### **Speaker Appoints Counts**To Insurance Committees

AUSTIN - - Texas House Speaker Pete Laney has named Representative David Counts, D-Knox City, as co-chair of the Joint Interim Committee on Qualified Providers.

The six-member committee was established by HB 1461 and includes three House members and three senators. It will study the effect of requiring insurance policies and health maintenance plans to permit any qualified health services provider to participate as a contracting provider. A final report is due by December

Speaker Laney also named Representative Counts to the Select Committee on Insurance Rate and Policy Form Regulation. The nine-member committee, whose members are appointed by the speaker, lieutenant governor and governor, will look at how insurance rates are set and regulated in Texas.

It will consider whether the Texas Department of Insurance should focus less on rate setting and policy form and more on consumer services, companies' financial conditions and market conduct.

The degree of competition in the industry and the availability of auto insurance also will be considered. The committee was established by HB 1461. A final report is due by January 1,

"I know that Representative Counts will work hard on these important issues. I look forward to the final reports," Speaker Laney said.







#### Letter To The Editor

January 24, 1994 Benjamin, TX 79505

Dear Editor,

I am writing to you concerning a matter that has upset me greatly. It is pertaining to the Knox County Hospital. Let me begin by telling you exactly what happened, then I'm sure you will agree that I have reason to be upset.

On Friday evening, January 14, my husband and I took my brother, who is visiting us from Missouri, through the emergency room at Knox County Hospital. He had what turned out to be congestive heart failure and pneumonia. We knew he was badly swollen and was in extreme pain. Upon arrival at the hospital emergency room, we informed the nursing staff of his symptoms and gave them a list of medications he is currently taking. After taking his vitals, a doctor came in to check him. This person listened to his chest with a stethoscope then checked his ankle for fluid retention. This person commented at this time that, 'Yes, he does have a lot of fluid.' We told this person . . . Robert Fuller, by name . . . that my brother, Joe, was needing something for pain, that he was in intense pain. Fuller then ask what Joe's doctor in Missouri had prescribed. We told him but added that he had been out of this pain killer for about a week and that he had been using an over-the-counterbrand of Tylenol. At this point Fuller started telling us that the medication that Joe's doctor had prescribed was a narcotic and that he would not, quote, 'give it to just anyone that walked in off the street.' He then told us that he would prescribe an antibiotic for his "congestion"...please keep in mind it was congestive heart failure and pneumonia . . . but that he would not give him anything for pain. Not one time was anything mentioned about admitting him to the hospital where he could have supervised care. Instead this doctor was going to send him home with only an antibiotic.

We refused treatment and I told my brother in their presence that we would take him to another hospital for treatment. This we did. We took him to Seymour Hospital. When we got to the emergency room and explained Joe's symptoms, they immediately started an EKG, chest x-rays and different types of blood testing. He was admitted to the hospital and put in intensive care. He was kept in intensive care for three days with a diagnosis of congestive heart failure and pneumonia. His total hospital stay was 8 days.

I am very upset at the Knox County Hospital that they would have a physician like this and also that it is yours and my tax dollars that is paying him to be there. It is a very dangerous situation because people's lives are at stake. I consider that we were fortunate that something worse didn't happen to my brother because of the lack of care he received there. We were treated like drug addicts that had came in off the street trying to get

On Saturday, January 15, I contacted Stephen Kuehler, hospital administrator to inform him of the treatment... or lack of treatment... we had received. He apologized and said that he would get in contact with the center that sent Fuller to the hospital and see what they would do about it and would get back in contact with us, but as of today (10 days later) he has not done this. As of this writing we are undecided as to what further action we will take regarding this matter.

My thanks for allowing me to express my feelings to you.

Following the brunch, the meeting was called to order by Frances Dear, first vice-president. The Pledges to the American Flag and Texas Flag were led by Charlotte Patterson. Following the reading of the minutes of previous meeting by Winifred White and Federation Report by Lena McGee, election of officers for years 1994 through 1996 was held. Elected as president was Frances Dear, first vice-president - Olien Elmore, second vice-president - Lena McGee, secretary - treasurer -Winifred White. Installation of these elected officers and the ones to be appointed will be in May.

Roll call was answered by naming an American Indian tribe.

Frances Dear, director, then presented Janoma Stephens, who gave information concerning the Native Americans. According to World Book Encyclopedia the story of the American Indians began thousands of years ago. Scholars know little about these first Americans. Scientists have had to dig their story from the earth itself. Pottery, stone tools, bones of men and animals, charcoal of campfires - - all of these have offered clues about how and when the early Americans lived. Many questions remain unanswered yet.

After the Ice Age, million years ago, as the ice melted and the water receeded, plants started to grow on this new land; and animals began to cross it in both directions, grazing on the vegetation. Some people of Siberia followed the animals that they hunted, for food, so they crossed to this new land, possibly by way of the Bering Strait.

These Native Americans, when America was discovered became known as Indians. Some tribes or bands were farmers, some were hunters and some fishermen. Most were on the move never staying too long due to the source of food.

Music, it seems, has always been important as was painting. Some call the Indians, Redskins, but their skin was brown, unless painted with paint made of clay, herbs, etc.

After the Explorers brought horses were the Indians able to follow the buffalo herds. These buffalos provided not only food, but their skins were used as clothing and sometimes covering for teepees.

As America became more populated by so-called white men, the Indians were pushed farther away from their source of means of life. Finally many were placed on reservations. Today there are 275 reservations in the U.S. Many Indians choose to live on these reservations and practice cultures of their forefathers. Is it thought that 793,000 Indians are now living in United States. Only since 1924 all Indians born in U.S. are citizens. How about that? Since there were here many many years before any Europeans found this Great Land. Many legends are connected to the Indians.

Wedo need to know more about his great nation we take for granted.
