# **Bulldogs Whip Greyhounds**

Knox City Suffers Hard Fought 59-22 Loss In Spur Dogfight

Knox City's football game last Friday night against the Bulldogs of Spur could be summed up with a comment overheard during the third quarter of the game when one of the Greyhound defensive players came off the field shaking his head and saying, "I can't believe what's happening out there."

THURSDAY, SEPTEMBER 29, 1994

That 'stunned' feeling showed on the scoreboard at the end of the game, with the final score showing 59 points for Spur and 22 for Knox City.

While Knox City's performance was far below the expectations of most, the game did have its high points for the 'Hounds. Action during the first quarter and most of the second quarter was dominated by Knox City. Kevin Dorsey scored the first touchdown of the game on a 3 yard run into the end zone with just:35 seconds left in the first quarter. Duane Toliver kicked in the extra point that put KC ahead 7-0.

With 6:10 left in the first half, Lance Dever added to the score with another 6 points on a 1 yard run into the end zone. KC then added a surprise when Wes Grimsley appeared to be holding the ball for another extra point kick, then took off running across the goal line for two points. That put the Greyhounds up by 15 points over Spur. The few Knox City fans that traveled to Spur for the game had plenty of reason to be excited as their team was suddenly two touchdowns ahead of a team that was predicted to win by two touchdowns!

Then that same excitement faded, and despite clear skies, the evening became rather gloomy for the Greyhounds.

Spur took the 'Hound kickoff back to the 43 yard line, then moved the ball right down the field for a touchdown with 2:57 left in the half. Spur then tried for two extra points with a pass that was intercepted by Greyhound Louis Diaz.

Another Spur touchdown was averted a short time later when David Dudensing intercepted a Spur pass that prevented the Bulldogs from gaining another first down with short yardage to the goal line. The save by Dudensing was negated just two plays later when Knox City fumbled the ball back to Spur on the 14 yard line.

In just three plays, Spur scored a touchdown on a 7 yard run. The extra point play was a run by the quarterback, but he was tackled on the 1 yard line. The scoreboard then showed KC-15, Spur-12 with 1:52 left in the first half.

Spur scored again with a 70 yard run with just 12 seconds left on the clock. The halftime buzzer sounded during the play, and Spur did kick in the extra point to put them ahead 19-15 going into the halftime break.

The Greyhound Marching Band provided the fans from both Knox City and Spur with an great show during the half. Playing their familiar "Blue Suede Shoes," the band received a strong round of applause when they came off the

When action resumed during the second half, the Spur Bulldogs exploded into action that dominated the rest of the game. They received the opening kickoff and returned the ball to the 30

yard line. Then on the next play, ran the ball all the way down the field for another touchdown. The extra point kick hit the post and went wide, leaving the scoreboard showing Spur-25 and KC-15. Then, with 2:48 left in the third quarter, Spur scored again to put the score at 31-15 in favor of the Bulldogs.

Knox City did manage to score again, with a 46 yard run by Kevin Dorsey. That play came with 5:10 left in the fourth quarter. Toliver kicked in the extra point to put a total of 22 points on the board for Knox City.

Unfortunately, Spur managed to score three more touchdowns before the end of the game, putting the final score at Spur-52, Knox City-21.

The Greyhounds will play at home this Friday night, hosting class 1-A Windthorst with the game starting at 8:00 p.m. here in Greyhound Stadium.

District action for the Greyhounds begins next week when Aspermont travels to KC for the district opener on October 7 at 7:30 p.m

## 'Pink Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary **Donates Money For New Ambulance**

The Pink Ladies Volunteer Auxiliary of the Knox County Hospital recently donated \$15,000.00 toward the purchase of a new ambulance, according to Stephen Kuehler, administrator of the hospital. "Our volunteers generously donate their time to serve our patients at the hospital every day, but this donation means that everyone in the county will benefit from their generosity," he said.

The new ambulance, which replaces a 1977 Modulance Type II unit, is a Ford diesel Type 3 Marque, purchased from Reliable

Emergency Vehicles in Dublin, Texas. "We made our choice based on the structural integrity, warranties, price, and references," Kuehler said. The final purchase price was \$65,000.00. The balance of the cost of the ambulance will be paid from hospital district

A Type 3 ambulance is a box type ambulance. "The advantage of this kind of unit is that emergency care attendants can walk through the ambulance from the cab to the care unit," Kuehler noted.

**Knox County Hospital District** operates the ambulance service for Knox County, with ambulances stationed in Knox City and Munday. The service has four full time employees: two paramedics, and two EMT-Intermedi-

"This new ambulance will benefit the entire county, however the unit will be stationed in Munday. The advanced technology of the ambulance and the increased reliability of a new unit will enhance emergency care for all of us," Kuehler said.
