## **O'Brien Resident Critically Burned**

Rayland Hayes, an O'Brien resident and employee of Rolling Plains Well Service in Knox City, was critically burned last Thursday when a hot oil tanker truck exploded in a freak oilfield accident.

Hayes survived the accident, but tragically suffered second and third degree burns over 85% of his body. In critical condition, Hayes was brought out of the oilfield in a private vehicle by a witness who saw smoke from the burning truck and went to investigate. The private vehicle was met by the Knox County EMS ambulance between Rule and **Rochester and Hayes was brought** to the Knox County Hospital for emergency treatment. A short time later he was airlifted by an Aerocare Helicopter to University Medical Center in Lubbock.

Currently in the Intensive Care Unit of UMC, Hayes was scheduled for the first of many surgeries on Tuesday morning at approx. 11:00.

In a telephone conversation from the IC Unit on Monday afternoon with Rayland's wife, Rose, she stated that the Doctors were optimistic, but were not giving the family much hope. "The

antee that it would keep him alive", said Rose, who also went on to say that "Rayland has all his body parts, and his fingers are burned, but he did not lose his fingers as some have heard."

Thanking everyone for all their prayers and saying that many more were needed, Rose said "the only thing helping Rayland right now are prayers." She went on to say that "Rayland opened his eyes very briefly on Monday, and on Monday afternoon, his facial features were recognized for the first time."

Hayes was in still in surgery at 2:30 on Tuesday afternoon, and a phone call with his sister, Pam Reed, in the surgery waiting area at UMC, brought news that he had been in the operating room for several hours and that he still had several hours to go. Pam said that "Rayland went into surgery at noon and a doctor came about 2:00 o'clock and said that so far, he was holding his own." No other information was available as of press deadline late Tuesday afternoon.

A blood drive for Rayland is being organized by his many friends in Knox City as he will need from 2 to 10 pints for each surgery that he faces. The drive is scheduled for Tuesday, December 6 and more details will be available next week.

## **Benjamin ISD To Receive Recognition**

At State Migrant Conference

Benjamin ISD is being recognized for its work with the district's migrant students. Benjamin Superintendent WeldonKoepf reported this to school board members at the regular Benjamin ISD Board of Trustees meeting on Monday, November 14. Benjamin will receive Distinguished recognition at the State Migrant Conference on November 17, 1994, at South Padre Island Convention Center. The school is being recognized because of the high passing rate on the state TAAS test among the district's migrant students.

Superintendent Koepf also reported that Benjamin achieved an Accountability Rating of Accredited/Acceptable on Texas Academic Excellence Indicator System for the 1993-94 school year. The Texas Education Agency Accountability Report for Benjamin ISD will be available for viewing by the public at the Benjamin Superintendent's Office, Principal's office, Counselor's office, or the school library.

Superintendent Koepf also reported enrollment is up over last year and attendance has been very good during the first two report-

ing periods of this year. Current enrollment is 100 and percentage of attendance has been over 98 percent.

Trustees decided to join a class action suit against the Texas Education Agency to recover approximately \$22,000 in state aid funds which the district has been shorted over the last three years. The law firm of Ray, Wood, and Fine of Austin, Texas, will handle the case on a contingency basis at no cost to the district.

In other action the board approved monthly bills and salaries, adopted new board policy updates, approved the district textbook committee, and approved the district's participation the state contract purchasing program of the General Services Commission.





A petition to expand toll-free calling to area towns is being planned and it is hoped that enough interest in this service is generated locally to vote on this option, according to local coordinator Stan Wojcik.

Under the plan, once the petition is accepted and reviewed by the Public Utility Commission (PUC), a ballot will be mailed to all telephone subscribers in the Knox City and O'Brien exchange. At least 70 percent of the sub-

scribers who return their ballots must vote in favor of the expanded local calling for it to be provided.

If supported by local telephone customers, all customers will pay an additional per line fee of up to \$3.50 for residences and \$7.00 for businesses for the extended services.

The additional fee will be in effect until GTE's next general rate case, at which time all rates are subject to change.

If less than 70 percent of the customers were to return ballots voting for the extended service, no additional fees will apply and calls to the requested exchange will continue to have long-distance charges.

Wojcik indicated that the tollfree extended calling would help businesses and individuals in the community; thus, his undertaking.
