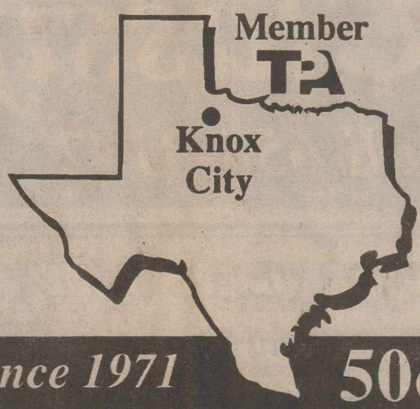

Hutchison Carries Knox County

State Treasurer Kay Bailey Hutchison carried Knox County in Saturday's Special Election to defeat appointed Democrat Bob Krueger for U.S. Senator. Governor Ann Richards had appointed Krueger to fill the seat vacated by Lloyd Bentsen, when he was appointed Secretary of the Treasury by President Clinton. Hutchison tallied 299 in Knox County to Krueger's 243.

Pink Ladies Buy Pulse Oximeter For Hospital

The Pink Ladies Auxiliary of Knox County Hospital recently presented administrator Stephen Kuehler with the funds necessary to buy a pulse oximeter for the hospital. President Peggy McGaughey presented money which volunteers raised from sales at their slightly-used clothing store, the downtown Thrift Shop.

The pulse oximeter measures a patient's blood oxygen level and pulse.

"Volunteers enhance the quality of care through special gifts such as the pulse oximeter," Kuehler said. "Our volunteers make such an invaluable contribution to our hospital and we are grateful for their dedicated service."

The Knox County Hospital Volunteer Auxiliary has 32 members.

"Our jobs would be much more difficult without the dedicated work of our volunteers," Kuehler added. "The time, energy and spirit of giving which they show is very rewarding for all of us."

Brown Recluse Spiders

... They're Back !!

"I've never seen the problem of Brown Recluse Spiders as bad as it is right now" was the way Larry Deering started a conversation with me this past Monday afternoon. Larry, an exterminator licensed by the State of Texas, was telling me about his recent encounters with the vicious and extremely dangerous spiders.

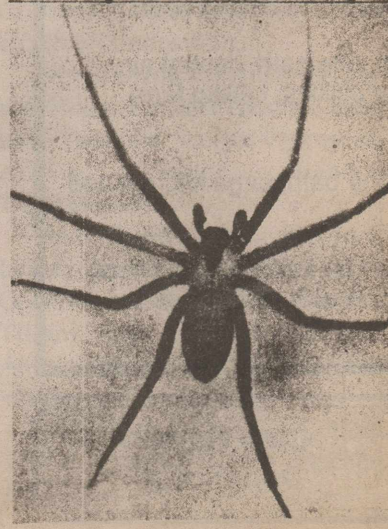
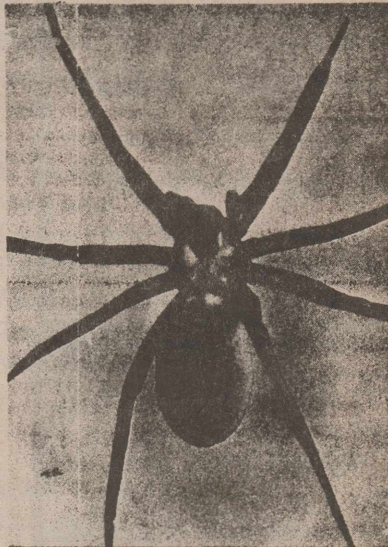
In recent weeks, Larry has had all the spraying work he could have ever hoped for in and around Knox City. Just about everywhere he has gone, he has found plain evidence that the spiders are out in full force, and according to Larry, "Worse than I've ever seen them before."

The *Loxosceles reculsa*, or brown recluse spider, is a big problem throughout Texas and this part of the country. A non-aggressive spider by nature, the brown recluse normally tries to avoid contact with humans. It prefers to hide in dark places, but will not hesitate to bite if handled, trapped with you in clothing, or flattened between you and some other object.

