Ledesma, the Knox City offense rolled on to capture several first downs in a row. After an incomplete pass, a time out and another incomplete pass on fourth down, Spur regained possession on downs.

Picking up a first down on their first run, the Bulldogs moved downfield with short passes and runs. One completed pass was stopped when the receiver was tackled by Mike Manuel, an incomplete pass followed that play before Knox City recovered a Spur fumble on the next play.

With a 1st and 10 from the 35 yard line, the Greyhounds picked up another 1st down before calling a time out. A holding penalty put Knox City back to a 1st and 20 with much of that yardage regained with short runs by Alex Ledesma. Not picking up enough for another 1st down, Knox City punted back to Spur with the Bulldogs' taking over on their own 18 yard line.

With time to run one play prior to the end of first quarter action, Spur picked up 2 yards on a run. When play resumed at the opposite end of the field, the Greyhound defense held on and allowed the offense to take over once again with the ball on the Spur 43 yard line. A quarterback keeper run, a dropped ball, and an incomplete pass forced Knox City to punt back with the ball going deep into the end zone and being brought back out to the 20 for

Spur to take over.

Again the Greyhound defense held on and allowed Spur only one 1st down before regaining the ball on downs at the 37 yard line. Knox City took over and fumbled the ball away with Spur recovering for a 1st down on the 35 yeard line.

A penalty against the Greyhounds for interference brought Spur another 1st down before they attempted a run and recovered their own fumble on the next play. Two passes with one completed out of bounds and one completed for another Spur 1st down moved the ball downfield as the Greyhound defense was forced backwards down the field. After several incomplete passes and a penalty, the Bulldogs were unable to capitalize on their yardage and the ball went back to Knox

City on downs

The Greyhounds picked up another two 1st downs right away and started to march the ball back down the field. Two passes then changed hands, one from Knox City was intercepted by Spur, then a Bulldog pass was intercepted by Willie Rodriquez to give the ball back to Knox City on the 35 yard line. With less than 20 seconds showing on the clock for the remainder of the first half, Knox City attempted a quarterback keeper run, two passes that were both incomplete and a field goal that was short. The buzzer sounded to end the first half with the scoreboard showing Knox City 7, Spur 0, as both teams headed for the locker rooms.

The Greyhounds kicked off to Spur to begin the second half and stopped the runback attempt on the 20 yard line. Spur missed two passes prior to picking up a 1st down on a run to the 47 yard line. The Bulldogs attempted to pass their way downfield, but a strong defense by the Greyhounds forced a turnover on downs on the 18 yard line.

With runs by Ledesma and Large, Knox City moved the ball for one more 1st down before punting back to Spur on 4th down. The Greyhound defense then got tough and held Spur for no yardage and again forced the Bulldogs to punt on 4th with the Greyhounds' taking over on the 43 yard line. Runs by Large, Roberson, and Ledesma moved the ball down to a 1st and 5 with Alex Ledesma taking the ball in for another Greyhound touchdown. Ledesma then kicked the point after to move the Hounds ahead 14 to 0 over

A clipping penalty against Spur on the runback moved them back to a 1st and 20 to open their offensive series. Incompleted passes and officials' time out to check a shaken-up Bob Burkham were followed by Spur's punting back and Knox City's taking over on the 32 yard line.

After good yardage runs by Roberson and Large, Alex Ledesma again moved the ball into the end zone for another Greyhound touchdown and followed that up with a good point after kick to put the Greyhounds ahead, 21-0.

Three Spur 1st downs were gained by the Bulldogs following the kickoff return before Knox City regained possession when Rob Whitford sacked the Bulldog quarterback on a 4th and 9 run attempt. A short series with a punt on 4th down followed for the Hounds and it was the same story in reverse when Spur had a short series that was stopped on a 4th down play when Fred Ledesma sacked the Bulldog quarter-

With both teams' swapping the ball back and forth and Knox City's losing a fumble, time ran out on the clock to end the game with the final score showing 21-0, Knox City over Spur.

