For City, School, Hospital, and State Elections

Voters are reminded to go to the mand polls Saturday and cast your votes for the mayor and city council members, the school board trustees, the hospital board director, U.S. Senator, and the constitutional amendments.

Thirty-one persons had voted as of 1:30 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall in the city and school elections in early voting. Tuesday was the deadline for early voting by personal appearance.

Polls will be open Saturday from 7:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. at the Knox County Aging Center in Knox City.

Incumbent mayor Oscar Mangis is being challenged by Stan Wojcik, and those seeking seats on the city council are incumbent Barbara Barnard, Jerry Curd, Cathye Williams, and Danny Parker. All are two year terms.

Seeking the three seats on the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District board are incumbent David Albus, Steve Pepper, Ray Penman, James Manning, and Leona Burkham.

Greg Clonts is unopposed in his re-election bid for the Knox County Hospital Board's elective term.

On the statewide level, the May 1 election will feature a race to fill the U.S. Senate seat vacated by Lloyd Bentsen and currently held by Bob Krueger. Twenty-six candidates are seeking this seat.

Also, Texas voters will decide on three constitutional amendments. Proposition One, the so-called "Robin Hood" amendment on public school finance, would allow statewide and countywide redistribution of property taxes from school districts with high property values to those with lower values.

Two other amendments will be on the ballot. One would exempt school districts from the obligation of complying with unfunded state education mandates and the second would authorize the issuance of \$750 million in state bonds to assist school districts in partially financing facilities.

School Finance In Hands Of Voters

(AUSTIN)..."The legislature has been wrestling with the enormous problem of education finance for quite some time, but now the future of our public schools is in the hands of Texas voters," State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) said. "It is important that voters get out to vote for the constitutional amendment regarding education finance on the upcoming May 1 ballot.

"I think there may be some confusion regarding the amendments on the May 1 ballot," Counts said. "There are actually three constitutional amendments related to public schools. Proposition One deals directly with the school finance dilemma and the Edgewood lawsuit; Propostion Two frees schools from complying with unfunded state education mandates; Proposition Three allows the state to issue bonds to finance school construction.

"There are many individuals inundating the public with complex and negative propaganda on the amendment. The truth of the matter is the courts ruled our current system of education finance unconstitutional and said that we have to do something about it, or our schools are going to be shut down. Proposition One was the best alternative we could come up with. The plan allows for excess funds from the wealthiest 5% of schools to be redistributed to poorer schools. The recapture rate from the wealthiest schools is limited to 2.75% of the local funds appropriated for education. The plan also caps the local tax rate at \$1 unless a tax increase is approved by local voters."

Counts noted that the options for a school finance solution are limited. "To neutralize funding, we could consolidate school districts until the funding was equalized. This process of mass consolidation does not consolidate schools, but rather the school districts, in an attempt to equalize funding throughout the state. However, under the mass consolidation plans I have seen, there could be five or six counties in one school district. When you consolidate in this manner, you lose local control of your schools. The only other alternative is for the state to pump enough money into the system to help equalize school funding. The cost of doing so would be in the tens of billions of dollars. There simply is not that kind of money available, unless you have a state income tax. The people in District 70 have made it clear that new tax burdens and mass consolidation are simply not acceptable solutions to the problem," said Counts.

Counts cited groups who have distributed tax models trying to show how taxes would increase under Proposition One. "These numbers are inaccurate and misleading. Until



The intergrated Farm Management Program Option (IFM) is also available for sign-up thru April 30. Under this plan you enroll from 20% to 100% of the bases on the farm for three years and plant the acres to grass or small grain (not wheat) and legume mixtures. The mixture must contain a legume. Deficiency payments are made on these acres the same as if the crop was planted (not guaranteed). This option must be carried out in accordance with a plan by SCS and cannot be grazed or baled from June 1 thru October 31.

CERTIFICATION

The final date to certify all small grain in Knox County is May 17. Call 658-3537 for an appointment.

lab, said. The laboratory uses body fluids and smears to perform several tests, including chemical profiles, coagulation studies, and electrolyte studies.

Advanced technology and equipment are important, but the equipment would be useless without the training and dedication of the people who operate it. Three professionals staff the Knox County Hospital laboratory; Joe Walaski, MT, Pauline Marion and Sharon Wainscott. Staff members continue to sharpen their skills with advanced training and study.

