Dragons 'Burn' Hounds

On a cold and breezy night in Paducah last Friday, the Knox City Greyhounds lost a hard fought game when they tangled with a tough Paducah team. The Dragons 'burned' the Greyhounds with two touchdowns early in the game and managed to stay ahead all game long in spite of a rally by Knox City that put 21 points on the scoreboard and thrilled the Hound supporters. Knox City was behind 20-0 at the end of the 1st half but managed a respectable showing as they came back to a final score of 27 to 23 before the game ended. The Greyhounds now face an end of season showdown with the Munday Moguls at 7:30 this Friday night in Munday.

Game action started when Knox City kicked off to Paducah, with the Dragons moving the ball out to their own 38 on the kick return. The Knox City defense played tough, but the Dragons still managed to pick up a 1st down on their third short run with the ball. A 5 yard penalty set Paducah back to a 1st and 15 with Billy Wayne Large and Augie Rodriguez teaming up to stop the next couple of Dragon runs for short yardage. Both teams got a brief rest when a medical time out

was called next for an injury to Greyhound Bob Burkham. With Burkham out, Paducah ran for another 1st down on the next play. Monte Owen stopped the next play with Paducah picking up 7 yards. Two plays later the Dragons had another 1st down on the Greyhound 28 in spite of hard hits by Monte Owen and Jim Ford. Paducah had another 1st down just two plays later when Knox City received an en-coachment penalty. One play Paducah scored when Evans ran over the right side and made the first trip of the evening into the end zone. The extra point kick was good as Paducah moved ahead of the Greyhounds, 7-0.

After the kickoff by Paducah, Knox City finally had an opportunity to show its offense as Alex Ledesma took the first run and gained 8 yards with a running play. On the second play of the series, Knox City fumbled and Paducah recovered the ball on the 51 yard line.

The next series by Paducah had Greyhound Alex Flores scrambling for a Dragon fumble on 2nd down, but Paducah managed to recover its own fumble. Two plays later, Paducah completed its first pass play and gained considerable yardage as the

play moved the ball down to the Knox City 23 yard line for another 1st down. Monte Owens and Fred Ledesma stopped a quarterback keeper on the next play. Owens came right back on the next play to stop a Dragon runner who

Absentee Voting Is Still Underway

Absentee voting in Knox County is still underway and will continue through Friday until 5:00 p.m. for those who vote in person. Under this year's law, it is no longer required that persons have to be out of county on election day to vote absentee. Now, there is no stipulation, and any person desiring to vote absentee in person may do so, according to Gloria L. West, District/County Clerk.

As of Tuesday morning, 42 persons had voted absentee, and 64 had requested mail-outs. The deadline has passed for mail-outs, but as stated above, Friday at 5:00 p.m. is the deadline for voting absentee in person at the Clerk's office.

Good Voter Turnout Expected

Tuesday, November 8, is just around the corner, and one of the most important days that we have coming up for a long time, an especially long time if the candidate of your choice does not win.

Polls for the General Election will be open from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. to elect President, Vice-President, Members of Congress, Members of the

Legislature, state, district, county, and precinct officers, as well as adopting or rejecting the proposed Constitutional Amendments as submitted by the Legislature, sessions, of the State of Texas.

Voters in Knox City for #7S will go to the Knox County Aging Services building on East Main, while #7N voters will cast their ballots at the

Story Causes Local Concern

As It Appeared In Vernon Paper

When the October 24 issue of *The Vernon Daily Record* made it to various people in Knox County last week, both surprise and shock were voiced about a story on Page One that indicated the Wilbarger County Commissioners and the Wilbarger County Judge would "vigorously pursue" the possibility of relocating the SCS Plant Materials

Center from its present location north of Knox City to a new site outside Vernon.

Coming as a complete surprise, the story went on to quote SCS Area Conservationist Carroll Adams of Vernon about how the current location suffers from several problems including lack of room for expansion, lack of hard surface roads to the site, and the

inability to secure a 50 year lease instead of the current 10 year leasing arrangements. Adams stated that he was presenting the matter to the Wilbarger County Commissioners Court because the SCS would prefer to deal with some sort of governmental entity or trust in its negotiations rather than with an individual. The land currently in use by the Plant Materials Center is leased to SCS by Tom R. Campbell. The story went on to say that the Wilbarger Soil and Water Conservation District has already passed a resolution supporting a move to Wilbarger County, and while this group could serve as the go-between in negotiations, having the county's support could only help the process.

