
By Dave Thompson "I've never seen the problem of Brown Recluse Spiders as bad as it is right now" was the way Larry Deering started a conversation with me this past Monday afternoon. Larry, an exterminator licensed by the State of Texas, was telling me about his recent encounters with the vicious and extremely dangerous spiders.

In recent weeks, Larry has had all the spraying work he could have ever hoped for in and around Knox City. Just about everywhere he has gone, he has found plain evidence that the spiders are out in full force, and according to Larry, "Worse than I've ever seen them before."

The Loxosceles reculsa, or brown recluse spider, is a big problem throughout Texas and this part of the country. A non-aggresive spider by nature, the brown recluse normally tries to avoid contact with humans. It prefers to hide in dark places, but will not hesitate to bite if handled, trapped with you in clothing, or flattened between you and some other object.

The bite of the brown recluse is especially dangerous to children, to the elderly, and to those in poor physical condition. Fatal reactions to the bites have been reported, but are rare. Normally, the bites are extremely painful, with intense local pain, blisters, inflammation of the affected area, and ulcerated sores that eat away at skin, muscle, and nerve tissue. The affected area is literally 'eaten away,' just as it would be if you dropped battery acid directly on your skin.

are usually larger and darker in color than the males, and are much more vicious than their male counterparts. Colors can range from a light brown to a dark gray, almost black color.

The brown recluse spiders can live several months without food. Because of this, the spiders are difficult to eliminate by merely trying to control the insects on which it preys. Larry Deering uses a powder or dusting method to control the spider.

The bite area of a brown recluse usually starts out looking like a whitehead or pimple. Then the infection spreads and that pimple form starts looking like a bullseye with red, irritated skin surrounding the bite area. When the pimple looking area bursts, it develops into an ulcerated area that, if not treated, justs begins to literally eat its way through the skin, tissue and muscle - right down to the bone. If not treated right away, a full blown bite can eventually involve a lot of surgery with the entire area of skin, tissus and muscle being cut out to remove the toxin. If the toxin gets into your bloodstream, other symptoms can develop, ranging from an overall fatigued feeling to loss of memory and slurred speech.

If you suspect that you have been bitten by a brown recluse spider, the most important thing to remember is to seek medical help just as soon as you can. A lot of doctors don't know how to treat a brown recluse bite, many mistake it for other types of bites and prescribe the wrong forms of treatment. A doctor in Oklahoma. who is an expert on the treatment of

and nest, with one female spider producing as many as 300 eggs in her lifetime. The development time from egg to mature brown recluse is about one year, with the spider able to remain active in temperature ranges from 40 to 110 degrees.

The spider is easily identified by the brown fiddle marking on its back. Actually, the fiddle shape is on the top of the spider, close to the front, with the larger portion of the fiddle design at the front of the spider, and the neck of the fiddle design pointing to the rear of the spider. Judy and Mike were here at the time she became ill. She was taken by ambulance to Abilene. From there she was moved by helicopter to Lubbock and later transferred to Zale Lipsky Hospital in Dallas for brain surgery. Marie explained that she had two aneurysms, one in the lower part and another in the upper part. She said it was possible for the surgeon to do both in one operation, but it was necessary to follow up with minor surgery.

She said Judy was to be moved within a day or so to Lubbock where she will undergo therapy, first as an in-patient and then as an out-patient. Judy and her husband Mike had just moved to Rotan where he is employed by the Soil Conservation

Service.







culturing to determine the exact form of medication needed for the bite. A special danger exists to those who might suffer a toxic reaction to the bite, in some cases this reaction can be fatal.

In my conversation with Larry Deering, he stated that most people do not realize what a danger this little brown spider really is. "If the Indians back in the old west could have taken the venom from brown recluse spiders and put it on arrow points, they would have won their wars," commented Larry. This problem is just too dangerous to fool around with, and the recent warm weather seems to have produced an explosion type of effect in our local brown recluse population. "The problem is the worst I've ever seen," stated Deering over and over, "People need to be very careful." In our attempt to bring you this news, we here at the News office are not trying to promote the business of either Larry Deering or Dr. W.F. Thompson over anyone else in their professions. We are using them in this story because we know first hand that they have both had a lot of experience in dealing with the brown recluse spider.
