Tough Laws To Be Enforced On 4th Of July Fireworks, Fires

Knox City Fire Marshal Roland Marion has announced that laws regarding fire works and fires caused by fireworks will be strictly enforced during this Fourth of July Holiday period. Laws already on the books state that any person who starts a fire by the use of fireworks can be held responsible for the complete cost of all fire related damage. That includes the damage cost of crops, land, property and fire equipment property damaged in the fire.

Marion emphasized that violators would be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law and their careless actions could cost them (or their parents in the event of juvenile offenders) a lot of money. These steps are being taken in response to the high cost of fighting the fires during the same period last year. The city and county saw costs in excess of \$2,000 to fight fires last year. The Munday Fire Department suffered damage to a truck and the department was out the expense of repairs, all because of a careless fireworks related fire.

If no rain is received during the next week, there is a great probability that an emergency no burn law could be enacted prior to the holiday period. That law prohibits any outdoor burning and was placed into effect during the long, hot dry spell last year that included the Fourth of July period.

Knox City has a fireworks law already in place that prohibits the use of any fireworks within the city limits.

This article in *The Knox County News* is the only advance 'warning' that violators would get. "If you use fireworks and start a fire, you had better be prepared to pay for all damages and costs involved with the fire itself and the cost of fighting the fire, stated Marion." He went on to say that "anyone caught using fireworks and starting fires will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law and made to pay damages, with parents held responsible for fires and damages caused by their children."

In an area wide meeting of Little League officials in Seymour this past Sunday, Knox City's Robins Field was selected as the site for the 1994 Girls (11-12) District Softball Tournament.

Set to begin on Monday, July 4, the tournament will feature teams from Jacksboro, Munday, Sheppard Air Force Base, Iowa Park and Knox City. The tournament could last until Monday, July 11.

Bringing 70 players, 10 coaches and managers, and all their families and friends to our community over a four day period will be a small shot in the arm for our local economy.

Representative Counts Votes To Keep Agencies

AUSTIN - Representative David Counts of Knox City, member of the Sunset Advisory Commission, voted Thursday to extend the life of three state agencies and proposed changes to improve the agencies' operations.

Agencies recommended to be continued are the Texas Commission on the Arts, the Texas State Library and Archives Commission, and the Texas Food and Fibers Commission.

Other major proposals adopted by the Sunset Commission would:

- * require appointment of residents from rural counties to the Texas Commission on the Arts;

- * authorize the Texas State Library to create a state-funded grant program that targets local library needs;

- * provide more flexibility to local governments for records retention;

- * increase public access to state agency electronic publications through a centralized on-line com-

puter index.

The 10-member Sunset Commission is a legislative body that reviews state agencies once every 12 years to determine if the agency and its programs are still needed and to identify changes to improve the agency's efficiency and effectiveness. The Commission's recommendations will be considered by the full legislature during the next legislative session, which begins in January.

Members of the Sunset Commission are Senator Ken Armbrister (Victoria), chairman, Senator Carl Parker (Port Arthur), Senator Mike Moncrief (Fort Worth), and Senator David Sibley (Waco); Representative Layton Black (Goldthwaite), vice-chairman, Representative David Counts (Knox City), Representative Patricia Gray (Galveston), and Representative Barry Telford (DeKalb); and public members Chuck Bailey (Austin) and Mike Sims (Houston).

Osteoporosis May Be Prevented

(NU) - Osteoporosis, one of the most debilitating and costly diseases striking the elderly, may be prevented, according to Dr. Arthur Weaver, spokesperson for the American College of Rheumatology.

Osteoporosis is a decrease in bone mass and strength that makes bones brittle and susceptible to breaking.

The body can store calcium, the building block for bones, until about age 35. After that, bones begin to lose density. Some people lose calcium at a higher rate, and their bones become brittle.

A variety of medical and lifestyle factors may increase bone loss, making osteoporosis worse. These include:

- Early menopause.
- High consumption of alcohol.
- Cigarette smoking.
- Loss of menstrual periods.
- Certain medications.
- Low dietary calcium, especially during adolescence or young adulthood.
- Lack of exercise.

People with these risk factors should be concerned about developing osteoporosis. They should talk to their doctor about bone density tests to detect the disease in its early stages when therapy can prevent further damage.

"People should not wait until they have symptoms of osteoporosis to seek treatment," Dr. Weaver said. "Too often, the first symptom is a broken hip or vertebra."

Affordable Paradise: Hawaii

(NU) - Ed Hogan, founder of the largest travel company to Hawaii, is known as "Mr. Tourism Hawaii." The state Senate accorded Hogan that title for his pioneering efforts in making the Islands an affordable paradise for visitors.