After the initial shock when the story

Cotton Classing Report

Harvesting and ginning were once again blessed this week with clear perfect weather, resulting in the receipt of approximately 32,000 samples in the USDA classing office in Abilene. Most gins were able to keep up since the only cotton being harvested was defoliated. This week's activity showed an increase over last with gins to the west just getting started while those to the south are losing ground to the backlog on the yards.

This was also a busy week in the classing office. With ten HVI lines active approximately 27,000 samples were processed according to area director B.F. Manly. This left a carry over of one and one half days work. With receipts building, the office will work Saturday to stay current.

Grades are still high with approximately 50% being grade 21 or 31. Grades 41, 32, 42, and 51 made up the majority of other samples. Average mike was 39 with 88% in the 35 to 49 range. Staple length averaged 32, uniformity 79, with grams per tex at 25.

Cotton sales were minimum and seed prices paid to the growers ranged from \$105 to \$120 per ton.

first surfaced, several local citizens and civic leaders expressed a deep concern over the news as it was reported in *The Vernon Daily Record*. Knox City Chamber of Commerce Manager Doris Crowover immediately began to work on the story in an effort to rally support with the goal in mind to keep the Plant Materials Center right where it is. The matter was also brought to the attention of *The Knox County News* staff, who went right to work on the story.

A long phone conversation with James Alderson, manager of the Knox County Plant Materials Center, brought out many interesting facts and a completely different side of the story. He too was surprised at the story as it appeared in the Vernon newspaper and stated emphatically, "It has never been our intent to move and that would be the very last thing we would consider." Apparently the information presented to the Wilbarger County Commissioners Court was information that was discussed only as an informative briefing at a recent Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District meeting.

According to Mr. Alderson, the leasing information was presented to the SCS meeting as a progress update in order to keep everyone informed that a new lease was being renegotiated and a meeting has been scheduled after the first of the year for just that reason. Some of the points brought up in the Vernon newspaper story to explain the proposed move were nothing more than ordinary give-and-take options that appear in any lease situation. Mr. Alderson stated, "Lease negotiations go on constantly, and our negotiations with Tom (Mr. Tom Campbell) are normal."

"The reason for giving notice of negotiations at this time is because some of our planting occurs in five year cycles, and although our current lease does not expire until 1995, we are due for another planting cycle in 1991, so we really need to have a lease secure prior to that time because we wouldn't want to wait until 1994 to find out", stated Alderson. According to Mr. Alderson, the Vernon conservationist was not authorized by the state office in Temple to present the information to Wilbarger County. He apparently did so because of a request by Wilbarger County officials. He then gave information that was presented at the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water

Conservation District meeting concerning current lease negotiations. "SCS Plant Materials Center does not answer to anyone on a local level. Our link is only to and directly through the state office in Temple, and Mr. Adams has nothing to do with the decision to move or not", advised Alderson.

The Plant Materials Center is a vital part of the local and county-wide economy. With an annual payroll of approximately \$150,000.00 and local expenditures in the range of \$15,000.00 a year, the center employs six full-time personnel and from four to six part-time people. There is also a full-time employee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife headquartered at the Center. Other major boosts to the county economy include occasional purchases of tractors and other farm-related equipment since those items are approved for local acquisition.

While the front page story in the Vernon paper put a scare into the local area, those concerned can rest a little easier knowing that the center does not intend to move.

Local's Kin Presented With Award

Soldiers of the 1st Battalion, 17th Infantry of Fort Richardson, Alaska, earned more than half of the 65 Expert Infantryman Badges awarded at the conclusion of this year's testing in the 6th Infantry Division (Light).

Major General Harold T. Fields Jr., division commander, presented EIBs to 36 "Strike Fear" battalion soldiers in a ceremony at Fort Richardson September 28. After presenting the EIBs, Fields compared the expert infantrymen to the Olympic athletes who, he said, "for one bright and shining moment stood head and shoulders above their competitors."

