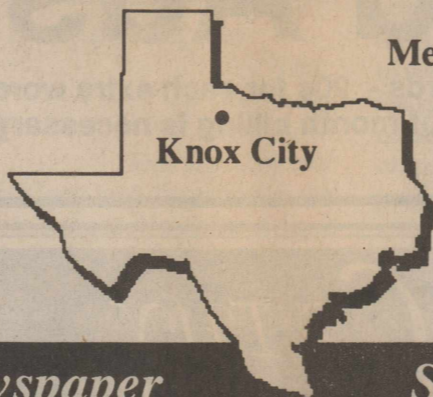

County Courthouse Could Be Site Of Visitors Center

If Knox County Judge David Neil Perdue is successful in a grant application that he has submitted to the state, the Knox County Courthouse in Benjamin could very well be the location of a new Visitors Center and Transportation Park.

Located at the intersections of U.S. Highway 82/Texas 114 and Texas Highway 6, the county courthouse is already the stopping point for a lot of travelers motoring the long stretches of open land that make up the west central Texas landscape. Some who stop at Benjamin are interested in the history of the area and the courthouse, others are simply interested in finding a bathroom or a cold soft drink. Still others might be just trying to stretch their legs and wake up a little before continuing journeys taking them north, south, east or west. Whatever the reason for stopping in Benjamin, travelers may soon have a new and interesting facility to attract their interest.

The proposed Knox County Visitors Center and Transportation Park is more than just an idea. It is a project that is very real and has involved countless hours of work by Judge Perdue to get it to its current stage in the grant submission process.

The project actually began with an announcement by the state that there would be a total of \$180 million dollars available for various types of grants under the State-wide Transportation Enhancement Program initiated by the Texas Department of Transportation regarding the Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991.

Working together, the Knox County Commissioners Court and Judge Perdue quickly sought more information on the types of projects that could qualify for the grant funding. Following months of planning and work, the final project as submitted to the Texas Department of Transportation two weeks ago involves the restora-

tion, renovation and historic preservation of the third floor of the courthouse, and the ground area on the north side of the courthouse. If the grant application is successful, the third floor of the courthouse will be renovated into a visitors center featuring the history of transportation in Knox County. In addition, the current parking lot used by courthouse employees on the north side of the building would become a transportation theme park, also featuring the history of transportation in Knox County.

Renovation of the courthouse would be accomplished by adding new work to projects that have already been planned by the Commissioners Court. An example of this would be the current project being planned to install an elevator in the courthouse. Under the American Disabilities Act that was designed to make all public buildings accessible to the handicapped, the commissioners court was required to install an elevator in the courthouse. The planning

for that only included an elevator to the second floor. If approved, the visitors center grant will help the original elevator project by extending the elevator from the second floor to the third floor. Other work involved in the project would be the replacement of bathroom plumbing and fixtures on the third floor; replacement of all electrical wiring on the floor; replacement of all courthouse windows with storm windows and the installation of air conditioning and heating units.

Work to be performed on the courthouse grounds would be to acquire the old Benjamin Railroad Depot, move it to the north side of the courthouse, and renovate the building to serve as the centerpiece of the outdoor transportation park. Other additions to the park in the future could possibly include items that feature the various modes of transportation used throughout the history of Knox County. The placement of eight park and picnic benches,

KC To Open Season

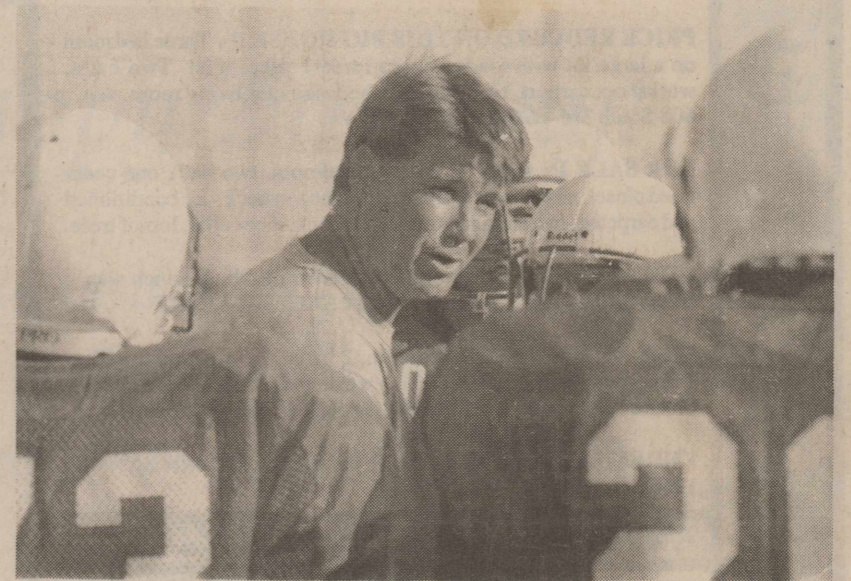
The Knox City Greyhounds will host the Seymour Panthers Friday night at Greyhound Stadium in the season opener. Kick-off is at 8:00 p.m.

