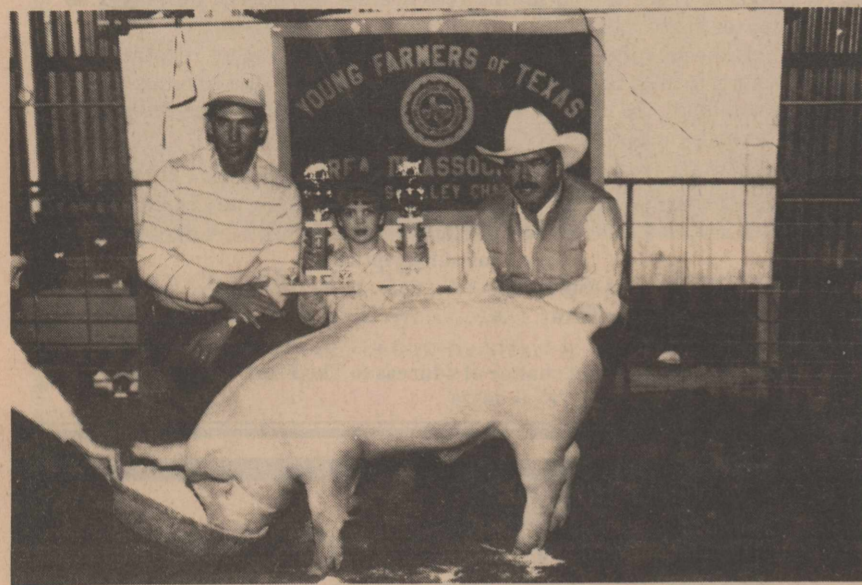

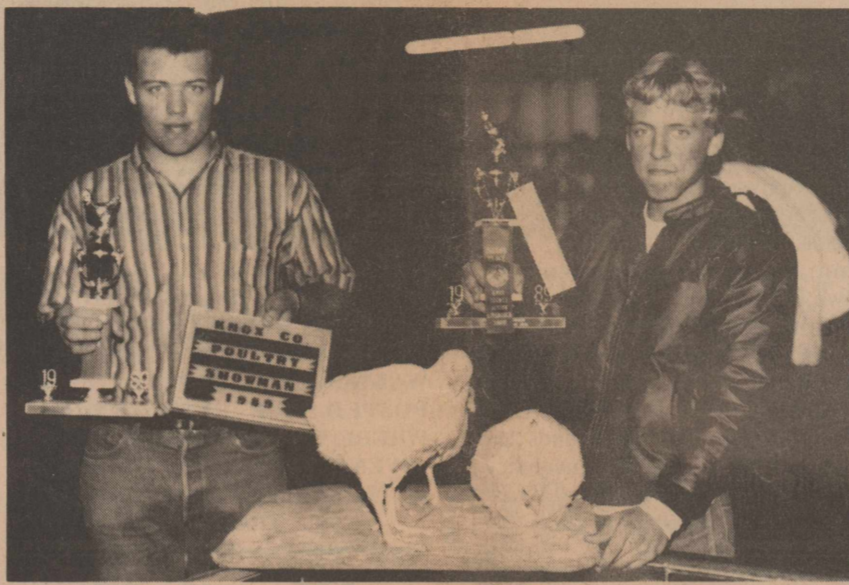
A Little Straight Talk

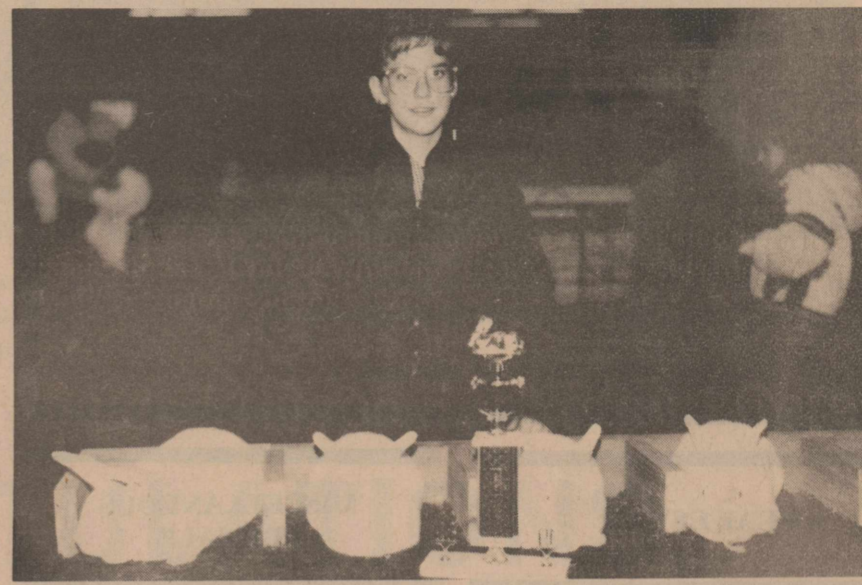

Third Officer Hired

Last Tuesday evening the City Council met in regular session and among the items of business was the hiring of a new police officer.

After interviewing two well qualified applicants out of nearly a dozen, the council voted to hire Gerald Saffel of Munday.

The hiring of another police officer comes in response to the need for an officer to be on patrol 24 hours a day seven days a week. Police Chief Gil Gillilan stated, "With an increase of crime activity in Knox City it is impossible for two officers to work 44 hours a week and be effective."

One council member said, "It would be nice if we could do the job with one man, part time and a night watchman, but times and circumstances have changed and we have to make adjustments in our system to compensate for these changes." He continued, "We have a serious drug problem in Knox City and this is a major contributing factor to other crime such as burglary which increased 23% in 1988 over 1987."

Officer Saffel is no stranger to Knox City and surrounding areas. He grew up in Rule and over the past 18 years has been in law enforcement agencies in Haskell, Munday, Seymour and just recently was the investigator for the District Attorney of the 50th District. Saffel brings to this department a vast knowledge of investigation procedures, along with other areas of law enforcement as well," Gillilan said.

Saffel and his wife Donna have three

children and will be moving to Knox City as soon as arrangements are made for housing. Donna is a school teacher in the Munday school district. They are Baptists.