Receiving the much coveted award was Sgt. Nye Paul Justice II. Sgt. Justice was one of only 36 soldiers out of 500 in the battalion who successfully completed the necessary 36 tasks at 16 stations. The EIB testing was September 12 through September 23. Sgt. Justice is married to Mary Beth, formerly of Knox City, and daughter of Judy and the late Bill Anderson. Sgt. Justice's parents are retired MSG Jim and Clara Justice of Coahoma. Paul and Mary Beth have one son, Nye, who is 15 months old.

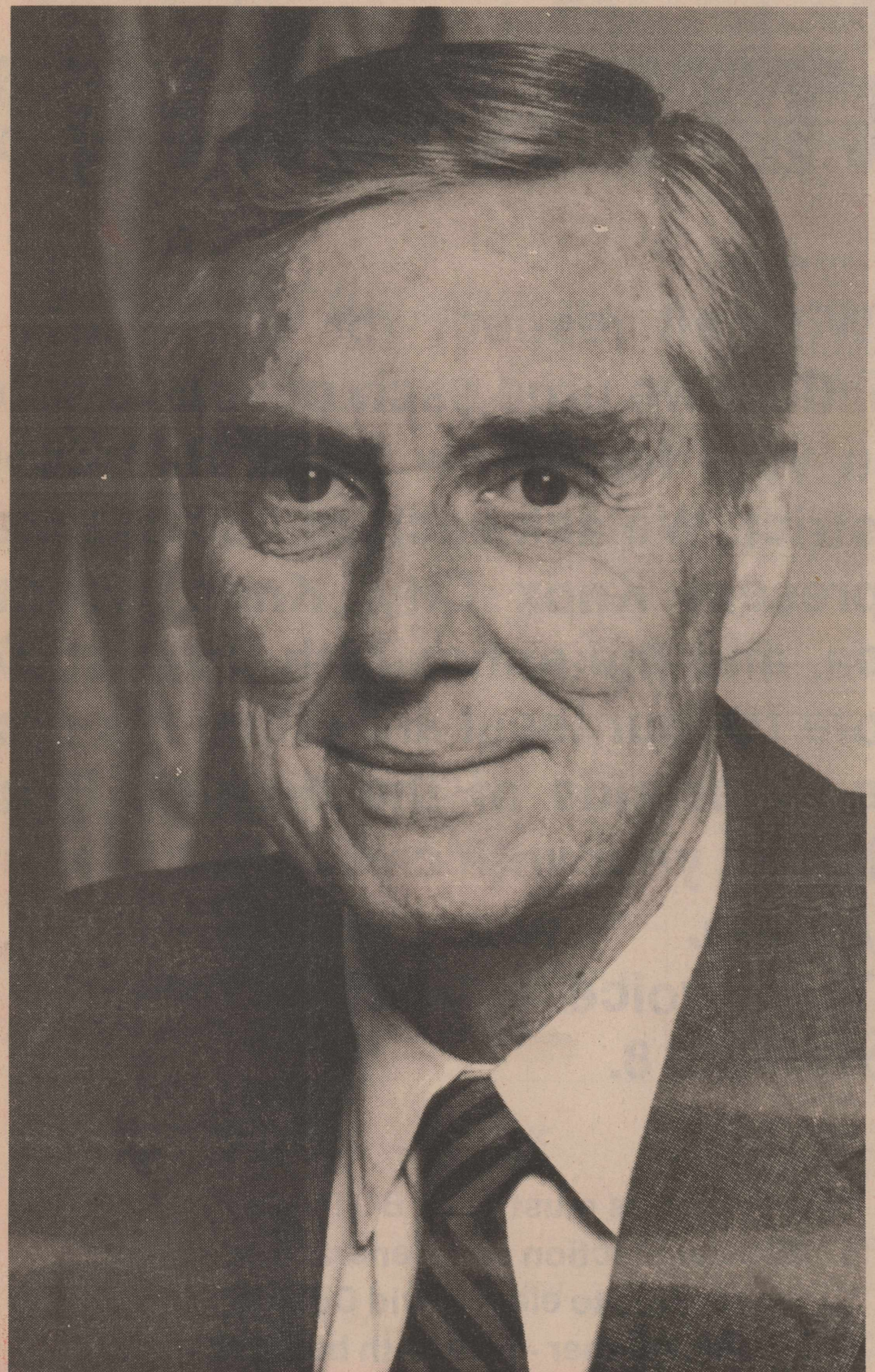

WHAT KIND OF MAN IS LARRY MILNER

I wish I could make everyone in the 13th Congressional District understand Larry as a person. If I could, Larry's winning the November election would be assured.

