Knox County Melon Show Winners Named

There were 43 entries shown at the Knox County Melon Show held on July 29 at the Knox City city park.

The Grand Champion Junior exhibitor was Blake Adkins of Rochester with a seedless watermelon, while Dustin Johnson received Reserve Champion honors with his All-Sweet watermelon entry.

In the Senior Division, the Grand Champion exhibitor was Becky Underwood of O'Brien with her cantaloupe and Underwood also took the Reserve Champion honors with her yellow seeded watermelon.

In the commercial division, Johnson Farms, Knox City, took Grand and Reserve Champion honors with seedless watermelon and All-Sweet watermelon entries, respectively.

The largest melon of the show was exhibited by Brad Johnson with an All-Sweet watermelon that weighed in excess of 60 pounds.

Johnson Farms Featured In Sunday Abilene Paper

Highlighting the first annual Knox County Watermelon Festival sponsored by the Knox City Chamber of Commerce and the Knox County Horticulture Committee was Johnson Farms taking grand champion and reserve champion honors with seedless watermelon and All-Sweet watermelon entries, respectively.

J.T. Smith, farm editor of *The Abilene Reporter News*, featured Donald Johnson in the Sunday edition with a double spread news article and pictures in color.

Donald began his commercial melon growing as a small operation when a Hispanic man wanted to buy a small amount of melons and encouraged him to grow more.

According to Smith's article, everything changed about seven years ago when the father of seedless watermelons visited the Munday and Knox City area. Dr. O.J. Eigsti was visiting with Herb Partridge, a Munday farmer who brought seedless melon production to Knox County in 1964. Dr. Eigsti needed to increase production to meet the rapidly growing demand for his seedless melons throughout the world, and the many years of top production by Partridge had thoroughly convinced Dr. Eigsti that with irrigation, the sandy loam soil and climate of the Rolling Plains was the most ideal place in the nation to produce his seedless melon.

Fire Dept. Purchases Rural Truck

Fire Chief Roland Marion has advised the *News* office that a used fire truck for fighting rural fires has been purchased. The four-wheel, two-ton Ford was purchased from a Seymour company for \$10,000.00. A \$5500.00 grant is also scheduled to be received toward the truck.

With approximately \$2000.00 being received in donations, a total of \$5500.00 is still needed to take care of the "extras" including the pump, tank and fittings for the truck.

Chief Marion said county officials have been asked to help with funding and rural residents should contact their county commissioners, Billy Gene Johnston or Bobby Roberson, asking them for assistance. He stressed that the responsibility of funds is that of the rural residents; however, anyone is asked to make a donation. These may be given to any member of the fire department or may be left at City Hall, Marion said.

Realizing it would take more than Partridge alone to meet the world demand, Dr. Eigsti approached Donald, asking if he would grow seedless melons for seed.

When Dr. Eigsti decided to retire recently, after 50 years' work with seedless melons, he put his company, the American Seedless Watermelon Seed Corp., up for sale.

Johnson along with an Oklahoma farmer, Arizona grower, and one of Dr. Eigsti's sons, a New York lawyer, bought the company and reorganized it in 1987 as "American Seedless Corporation." That company does the marketing, and Johnson's company at Knox City, "American Sunmelon" produces the melons and the need for seedless production.

Johnson finds top farmers to produce the triploid seed for seedless watermelons. There are six seedless growers in Knox and Haskell counties, including Johnson. Johnson has more than 600 acres of melons around Haskell and Knox counties-most of it his own acreage. He uses wheel, pivot, and flood irrigation, and he has more than 250 bee hives that he gets from a honey farm outside of Anson to pollinate the seedless melon vines.

All seed, no matter where grown, are sent to American Sunmelon headquarters four miles east of Knox City. They are packed in bright, shiny sacks that are labeled and well-sealed, and shipped all over the world. This includes sending the seed to various seed distributors in Texas.

A few of the countries where the seeds are shipped from Knox City include Israel, Spain, South Africa, Central and South America, New Zealand, Australia, and Mexico.

Johnson said, "We export more seed to Israel for them to grow seedless melons than we grow in the U.S. That's hard to believe since Israel is not very big."

Within the U.S., the seed is shipped from Knox City to seedless growers in California, Arizona, Texas, Oklahoma, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Maryland, Indiana, and Kentucky.

To help with the seed supply year around, Johnson has established seedless operations in Chile, El Salvador and Mexico for seedless melon and seed production in the winter for his American Sunmelon Company.

Donald and his wife, Fay, said that among their extensive travels, they were most impressed with Chile, describing how clean the country is, how friendly and courteous its people are, and how interested its children are in learning about the U.S.