"Knox City is fortunate to have an officer with Saffel's qualifications working for the citizens of this community," stated Dick Wilcox, City Administrator. Mayor Derrell Marion said, "This is just one more example of our progressive thinking and acting city council. They are looking at the present and future needs of this city, based on the facts."

Counties Consider Taking Over Railroad

Representatives of seven counties along the Santa Fe Railway's Chillicothe to Sweetwater, Texas, line were in Crowell last Thursday to discuss survival strategies in face of the proposed abandonment of the line by Santa Fe.

Those attending the meeting were told by Crowell Mayor Robert Kincaid that someone in a leadership position will be urged to attend a railroad convention in Fort Worth on January 18.

Officials from the seven-county area including Hardeman, Stonewall, Jones, Knox, Foard, Haskell, Fisher, and Nolan are weighing the possibility of forming a short-line railroad.

Kincaid told the group that Nortex Regional Planning Commission in Wichita Falls has been contacted about the counties' problem. However, a Nortex spokesman was unable to attend Thursday's meeting.

Kincaid explained that the reason the group will have to go through Nortex in applying for Texas development funds.

Richard Bertel of TRAX Engineering and Associates, a Fort

Worth company that conducts feasibility studies for short-line railroad companies spoke at the meeting and said that buying a short line is a "long, laborious process." He said governmental funding is not readily available to purchase a short line.

Other considerations include buying and leasing locomotives to operate the line, which can run up to \$100,000 for purchase and maintenance of a 1950s locomotive. The line would also have to be inspected for rail and safety defects.