Larry and I have been married for 25 years. During that time I have come to know him "pretty well."

I'm convinced that many of the qualities which I respect and admire in Larry are the same qualities which will make him a terrific congressman. So let me tell you, through some of my experiences, about the Larry Milner I know.

Larry and I met in 1962, when he was manager of the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco, Texas, a town of about 5,400 people. After each Chamber board meeting, my dad, who was on the board, would reach into his pocket and bring out a picture of his daughter who was away at college.



I think Dad had just about given up trying to get us together when Larry and I met one weekend at a chamber-sponsored party. Both of us claim it was love at first sight! We married that same winter in the First Presbyterian Church in Cisco.

In the beginning I didn't know Larry was destined for great things. It wasn't until sometime later, after we were married, that I came to realize just how smart Larry really is. I determined then that he was going places, and if I wanted to go with him, I had better stay on my toes.

And go we did! First to San Angelo, where Larry was on the staff of the Board of City Development. Then to Austin, where he was on the staff of the Texas Industrial Commission. And finally to Amarillo, where Larry began his 18-year career with Southwestern Public Service Company. He was the first manager of SPS's newly formed Area Development Department and later became a vice-president.

While Larry's career was taking shape, so was our family. We had three girls - Laura, Pollyanna and Bonnie. Larry always said our home was a haven from the hectic, rushed world. No matter how busy he was, he was never too busy for us.

Sit-down dinner time was always the rule. And no television. We loved talking at dinner. It was the only time we were together all day.

Our best purchase was a travel trailer. We hooked it to the back of our station wagon and headed out each summer on vacation. We wanted to broaden the girls' world, so we divided up the United States and went east for the Bicentennial year. (We were standing in Philadelphia's Independence Square on July 4, 1976.) Then we went west to Disneyland and on to Yellowstone and Colorado, etc. Many weekends were spent in Palo Duro Canyon Campground - no television, no telephone - just rocks and sticks

and bushes. Daddy told "Little Bear" stories around the campfire at night. I wish I had written them down.

Now that the girls are older (18, 23, and 24), I realize how much of their character was formed in those early days, with their father's ideals as a strong foundation.

Larry owes so much to his own parents. His parents gave him tons of love, but also security and acceptance. "Father" (Murray Milner) owned a small business. They lived on a farm near Dallas before moving to Brownwood, where Larry grew up.

Larry's real gifts are in organizing, explaining, and inspiring, and I believe these three things would be wonderful in a congressman.

1. **Organizing.** Larry can break down any project, no matter how large, into manageable pieces. He has designed organization charts for many political and civic projects, large and small. He has also taught organization seminars.

2. **Explaining.** Larry has the ability to explain even complicated subjects in such a way that people understand. The girls would often ask him to explain school work, even in college. He uses examples, describes situations briefly, and remembers so much background information.

3. **Inspiring.** This is one of Larry's greatest qualities. As an employer, Larry would often fill his job openings with young, enthusiastic men and women who didn't know it couldn't be done. He was always a mentor more than a boss. He had these rules for his employees: "Never say, 'It's not my job.'" Everybody does everything.

"You can do anything if you want to do it badly enough." He trained his employees to be creative and caring by example.

Apart from these gifts, Larry has a deep and abiding faith in God and a love for his country. He has a strong sense of responsibility to make our area of Texas the very best it can be.

I know you are looking to him for the leadership to get our area's economy moving again. Recently Larry and I were chaperones at our youngest daughter's (Bonnie's) high school graduation party. A young man who had graduated from high school hours before came over to Larry and said, "Mr. Milner, please help bring some companies here so I can have a job when I get out of college."

