

## The Message Is Clear: "Do Not Follow The Fire Trucks To Fires"

That message to motorists in Knox City was issued loud and clear early Tuesday morning by Fire Marshal Roland Marion.

Marion went on to remind residents of both Knox City and O'Brien "that it is illegal to follow an emergency vehicle, drive across a fire hose, or interfere with emergency workers in the performance of their jobs."

The strongly worded remarks by Marion came after local firemen were hampered by curious onlookers driving by in their cars at a recent fire. "Firemen were obstructed in their efforts to put out the fire by vehicles driving by within 2 or 3 feet of the men," stated Marion.

The Fire Marshal went on to emphasize that not only is it ille-

gal to follow the trucks and interfere at a fire fighting operation, but it is also just plain dangerous.

Motorists are reminded not to follow emergency vehicles, and to stay away from fire fighting or other emergency locations. There have been occasions when volunteer firemen trying to get to the fire in their own personal vehicles could not do so because they were blocked by the curious, just driving by to see the excitement. It's not hard to figure the obvious: without the emergency workers on the scene conducting fire and rescue operations, there is the potential for a loss of life if someone were trapped in the fire location. All emergency workers and emergency vehicles need free access to emergency locations. That

includes all emergency workers. including fire, police and ambulance personnel.

Fire Marshal Marion cautioned that the police will be called and citations issued in the future to any person, walking or driving, who is interfering or in the way at

a fire fighting location. Living in a small community, these measures may seem harsh to some, but everyone needs to be reminded of the law from time to time. Citizens who are abiding by the laws regarding emergency vehicles and emergency locations and staying away from these locations will be aiding the very workers who are trying to save property, and possibly the loss of a life. Remember: even if you are curious, stay away !!

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
#### Munday Man Is Asst. Manager At Plant Center

Rudy's parents are Mr. and Mrs. A.C. Esquivel Jr. of Munday.



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



#### EXERCISE IS AN ESSENTIAL KEY TO PERMANENT WEIGHT LOSS

Vou can count those calories until your calculator smokes, L but you still have to "move it to lose it." How does exercise hasten and support weight control?

First, exercise increases the metabolic rate, literally turning up the fire to burn calories. What is the fuel for the fire? You guessed it—fat. Studies have demonstrated not only that regular exercise increases the metabolic rate during exercise, but that the person who regularly exercises sustains an increased metabolic rate even during nonexercise periods. Beginning with small steps—walking a mile a day or taking the stairs to work—we can "learn to burn" up to 2,000 calories during a week.


Second, weight loss always includes loss of both fat tissue and muscle tissue. Passive weight loss, without exercise, may even result in the loss of more muscle than fat. Exercise ensures that the proportion of muscle loss decreases as fat is burned through exercise. Muscle weighs more than fat and the scale may be deceptive—try using your clothing size or waist measurement for more accurate results. The best news is that muscle produces a higher metabolic activity, reinforcing the "hot fire" effect.

Medium intensity activities (such as 3 mph walking, dancing, and bicycling) burn about 300 calories per hour for a 150 pound person. That same person burns 500 calories per hour swimming and 700 calories per hour running. To correct these figures for your weight, divide your weight by 150 and multiply the result by the listed number of calories burned. For example, a 120 pound person burns 240 calories per hour at medium intensity activities because  $120/150 = 0.8 \times 300 = 240$ .

Once weight has been lost, the really hard part is keeping it off. No one wants to live on a diet forever. Studies show that people who exercise on a regular basis (burning 2,000 calories a week or more) are likely not to regain their weight. Why? Start rereading this article.








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
