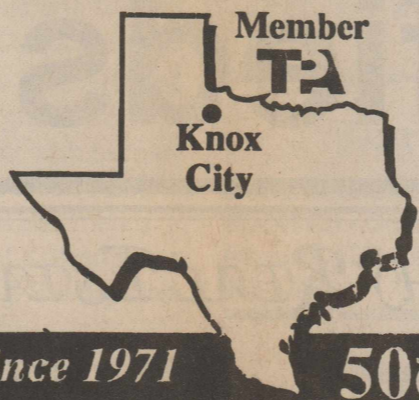

Tx Ag Commissioner Declares Cotton Emergency, Defies EPA

Rick Perry Will Speak In KC On Thursday at 1:00 PM.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has gone against a decision by the federal Environmental Protection Agency and issued an emergency order that allows the use of Furadan on cotton crops in Texas. This emergency crisis exemption by Perry is the result of a massive and devastating infestation of current cotton crops by the cotton aphid. Traveling around the state to explain his action, Perry will be in Knox City this Thursday afternoon to talk with local farmers and others associated with the cotton industry.

Scheduled to kick off at 1:00 p.m. at the Community Center (212 South 3rd. Street), the meeting will focus on government over-regulation and how the regulations threaten landowners' rights.

During the Knox City meeting, Perry will discuss how the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency directly contributed to the cotton aphid crisis, currently occurring in West Texas and Knox County, by banning the use of the insecticide Furadan in Texas and four other states, but not in Oklahoma. As a result of this directive by the EPA and the hardship it has placed on the cotton crop this year, Perry has issued a crisis exemption allowing the use of this insecticide.

The exemption issued by Perry and the Texas Department of Agriculture against the EPA just might be the direct result of action that started right here in our local area.

The fight against the decision by the Environmental Protection Agency to outlaw the use of the insecticide Furadan began almost

as soon as the EPA issued its directive. Affecting four cotton producing states besides Texas, but excluding cotton producing Oklahoma, the EPA directive was supposed to be aimed toward an overall goal of reducing the use of insecticides. Typical of action by the federal government, their wisdom was to replace the single insecticide, Furadan, with three other insecticides that only work 50-60% as well in curtailing cotton aphids.

According to Stan Wojcik, owner and operator of Air Ag,

Inc. of Knox City, in their attempt to reduce insecticide use, the EPA decision "actually increased the amount of insecticides being used on cotton crops." In a study by Steve Morren, an independent agricultural consultant and the owner/operator of Ag Management in Munday, the current insecticides authorized by the EPA for use on cotton crops (*Bidrin, Lorsban, & Lannate*) now require a projected usage of 2.25 pounds of active ingredient per acre. The use of Furadan would have only been .50 pound per acre. "The EPA regulation against Furadan actually increased the use of insecticides by 1.75 pounds of chemicals per acre", stated

Wojcik, who went on to say, "Because the other insecticides are only 50-60% as effective, not only are cotton farmers having to dump more chemicals on their land, they are also having to pay an average of \$20.00 more per acre in chemical and spraying costs." It isn't hard to figure out how much that cost figure alone affects cotton farmers, and our local economy.

But, that's certainly not the end of the story. By having to use the three 'approved' chemicals that only work 50-60% as well, cotton farmers are currently facing a cotton crisis because the 40-50% of aphids not killed by these insecticides are literally destroying thousands of acres of what would have been a very good cotton crop.

According to Wojcik, "Once aphids get into cotton, their population literally explodes." Aphids that enter a cotton crop can multiply by the millions in less than 7 days. By using currently authorized EPA approved chemicals that only kill 50-60% of aphids, the remaining 40-50% can easily ruin a crop. "With the use of Furadan, the kill rate is as high as 99.9% with just one application," stated Wojcik. When asked how bad the current crisis is for cotton farmers, Wojcik said that "every day when I fly to and from an area for spraying, I fly at 400 feet. By the end of every flight, my plane's windshield is covered with aphids that are flying from one field to another." Wojcik went on to explain, "last Thursday I checked plants in a field and found 40 to 50 aphids per plant. By Monday morning, the same plants were

An added feature of the event will be a cake sale during the half time intermission of the two hour show. Delicious cakes will be auctioned off to the highest bidders, who may pick up their cakes at the conclusion of the evening's entertainment.

The cost for a show of this nature is very reasonable, with the

Lions Club charging just \$3.00 for adults and \$2.00 for children under 12. Tickets are available from any Lions Club member or at the door on Saturday night. Those attending will want to plan on arriving early to be assured of a choice seating location. All tickets are general admission, not reserved.

Lions Club spokesman Alton

Hester stated that this musical variety show will be different from most held in the area, with the show "fast paced and enjoyable." Hester went on to say "the local Lions Club is going all out on this project, and I hope the community and area will support us with their presence for the show. All funds raised will be forwarded to Campaign SightFirst."