Larry is determined to make this young man's request a reality. But Larry knows it will take teamwork. I first got elected. Then to get our economy going again. I hope you will be on both teams.

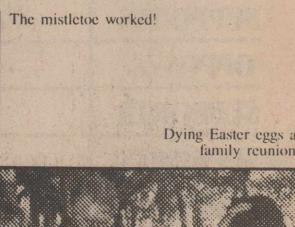

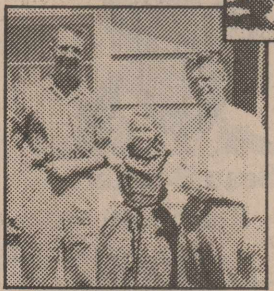

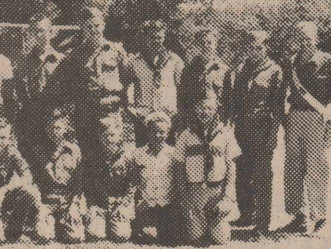

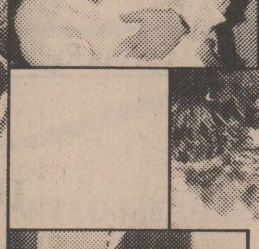

still managed to pick up the seventh 1st down for Paducah. Play stopped briefly when the lights on the scoreboard went out and the officials were forced to call a time out. With the clock back on a few minutes later, play resumed with Paducah going to the air. A good defense by Knox City stopped a possible pass reception in the end zone but the Dragons came right back on the next play to run 5 yards and place another 6 points on the scoreboard. The extra point added another point as Paducah moved ahead of Knox City, 14-0.

Billy Wayne Large brought the kickoff out to the 22 yard line before he was run out of bounds. Ledesma took the ball on 1st down for a short yardage run as 15 yard penalties were called on both teams. The play went over with Knox City facing a 1st and 25 situation. Large then attempted a pass to Flores that was incomplete. Ledesma ran next for short yardage and an offside penalty against Paducah gave Knox City the 2nd down over. Roberson picked up 2 yards on the next run as Paducah was called for another 15 yard penalty on the following play. That penalty gave Knox City a 1st down and their first trip into Paducah territory. A facemask against Paducah on the next running play by Roberson moved the ball further downfield with the Greyhounds needing just 2 yards for another 1st down. Knox City once again fumbled the ball away on the very next play and stopped what was its best offensive series thus far in the game.

Paducah picked up another 1st down in just three plays as the Greyhound defense appeared to falter against the seemingly awesome Dragon offense. Willie Rodriguez moved in to swat away a Dragon pass and Fred Ledesma stopped the next Paducah running play as another penalty was called against the Dragons. A 5 yard pass play was next, but the Paducah quarterback went down with an apparent injury as he was hit hard by a Greyhound defender as he released the ball. Another penalty against Paducah moved them back 5 yards for illegal procedure on the next play. On 2nd and 8, Large stopped the Dragon runner for a gain of just 2 yards. Another 1st down followed for Paducah as their quarterback returned to the game and ran a keeper play that picked up 8 yards. Working from the Greyhound 35 yard line, the Paducah quarterback ran the ball again for a 6 yard gain. Another Paducah 1st down followed on the next running play as Evans picked up his 94th yard in 17 carries. Andy McCrary stopped the next play when he batted away an attempted pass by Paducah. With 7:39 left in the first half, the Dragons ran again but did not pick up any yardage. The next play for 4th and 11 saw a long pass that was complete to a receiver in the end zone for another Dragon touchdown. The extra point attempt was blocked by Knox City, but Paducah led the game 20-0 over the visiting Greyhounds.

Monte Owen downed the kickoff for Knox City and set up the Greyhounds to take over from their own 27. Alex Ledesma brought the Knox City fans out of their seats on the next play with

a run for 20 yards and a Greyhound 1st down. Roberson and Large added more yards on the next two plays and Paducah picked up another 15 yard penalty to put the ball on the Dragon 11 yard line and a 1st down for Knox City. Danny Grindstaff picked up 7 yards on the next play and Large ran for little yardage on the 2nd down. Alex Ledesma took the 3rd down handoff up the middle and into the end zone for Knox City's first touchdown of the game. Ledesma kicked in the extra point and brought the score to Paducah 20, Knox City 7.

