

Brush Fire Flares To 32,000-Acre Ruin

Treks Through King and Knox Counties

Helicopters dropped 300-gallon buckets of water Monday on a range fire sparked by a university's weekend brush control experiment.

According to the Division of Emergency Management, Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin Tuesday at noon, the wildfire which began Saturday near Guthrie could be contained as early as today. The fire has burned approximately 32,000 acres in the northwest quadrant of Knox County and the northeast quadrant of King County. The fire zone roughly is bordered by U.S. 82, South; U.S. 83, West; and Highway 6, East.

A Lubbock Department of Public Safety trooper confirmed that King County Judge Kerry Havins has signed a disaster declaration for imminent fire threat and existing damage Sunday night in his county. The fire primarily affected

the northwest quadrant of Knox County and the northeast quadrant of King County, located in Knox and King Counties, roughly bordered by U.S. 82, South; U.S. 83 West; and Highway 6, East.

About 300 firefighters - including squads from the National Guard - managed 70-percent containment over the fire by noon Monday, the Department of Public Safety reports.

The blaze in King and Knox counties started Saturday when flames jumped safety barriers set up by Texas Tech University students on the Masterson Ranch near Guthrie.

"We were doing a prescribed burn to basically control the brush and increase the grass production," Henry Wright, a professor of range and wildlife management, said. "The purpose was to get rid of the juniper and enhance the grass production."

Wright blamed an unexpected "fire whirl" that spun across a precautionary fire line 400 feet wide. Winds up to 20 mph whipped the flames beyond what Texas Tech's pumper crew could reach, he said.

The fire consumed pastures and drifted into canyons east of Guthrie.

One man suffered smoke inhalation while battling the fire and no other injuries were reported, although some cattle died.

Some barns and at least one tractor used to combat the blaze were destroyed and at one point the Knox County town of Truscott was in danger, but the wind shifted to the north.

Local fire departments are from Knox County including Knox City, Munday, Benjamin and Goree and the counties of Baylor, Cottle and Foard as well as the

Burnett 6666 Ranch Winner Of 1993 AQHA Best Remuda Award

Presented By American Quarter Horse Association

AMARILLO, Texas - - The legendary Burnett 6666 Ranch was the recipient of the 1993 Best Remuda Award presented by the American Quarter Horse Association during an awards presentation in conjunction with the 1994 National Cattlemen's Association Convention in Reno, Nevada. The Best Remuda Award is presented to the ranch judged to have the best remuda, or band of ranch horses.

AQHA Second Vice President Rob Brown presented the specially-commissioned bronze to Glenn Blodgett, DVM, manager of the 6666 Ranch. Featuring a cowboy roping a ranch gelding from the remuda, the bronze was created by Texas artist Lisa Perry.

Founded by Captain Samuel "Burk" Burnett in 1870, Burnett Ranches is one of the largest individually-owned ranches in Texas, with more than 350,000 acres and divisions in the north central plains towns of Guthrie, Panhandle and Granbury. Today, Burnett Ranches is owned and operated by Anne Windfohr Marion, Burk Burnett's great granddaughter.

The 6666 Ranch horses carry an "L" brand in honor of Burk Burnett's father-in-law Captain M.B. Lloyd. Featuring the bloodlines of such famous sires as Joe Hancock, Hollywood Gold and Cee Bars, the 6666 horses have competed in ranch-type competition, rodeos 4-H and AQHA events winning numerous awards. Cowboys mounted on horses carrying the L brand have won the Top Horse award at the Texas Ranch Roundup in Wichita Falls, Texas; Western Heritage Classic in Abilene, Texas; and The Outfit

Coors Ranch Rodeo in Amarillo, Texas. Burnett 6666 Ranch-bred horses have also accumulated AQHA points in cutting, reining and heeling. The 6666 Ranch recently added racing's all-time leading sire Dash For Cash, Streakin Six and Special Effort to their list of sires, and have re-entered American Quarter Horse racing.

Other ranches nominated by state NCA affiliates include T-Cross, Colorado; D-Bar Ranch, Florida; Bar-B Ranch, Fisher Ranch and Stuart Ranch, Oklahoma; ZX Ranch, Oregon; Crago Cattle Co., South Dakota; King Ranch, Pitchfork Land and Cattle Co., Texas; and Taylor Creek Ranch, Utah.

Judging for the Best Remuda Award is based equally on the historical significance of the ranch, quality and/or reputation of their remuda, and, accomplish-

ments by ranch horses in AQHA shows, rodeos and related events. Judges for the 1993 award were Craig Haythorn of Haythorn Land & Cattle Company in Nebraska, 1992 Best Remuda Award winner; AQHA Director Jerry Kaufman; AQHA Director Duane Walker of Kansas; AQHA Inspector Jim Wright of Texas; AQHA Past President Bill Englund of Arizona; and AQHA Past President Bill Reed of New Mexico.

Each state NCA affiliate is encouraged to nominate up to three ranches for the 1994 "Best Remuda Award" to AQHA prior to November 1, 1994. The minimum requirements are that the ranch must have current AQHA and NCA membership, and maintain at least 10 registered American Quarter Horses for production of ranch horses. A ranch may only win the award once.

communities of Aspermont, Guthrie, Haskell, Paducah, Rochester and Seymour. Some firefighters are local residents and farmers without formal fire fighting training.