RC&D Office Locates In KC

Ribbon cutting ceremonies for the Four Winds RC&D office were held last Thursday afternoon at 5:00 o'clock in the new office located on the north end of the school administration building.

Leta Mangis, president of the Knox City Chamber of Commerce that sponsored the event, along with Jimmy Smajstria of Seymour, chairman of the RC&D Executive Board, and Ronald Colburn, RC&D coordinator, cut the ribbon. Approximately 25 persons were on hand for the ceremonies.

Organized in 1971 to improve the standard of living for rural communities in Wilbarger, Foard, Hardeman, and Childress counties, the Four Winds RC&D area was expanded in 1991 to include Knox, Haskell, Stonewall, Throckmorton, Cottle, King, Motley, Baylor, and Dickens counties.

RC&D is the delivery system for rural development through the U. S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service. It provides the mechanics for dealing with rural problems and needs through volunteer citizen participation. The RC&D "process" is run by the people who live in the area it serves. They set the priorities for their communities and seek needed assistance for improvement and rural development.

The Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School

District school board offered the U.S. Department of Agriculture office space for an RC&D office in the school administration building in an effort to attract a new service to the Knox area. The RC&D personnel will serve this area, provide local employment, and business opportunities for the Knox area. Businesses and individuals who contributed to the construction of the office include Citizens Bank, M-System Super Market, Counts Insurance, Knox City Lions Club, Wichita-Brazos SWCD, Knox City Chamber of Commerce, John Grindstaff, Bruce Campbell, W.R. Baker, Oscar Mangis, Jerry Guinn (Jerry's Plumbing), Penman Conoco and West Texas Utilities.

Ronald Colburn is the newly appointed coordinator for the Four Winds RC&D Area. Colburn, a longtime employee of the Soil Conservation Service, was most recently a landrights specialist in Terrell, Texas.

Colburn has also been a district conservationist at Sanderson and Victoria. Other duty stations include Goliad, Hondo, Taylor and Ballinger.

Colburn, a Winters native, is a 1969 graduate of Texas A&M University. He is a U.S. Army veteran with overseas duty in Korea.

Colburn and his wife, Reba, have two children at home. Sandi is a senior this year. Jim Terry is

a seventh grader. Two other children are attending Texas A&M. Shannon, 21 is a junior education major. Todd, 18, is a freshman marketing major.

Knox County Cotton/Peanut Tour Thursday

The Knox County Extension Service will be sponsoring a cotton and peanut tour on September 1 starting at 9:00 a.m. The tour will start at the Texas A&M Vegetable Research Station in Munday.

Speakers for this tour will be Emory Boring, Extension Entomologist; Robert Lemon, Extension Agronomist; and Thomas "Chip" Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist. Two CEU's will be offered toward a certified or Licensed Private Pesticide Applicator license.

Plans are to visit an irrigated cotton variety plot, a lesser comtalk borer control in peanuts, and a Staple herbicide plot.

In the event of bad or wet weather, the program will be conducted at the Knights of Columbus Hall in Rhineland.

trash bins, lighting, and landscaping will also enhance the transportation park.

The proposed budget submitted with the grant application is for a total of \$212,348.00. Of that total, \$139,593.00 will be spent on courthouse renovation, and \$72,755.00 spent on the outside courthouse grounds project. According to Judge Perdue, the project would require Knox County to pay for 20% (\$42,470.00) of the overall cost, with the state paying the remaining 80%. No taxes would be raised, the county would pay its 20% share from existing reserves and from the money being saved by not replacing 3 personnel vacancies that currently exist on the courthouse staff.

