CO-OPERATION NEEDED

The United States News, published by David Lawrence in Washington, and claiming to be a medium of accurate and unbiased information regarding the activities and operations of the national government, said in a recent issue:

"The theory on which officials are working is that with billions about to flow into the pockets of farmers and workers on CWA and PWA enterprises, private business will be stimulated greatly.

"Then demand for labor will be counted on to pick up.

"Under codes, hours now are restricted so that work will be spread as industry seeks to fill the new demands for its goods."

That is the theory. It is the basis of all vast endeavor that President Roosevelt has undertaken for our national rehabilitation and recovery, and as the theory works itself out, as there is good reason to believe it will, there will come the gradual transfer of the burden of unemployment from public enterprise to private industry. It is understood that the President hopes he will be able to begin the transfer of this load by the middle of next summer, and that by the end of another year the job will have been virtually completed.

We should bear in mind, however, that the combined efforts of the President and the Congress cannot accomplish the monumental task which has been undertaken without the enthusiastic and whole-hearted support of all classes of citizens. Workers, employers, business men, politicians, farmers—in fact unemployed as well as the employed must enter into the effort and help put it over. He who attempts to rock the boat in this emergency to advance partisan ends is not loyal to his country.

AGE AND EFFICIENCY

The late William James, reputedly the greatest American psychologist, is said to have declared that most men are old fogies at the age of 25. Bruce Barton interprets this statement to mean that by the age of 25 most men have formed permanent prejudices and have closed their minds to all new ideas.

If this theory be correct, which we do not believe, there are certainly many striking exceptions. Many men long past the age mentioned have struck out into new fields of endeavor and have developed abilities in later life of which they gave little promise in their youth.

As to the continuance of executive and creative activities to ripe old age, innumerable examples may be cited. Consider Oliver Wendell Holmes, an active member of the Supreme Court of the United States until he was past 80; President Hindenburg, of Germany, at 86; Thomas A. Edison, who continued at work until a short time before his death at 84. The list might be continued almost indefinitely.

Some other notables who prolonged their activities far beyond the allotted span of three score and ten may also be mentioned. Sophocles finished his "Oedipus at Colonus" at 90; Michael Angelo did some of his best work after he was 80; Clemenceau wrote his memoirs at 84; Tennyson wrote his lyric masterpiece, "Crossing the Bar," after he was 80; Goethe completed "Faust" at about the same age.

If these grand old men ever heard of psychologists it is evident that they did not take them too seriously.

A SIGN OF RECOVERY

It is worth remembering that not all of the vast amount of money spent by the Federal government in the past year is going to prove a complete loss. Some of it is coming back, and recently it has been coming back at a pretty lively rate.

Harvey Couch, head of the directors of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation, reveals that the RFC is now collecting fully \$1,000,000 a day from its borrowers. The corporation has loaned something more than three billions in its career, and more than a third of that already has been paid back.

Not only does this indicate that a severe strain on the treasury is being lessened, but it is an excellent sign of reviving business, and when Mr. Couch adds that applications for loans totalling \$330,000,000 recently have been canceled, it becomes apparent that prosperity is on the way back at a fairly rapid gait.

VATICAN CITY.—Pope Pius delivered a warning Jan. 27 against materialism, paganism, atheism, Communism and Protestantism to an audience of 300 Holy Year pilgrims from South America.

"There are many perils," said the Pontiff, "in the spirit of Communism, materialism, and atheism which attempt to penetrate the soul of the family and lead it to destruction. He said Protestant proselytism was particularly dangerous, because, "while it does not succeed in destroying faith, it generates an indifference which produces so much bad in the spirit and annuls the precious treasure of Christian life."