He also said the bridges between the Red River and Sweetwater would have to be inspected. TRAX does appraisals on railroad lines.

"When the line is abandoned, Santa Fe will solicit bids from dismantling companies and the line could be ripped up within 60 days," Bertel said.

Three officers were elected at the meeting to represent the counties and included Bob Monde of Sweetwater, president; Dave Oxford of Knox County, vice president; and Billy Hord of Foard County, secretary.

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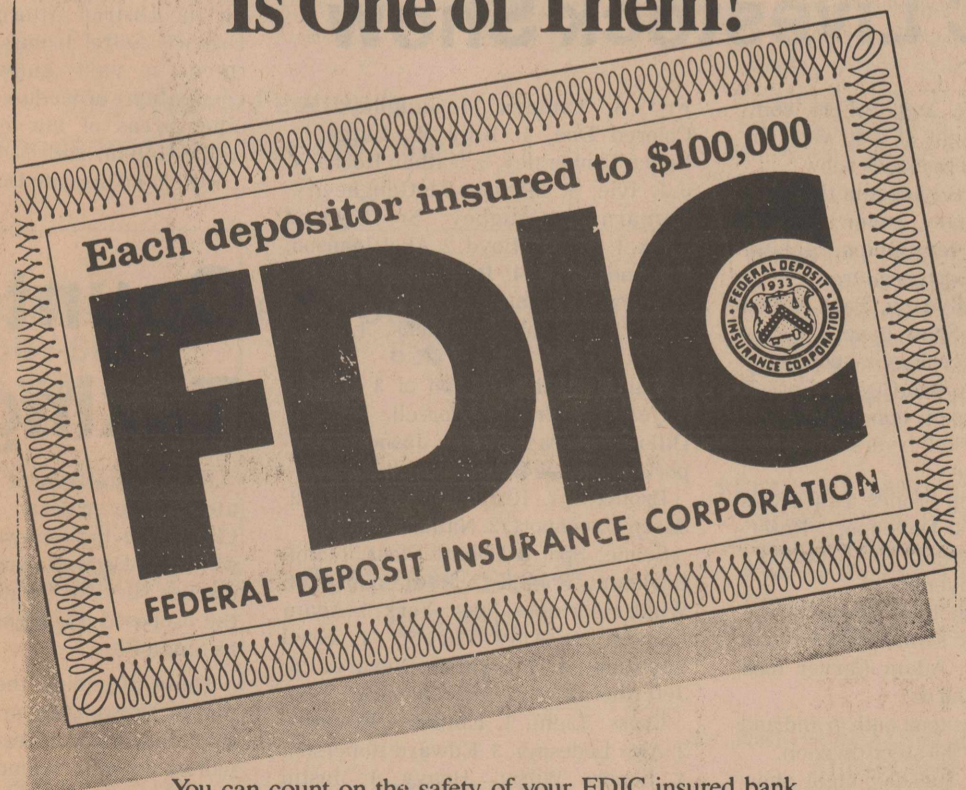

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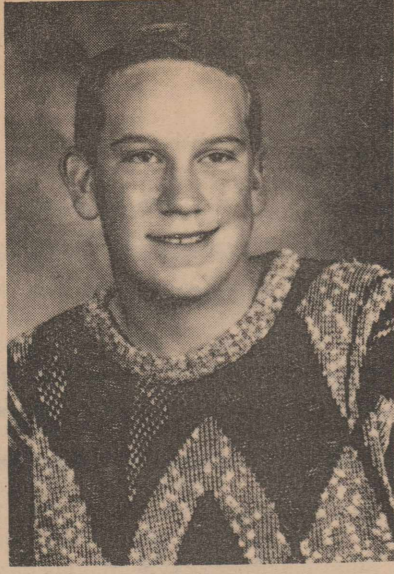

TIME TO SPRAY FRUIT AND NUT TREES

Since January has been unseasonably warm and homeowners are looking for ways to take advantage of the weather, now is the time for cover sprays of dormant oil spray on pecan and fruit trees.

