



The funeral rites of Stephen G. Perrin were held Wednesday after-



# THE LITTLE FELLOW PAYS

It took only three years of the depression to reduce the number of reported million dollar incomes in the United States from 513 to 20. Income tax statistics just released by the Internal Revenue Bureau show that in 1929 there were 38 persons in this country with incomes of more than \$5,000,000 yearly. Figures for 1932 show there were none in this category. Of the 20 fortunates reporting in the millionaire class 12 were just inside the charmed circle; three were below \$2,000,000, three were below \$3,000,000 and two below \$5,000,000. Figures for 1929 show more than half of the 513 reporting million dollar incomes received in excess of \$2,000,000.

Strange as it may seem the real standby of the tax collector both in 1929 and 1932 was the fellow who made less than \$5,000 yearly. The 513 millionaires paid taxes on a total net income of \$1,212,098,784, while the little fellows with incomes under \$5,000 reported on and paid on a grand net total of \$8,106,000,000. In spite of the fact that the millionaire incomes dropped to less than one twenty-fifth in 1932, the little fellow with less than \$5,000 a year continued to report and pay taxes on a net total income of \$7.112,000,000. It will be remembered that recent investigations disclosed that many wealthy individuals had evaded the payment of large amounts of taxes while the little fellow who could not afford expert counsel stepped up and paid. This may account for a part of the shrinkage in the millionaire class.

## TO REGULATE STOCK EXCHANGE

Some uproar may arise in certain quarters over the President's request for legislation for the regulation of stock exchanges, but it will be welcomed by the general public, especially by the small investor who has been unmercifully skinned in the past.

In the words of Chairman Fletcher, of the Senate Banking Committee, who introduced a regulatory bill in the Senate, the legislation is designed "to make stock exchanges market places for investors and not places of resort for those who would speculate or gamble."

No one unless he has an axe of his own to grind, can quarrel with such an object.

Provisions of the restrictive legislation, as summarized by the press, appear reasonable and eminently fair. Registration of all exchanges with the Federal Trade Commission is required, the commission having broad power to promulgate rules for their operation. This is the prime object of the administration measure.

Other provisions of the proposed legislation cannot help but meet with general public approval. Among them is one fixing a minimum marginal limitation of 60 per cent, and another placing severe restrictions on borrowing by exchange members and their use of customers' securities, including the requirement that loans on registered securities must be deral Reserve banks. The objection may be advanced that the proposed legislation may have the effect of curtailing the volume of business in securities, but legitimate business cannot suffer by reason of the proposed legislation.