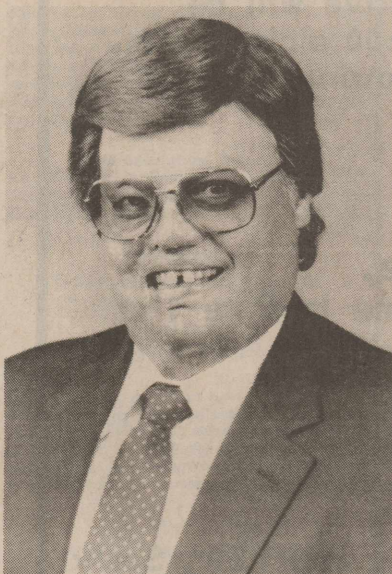
"We just hope to have a good time. It's nice to have an evening

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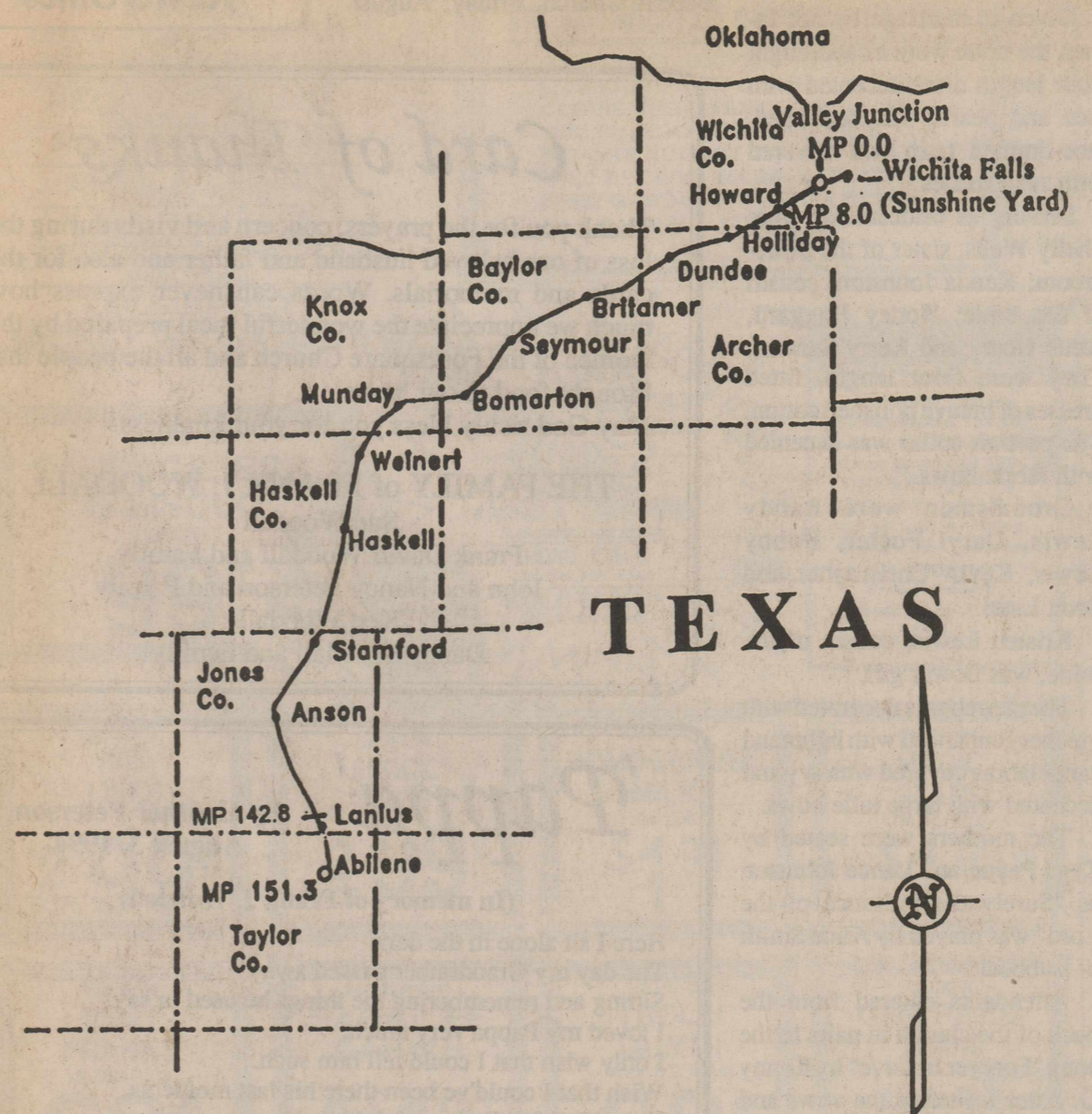

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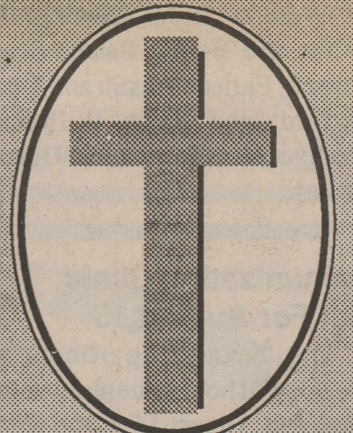

Born in Fillmore, Oklahoma, Mr. Walton had been employed by the United States Air Force Food Service. He had resided in Wichita Falls since 1967.

