

#### Pitchfork Ranch Wins At Western Heritage

A mouth-watering T-bone steak basted with a rich barbecue sauce and served with baked potato, sourdough bread, and apple cobbler won first place at the fifth annual Western Heritage Classic Chuckwagon Cook-off May 13 at Abilene for Pitchfork Ranch of Guthrie.

Pitchfork, one of the state's oldest and biggest cattle operations, defeated 15 other chuckwagon crews from Texas, Nebraska and New Mexico for this year's crown.

The chuckwagon cookoff, sponsored by the Texas Beef Industry Council, Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association, and the Abilene Restaurant Association, was part of the week-long Western Heritage Classic. The majority of its competitors are from working ranches where chuckwagons are needed to feed cowboys during roundup. The Pitchfork Ranch chuckwagon, for instance, is used approximately two months each year during spring and fall roundups. For this competition, chuckwagon cooks Gary and Marilyn Ferguson used a mesquite-wood fire,

cast-iron skillets and Dutch ovens, and readily available ingredients to prepare their award-winning entry.

The T-bones were seasoned with garlic salt and black pepper and cooked for about 20 minutes over medium hot coals until they were medium rare. It was basted with a "soppin' sauce" named for another large, old Texas ranch, the Four Sixes at Guthrie.

Charlie is the song leader and a deacon at the First Baptist Church and served as a Boy Scout leader for five years in the 70s. Joy is a licensed vocational nurse at the Seymour hospital. "It takes a special person to be a nurse and she happens to be one. She thoroughly enjoys her work," commented Charlie.

"Charlie is a special person, too," says his supervisor Weldon Sullivan of Henrietta. "He has a perfect safety record. In his 30 years at the Benjamin Station there has never been a lost-time accident. In fact, in his 35 years' total service, he has only missed five or six days because of illness," added Sullivan.

The Benjamin Compressor Station is semi-automatic. "It used to take a minimum of four people, one for each eight-hour shift, to keep our compressors going. A number of years ago we installed new semi-automatic controls and now one person can keep the

gas flowing," said Jones.

The Joneses have never had a desire

to live in a big city. "Both Joy and I grew up in Benjamin and went to school here. You make a lot of close friends. Everyone knows everyone else. Benjamin is our home and always will be," said Charlie.



## WTU Participates In Gatekeeper Program

West Texas Utilities Co. has announced its participation in the Gatekeeper Program. The program is designed to assist vulnerable older people who need help but may be unable to get it for themselves.

"We have long been active supporters of programs like the United Way, volunteer fire departments, and other community programs," said Glen Churchill, president and chief executive officer of the electric utility. "Our employees also participate in the Neighborhood Crime Watch in our communities. The Gatekeeper Program offers us an oportunity to further serve West Texans."

Each year the elderly population grows. In fact statistics show that people over 85 make up the fastest growing segment of the U.S. population. Many of them are healthy, active people involved with family and friends, church or community groups.

But many others are not that fortunate. They live alone and have little contact with others. If they become ill or unable to function independently, they can easily go unnoticed and unattended. According to Churchill, the Gatekeeper Program seeks to help remedy the problem by using meter readers and other customer service representatives who may have contact with the elderly in the normal course of their jobs.

Nancy Johnson, WTU supervisor of residential audit services, recently conducted training sessions for those employees throughout the company's 52 county service area. The training

taught the Gatekeepers to recognize certain signals in the elderly such as a change in appearance or behavior, or signs of confusion or disability.

When the employee sees a warning sign, the local agency for the aging is contacted. The agency takes it from there.

They contact the elderly person, assess their needs, and get whatever help is required from the appropriate health or social service organization. This may include medical care, food preparation or delivery, help with household chores, transportation, or other services.

In discussing the company's reasons for participating in this nationally recognized program, Churchill pointed out that it is a logical extension of what company employees do in their normal line of work. He added "the Gatekeeper Program is a way to help our neighbors, customers and friends."

#### **Counts Co-Authors** Clean Air Bills

AUSTIN - State Rep. David Counts, D-Knox City, joined by more than 50 co-authors, threw his support behind legislation that amends the Texas Clean Air Act by discouraging the use of polluting fuels.

The amendment was filed by State Rep. Hugo Berlanga, D-Corpus Christi, and is half of the package of clean air legislation now before the 71st Legislature. The other bill, sponsored by Rep. David Cain, D-Dallas requires the conversion of certain state and private fleet vehicles from diesel or gasoline to alternative fuels such as compressed natural gas.

The Senate companions to the bills passed by voice vote on Friday.

'Clean Air is not a partisan issue. It is not a regional issue. Clean Air is an issue for all Texans," said Berlanga, speaker pro tem of the House.

The package of bills is also backed by Clean Air Texas, a coalition of energy, environmental and consumer

"I applaud Representative Counts for taking such an active role in the promotion of these bills in the House,' said Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro, who serves as president of Clean Air Texas. "He and his colleagues have shown how much support there is for clean air legislation."

Metropolitan areas of Houston, Dallas-Fort Worth, Beaumont-Port Arthur, and El Paso, twenty-one counties in all, fail to meet the EPA minimum health-based air quality standards. The bill calls for industrial and utility boiler operators to pay a penalty for burning fuel oil between April 15 and October 15, the high ozoneformation months. It encourages the adoption of "select-use" technologies which burn natural gas or alternative fuels in combination with other fossil

In these non-attainment areas, the bill also calls for transit authority, fleet conversions to alternative fuels. If necessary, a subsequent conversion of local and private fleets will be

The Texas Air Control Board will monitor clean air compliance contained in this bill and in the alternative

Both bills would encourage the use of natural gas, one of Texas' most abundant resources. Increased use of cleanburning natural gas would lead to cleaner skies and thousands of new jobs in Texas.




#### Beta Chi Chapter Closes Out Year

Chrystal is a May graduate of Knox City High School. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Taylor of Route 1, O'Brien.






