Youngest American Citizen To Ever Become Certified

Rick Wupperman, Manual Therapy Clinical Specialist at Seton Northwest Sports Medicine Center in Austin, gained certification in Orthopedic Medicine and Manual Therapy of the Extremities by the International Academy of Orthopedic Medicine.

He became the 18th United States physical therapist certified by the IAOM, based in Schoten, Belgium. At 26, he also became the youngest-ever United States member.

To attain certification by the IAOM, health care professionals must complete the American Academy of Orthopedic Medicine's series of six advanced courses, and then pass an intensive one-day examination on each joint of the upper and lower extremities. Topics include functional and surface anatomy, biomechanics and pathomechanics, diagnostic orthopedic examination techniques, and treatment concepts.

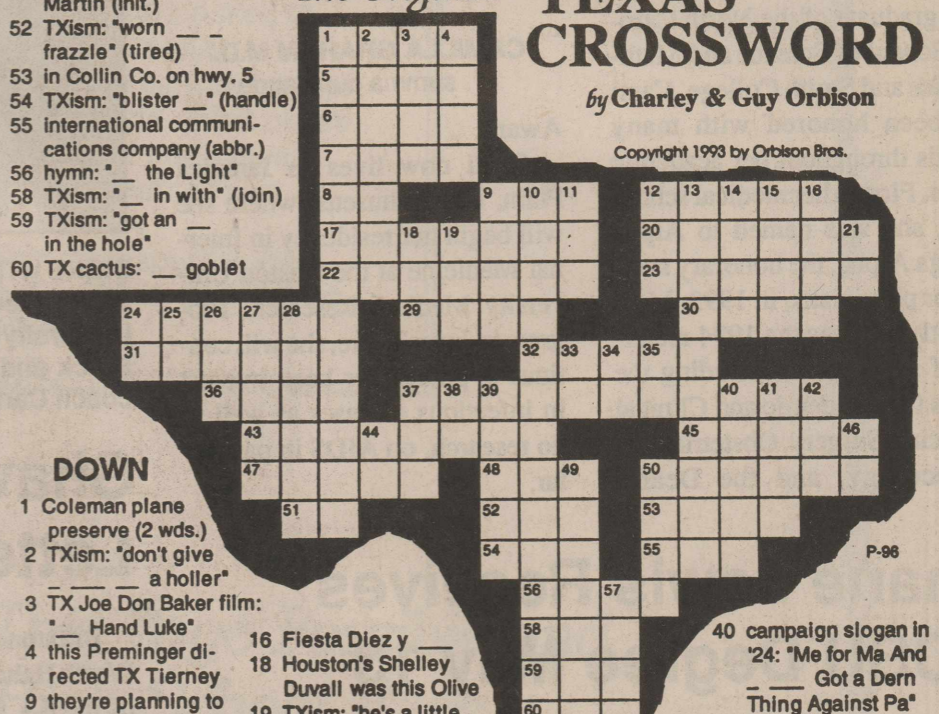

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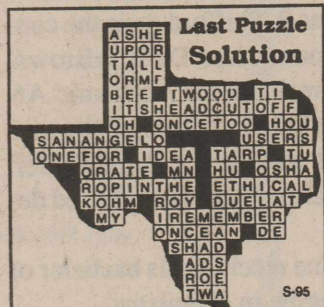

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.

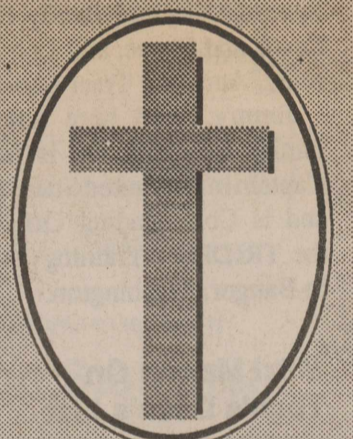

WTRC Adaptive Devices Staff Makes Life Easier For KC Woman

Waynell Clark of Knox City rests easier these days because the people in West Texas Rehabilitation Center's adaptive devices department built a wheelchair that exactly fits her needs.

"I have never seen her so comfortable in all her 56 years," wrote Ramona Helms of Knox City, one of her sisters, to Jeff Day, WTRC adaptive coordinator. "Thank God for people like you . . . that can make handicapped people comfortable."

The new chair "has made her disability more tolerable," wrote another sister, Mrs. L.B. Baty Jr. of San Angelo.

Customized wheelchair beds, seating systems, tables and other "helps" for the handicapped are all in a day's work for the adaptive devices shop.

Headed by James McBryde, adaptive crews in Abilene and San Angelo combine training, ability and creativity to fashion comfort for Rahab patients. Whatever the need, they will figure out a way to build it, adapt it, bend it, pad it or somehow finagle it into existence.

WTRC's shop "is leading the way in the field of specialized wheelchair seating and adaptive devices technology," McBryde noted.

The shop now sells and installs Braun wheelchair lifts and other devices for drivers with special needs, does custom work for schools, homes and medical facilities to ease the lives of the handicapped and repairs equipment such as hydraulic lifts, hand controls and - - of course - -

wheelchairs.

Following recent Medicaid rulings, when a physician orders a wheelchair for a young Medicaid patient, a newly organized wheelchair team at WTRC evaluates the child's needs for the adaptive devices department.

Judy Perkins, assistant physical therapy chief at the San Angelo campus, said the system is used as well for non-Medicaid youngsters.

The team includes the child's parents, teacher, consultant and physical therapist. An occupational therapist also may be involved, and Parent Case Management is called in for children age 3 and under.

An evaluation considers a vast array of factors: Will the child use the chair more at home or at school; is a lap tray needed to hold a computer or language board; are special switches or positioning devices needed for the chair arms; are hallways and doorways at home and/or at school narrow or wide; are there steps at front or back door; is the child transported in a small car or a large van.

Cushioning must be designed to prevent spinal abnormalities or pressure sores. "You want them to sit correctly so they are able to learn," Ms. Perkins explained, "and the chair must be cost-effective in terms of growing with the child. These chairs cost from \$1,500 to \$2,000. We are all very award of the (Medicaid) funding and expense, and as a team we want to save as much money as possible."

KC Woman Elected To State Office As GFWC Recording Secretary

Janoma Stephens has been elected recording secretary of the GFWC Texas Federation of Women's Clubs for the 1994-1996 term. She was elected on May 10 at the 97th annual convention held at the Marriott Bayfront Hotel in Corpus Christi, and on May 11, the installation was held in the historical Henrietta Memorial Center, the huge old ice house which the King Ranch bought and restored, in Kingsville.

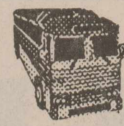