Dormant oil spray is recommended yearly on pecan trees to aid in the prevention of phylloxera which are insects that cause the formation of galls. Galls are the irregular growths that occur in early spring as pecans begin making rapid growth.

Dormant oil spray will also control scale which is a rust colored bulbous formation that occurs on leaves of pecan and fruit trees. On fruit trees, the fruit may also be affected which can be recognized by a mottled appearance on the fruits.

For best results dormant oil spray should be used when the daytime temperature is warmer than 60 degrees Fahrenheit. At a rate of 4 gallons per 100 gallons of water or 5 ounces per gallon of water. The spray should be applied to the trunk and all branches in order to receive maximum control.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are open to people of all ages, regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, handicap, religion, or national origin.

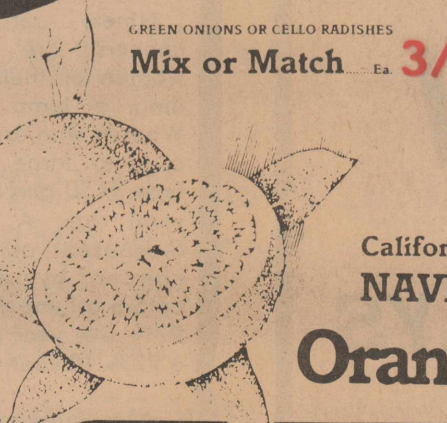
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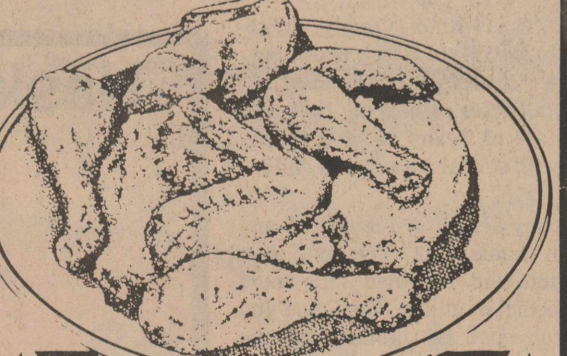

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City Council Minutes

November 10, 1988

The City Council met in regular session with Mayor Derrell Marion, Councilmembers Barbara Barnard, Joe Barnard, Marq Brockett, Rob Harrison and Larry Staggs present.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Derrell Marion.

The Invocation was given by Councilmember Rob Harrison.

The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

EMS Director Tommy Waldrip presented to the City Council the EMS Policy and Procedures Manual. After a lengthy discussion, and reviewing the Manual, a motion was made by Rob Harrison, seconded by Marq Brockett to take no action on the EMS Policy and Procedures Manual at this time for the purpose of rewording a few paragraphs and obtaining additional information before adopting this manual. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

City Judge Walter Rauch came before the Mayor and City Council to present the City Judge Monthly Report for the month of October, 1988. There were nine (9) offenses for the month of October. One (1) was transferred to County Court, one (1) dismissed, one (1) failed to appear, two (2) are pending and four (4) have been or will be paid.

Fire Chief Roland Marion came before the City Council to present the Fire Department Monthly Report. Roland stated that the Department answered three (3) fire calls for the month of October, 1988.

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BREAST CANCER DETECTION UNIT AVAILABLE TO AREA WOMEN



Wednesday, January 25
Knox County Hospital
Knox City, Texas

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of eleven women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