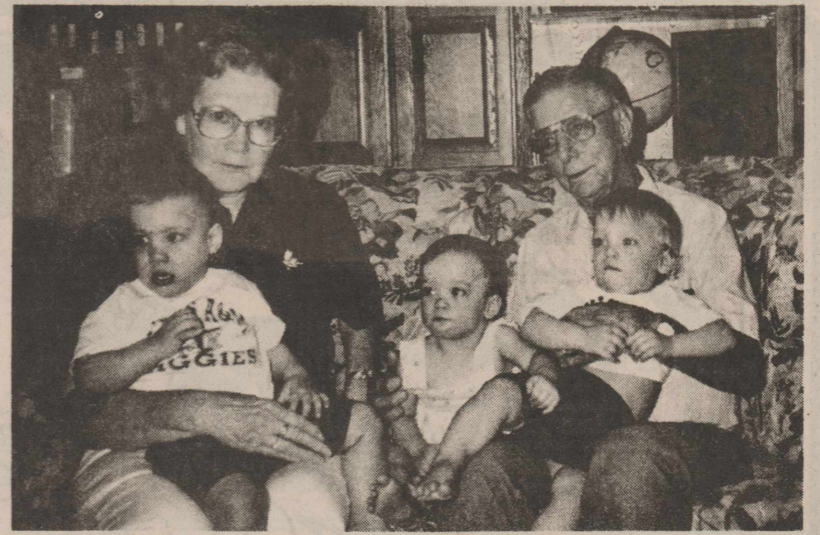

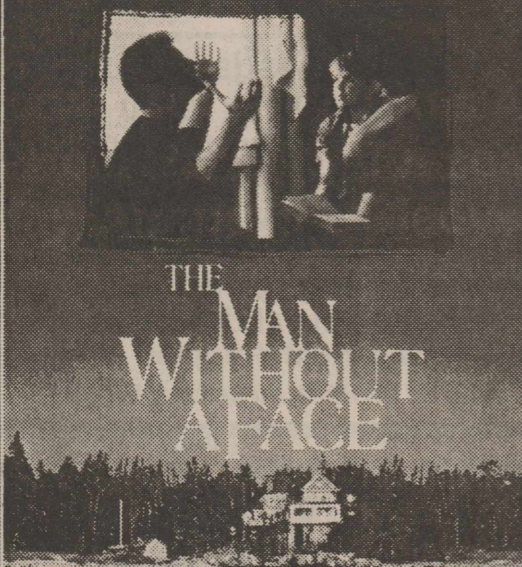

totally covered by aphids." The current aphid infestation could easily mean a loss of approximately 1/2 of a bale per acre. That loss figures out at \$185.00 per acre. Add the increased chemical and spraying cost of \$20.00 per acre to this, and the end result is a net loss to the cotton farmer of about \$205.00 per acre. Again, it isn't hard to figure out how that will affect cotton farmers and our local economy.

Besides Wojcik and Morren, others in our area who played a key role in getting Commissioner Perry to declare an Emergency Crisis Exemption were Jim Cottingham of Petty Flying Service in Munday, Bill Baker, Sammy B. White, and State Representative David Counts. The concentrated effort by these men came about because of a serious concern for the cotton farmer. In the case of Stan Wojcik and Jim Cottingham, both will actually lose income as a result of the action by Perry. Because the three chemicals approved by EPA had to be applied three times to be even 40-50% effective, both men flew a lot more to spray Knox County cotton crops. By reverting back to the use of Furadan, most fields will only have to be sprayed one time for a 99.9% kill rate. Even though that means less flying and less income for the crop dusting aviators, "Money was not our concern", stated Wojcik, "our main concern was the condition of the cotton crop and what it means to the economy of the area."

With regards to the action by Ag. Commissioner Rick Perry to allow the use of Furadan to control the current aphid crisis, Wojcik stated "He (Perry) stuck his neck out for the farmers and I'm proud of him. His action saved the cotton crop in this area."