The project application has received widespread support throughout Knox County and the surrounding region. Submitted with the application were a resolution signed by all members of the commissioners court, and regional letters of endorsement from the West Central Council of Governments in Abilene, the Four Winds Resource, Conservation and Development Area, Inc., the Nortex Regional Planning Commission in Wichita Falls, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers office in Truscott, and the Plant Materials Center of the Soil Conservation Service. In-county letters of endorsement were included from the Knox County Historical Commission, the Benjamin Independent School District, the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated Independent School District, the Goree Public Schools, the Knox City Chamber of Commerce, the City of Benjamin, the City of Munday, the City of Knox City, and the City of Goree.

The application for the grant was hand delivered to the Texas Department of Transportation office in Childress. After being forwarded to Austin, the grant application undergoes a review and approval process by the Transportation Enhancement Project Evaluation Committee. The TEPEC is a six member committee composed of representatives from the Texas Department of Transportation, the General Land Office, The Texas Department of Commerce, the Texas Historical Commission, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, and the Texas Water Commission. TEPEC will evaluate the candidate project in terms of quality and scope in each of three benefit areas: economic benefit, environmental benefit, and social benefit. Scored on a point system, the grant application will receive between 1 and 100 points in each of the three above mentioned areas. The overall project score will be a total of combined points from the

three areas, with a maximum possible total of 300 points. Once scored, TEPEC will return a list of eligible project applications to the Texas Department of Transportation, along with any recommendations.

The Texas Department of Transportation will then present the project applications to the Transportation Commission. The Commission will select projects for funding from the list of eligible candidates.

Some of the counties that have submitted successful project grant applications, and the grant amounts are: Blanco County for \$360,000, Rockwell County for \$500,000, Bell County for \$1,111,520, Polk County for \$160,000, Hill County for 3 million dollars, Grimes County for \$214,794, Milam County for \$486,800, Hays County for \$2,240,000, and Caldwell County for \$2,224,880.

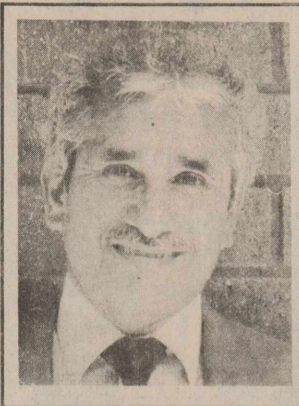
It will take several weeks for Judge Perdue and the Commissioners Court to receive notification if the project application is approved or rejected, and/or advances through the next step of the approval process. Basically, all that remains now is to wait for the phone to ring with word from Austin.

The construction of the Knox County Courthouse took place back in 1936 with WPA funds, and the building remains basically the same as it did when it was built. The third floor was designed for use as an area to sequester juries back when jurors spent the night at the courthouse instead of traveling back and forth from home. For approximately forty years the third floor has remained inactive, utilized only for a storage area of old, outdated equipment and records. If approved, this project would not only attract visitors to the county with an outside transportation park, but it would also renovate the third floor of the courthouse into a museum that could easily become the focal point of Knox County history.

Spearheading a very worthy project that will benefit not only Knox County and the surrounding area, but the traveling public as well, Knox County Judge David Neil Perdue should be commended for his hard work on this project and his foresight in attempting to bring this type of history making (and history keeping) facility to Knox County.

Local Man's Brother Dies August 12 In California

After he graduated from the Benjamin schools, he went to Texas Tech where he received a B.S. degree in Agricultural Engineering in 1955. After graduating, Bo moved to Los Angeles, California. While there, he completed his training to become a professional civil engineer. He then moved to San Bernardino, California, in 1965, where he went to work for San Bernardino County as a senior civil engineer. During Bo's tenure with the county, he worked as Federal Projects Engineer, Planning Engineer and Operations Engineer. Bo then became the County's first departmental Director of Solid Waste Management. Besides being very dedicated to his work, Bo was also very active in the 1166F Toastmasters, American Society of Civil Engineers, the National Society of Professional Engineers and the Riverside-San Bernardino chapter of the California Society of Professional Engineers from which he received the "Outstanding Engineer of the Year Award" in 1990. He volunteered his time on the national "Math Counts" Program (helping and testing young people) for over ten years.

Survivors include his wife, Clara; three daughters, Celeste of San Louis Obispo, California, Rebecca of San Bernardino, California, and Belinda of Alhambra, California; his mother, Amalia of Tujunga, California; four brothers, Ray of Knox City, Philip of Lancaster, California, Ralph of Austin and Henry of Tujunga, California; four sisters, Martha Palacios of Sunland, California, Mary Macias of Lancaster, California, Betty Martinez of La Crescenta, California, and Ester Cano of Lake Tahoe, Nevada; and three grandchildren.