The Knox County Hospital Laboratory routinely provides diagnostic tests for the acute care patients in the hospital. They also provide the diagnostic testing requirements for the Knox City and Munday clinic, local nursing home and home health care services in the area.

Among the most frequently ordered test that the laboratory is re-

Currently, the Knox County Hospital District is in the process of procuring the Baxter Stratus Analyzer, replacing the Abbott TDX Analyzer. This new piece of equipment will allow the laboratory to perform testing at the hospital which in the past had been referred out of the area - including quicker and more sensitive results in acute cardiac or heart situations.

Performing tests is not the only function of the laboratory, according to Walaski. "The paperwork required to operate a lab has increased significantly during the last few years. Quality assurance, Medicare and Medicaid requirements, state and federal guidelines all require careful documentation," Walaski said.

"We are very fortunate at Knox County Hospital to have the quality of equipment that we have," Stephen Kuehler said. "For a hospital our size our laboratory is very well equiped and staffed."







To The Editor:

On May 1, 1993, the voters of the state of Texas are being asked to vote on three amendments to the Texas Constitution that deal with public schools. Proposition 1 is not about improving school finances, effeciency, or education. Instead it is about constitutional rights and tax increases. The amendment removes the constitutional prohibition against a state property tax and the redistribution of monies between different taxing authorities. It also removes the voters' right to vote to establish taxing authorities. The amendment raises the limit on the maximum school tax rate from \$1.50/100 value to \$2.50/\$100, an increase of 67%.

Does Proposition 1 solve the problems? NO! It continues the County Education District plan that has been proven a dismal failure. Even the proponents agree that it is merely a bandaid and will not solve the school finance crisis or keep the courts out. It will not provide any more money for educaiton; over \$400 million was "lost" by schools through the CED plan.


Will schools close on June 1? No! Judge McCowan has stated that a constitutional amendment is not necessary to keep schools open. The legislature must act on the various alternatives that are available. A simple across-the-board cut of 1% of the state budget would raise \$660 million for public schools.

The Governor and the legislature want the voters to hand over their constitutional rights along with a signed blank check. They expect us to vote for an amendment for which there is no distribution or funding mechanism in place. They say it would be too confusing for the voters. 
you have determined what your basic allotment will be, and what property values will be, there is no way you can make an educated guess as to what your tax rate will be," Counts said.

Counts also explained, "Under a plan recently released by Representaive Linebarger, the base tax rate would be set at .86 per \$100 of property valuation. In this particular instance, only 13 school districts would be required to raise taxes. Representative Linebarger's plan would create 253 Education Funding Districts, and the excess money from schools would first be distributed to other schools in that same county.


"I do not know anyone who has ever said the plan is perfect. There is no one plan that will satisfy everyone. However, Proposition One is a workable solution that is certainly better than any of the other options. There will be instances under the amendment that some schools will have to tighten their belts, but it will keep our schools open and the local communities in control of their children's education." Counts said.




Child Welfare Board Minutes



Reduced Rates Will Benefit Local Farmers

AUSTIN--- For the fourth time in the last 12 months, the variable interest rate for Federal Land Bank Association agricultural, rural housing and farm-related business loans has declined. The new rate, effective March 1, is 8.2 percent.

The new rate benefits nearly 30,000 farmers, ranchers and rural homeowners throughout Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas who do business with FLBAs.

"Like other businessmen, farmers are concerned about keeping their business costs as low as possible," Michael R. Davis, president of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas, said. "We hope this latest rate reduction will help create a more favorable financial environment for our stockholders."

Davis said the rate reduction was a reflection of the bank's lower cost of funds and the FLBAs' strong financial performance.

In addition to reducing the variable interest rate, the bank has received regulatory approval to originate and sell loans through the Federal National Morgage Corporation (Fannie Mae).

Our entrance into the Fannie Mae market is exciting because it enables the district's FLBAs to offer 30-year fixed-rate mortgages to rural home buyers, Davis said. "Fannie Mae gives our borrowers yet another option to meet their financing needs."

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas provides loan funds through 48 FLBAs in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas. FLBAs make long-term agricultural and rural h ousing loans through locally-owned and operated offices.


KCHS Hosting Outsiders BB Tournament


Knox City High School is hosting an Outsiders Basketball Tournament May 7 and 8.