Landreth Rites Set Thursday

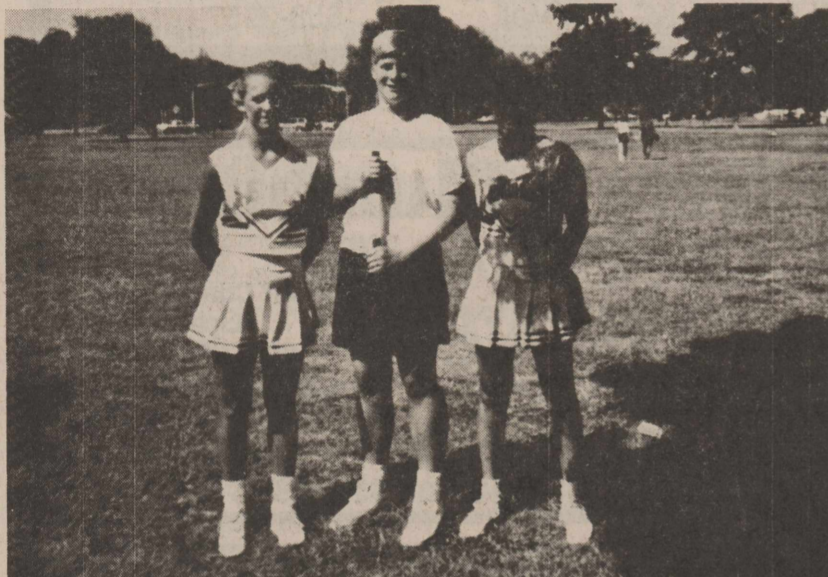

Need A Soil Test? It's Free

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Soil Conservation Service are sponsoring a free soil testing program through the Seymour Aquifer Project for producers in Knox and Haskell counties. The free soil testing program will extend through September 1, 1994.

Soil sampling should be done each year to determine the amount of nutrients left in the soil from the last crop. The soil sample should be taken from a uniform area of the field and represent from 10 to 40 acres. Take 10 to 15 samples from the field and mix in a clean plastic bucket, take out about one pint for a composite sample. Be sure to fill out an information sheet to send in along with the sample. The information sheet asks about the type of crop to be grown and the yield goal of

the crop. The fertilizer recommendation will be made depending on yield goals and type of crop grown, minus the amount of nutrients present in the soil sample.

Soil sample bags and information sheets can be picked up at Allison Farm Supply, Rule; Farmers Gin or Lone Star Peanut, Rochester; O'Brien Co-Op Gin; Charlie Myers Grain Co., Haskell; Terra or Benjamin Fertilizer, Knox City; Rhineland Co-Op Gin, Parker Implement, Quality Implement, Knox Prairie Co-Op, Farmers Grain, or Zeissel Brothers Fertilizer, Munday; or the local ASCS, SCS, or County Extension Service office.

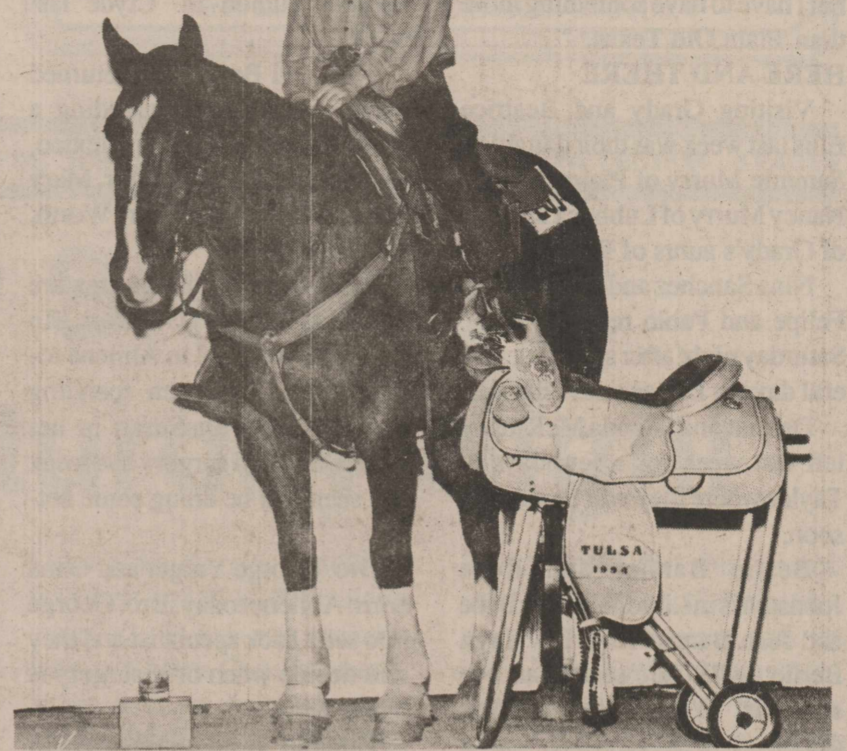