Statistics provided by Hogan's firm, Pleasant Hawaiian Holidays, indicate that 37 percent of the people who travel with the company are members of frequent-flier programs. A flight to Hawaii from the West Coast adds almost 3,000 miles of credit.

Even before frequent flyers flocked to Hawaii, the Islands had their share of famous visitors. One, author Herman Melville, who wrote about that great white whale Moby Dick, spent 16 days in Lahaina on Maui in 1943. Appropriately, he arrived on a whaling ship.

Another famous traveler to the Islands was "Treasure Island" author Robert Louis Stevenson, who visited during the latter part of the last century and became friends with then-King Kalakaua.

Then there was Charles Lindbergh, who flew nonstop from New York to Paris in 1927 aboard the "Spirit of St. Louis." He liked the Islands so much he bought a home on Maui and is now buried on the Island in a church graveyard.

Tips for Balancing Work/Family

(NU) - More than 60 percent of American workers struggle to balance child- or elder-care responsibilities with their jobs.

If you are one of them, here are some tips for managing the balancing act:

- Consider working less than full time. Craft a proposal for job sharing, a shortened work week or a part-time position. Show how your idea can work for both you and your employer.

- Propose a flexible work week with the same number of hours but a schedule that works better for you. Some possibilities: Work four 10-hour days; or from 7 a.m.-4 p.m. instead of 9-5; or Tuesdays through Saturdays, eliminating one child care day and a rush hour.

- Work from home. With a pager, computer, modem, fax machine and answering machine — plus fewer distractions — you can get the work done during the hours that best suit you. And you'll save commuting time.

- Use a pager to keep in touch while away from home or the office. For information about pagers, write to Paging Services Council, Box 32229, Washington, DC 20007-0529.

And remember, you need time to regenerate. Schedule time to do what you like best.

Social Security Retirement Fund Solvent For Now

The Social Security trust fund that finances retirement and survivors' benefits for approximately 37 million Americans will be able to pay benefits well into the 21st century, according to the 1994 Annual Reports of the Social Security and Medicare Boards of Trustees.

At the same time, the trustees reported for the second consecutive year that the disability insurance trust fund will be exhausted in 1995, a situation requiring immediate action. The trustees recommend a reallocation of the rates between the two trust funds to remedy the short-range deficit in the disability insurance fund. Such actions have been taken in the past to address shortfalls in one fund without requiring increases to the overall tax rate.

The report notes that this year alone, the combined Social Security trust funds will take in about \$377 billion.

Estimates show that, based on the most likely assumptions, the combined OASI and DI trust funds will continue to grow for the next 25 years and then decline until the funds are exhausted in 2029.

The trustees noted that there is ample time to address long-term deficit issues. They recommended that the Advisory Council on

Social Security review the financial status of the program and develop recommendations for restoring the long-range financial balance of the two Social Security trust funds.

MEDICARE
The trustees continued to express pessimism about Medicare's Hospital Insurance Trust Fund, which they called "severely out of balance." This trust fund pays for inpatient hospital care and related services for people age 65 and over, and for the long-term disabled. Using "most likely" economic and demographic assumptions, the fund will be exhausted in 2001 unless changes are made.

Last year, the trustees had stated that the Medicare trust fund could go broke in 1999. Congress adopted certain Administration recommendations to increase revenue and reduce program expenditures, which resulted in this year's improvement in the projected exhaustion date.

The Supplementary Medical Insurance report, however, was found to be actuarially sound. This trust fund pays for physician services, outpatient hospital services and other medical expenses for people age 65 and over and for the long-term disabled.

HHS Secretary Donna Shasla says, "Medicare's financial condition would improve significantly as a result of general cost containment under the President's health care reform proposal."

The Social Security and Medicare Boards have five members, three of whom are cabinet secretaries: Secretary Shalala, Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen, and Labor Secretary Robert Reich. The other two members, Stanford Ross and David Walker, serve four-year terms as trustees representing the public.