The bite of the brown recluse is especially dangerous to children, to the elderly, and to those in poor physical condition. Fatal reactions to the bites have been reported, but are rare. Normally, the bites are extremely painful, with intense local pain, blisters, inflammation of the affected area, and ulcerated sores that eat away at skin, muscle, and nerve tissue. The affected area is literally 'eaten away,' just as it would be if you dropped battery acid directly on your skin.

The brown recluse is naturally at home outdoors under rocks, under loose bark on a tree, or other sheltered areas. Other favorite spots for the spiders to hide is in old, abandoned buildings, storage sheds and wood piles. Most people bring them into a home on firewood that has been stacked outside, or inside clothing that has been left hanging in garages, barns, or other outbuilding storage areas.

Deering has had many calls in the area from people who have cedar or 'shake' shingles on their roofs, or on the sides of their houses. The spiders

get under the shingles and cedar shake and nest, with one female spider producing as many as 300 eggs in her lifetime. The development time from egg to mature brown recluse is about one year, with the spider able to remain active in temperature ranges from 40 to 110 degrees.

The spider is easily identified by the brown fiddle marking on its back. Actually, the fiddle shape is on the top of the spider, close to the front, with the larger portion of the fiddle design at the front of the spider, and the neck of the fiddle design pointing to the rear of the spider. The females

are usually larger and darker in color than the males, and are much more vicious than their male counterparts. Colors can range from a light brown to a dark gray, almost black color.

The brown recluse spiders can live several months without food. Because of this, the spiders are difficult to eliminate by merely trying to control the insects on which it preys. Larry Deering uses a powder or dusting method to control the spider.

The bite area of a brown recluse usually starts out looking like a whitehead or pimple. Then the infection spreads and that pimple form starts looking like a bulls-eye with red, irritated skin surrounding the bite area. When the pimple looking area bursts, it develops into an ulcerated area that, if not treated, just begins to literally eat its way through the skin, tissue and muscle - right down to the bone. If not treated right away, a full blown bite can eventually involve a lot of surgery with the entire area of skin, tissue and muscle being cut out to remove the toxin. If the toxin gets into your bloodstream, other symptoms can develop, ranging from an overall fatigued feeling to loss of memory and slurred speech.

If you suspect that you have been bitten by a brown recluse spider, the most important thing to remember is to seek medical help just as soon as you can. A lot of doctors don't know how to treat a brown recluse bite, many mistake it for other types of bites and prescribe the wrong forms of treatment. A doctor in Oklahoma, who is an expert on the treatment of recluse bites, informed me that it is amazing to him that modern medicine can replace hearts, and limbs, but no two doctors will agree on the treatment of a brown recluse bite. The best recommended form of action, and one used by Dr. W.F. Thompson right here in Knox City, is a shot of steroids right into the affected area within 24 hours of the bite, then a specimen of tissue and fluid samples is taken from the bite area and sent off to a laboratory for

Physician Assistant Here Through July 2

Training With Dr. Shirley Barretto

Eric Sloan will spend his last month of training as a Physician Assistant with Dr. Shirley Barretto in Knox County Hospital Emergency Room and at the clinics in Knox City and Munday. Sloan is coming as part of the Rural Preceptorship program at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center in Dallas.

"The Rural Preceptorship program is designed to let these students experience life in a rural community in hopes that this may spark in interest in the students settling in a rural area," Stephen Kuehler, administrator of the Knox County Hospital, said. "The student receive a unique family practice experience. Dr. Barretto will receive a helping hand and a chance to teach, and then our communities will learn more about Physician Assistants."

Sloan will spend June 7 through July 2 in Knox County.

The Physician Assistant training is a four-year program, which includes both classroom and clinical work. The study leads to a Bachelor of Science degree. Graduates of the program are eligible to sit for a national certification test.

The first formal training program for Physician Assistants was established in 1965. In 1977, the U.S.

