Under the direction of Manager Linda Haragan and Lifeguards Lance Haragan and Andy Williams, the pool will officially open on Memorial day with the traditional free 'Splash Day' of swimming. The pool will be open on Monday from 2:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. and everyone is invited to swim for free. Parents are reminded that this does not mean the pool is a free babysitting service. Those children who are not able to swim must be accompanied by an adult who can


The pool hours for the rest of the season will be from 1:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. each Tuesday thru Saturday, and from 2:00 p.m. until 5:00 p.m. on Sundays. The pool will be closed every Monday.

Admission is \$1.00 per person per day, and monthly passes for individuals and families will be available at a lesser, discounted rate.

Swimming lessons and pool parties will also be offered again this year. Lessons at the beginning and advanced levels will be offered by certified lifeguards, and the pool parties can be scheduled for a fee of \$30.00. That fee is for a time period of 1 1/2 hours in the evening after the pool has closed for the day.

Individuals who are no longer enrolled in a Texas public school and who wish to register to retake the exit level TEAMS or TAAS test(s) may pick up a registration packet at any high school campus, district central office, or education service center. The test registration form must be completed and returned in the preaddressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5:00 p.m., June 11, 1993.

These registration packets are ONLY for individuals who are not enrolled in a Texas public school. They are not needed by 10th, 11th and 12th graders currently enrolled who may need to take the summer assessment.

The tests will be administered in the W.R. Baker Auditorium on the Knox City High School campus beginning at 9:00 a.m. as follows: Writing - Tuesday, July 13; Reading -Wednesday, July 14; and Mathematics - Thursday, July 15.

Same tests will be administered on the same dates at the Benjamin High School Library beginning at 8:00 a.m.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals, You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

The value placed on your property.

Any exemptions that may apply to you.

The cancellation of an agricultural appraisal.

The taxable status of your property.

The local governments which should be taxing your property.

Any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

If you think that you have something wrong with the appraisal of your property, you may contact the Knox County Appraisal District. The telephone number is 454-3891. We will try to help you with these problems, but if we are unable to solve any questions that you have, you still have the right to file a protest with the Appraisal Review Board.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at P.O. Box 47, Benjamin, Texas, 79505.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

You can get more information by contacting your appraisal district at P.O. Box 47, Benjamin, Texas, 79505, Phone (817) 454-3891. You can also get a phamplet describing how to prepare a protest from the appraisal district or from the State Comptroller's Property Tax Division at 4301 Westbank Drive, Building B, Suite 100, Austin, Texas 78746-6565.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadline

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.



KNOX COUNTY WHEAT LOAN RATE

The wheat loan rate for Knox County has been announced at \$2.38 per bushel. This rate will vary from county to county due to difference in freight differentials to terminal markets.

You must be participating in the wheat program, or have eligible flex acres. Nine to ten months storage must be paid or arranged for up front in order to be eligible for a regular wheat loan. The loan matures at the end of the 9th month following the month of disbursement. The loan may be paid off (plus interest) at any time during the life of the loan or forfeited

Wheat must be stored in an approved UGSA warehouse in order to be eligible for loan.

If the price of wheat drops low enough, it appears that loan deficiency payments (LDP) will take effect similar to LDP under cotton. Bear in mind, beneficial interest must not have been lost in the commodity in order to be eligible for LDP or a regular loan.

SET-ASIDE (ACR) AND CUPAY ACRES

Livestock must be off of ACR and CUPAY acres by June 1 and stay off until November 1. Also, these acres cannot be baled during this same time

They are members of the First Christian Church in Knox City.

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