Large stopped a potential Paducah touchdown just 2 plays later as he won a footrace and brought the Dragon runner down after a 38 yard gain. Another 15 yard penalty for clipping against Paducah followed on the next play and put the Dragons into a 1st and 22 play. With 2:35 left in the half, Paducah continued to move the ball downfield for short yardage plays before they were forced to punt off to Knox City on 4th down.

Jim Ford picked up good yardage on the first play for Knox City and a 15 yard facemask penalty against Paducah moved the ball down the field for Knox City. Jim Ford then caught two passes in a row from Large and gave the Greyhounds a badly needed offensive boost with a 1st down on the Paducah 15 yard line. Alex Ledesma then ran for 9 yards on the next play and moved the ball to the 6 yard marker. Ledesma again carried the ball to the 2 yard line on the following play. Large tried a pass next that failed, but Alex Ledesma came right back to score a touchdown on his next run. The extra point kick by Ledesma was good and Knox City's side of the scoreboard showed 14 points to the 20 for Paducah.

The kickoff ran out the clock to end the first half. A lively halftime show followed as many fans from both sides were quick to form a line for hot coffee and a chance to warm up briefly.

Second half action began with Knox City receiving the opening kickoff from Paducah Large brought the kickoff out to the 35 yard line to start Knox City on a 1st and 10 run by Alex Ledesma for 2 yards. Roy Roberson was hit hard on the next play and stopped with only a 1 yard gain. On 3rd down, Roberson again carried and was tackled short of a 1st down. On 4th and 3, Knox City punted back to Paducah.

The first Paducah run picked up 9 yards and the 2nd and 1 play picked up another 1st down for the Dragons. Monte Owens once again showed his tackling abilities by stopping the play before the runner could gain any additional yardage. Two plays later Paducah picked up another 1st down on the 47 of Knox City. McCrary and Ledesma stopped the next runner, but not before the Dragons picked up another 1st down. With 7 minutes left in the 3rd quarter, Paducah elected to run but was stopped by a host of Knox City defenders. An attempted pass play was stopped when Augie Rodriguez and Alex Flores sacked the quarterback deep in his own territory. Paducah then punted off to Knox City.

In their second possession of the second half, the Hounds started off

running with a 1 yard play by Roy Roberson. Large attempted a pass next, but was forced to get rid of the ball and an incomplete pass was the result. Jim Ford could not catch the next pass and Knox City soon found itself punting back to Paducah on 4th down.

With 4:22 left in the 3rd quarter, Paducah took over and tried a run that resulted in an illegal procedure penalty. The 5 yard penalty made a total of 85 yards on yellow flags for Paducah in the ball game. A play that looked like a sure touchdown for the Dragons was stopped by Mike 'Bubba' Manuel with a solid tackle that would make any coach proud. Paducah soon had a 4th and 3 situation as the Dragons elected to punt back to Knox City.

Roy Roberson took the ball on 1st down and gained 7 yards with Paducah picking up another 15 yard personal foul on the play with a late, out of bounds hit. A 1st down for Knox City from the Dragon 42 brought a 2 yard run by way of a handoff to Roberson and a face mask penalty against Paducah. Roberson picked up another 1st down. A penalty for holding against Knox City accompanied a run by Roberson that was followed by a run by Ledesma. Large ran next and was forced out of bounds at the 33, but a 15 yard clipping penalty against Knox City brought the ball back with the Greyhounds facing long yardage and a 1st and 35. Large was sacked next and lost yardage forced the Greyhounds to a 2nd and 41. A second down screen pass to Ledesma did not connect and on 3rd and 41, Roberson ran for 9 yards. On 4th and 32, the 3rd quarter ended before Knox City could punt.

Paducah took the Knox City punt to open the 4th quarter as the Greyhounds punted short and downed the ball on the Paducah 23 yard line. Quarterback Hurd picked up a 1st down with a 45 yard run that placed the Dragons deep in Greyhound territory with another 1st down. Three plays later, Paducah picked up another 1st down and moved inside the Knox City 5 yard line. The Greyhound defense held for 2 plays but Paducah scored another touchdown on 3rd down with a short run. A point after kick that was good put Paducah ahead 27 to 14 with 8:08 left in the game.