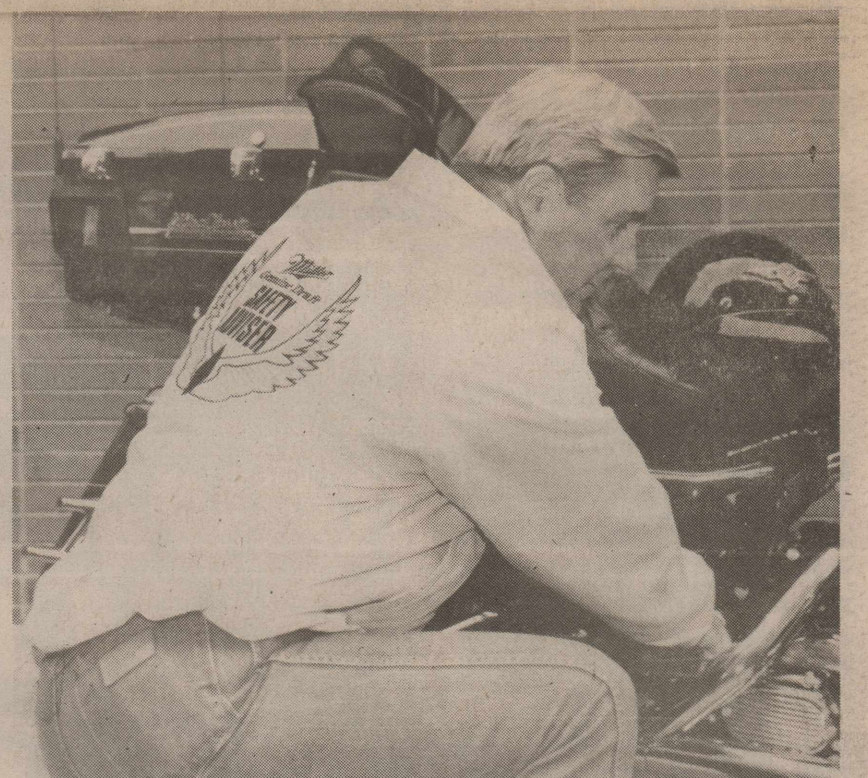
legislature enacted the Rural Health Clinic Services Act which required utilization of a mid-level practitioner, such as physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and nurse midwives. In more recent years, Physician Assistants in Texas have been given limited powers to write prescriptions. Their services can now be compensated by Medicare.

"Physician Assistants always work under the supervision of a physician," Kuehler said. "Although the profession is somewhat new to many people in this area, there are currently 1200 Physician Assistants practicing in Texas."

Physician Assistants can provide a wide range of primary medical care, consisting of taking medical histories, performing physical examination, ordering diagnostic tests, assisting in surgery, managing medical emergencies, as well as developing and implementing a treatment plans.

Thompson Is Safety Adviser On Harley-Davidson Reunion Ride

MILWAUKEE -- Miller Genuine Draft has teamed up with another made-in-Milwaukee institution this summer as the primary sponsor of Harley-Davidson's 90th Anniversary Reunion Ride benefiting the Muscular Dystrophy Association.

As part of a comprehensive plan, the two will conduct a variety of Reunion Ride activities including a recycling program and motorcycle safety instruction.

To promote safe and responsible cycling on the Reunion Ride, Dave Thompson, a motorcycle safety expert from Knox City, Texas, will ride along the San Antonio route as a Safety Adviser. Thompson is one of four Safety Advisers accompanying cyclists from starting-point cities to encourage safety for 60,000 cyclists enroute to Milwaukee, where the reunion celebration will take place on June 12. Starting points for the Reunion Ride include San Antonio, Orlando, Seattle, San Francisco, New York, Washington, D.C.; Kitty Hawk,

North Carolina; and three locations in Canada. All rides will converge in Milwaukee on Saturday.

"The sponsors recognize that there are safety concerns unique to a long-distance group ride and want to help ensure a safe roadway for both motorcyclists and other motorists," Thompson said. "As a Safety Adviser, it's my job to help educate cyclists about safe practices along the ride."

"The Safety Adviser program will promote safe and responsible cycling to bring this important aspect to the 60,000 riders traveling to Milwaukee for the June 12 event," Mark Ziskind of MGD.

In addition to the Safety Adviser program, a fund-raising recycling program, is being conducted with the proceeds of which will be donated to MDA. "We're proud to be a partner with our neighbors at Harley-Davidson, celebrating their rich heritage and supporting the Muscular Dystrophy Association," Ziskind said.