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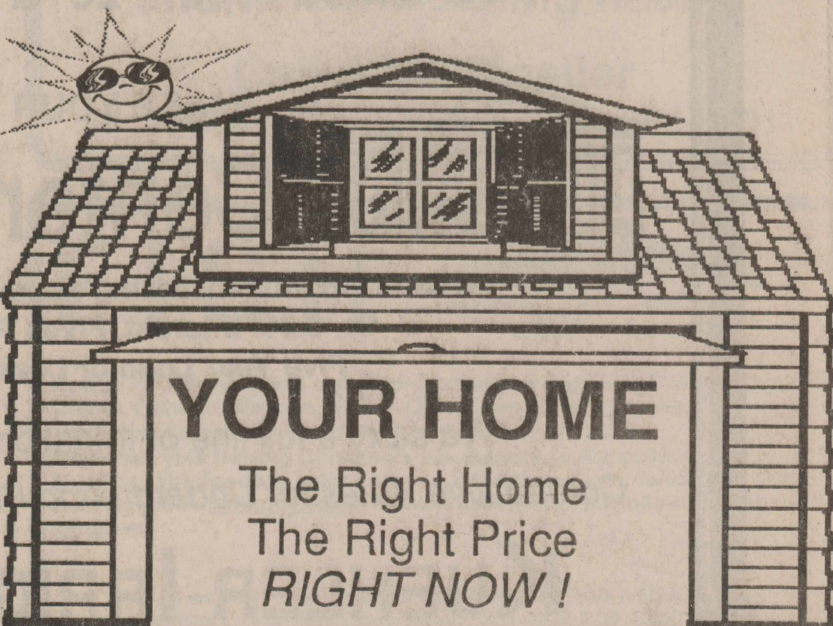
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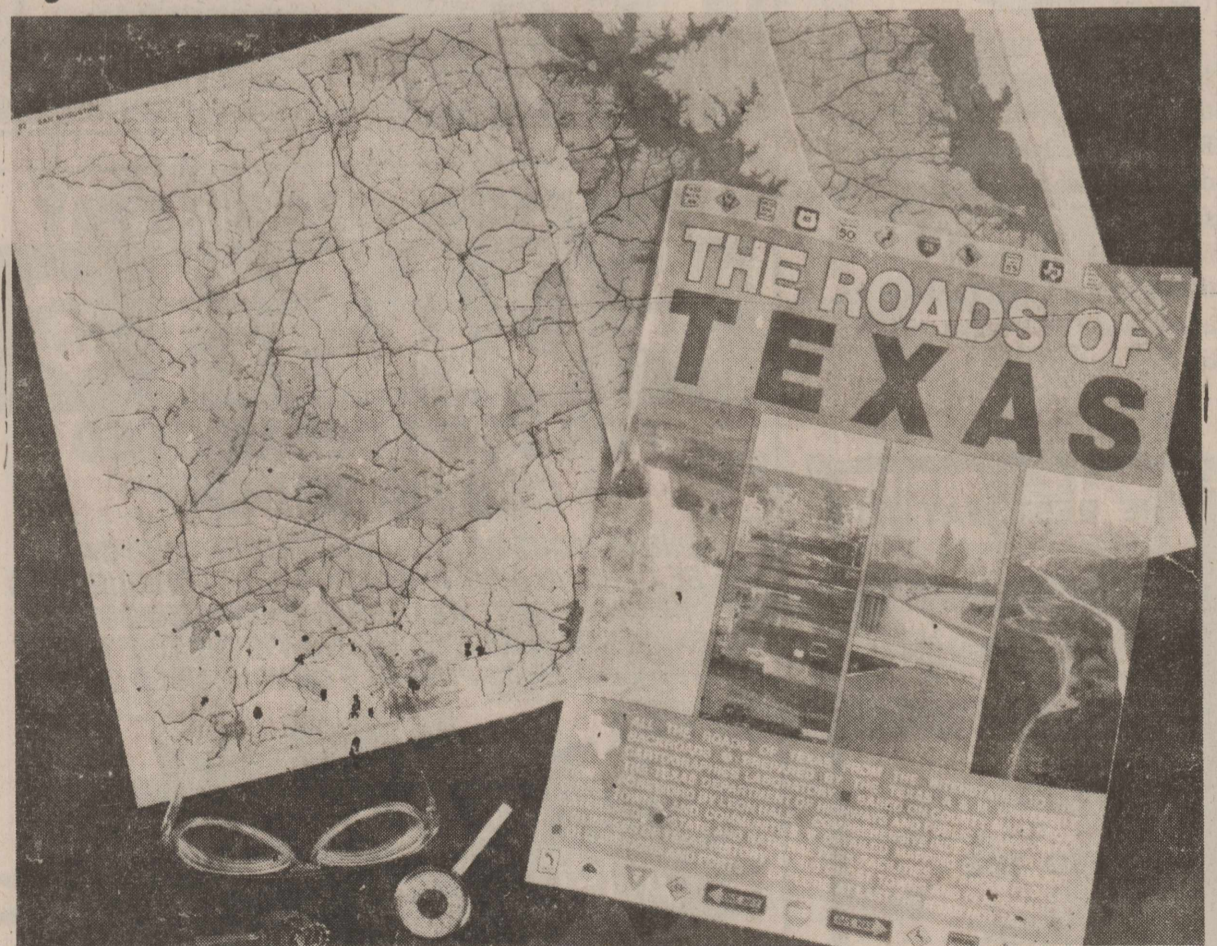

How to Take A 'Vacation' From Burglary Worries

(NU) - The average American family works until about May just to pay its annual tax bill, then tries to put together a summer vacation. And while the Joneses are away, they hope no one's breaking into their home.