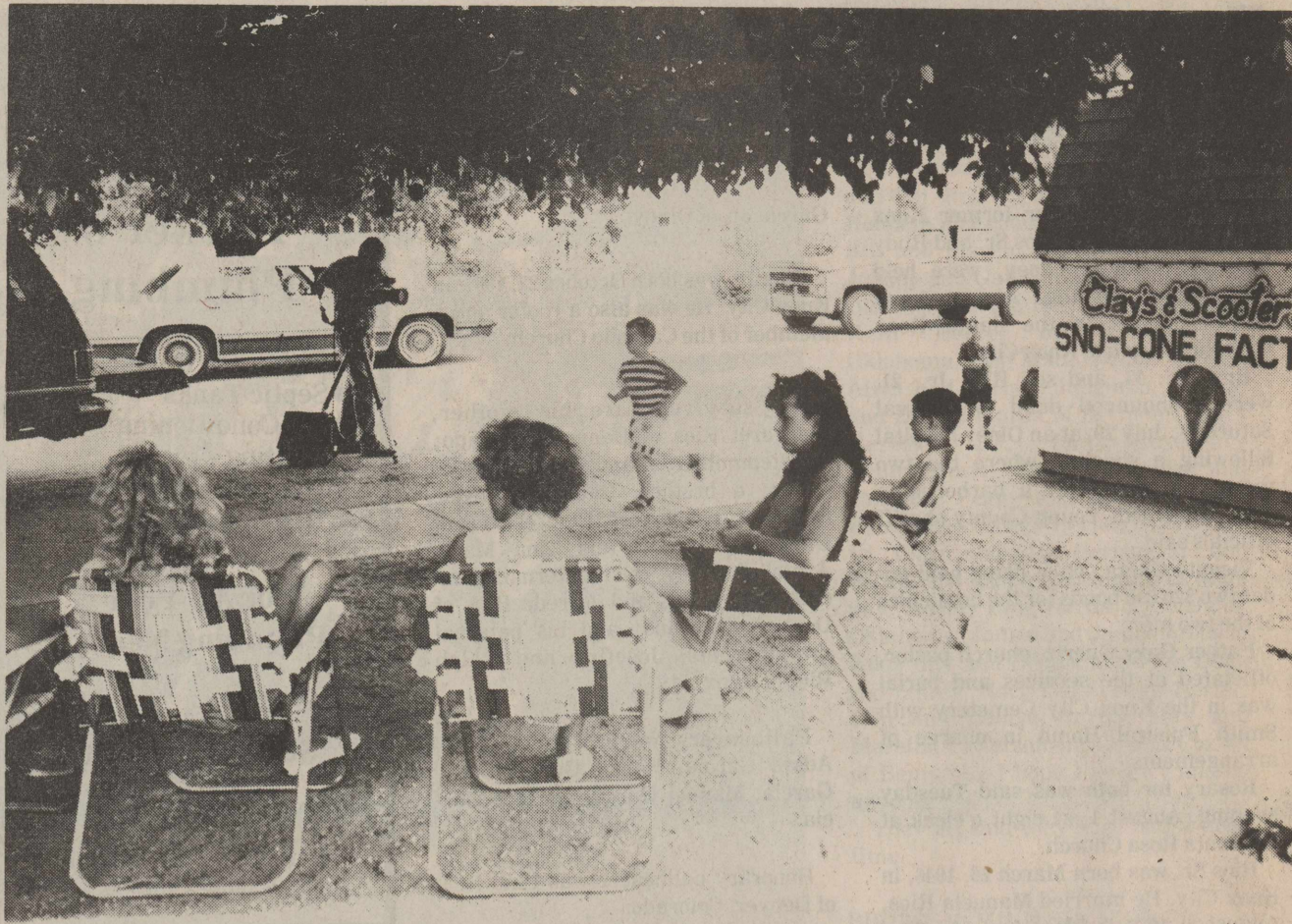

Ex-Sheriff Promoted At Baylor

Baylor University Department of Public Safety Officer Morris E. Nix, a former resident and longtime law enforcement officer in Knox County, has been appointed to the position of Operations Lieutenant at Baylor, according to Police Chief Jim Doak, Director of the Baylor DPS. The promotion becomes effective August 1, 1989.

Lt. Nix became associated with Baylor University in July, 1988 as a Patrol Officer and was promoted to Sergeant and Patrol Supervisor in October. He was chosen for the newly created Operations Lieutenant post from a field of over 20 applicants whose resumes and personal interviews were reviewed by a panel consisting of the DPS Director, various Baylor administrators and other McLennan County Peace Officers.

Lt. Nix will be responsible for directing the Department's criminal investigation unit as well as overseeing the operation of the 14 commissioned officers who make up the Department's patrol force. His job duties will also include evaluating the performance of Patrol Supervisors, coordinating special events on campus, assisting in the development of new programs and training of employees.

Baylor University, the largest Baptist Church-affiliated institution of higher learning in the world, is located in Waco, Texas and has a student population of approximately 12,000. The DPS employs some 30 personnel, including 20 commissioned law enforcement officers.
