A strong Knox City defense prevented the Trojans from accomplishing much during the


game, while an equally strong Trojan defense halted the Greyhounds at almost every occasion.

Accepting Loan Applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought and high temperatures which occurred on June 25, 1994, through June 30, 1994, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Knox City, FmHA County Supervisor Bobby G. Cude has announced.

Knox and Foard counties are two of seven in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought and high temperatures.

Cude said farmers may be eli-

gible for loans of up to 80% of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000.00 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for a FmHA emergency loan," Cude said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 1, 1995, but farmers should apply as soon as possible.



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
