Cotton Supply In U. S. Is Lowered

WASHINGTON.-The Bureau of Agricultural Economics, declared in a report vesterday on world cotton pro peets that the apparent supply in the United States on May I was approximately 10,300,000 bales This supply compares with 11,000,000 lakes in May 21, 1935, and an average of \$200,000 bales for the 10 years which ended in 1930.

Domestic cotton textile mill tivity was relatively high in May, but consumption was materially less than the unusually high level during May, 1933. With few exceptions sales of cotton textiles have been below production for many weeks

HITCH HIKERS

With the coming of summer a bumper crop of "thumbers" has appeared on the highways.

All automobile drivers are well acquainted with "thumbers," but for the benefit of those outside their ranks who may be uninitiated it might be explained that "thumbers" are hitch-hikers, a product of the automobile age. They are those individuals seeking to obtain free transportation by jerking their thumbs as motorists pass, and it has become quite an American custom.

The practice is not as harmless as it may sound, as many motorists have learned to their sorrow. It is true that the average hitch-hiker is a respectable, honest and worthy person, often a college student on his way back to college, but there are enough who have violated every principle of accommodation and courtesy, as to make it advisable for any drivers to refuse a lift to all thumbers no matter how worthy they appear.

Many automobile drivers sincerely regret passing up a hitch-hiker along the way, but every time they stop their car to take a stranger in they are running a risk.

An exchange puts it in this fashion: "Motorists who pick up hitch-hikers are taking a chance. An Oklahoma sheriff reports that a hitch-hiker has confessed the murder of a naval officer who offered him a ride. Other killings in various sections have been committeed by thumb jerkers. Robberies by these gentry are even more numerous. Moreover, motorists involved in accidents while transporting hitchhikers have had to pay enormous damages.

"Not every hitch-hiker is a potential killer, bandit or damage seeker, but the wise motorist will refuse to take chances with any of them.'

MAKE REPAIRS NOW

Much could be done toward relieving the unemployment situation in this and every other community if all who are able to do so would have needed repairs made about their homes and other buildings now, instead of waiting until later.

Nearly every property owner could do some remodeling, renovating, painting and the like to his own advantage, at the same time giving temporary employment to those in need. The unemployed want work, not charity. The acceptance of outright charity lowers a man's self respect, but he can work at any honorable task and still hold his head up. That is the idea which dominates the present nation-wide movement to make more jobs.

It is always good business to make needed repairs promptly, and a property owner today may have work done at an actual saving to himself, besides having the satisfaction of doing a worthy act in behalf of his less fortunate neighbor.

TO SAVE NIAGRA FALLS

After several years of discussion a treaty has been signed by Canada and the United States looking to the preservation of Niagra Falls and a joint board recommending a \$7,500,000 program for this purpose, after an investigation of conditions.

The rate of erosion was found by the board to be not so great as was feared, being only slight on the American side and from three to four feet in the Horseshoe. Extensive protective works were recommended, however, in connection with which it is believed that considerable additional water may be diverted for power purposes without affecting the scenic beauty of the Falls.

Much anxiety has been felt concerning the possibility of a serious impairment of the grandeur of this great natural spectacle, therefore the action of the two governments in providing for its preservation will be approved by the people of both countries.