Owen stopped the kickoff to give Knox City a 1st down from the 30. Large ran next and was forced out of bounds. A second down pass to Alex Flores followed and a pass to Ford ended on the Paducah 4 yard line after a long run and a good second effort by Ford. One play later, Alex Ledesma moved into the end zone for another Knox City touchdown that came after the Greyhound offense showed a flash of their normal offensive excitement and moved 70 yards in just 4 plays. The extra point kick by Ledesma was good and Knox City pulled closer to Paducah, 27 to 21.

Starting from their own 36, Paducah picked up a 1st down in 3 plays and move the ball out to the 43 yard line. Evans of Paducah picked up his 206th yard of the evening with a 3 yard run with Knox City picking 5 yards on an offside penalty. The next Dragon play picked up a 1st down but a 5 yard

penalty pushed Paducah back to a 1st and 15. Evans picked up another 1st down on his next run with 5:05 left in the game. Three plays later Alex Flores sacked the Dragon quarterback to bring up a 4th down and a punt by Paducah. The ball was downed on the 14 yard line and Knox City took over in a drive that could make or break the game.

A 1st down pass to Ford from Large picked up another 1st down for the game gained 24 badly needed yards with 2:43 left in the game. Large was attacked and sacked for a loss on the next play to bring up a 2nd and 21. On 2nd down, Large attempted a pass to Ford but the ball was batted away by a Dragon defender. With Knox City just a couple of plays away from a win or a loss, Large passed long to Alex Flores and picked up 22 yards and a 1st down. The clock stopped for moving the chain with 1:58 left. Large again passed to Ford for a 5 yard gain and was hit hard while getting the pass off. Large got up holding his arm, but went to another pass play that was intercepted as a Paducah defender stepped in front of the ball to pick off the pass.

Paducah took over with 1 minute left on the clock and elected to run out the clock with safe, short yardage plays. The game ended with Paducah's taking a safety-the punter running out of his own end zone-to avoid the possibility of Knox City's blocking the punt and returning it for a tying touchdown. Final score was 27-23.

The loss to Paducah puts the Greyhounds in a must win situation when they take on the Moguls this Friday night in Munday. See you there for what should be the most exciting game of the season.

Paducah is 4-5 for the season and 3-3 in District 9-A.

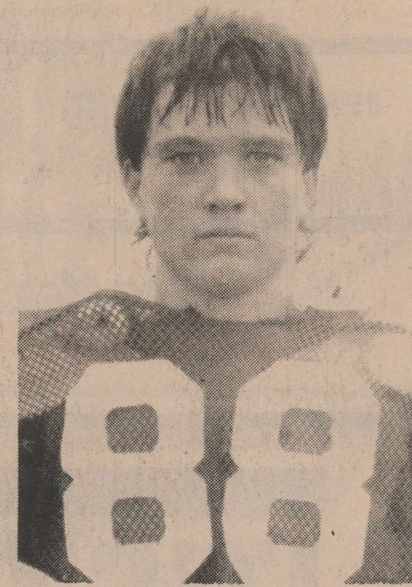

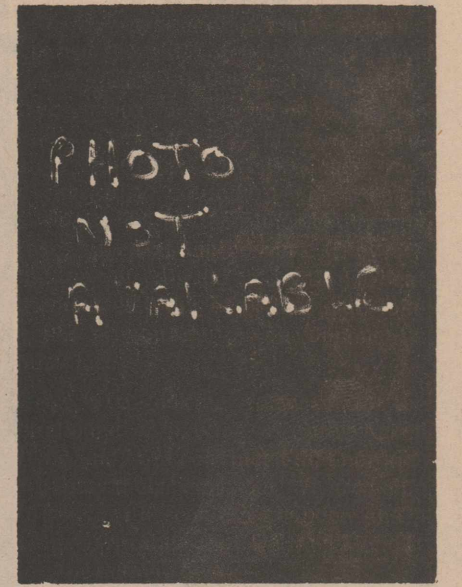


JIM FORD