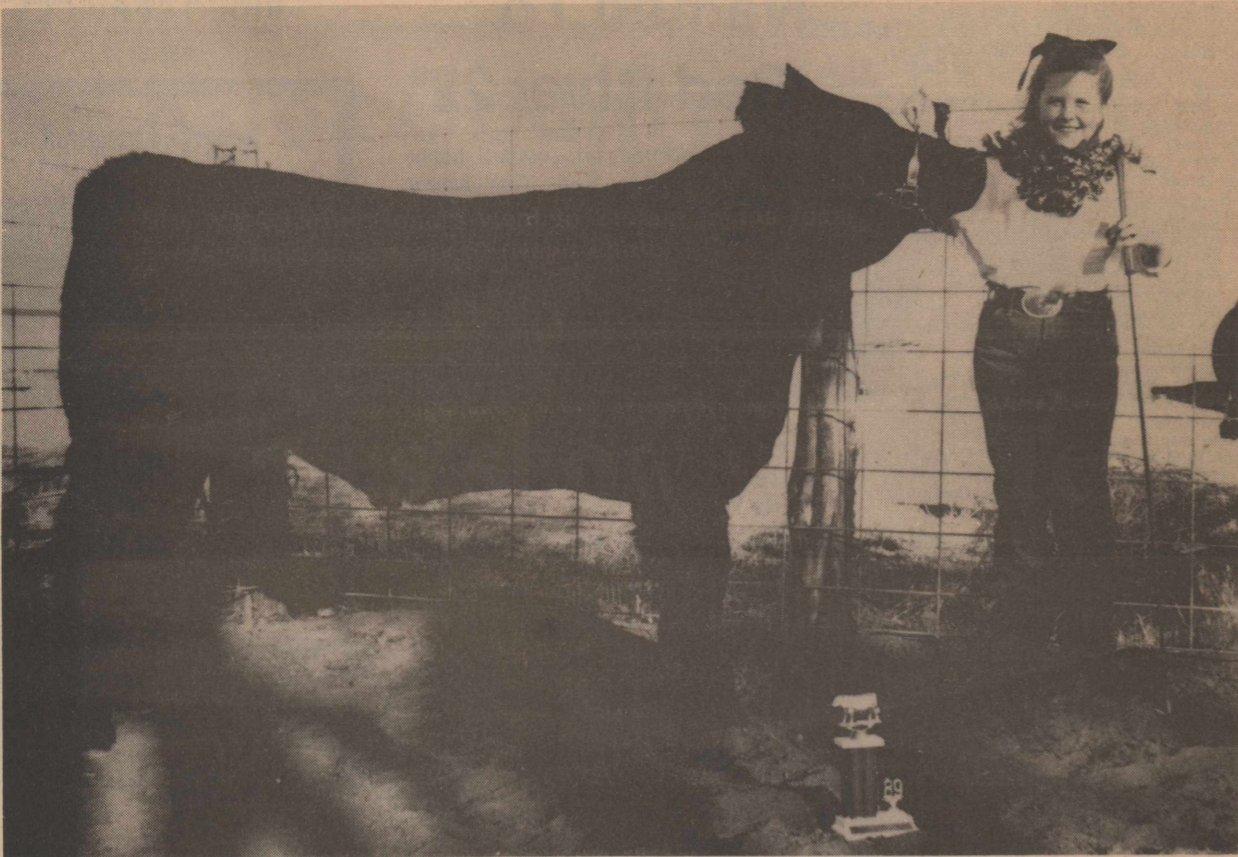
- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

