### **Hounds Keep On Winning**

Record of 14-4 Overall, 1-0 In District

The Knox City Greyhounds closed out non-district play last week with a 81 - 28 victory over Woodson and opened district play with a 63-46 win over the Aspermont Hornets here at the Knox City Gymnasium on Friday night. The wins improved the Hounds record to 14 - 4 overall and 1 - 0 in district.

The Greyhounds shot the ball well from both the floor and the free-throw line, hitting 48% and 71% respectively.

"The kids did a good job of taking what Aspermont gave us, normally we like to pound the ball inside, but Aspermont was constantly double and triple teaming Scott and Duane. Michael, Kevin and Lance did a good job hitting the open shot from the perimeter. Once again, it was a strong defensive effort that swung the game in our favor."

Scoring for the Greyhounds were Kevin Dorsey 7, Michael Frausto 7, Ryan Marion 2, Lance Dever 24, Wesley Holmes 2, Duane Toliver 10, and Scott Stephens 11. Stephens led the way

with nine rebounds and Toliver had six.

Out in Lubbock over the holidays, the Greyhounds lost to Lubbock High 73 -45 and then lost to Class 4-A Canyon Randall 71 -42. "I was a little disappointed in the fact that the scores weren't closer than they were, I don't feel either team was 30 points better than us. This was a good experience in that we got to play against people bigger and quicker than us - it should help us down the line."

Plans are being completed for the Knox City Livestock Show which has been scheduled for Thursday, January 13, in the bus barn on the Knox City campus.

The Knox County Junior Livestock Show, sponsored by Brazos Valley Young Famers, will be held in Knox City this year on Friday and Saturday, January 14-15 in the bus barn, also.

In local show, beginning at 6:30 p.m., broilers, rabbits, sheep, hogs, and beef will be exhibited by Knox City 4-H and FFA members, according to Leon Burkham, vocational ag teacher.

Burkham said that for the county show, all animals must be in place by 9:00 a.m. The lamb show will begin about 12:30 followed by the poultry show at 2:00 p.m. Burkham said the rabbit show would begin about 3:30.

On Saturday, the swine show will begin about 8:00 or 8:30 a.m., the beef show about 12:00 noon followed by the premium auction about 2:00 p.m.

Judges for the county show include David Finley, rabbits and poultry; Duane Gilley, sheep; Garth Priddy, swine; and Don Ballard, beef.

"The Commissioners Court of Knox County has the grave responsibility of using each tax dollar to its maximum return. It is my goal, if elected, to work with each



**ROBY-Thirtieth District State** Senator Steven A. Carriker has filed in the Democratic Primary for re-election to the office he has served in since 1988.



### By Knox City Police Department The Knox City Police Department recently reported statistical crime figures, with comparisons

between the years of 1992 and 1993. Figures turned in to the Knox County News office this week by Officer Jerry Don Walker showed a slight decrease in the number of calls answered by officers in 1993 compared to 1992, but a slight

increase in the number of crimi-

nal cases filed with city, county

and district judges. Areas showing significant increases were in the areas of crimes involving juveniles and complaints involving the crime of harassment. Crime categories on the increase were burglary of coin operated machines, misdemeanor assault, felony assault, sexual assault, felony theft, weapons offense, driving while intoxicated, public intoxication/disorderly conduct, criminal trespass, harassment, and reckless damage. New crimes reported in 1993 that were not reported in 1992 were reckless damage, unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, aggravated robbery, aggravated kidnapping, child neglect, and abandoned

Crimes areas reporting a decrease in 1993 were burglary of homes or buildings, burglary of a vehicle, misdemeanor theft, criminal mischief (misdemeanor), resisting or evading arrest, forgery, drug offenses, indecency with a child, solicitation of a child, injury to a child, reckless conduct, and misc. reported offenses.







### Reminder To Taxpayers

### **JANUARY 31, 1994**

IS THE LAST DAY TO PAY YOUR 1993 TAXES AND AVOID THE ADDITIONAL PENALTY AND INTEREST CHARGES

### HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1993. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1993, and before January 1, 1994, you need to apply for the additional over 65, \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown, between the dates of January 1,1994 and May 1, 1994. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

#### **AG-USE EXEMPTIONS**

Annual applications for qualifying land for agriculture use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1994 and May 1, 1994.

#### DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTION

These exemptions need to be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1993 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1994. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1994 and May 1, 1994.

#### RENDITIONS

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1994 and April 1, 1994.