Dalton Hardin In Abilene Hospital

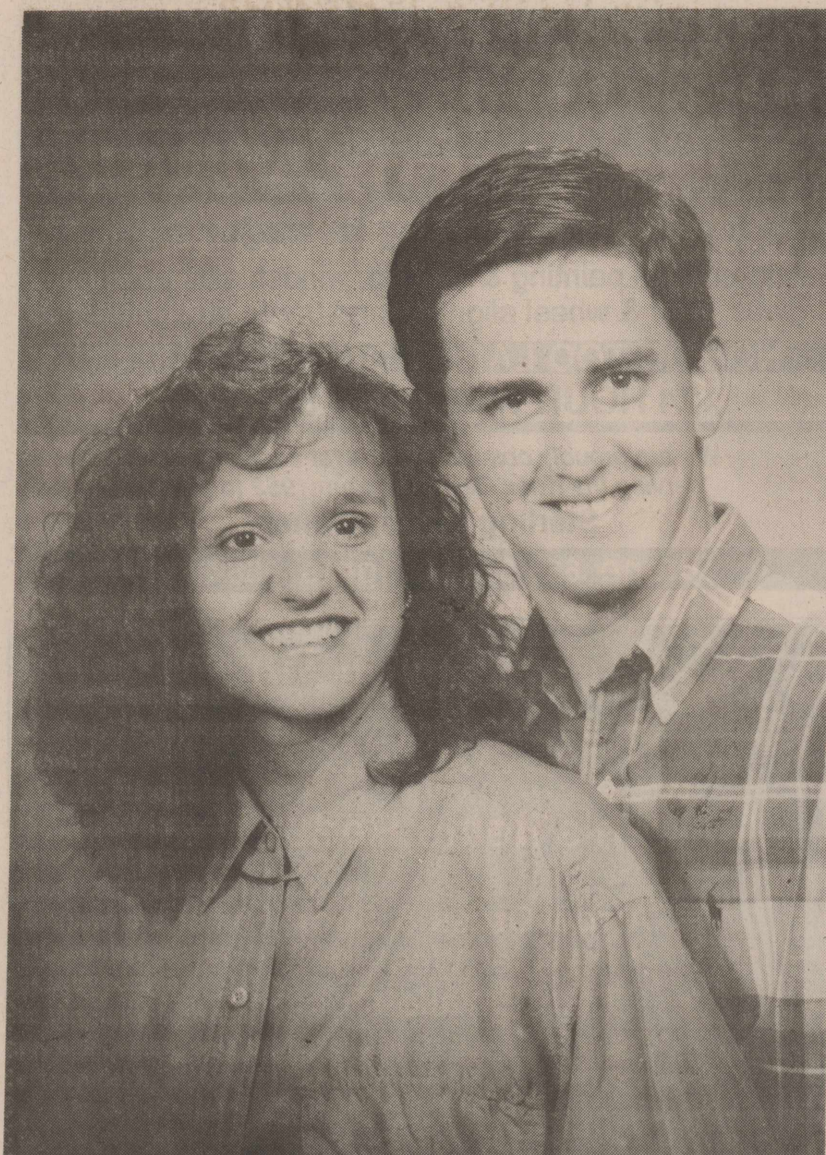

culturing to determine the exact form of medication needed for the bite. A special danger exists to those who might suffer a toxic reaction to the bite, in some cases this reaction can be fatal.

In my conversation with Larry Deering, he stated that most people do not realize what a danger this little brown spider really is. "If the Indians back in the old west could have taken the venom from brown recluse spiders and put it on arrow points, they would have won their wars," commented Larry. This problem is just too dangerous to fool around with, and the recent warm weather seems to have produced an explosion type of effect in our local brown recluse population. "The problem is the worst I've ever seen," stated Deering over and over, "People need to be very careful."

In our attempt to bring you this news, we here at the News office are not trying to promote the business of either Larry Deering or Dr. W.F. Thompson over anyone else in their professions. We are using them in this story because we know first hand that they have both had a lot of experience in dealing with the brown recluse spider.