The Greyhunds will return home to Greyhound Stadium this Friday evening to host Motley County in the Knox City Homecoming game. Royalty will be crownd during half-

The Greyhounds opened their district play with a big win over the Spur Bulldogs 21-0. Offensively, we rushed for 340 yards in the game with two backs, Billy Wayne 141 yards and Roy Dale 109 yards, breaking the 100 yard barrier. Alex Ledesma contributed 91 yards rushing and two touchdowns. Our offensive line did an outstanding job all night. We adjusted to their shifting, stunting defense by cutting down our line splits and zone blocking. Our linemen blew them off the line of scrimmage and controlled the game for us. Two turnovers prevented us from putting more points on the scoreboard. Coach Underwood and our linemen deserved much credit for opening holes for our backs. This domination of the L.O.S. led us to the

Defensively, Coach Chappell's game plan worked well, and our defense stopped their running game. They were forced to throw the ball, but completed only 9 of 31 passes. The Hounds' defense recorded their second shutout of the season. An injury to Richard Davenport was the only damper to the spirit of the Hounds. Richard, coming back off a knee injury, dislocated his elbow and will be out again for an undetermined time.

Friday, Motley County comes to town riding high off an 35-6 win over Valley. They have a good ball club with good size upfront. This will be another test for the Hounds. We are expecting to get Boyce back this week which will strengthen our defense. The addition of Andy McCrary, who we moved up from our JV team last week, gives us added depth in the secondary. Andy had an excellent game against Spur and will continue to help us both defensively and at flanker on offense. We are expecting a tough ballgame Friday and hope everyone will come out on Homecoming to support the Hounds against the Matadors.





The Knox County Museum fund continues to grow, with recent memorials totaling almost \$200 and a \$1,137.34 deposit from the Knox County Sesqueentennial Wagon Train Fund taking the fund over the \$10,000.00 mark. Janice Tolson, Buddy Tolson, and Charles Durham were cochairmen of the Wagon Train Commit-

Persons wishing to make memorials to the museum fund may contact Doris Crownover, treasurer of the Knox County Historical Commission, or the office of Knox County Judge David Perdue. A card will be sent to the person or persons designated by the

The museum committee of the KCHC met at Benjamin last Tuesday. Building possibilities were discussed along with plans for developing museum volunteers. A few have already contacted the KCHC chairman about a desire to do volunteer work for the museum. Their names have been retained and they will be contacted again, hopefully as plans develop within the next few weeks.

The museum is as much in need of persons willing to donate time as it is in need of money, and these volunteers are really appreciated.

Even though there is no museum building at this moment, Knox County does have a number of artifacts in the courthouse museum display. It also has filing space in which to store photographs and other archival items. Soon these will be recorded on professional museum records. Even though artifacts cannot be accepted until a larger museum space is available, archival materials will be accepted when records and a collections policy

Having started the training of volunteers at this base will be a great help when a building is obtained.

One thing persons interested in the museum and archives can do at this point is to search their shelves for Knox County related books which they would be willing to donate. "The early

History of Baylor County" by Sarah Ann Britton is one out of print book that tells much about Knox County. "Memoirs of a Cattleman" by J.O. Jones is another title with much early Knox County history. There is also a book with "Knox Prairie" in the title which the Houston public library carried in its catalog a few years ago but did not have on the shelf. H.G. Bedford's book would of course be high on

Is there any person, persons, or group which would take on an eight question survey requested by the Texas Historical Commission? It will be a survey of persons and businesses related to the local visitor industry, such as motels, service stations, etc. The questions would help reveal what both visitors and citizens do and do not know about historical attractions in the area. Improvements in disseminating local historical information could be beneficial to the economy. If an out of county car can be stopped for 30 minutes, that will probably gain ten or more "new" dollars for the local economy.

The county wide cemetery survey under the direction of Moulton Wiggins of Munday is moving right along. Soon after Knox County began its survey, a letter was received from the Texas Historical Commission urging such