Nearly seven million families return home sometime during the year to find it burglarized. U.S. Justice Department statistics indicate summer is prime time for burglars, whose victims are out playing in the sun, at the pool or on vacation.

The best protection is a good burglar alarm system. Homes without security systems are three times more likely to be broken into than homes with a system according to the National Burglar and Fire Alarm Association (NBFAA).

A good alarm system, combined with the following security practices, can send burglars looking for easier targets:

- Cancel newspaper, milk and other deliveries. Don't leave notes.
- Lock all doors and windows.
- Secure the garage door.
- Have a neighbor pick up mail, deliveries and emptied garbage cans.
- Park a car outside.
- Leave a house key with a neighbor who will know where the family can be reached.
- Turn telephone ringers down or off. Constant ringing phones indicate an unoccupied house.

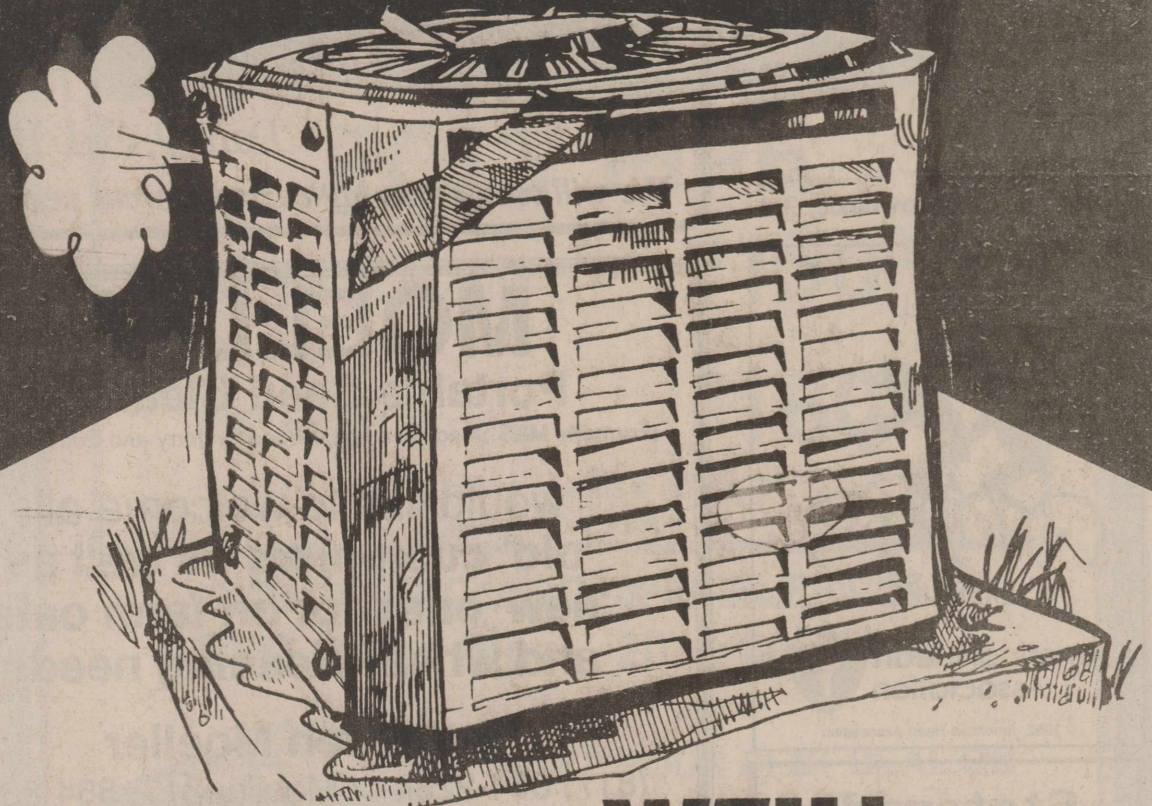

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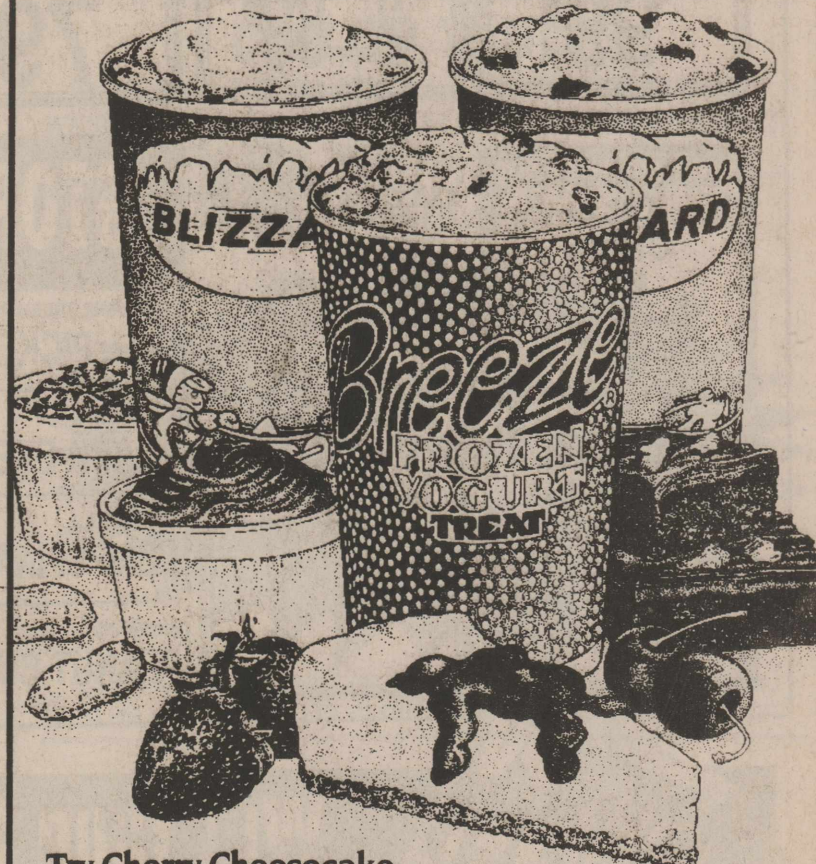

Traffic Engineering Survey Yields New Speed Limits

Also Has Newly Posted Warning Signs

CHILDRESS - - Regularly scheduled traffic engineering surveys are conducted on all highways by the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT). The surveys are performed every two years to determine the amount of vehicular traffic and average speeds at which Texas motorists drive. TxDOT officials use radar to precisely determine the speed of vehicles during surveys. Results of the studies provide information that helps the State of Texas determine a number of concerns to include maintenance funding and speed limit zones. One such survey was recently conducted on State Highway 222 from west of city limits of Knox City, to the intersection of State Highway 6. The study revealed that at least 85 percent of the motorists coming into Knox City from this area were driving over the posted speed limit of 55 miles-per-hour.

