County Bedroom Demonstration Is Attracting Many

"There have been fifty-eight of friends and neighbors that have sited my improved bedroom," say strator of the Weinert 4-H Club and tieing for second place in the coun-

ty with a score of 90 points.

In telling the story of her bed om improvement Berta Mae says shades were also very worn.

"The first thing I did to improve my room was to remove all paint from the bed stead, dresser, chair and small table with hot lye water. Lye water was also used to wash the woodwork before painting. I sand-papered the furniture with sandpaper and painted the furniture, ceiling, windows and doors with a cream enamel.

'I bought new glass knobs for the dresser to match my rose drapes and spreads. I took the large heavy side pieces off the dresser and left it a chest of drawers with a mirror hanging above it. I made my rose drapes to match the rose spread I already had.

"My family helped with the papering. The room is papered with a cream colored paper that matches the woodwork and furniture and the drapes and bedspread add col hat is needed in my ivory room.

With help from the other mem kept in excellent condition at I times. I papered my closet in-de with a light colored paper that makes it very light and clean looking. I made a shoe rack out of the end of an old box and a broom hanile. I made a hat rack out of an oatmeal box and papered it after placing it on a square piece of cardboard, and placed it on the top shelf of my closet to keep my hats in shape. I also made a laundry bag, sox bag, book bag and pin rushion out of brown domestic and rimmed it with rose gingham,

"I used lye water, sand paper and finally a floor scraper on my floor before I could remove all traces of old paint and then I repainted the floor with a deck paint.





SMALL TOWN FACTORIES

No community and no state ever became fully prosperous through agriculture alone, declares T. R. Preston, former president of the American Bankers Association, who is a very strong advocate of combining industry with agriculture by locating factories in the smaller communities.

Mr. Preston cites particularly the small cities and towns of North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Ohio as afforcing excellent examples of such combination. He points out that industry and agriculture are well balanced with the result that the farm problem is less acute in

The idea of locating new factories in towns and villages, instead of further concentrating them in congested centers of population, is spreading throughout the country, and some of the largest factories are now so located. An example in Kingsport, Tenn., with only a few thousand population, yet boasting the largest book printing plant in the world, besides other important industries.

The benefits derived from this decentralization of industry is seen in the increased market for local farm products, employment of surplus labor, elevation of living standards for both farmer and factory employe, increases in taxable wealth, better schools and other public facilities.

That is what Haskell needs, and as prosperity returns an effort should be made to secure factories which will provide employment for the unemployed.

TOO MUCH ALARM

There's entirely too much "viewing with alarm" and not enough "pointing with pride" in this country. Too many people running around with long faces and drooping mouths. Too many ready to believe that the republic is either going to die or blowup. The fact is, it is not going to do either. Here in our own community we have entirely too many gloom spreaders, and other towns are in the same fix. These prophets of gloom around Carmi who are still spreading their hands and making grim prophecies are doing more to forestall good times than any other class.

One citizen who goes about his work with a hearty good will and who looks into the future with hope and confidence is worth all of the gloom spreaders who walk the face of the earth. But just one optimist in a community is not enough. It is a gift. A man may have ability, education, training and ambition, and still lack the genius that gets things done. Another man who has had little or no education and whose training has been of the most haphazard, without any fuss or ado will seem to accomplish the impossible.

Part of it, perhaps, is a daring to tackle things that seem impossible to others. Perhaps another part is made up of intense concentration and steady patient work. There is always a sort of placid certainty about the man who gets things done.

In almost any small community can be found the man to whom the residents inevitably turn when something especially difficult to solve comes up in the life of the community. For some reason this man is seldom in an official position. He seems to have no flair for politics. He is more apt to be found running a busines of his own and taking a comfortable and unostentatious part in the affairs of the village. He may be a diamond in the rough. He never dictates. He never boasts. He never exaggerates. He never scolds. But somehow, as if by a magic touch, when something is badly needed, he manages to get it done.

In the larger communities and the big cities it takes longer for the man who gets things done to be recognized, but eventually he is discovered and used. He is the man of the smaller communities, only his opportunities are larger and therefore his accomplishment seems more important.

Texas Now Growing A Highly Improved Variety of Cotton

HTLLICOTHE Texas A new variety of cotton, surpassing both in vield and quality of staple any now being grown in northwest Texhas been developed by the federal agricultural experiment station here, according to Mr. J. R. Quin-by, superintendent. This is no overhasty announcement of startling results obtained by chance, but the outcome of nine years of constant application, and the product of the experiment station's study has been thoroughly tested both scientifically and in the cotton farmer's field. Last year, seed from the new cotton was distributed to 50 farmers in the vicinity of Chillicothe, and results substantiatig the station's claims for it were obtained. The yield at the station on 23 acres last year was 24 hales of 500 pounds each, or more than a bale to the acre. Average production for four successive years has been 380

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

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
