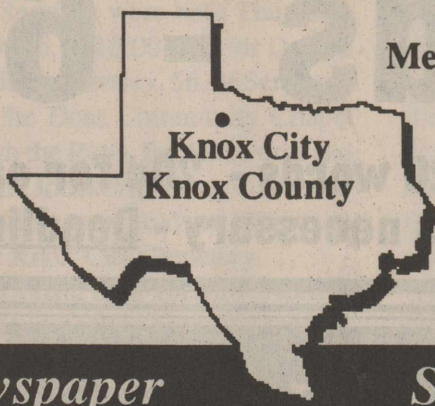

The Knox City church is now worshiping in a new building because of the leadership and faith of Pastor Ward.

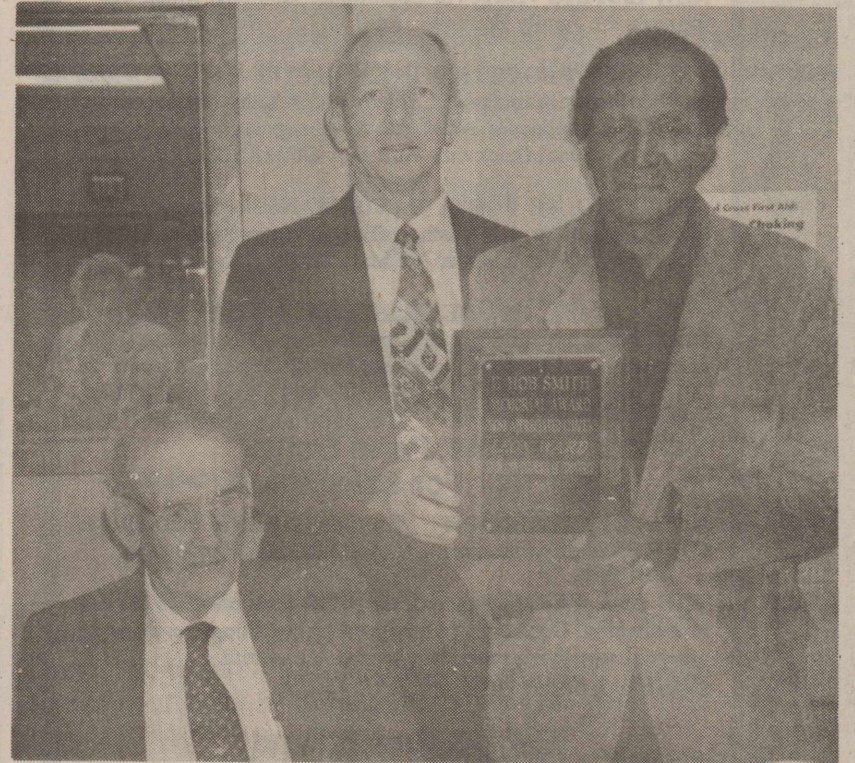

The Four Winds Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) Area, Inc. is coordinating the efforts of the rural residents of Knox County to obtain a safe source of domestic water. Several meetings have been held to discuss the possibility of extending an existing water supply to service a much larger area. The Four Winds RC&D Area, Inc. has agreed to help develop and coordinate this project according to Don Henson, Executive Director of the Four Winds Area located in Knox City. Henson stated that this project has been on-going since 1993. The Four Winds RC&D serves a 13 county area with its regional office located in Knox City. The RC&D assist rural communities in the development and protection of our natural resources. The RC&D Board of Directors is very concerned about the quantity and quality of one of our most precious resources, Water.

The RC&D has been with Rhineland Water Supply Corporation (a nonprofit organization) who has expressed an interest in expanding its service to a larger part of Knox County. Sam Boone, current president of the Rhineland Water Supply Corp., stated that if there were enough people interested in being a part of this explanation project that the Rhineland Water Supply Corporation would begin work with their engineers to develop a plan to get the project ongoing. Boone stated that over 21 people have sent in a \$100.00 membership application fee and have complete the necessary paper work.

He added that the Water Corp. would like to get at least 50 residents involved to make the project feasible. Boone also stated that if anybody is interested in being included that it is very important to get in on the ground level of the project because the engineers will be designing the system to meet the needs of those who signed up. The Rhineland Water Supply Corp. is very interested in being able to provide this service to a larger area. Boone stated that is the system is not built or service is not feasible to your location that the membership fee will

be completely refunded.

## METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.

Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.

Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:

- (1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
- (2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
- (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.

As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.

All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
