## Ministerial Alliance To Feature The *Imperials* In Concert

Once again, the Knox City Ministerial Alliance is combining efforts to bring gospel music to Knox City and the surrounding area. The alliance has announced that the world famous 'Imperials' will be performing here in Knox City, on Thursday, May 5, at 7:00 P.M.. The concert has been scheduled into the W.R. Baker Auditorium on the Knox City School campus.

The Imperials recently celebrated their 30th year of ministering the gospel through recordings, television, and personal appearances all over the United States and beyond its borders to many other countries. Although the members have changed through the years, the quality, sound and popularity has been received and appreciated. The name 'Imperials' has become a household word in the Christian community.

The group has many credits behind them. They have been awarded 4 Grammies from NARAS and 13 Dove Awards from GMA. They have also been Group Of The Year 8 different times, and continue to have songs in the top 10 radio charts all over the country.

Setting the tone for contemporary Christian music, the Imperials are as popular now as they have ever been. Having evolved from a conservative, traditional southern gospel quartet to a thoroughly hip pop vocal group, the Imperials can rightly claim to have drawn the blueprints for contemporary Christian music.

Armond Morales, the only original remaining member of the group, can remember back to the time Elvis Presley asked the Imperials to tour with him. "Elvis was a major Southern gospel fan," Morales said. "We did all his concert dates and recordings during that time, and one movie. It was exciting. He loved our singing, and we got to be very close friends. He was a very regular guy to us. I just don't know what happened to him between 1971, when we left, and the time he passed away. It was a shock. He still called me on my birthday up

until the year he died."

The group now includes David Wills, a veteran of 19 years, and relative newcomers Steve Ferguson and Jeff Walker. All four members are ordained ministers.

Speaking about the Imperials game plan, Morales makes it clear that the group does not subscribe to the theory that gospel artists need to dilute the spiritual content of their work to reach broader audiences. "Our calling goes way back into the church," he said. "Some people are of the opinion that you need to tone the message down to make people like you, then tell them about Christ. We've never felt that way. As far as we're concerned, the Gospel message can't be conveyed too strongly."

Remember, The Imperials will perform in Knox City on Thursday, May 5,7:30 P.M. at the W.R. Baker Auditorium. The concert is sponsored by the Knox City Ministerial Alliance. Admission is free. A love offering will be taken.

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
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
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## KC Police Report For March, '94

During the past couple of months, there have been an unusually large number of skunk reports in and around Knox City. Part of the reason for the skunks roaming so much is that this time of the year is the mating season for skunks. Another possible reason could be that several old houses in the city limits have been removed, making it more difficult to find a place to den up. If a skunk or any other wild animal, while denned up for the day time, is disturbed or run away from its hiding place, it naturally is going to be confused and will be anxiously seeking another spot. Normally, most wild animals will

lar animal is seen prowling in town in the bright daylight, it should be assumed, for your own protection, that the animal is rabid. A rabid animal is likely to bite a pet dog or cat, and in turn these domesticated animals may bite and infect a child or anyone handling the pet. If a human is around or aggravating a rabid animal, the infected animal is very likely to attack and can inflict a severe injury very quickly. If an infected animal is suspected, do not attempt to catch the animal. Call 911 and someone will be contacted to deal with it. Making sure your pets have been vaccinated is good insurance that rabies will not be spread to your pets. If you suspect that your pet has had an encounter with a skunk or other such animal, whether or not your pet has been vaccinated, take it as quickly as possible to the nearest veterinarian for attention, rather than waiting for the common symptoms of foaming at the mouth, having fits, etc. Anyone who would like more information on possible rabid animals may contact this department for a brochure or booklet. They are free as a public service.
