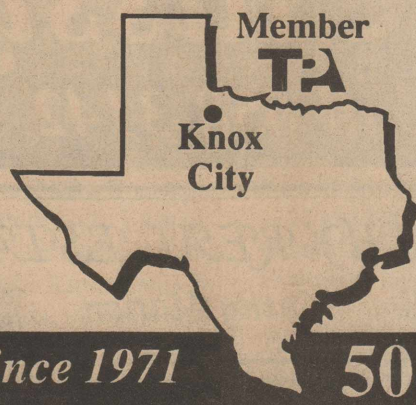

Citizens State Bank Applies For Branch

Abilene Branch Office Expected To Begin Operation In May

Greg Clonts, President and Chief Executive Officer of the Citizens State Bank in Knox City, has announced the filing of an application with the Texas Department of Banking to establish a full service branch office in Abilene, Texas. The branch will be located at 1500 Industrial Boulevard and will be managed by bankers experienced in the Abilene market to serve the City of Abilene and all of Taylor County. All data processing, as well as all accounting and other operational support, will be

handled by personnel in the home office in Knox City. The branch is expected to begin operation in May of this year.

In making the announcement, Clonts states, "This expansion will position the bank for additional growth into the future and will provide an opportunity for the bank to remain an independent community owned institution through greater diversification. By serving a larger population base, we hope to improve and expand our services to the Knox

City area as well.

"We are excited about the opportunity to offer the same friendly, courteous banking services to the people of Abilene which our customers in the Knox City area have come to expect for years."

The Citizens State Bank was chartered in 1927 and was recently awarded a five-star rating from Bauer Financial Reports, Inc., its highest rating. This award places the Bank in the top one-third of all commercial banks in the United States.

Hunt Oil Co. Acquires Pacific Enterprises Assets

DALLAS, January 5, 1993 - - Hunt Oil Company announced that final closing documents were signed earlier today completing the acquisition of substantially all of the domestic oil and gas assets of Pacific Enterprises Oil Company (PEOC). The transaction was first announced on October 12, 1992.

The assets, which Hunt Oil Company is acquiring from PEOC, consist of oil and gas properties located predominantly in Texas, Wyoming, Louisiana and Mississippi. The transaction will add reserves of approximately 63 million barrels of oil equivalent to Hunt Oil Company's existing asset base, and nearly 1.4 million gross acres of oil and gas leases. Included in the acquisition are several oil and gas fields located on the Burnett Ranch in King County, Texas.

The purchase price paid by Hunt

Oil was \$371 million and was based upon the value of the PEOC assets acquired as of April 1, 1992.

Hunt Oil Company is a privately held, independent oil and gas firm whose chairman is Ray L. Hunt.

The company is headquartered in Dallas and has significant domestic, as well as international, exploration

and production operation.

Prior to the acquisition, Hunt Oil Company enjoyed a senior debt rating of A+ from Standard & Poors.

The company has been notified that the A+ rating will remain unchanged following the PEOC acquisition.

Reminder To Taxpayers

JANUARY 31, 1993

IS THE LAST DAY TO PAY YOUR 1992 TAXES
AND AVOID THE ADDITIONAL PENALTY
AND INTEREST CHARGES

HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1993. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1992, and before January 1, 1993, you need to apply for the additional over 65, \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown, between the dates of January 1, 1993 and May 1, 1993. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

AG-USE EXEMPTIONS

Annual applications for qualifying land for agriculture use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1993 and May 1, 1993.

DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTION

These exemptions need to be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1992 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1993. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1993 and May 1, 1993.

RENDITIONS

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1993 and April 1, 1993.

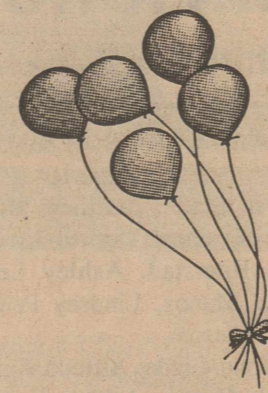

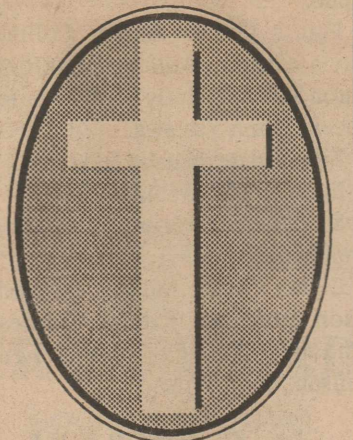