Among the relatives attending the funeral were Mr. and Mrs. Ray Escobar and Charles Escobar of Knox City and Janie Esparza of Lubbock.

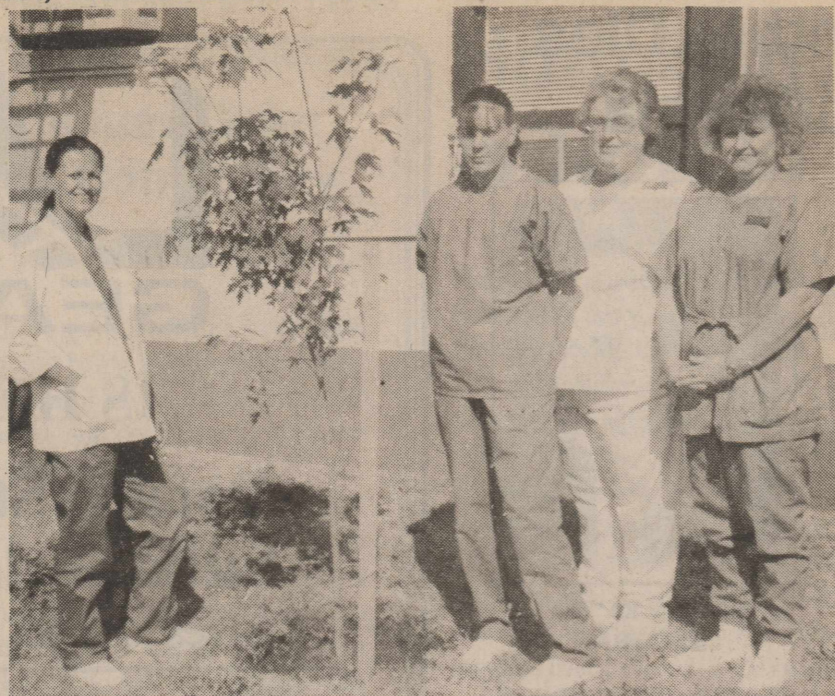

Used Oil Recycling Now Underway

Wednesday, August 31, marks the kickoff of the Do-It-Yourself Used Oil Recycling Program in Knox City. Present hours of operation are Tuesdays and Thursdays from 2:00 until 6:00 p.m. and Saturdays from 9:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon. Location is at North Sixth and East Railroad Avenue.

The used oil recycling program, initiated by the West Central Texas Council of Governments in coordination with local officials and financed by the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission, will be the first of its kind staged in West Central Texas.

The objectives of the program are to educate do-it-yourself oil changers of the importance of keeping their used oil out of storm drains, household refuse, and ground water; to provide environmentally sound collection areas; and to recycle a valuable resource.

Instructions for use of the containers are as follows:

What is Acceptable? Engine oil, gear oil, hydraulic fluid, transmission fluid, rear end oil.

What is not Acceptable? Antifreeze, brake fluid, contaminated oil, gasoline, grease, pesticide/fertilizer.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments has established a network of 33 collection centers for used oil recycling in its nineteen county region. These collection sites can be identified by the 465 gallon tank and numerous posters and signs.

The West Central Texas Council of Governments anticipates excellent cooperation and participation in this regional effort on the part of collectors, local officials and community residents. Anyone interested in obtaining additional information or a list of locations should call Alison Benton or Scott Patterson at WCTCOG (915-672-8544) or call the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission at 1-800-64-TEXAS.

Also the Convenience Center, will be open with the same hours as the recycling location, City Administrator Joe Rice said. Brush, metal construction debris, oil filters, tires and all appliances except those containing refrigerant will be accepted. Some fees will be imposed. For more information call City Hall at 658-3313 or go by the Convenience Center.

If you are feeding above normal and feel that you qualify - come in and check with us for further details.

Things to Remember:

1. File an ASCS-574 and let us inspect the acres before you destroy any failed crop.
2. Knox County is approved for haying and grazing of CRP acreage with prior approval and a 25% reduction in the annual payment thru September 30.
3. ACP funds are limited - if you are interested in applying a cost share conservation practice - come in and sign up immediately.
4. ACR (set-aside) for 1995 wheat is Q.
