Area Ranches Winners At Western Heritage Classic

6666 Ranch Wins Championship, Moorhouse Ranch Is Second

An estimated 35,000 people converged on Abilene for the ninth annual Western Heritage Classic held May 7-9.

The 6666 Ranch won championship honors while the Moorhouse Ranch captured second place.

The Pitchfork Land and Cattle Co. came away as branding champi-

The entire city gets involved in this event which benefits the Expo Center of Taylor and Hospice of Abilene.

From April 27 through June 13, Museums of Abilene collaborated with the Classic and are hosting "Living the Legend", an exhibit of ranch images and historic artifacts sponsored by Owen Healthcare and First National Bank. Saddles, bits, spurs, and photographs from the private collection of renowned horseman and rancher Buster Welch are displayed for the first time, anywhere. Mr. Welch has spent a lifteime researching and assembling a significant collection that traces the development of the cattle industry in the American West from the early 1800s. Mr. Welch has been instrumental in the development of modern-day ranching techniques.

All Emergencies Are Now 9-1-1


City Administrator Joe Rice has advised the News office that all emergency calls should now be handled through the 9-1-1 system.

This means that instead of dialing the 658-5085 emergency number, those needing assistance should now use 9-1-1, effective immediately





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


Moorhouse Exhibit Illustrates Beauty of Quarter Horse

National Hospital Week Is Celebrated

Knox County Hospital has adopted the theme "Caring People, People Caring" for the National Hospital Week celebration this year, according to Stephen Kuehler, administrator Knox County Hospital. "Our staff is an excellent example of this theme," Kuehler said. "Most of the health care professionals at Knox County Hospital chose their profession because they wanted to care for people. We see examples every day of their selfless devotion to the patients."

Knox County Hospital has a wide variety of health care professionals. "Often the public thinks of hospital employees as nurses and technicians, but we have many other professionals whose job is vital to the welfare of the patient," Kuehler said.

Some of the services and the personnel at Knox County include:

Emergency Medical Service operates the ambulance for Knox County. Health care personnel in that service are Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) or Paramedics.

The dietary department is responsible for planning and preparing special diets and regular meals for patients and visitors at Knox County Hospital. Employees in that department include registered dietitians and cooks.

The business office prepares bills for the patient, the insurance companies, Medicare or Medicaid; and handles the paperwork for the patients' admission and discharge. Personnel in that area include those with training in accounting, computers and general office work.

Housekeeping is charged with cleaning the patient rooms, treatment rooms, and the public areas of the hospital. The department must follow prescribed steps in assuring that all areas meet strict standards for cleanliness. Housekeepers and technicians staff this department in the

Maintenance/Engineering Department takes care of the physical plant, the fire safety equipment, the plumbing, heating and cooling, the electrical system, and the grounds around the hospital. Technicians in the department are trained in all aspects of maintaining the plant.

The Nursing Department at Knox County has a variety of roles. Registered nurses, licensed vocational nurses and nurse aides care for patients in all area of the hospital. Nurses also work in specialized areas, such as infection control and risk management.

The Medical Records department transcribes and archives all written

results, physician comments, etc. Staff in that department receive special training in medical terminology and medical records technology. The Laboratory is responsible

for anatomical pathology and hematology, microbiology, chemistry and blood banking. The lab also adminsters EKGs (electrocardiograms) and is staffed by licensed medical lab technicians.

The Radiology Department provides routine radiology (x-rays), fluoroscopy, ultrasound and CT scans.

WTU's Electric Bill To Come In Envelope May 14

To provide extra convenience and more account information to the people it serves, West Texas Utilities Company has improved the monthly bill it mails to customers.


Beginning May 14 the postcardstyle bill customers have been receiving will change to a full-page, more detailed bill that will be mailed in an envelope. A return envelope will be enclosed for convenience when paying by mail. The most obvious change in the bill will be its appearance. The letter-sized format will be noticeably larger, with a detachable bill portion at the top and a detailed statement below. The top portion of the bill will be identified by WTU's logo and light blue color.

While the new bill is more attractive, its real purpose is to serve WTU customers more efficiently. The biggest change most customers will notice is how much more information the new bill provides about their accounts. "The new format has more space, so we can include additional information regarding each customer account," said Dick Evatt, area manager. "You'll see exactly how your bill is calculated with meter reading usage, fuel and other factors."

Now customers will see a detailed breakdown of their energy usage and rates, as well as how much they owe. The bill will also show more detailed information on other matters such as merchandise accounts.

WTU also is taking this opportunity to provide extra convenience to customers. In the past, customers have expressed a strong wish for a return envelope to be provided with their bills. Now that bills will be mailed in envelopes, WTU will be able to provide this requested service.

The return envelope will have a window. The top portion of the bill

you return to WTU, when placed correctly in the envelope, will position the address of your local WTU office in the window.

The full-page format fared well in selected customer testing early this year. WTU randomly chose 100 accounts company-wide to receive the new bill. Afterwards, each of the 100 customers was called personally and asked for reactions. Some of the features customers especially liked included:

* the new bill is easier to read;

* having the return envelope provided for them;

* the privacy of their account information going through the mail in a

sealed envelope; and

* having more detailed information about their accounts.

The only change customers should notice is more information and added convenience. There won't be an increase in customers' bill to pay for the new features.

Although the return envelope is provided for customer convenience, those who prefer to pay their bill in person at their WTU local office may continue to do so. Your favorite WTU office personnel can still take your payment in person. Customers with a question or comment about the envelope billing may call his or her WTU area office for more information.

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