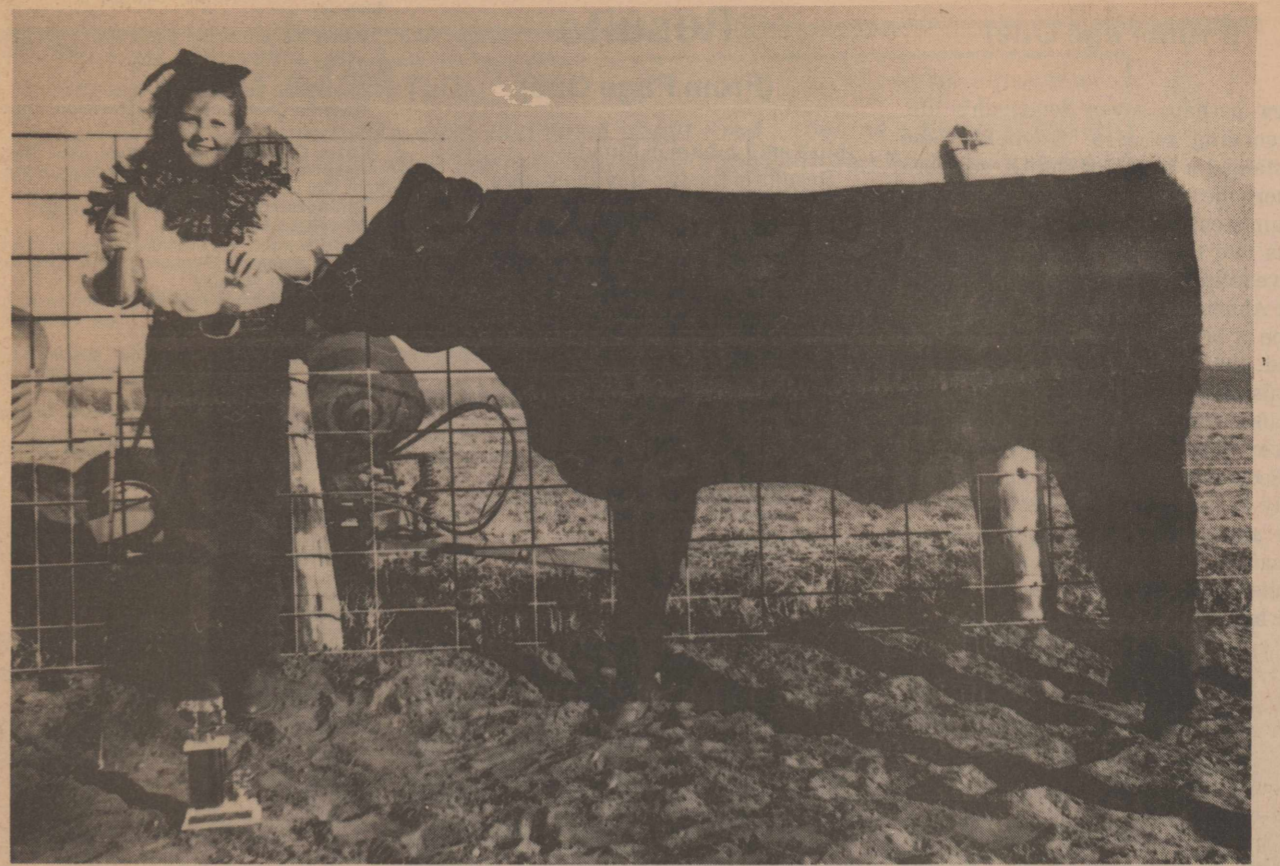
A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.

