Paducah team. The Dragons 'burned' the Greyhounds with two touchdowns early in the game and managed to stay ahead all game long in spite of a rally by Knox City that put 21 points on the
scoreboard and thrilled the Hound supporters. Knox City was behind 20-0 at the end of the 1 st half but managed a respectable showing as they came
back to a final score of 27 to 23 before back to a final score of 27 to 23 before

face an end of season showdown with the Munday Moguls at 7:30 this Friday night in Munday.