State assistance includes the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS), Division of Emergency Management (DEM), Texas Forest Service (TFS), Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT), Civil Air Patrol (CAP), and Adjutant General's Department (AGD).

DEM Regional Liaison Officers from both Lubbock and Midland were sent to the area to provide coordination assistance.

Governor Ann Richards ordered the National Guard into the fire area to provide firefighting water drops and aerial reconnaissance to hard hit areas.

The Salvation Army has provided food to firefighters on the scene. Local residents and businesses have joined forces in the support effort to help feed the estimated 100 State and local firefighters on the scene.

program for Physician Assistants was established in 1965. In 1977, the U. S. Legislature enacted the Rural Health Clinic Services Act which required utilization of a mid-level practitioner, such as physician assistants, nurse practitioners, and nurse midwives. In more recent years, Physician Assistants in Texas have been given limited powers to write prescriptions. Their services can now be compensated by Medicare.

"Physician Assistants always work under the supervision of a Physician," Kuehler said. "Although the profession is somewhat new to many people in this area, there are currently 1200 Physician Assistants practicing in Texas." Holmes completed three years of training in the Physician Assistant Program School of Allied Health Professions at Saint Louis University in Saint Louis, Missouri. During his training he served rotations in internal medicine, general surgery, pediatrics, primary care, emergency medicine, orthopedics, OB/GYN, and psychiatry. He has a Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology from South Dakota State Univer-

sity in Brookings, South Dakota.

He has been working as an orthopedic physician assistant with the Aberdeen Association of Or-

thopedic Surgeons in Aberdeen, South Dakota.

He and his wife Lynn have one child, Ashley. They will make their home in Munday.

Kite Flying Safety Tips From WTU

Spring is in the air, and so is the wind. It's the perfect opportunity for kids to fly their kites. West Texas Utilities Company reminds kids, and adults too, there are certain safety precautions that should be taken concerning kites and power lines.

* Never use wire, tinsel or any metal in kites or string -- they can conduct electricity.

Businesses Must Render Property

Texas businesses must render their property with the county appraisal districts by a new deadline, according to State Comptroller John Sharp. Beginning in 1994, state law changed the rendition deadline to April 14. Previous deadline was April 1.

To 'render' means to list all taxable property that businesses owned or managed as of January 1, 1994.

While state law requires business owners and operators to render, any property owner including homeowners, farmers, and ranchers may render their property with appraisal districts.

"Homeowners who render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers," Sharp noted. "They are insuring that the appraisal district has their correct address so they will receive notice of any actions that will affect their property or tax bills."

If the tax collector cannot deliver a tax bill because of an incorrect address, the property owner is responsible for paying the taxes, plus the late payment penalties, according to Sharp.

State law requires anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property as of January 1, to render with their appraisal district "For example, businesses must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible personal property by filing this annual report," Sharp said. "Appraisal districts use the

reports to set business property values. When a business owner doesn't render his or her property, the chief appraiser estimates the value."

If a property owner had property damage from storm, fire, or flood last year, a special decreased value report could lower their taxes, Sharp explained.

Advertise Your Differences

Advertise the advantages of your business by emphasizing how your service or product differs from its competitors. The distinctive features of your product or service will appeal to customers and give them incentive to buy from you.

To develop an effective advertising strategy: first, evaluate the benefits that existing competitors are offering and advertising to attract their customers; second, examine the most current market research that is available about your customers. Look for areas where you offer something unique or something more than the competition offers.

Advantages that can be advertised and promoted are of two types: the unique qualities of your business and the ability to fulfill a specific need. Examples of the first type of advantage are:

"Established in 1924" implies longevity in the marketplace and provides potential customers with a sense of security about your product. This type of distinction will be particularly effective if new competitors have entered the market.

"Find everything you need in one place" suggests to the customer that it is not necessary to visit several stores to find what is needed. If your business covers many aspects of one industry, say so.

"We specialize in Widgets" indicates that you are a specialist. You offer the most complete knowledge about the product and any special product parts. In such an advertising approach, you are relying on the reputation of the product.

"Over 1 thousand satisfied customers" implies acceptability by your customers. This type of statement tells potential customers that your business is well established.

The second type of advantage that can be advertised depends on appealing to customer's needs. Such an approach indicates that you really care about your customers and are willing to cater and adapt to their interests. Examples of these approaches are:

"Quicker service" indicates fast and efficient service. If your market research indicates that your customers value their time, implement a plan to raise the speed of your customer service.

"Open early/late" or "Open weekends" indicates extended business hours and provides extra flexibility for customers with busy schedules or who work long hours.

"Satisfaction Guaranteed" or "Satisfaction, or your money back" suggest a commitment to your product and provides customers with an added sense of confidence. Not everyone in the market is willing to take on this type of obligation and it can be extremely effective.

"Customer Support Service" implies that you are concerned about customer satisfaction and are willing to offer services to help please your customers.

"Free Delivery" will be especially attractive to customers who do not have a truck or automobile to transport their purchase especially if it is something large like furniture or a TV.

Identify and advertise the unique aspects of your business. They will help you to attract new customers, increase sales volume and achieve the growth objectives of your business.