The traveling public plays an important role in determining speed limits on Texas roadways. The speed at which motorists drive closely approximates what the posted speed limit will be, except no speed limit will exceed 55 miles-per-hour. Federal and state laws mandate that studies be conducted before any speed limit can be changed. TxDOT has no authority to change speed limits to either lower or higher designations without first conducting tests along selected areas.

Shortly after a fatal vehicular accident on State Highway 222 on the west side of Knox City in early April, a traffic engineering survey was conducted. Changes

made along the road in this area include signs which announce a plant entrance at West Railroad Avenue. Other signs called "highway alignment chevrons" now alert motorists to a curve in the road inside the city limits. A third measure included reducing the speed limit from 55 to 50 miles-per-hour at the hill crest, west of a housing project. Lastly, a reduction to 40 miles-per-hour at the west city limits was established. The present 35 miles-per-hour near East Railroad Avenue to the four-way stop sign will remain in effect.

Even though a slower speed limit has been posted on U.S. 222, the dilemma of speeding motorists in this area may still represent a problem. Traffic enforcement

The Texas Department of Transportation asks motorists to observe all warning signs and newly posted speed limits in this affected area. Always be alert for changes in road signs, road conditions and other motorists. Signs, while playing an important role in traffic safety, can never be substituted for safe driving habits and common sense.

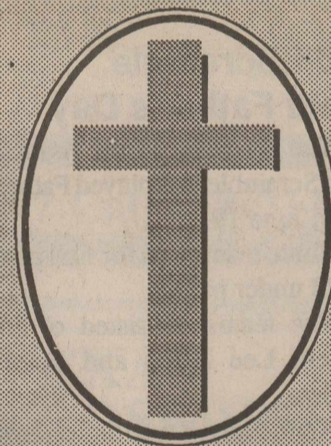