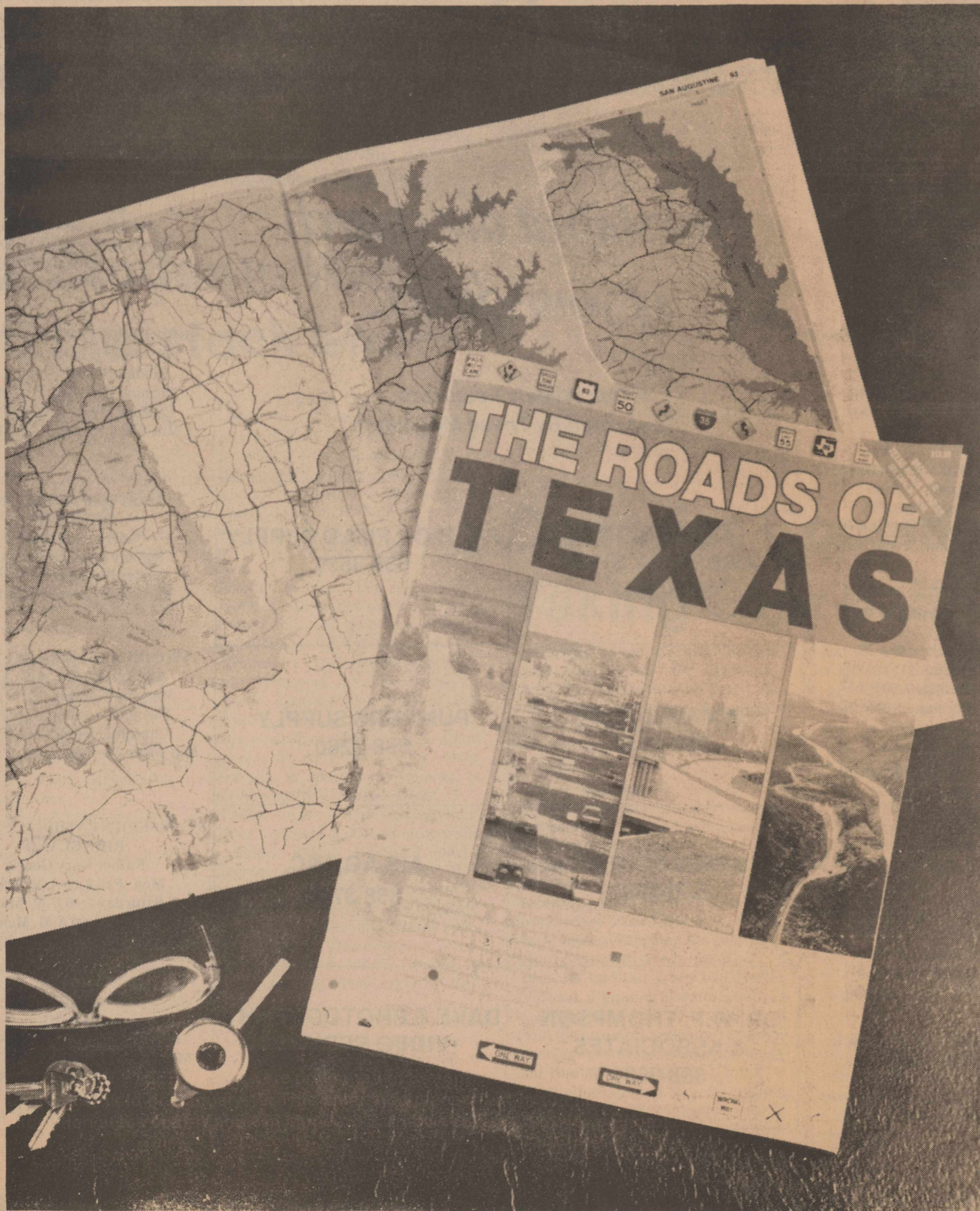

She said she was told that one wrong move could have killed or paralyzed her. She said the Abilene doctors explained that that type of break was very hard to detect and that Dr. Springer should be praised for his expediency. They also praised the local X-ray technician for his excellent work.

Sequoyah said she would continue to stay in bed and wear a neck brace for the next two weeks, and then on January 30 she would go back to Abilene for another catscan, hoping the break would continue to knit.

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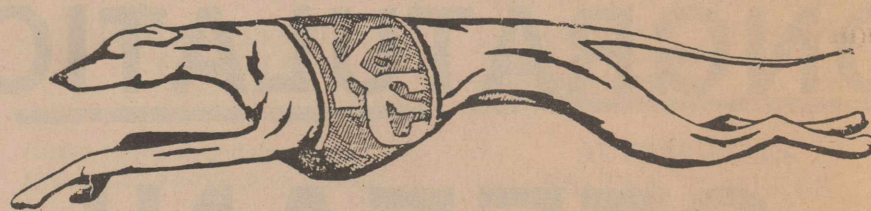
